# Way over goal with \$18,500

A slump in the economy according to McIntosh, who hasn't dampened the success of the Elkland-Novesta United Way campaign.

# Residents' objections halt rehabilitation facility

Plans to build an athletic and rehabilitation facility in Cass City are on hold following discussion at a village Planning Commission meeting last week.

Hills and Dales General Hospital officials had proposed building the onestory, 4,000 square foot facility on 2 lots adjacent to the hospital, just north of where Hill Street dead ends into Dale Street.

But concerns voiced by a number of residents during the planning board's Nov. 19 meeting prompted hospital President Ken E. Jensen to withdraw his request to rezone the lots from single family to multiple family use. The change was needed to proceed with the project. A dozen residents attended last week's meeting, village manager and planning board



Add old movies, especially if they are westerns (no war pictures, thanks), and science and nature films and there you have it.

You can add probably up to an hour a night for station clicking. It's a rare night that all the channels aren't run through a couple of times. It's easier than looking at the TV program book, which may be wrong any-

One trouble with my taste in television is that I'm frequently out of it when the latest television star and hot show are the topic at party time. And if the show starts after 10 p.m., count me out. There's no TV on in the mornings either.

So, what does all this prove? You guessed it. Nothing. But I think it illustrates a point. Familiarity breeds contempt. To capture

## Secret government

The Detroit cop's superiors wouldn't allow him to talk to me, but they couldn't muzzle his wife. She was too outraged to keep quiet. It's the type of outrage that should be aimed at Mayor Coleman Young and Police Chief Stanley Knox for refusing to explain their actions — or lack of actions to the taxpayers who pay their salaries.

Last month I wrote about the \$20 parking tickets issued to several teachers at Finney High School by Officer Gerald Flannery. Teacher Marilyn Williams-White said they were cited for illegal parking on a stretch of street where there was no sign prohibiting parking. She said Flannery told her there used to be a sign and he was issuing tickets on that basis.

At the 5th (Jefferson) Precinct, Lt. Stanley Dziuba told me he couldn't comment. He also said he couldn't ask Flannery to return my call. It was no surprise. In Young's underground administration, managers routinely are instructed to withhold public information from the public and its only practical news conduit, the dratted media.

#### A sign of stonewalling

So the column had to be written with no response from Flannery. But subsequently there was a phone call from his wife, Bonnie. She wanted me to know the no-parking sign was "maliciously removed" by unknown persons. She said Williams-White and the other ticketed teachers darn well knew this and were taking advantage of the situation.

The teachers would continue to stop at a dangerous intersection after the stop sign had been removed by vandals, Bonnie Flannery noted. The teachers were setting a poor example for their students, and the illegally parked cars could hinder fire fighters in case of a school fire, she added.

I asked Bonnie Flannery whether my quoting her might get her husband in trouble with police brass. She said she didn't think so. but even if it did, she had a right to be heard because, "I'm not a police officer."

OK. I'm pleased to oblige

the officer's wife, and only sorry the city's arrogant stonewall policy prevented me from talking to the officer and including pertinent information in the original column.

I checked back with Williams-White, who agreed there was a no parking sign in the area until about the middle of September. She said she had no idea how or why it was removed. And Williams-White noted that the law was obviously on her side: After my "ghost-sign" column appeared, all the disputed tickets written by Flannery were dismissed. As of last week, there was still no sign, teachers continued to park there, and no tickets were being written.

All of which, I concede, might seem like a lot of fuss over a few lousy parking tickets. Especially in a city wracked by drugs, murder and theft. My reason for belaboring the Finney case is to make the point that Young's secret government hides public information from the puble on a wide range of bureaucratic mismanagement, stretching from double parking to rape. And our outrage should be apportioned accordingly.

#### Mixed-up priorities

One worse example: Last Sunday's Free Press, in horrendous detail, described an armed auto theft that led to a kidnapping and rape. The husband of the victim, ousted from the family car, immediately phoned 911. Police never showed up, even after a second call during which the 911 operator advised the husband to calm down.'

Subsequently, the Detroit Police Department's official explanation was: "No comment."

How do they get away with that crap? Easy. In any other city, the mayor would fire a police chief who dared spit so egregiously in the public eye. But in Detroit, it's everyday policy, dictated by the

Detroit, where the cops led personally by Knox have time to throw homeless people out of tents pitched on private property. But no time to respond to an auto theft, kidnapping and rape. And no comment.

It's astonishing, outrageous and....routine.

# **Cass City survey reveals**

# Friendly church is important

for a church, a number of reason for not attending Cass City residents who church? don't attend services regularly look for friendly, unified, sincere people and interesting, practical, Biblebased preaching.

Many cite "other priori-

ties" or give no reason at all as to why they don't attend church, and many aren't certain what needs the church should strive to meet.

These observations were revealed in a public opinion survey conducted over the summer by representatives of the Lighthouse Baptist Church, which meets in both Caro and Cass City.

The week-long survey was conducted house to house, with some 150 households responding, according to Pastor Michael Wester.

"The unique aspect about this survey was that it polled only those who were not attending church on a regular basis," he said. "Most of the town of Cass City was surveyed. For those not at home, a survey was left for them to fill out and mail in."

The goal of the project, according to Wester, was to identify barriers — many that churches may not even be aware of — that might be keeping people home.

"We want to try to improve the church to the point to where we can reach these people — give them a reason

to want to come to church." The survey, which sought opinions and attitudes about churches, asked 4 questions: 1) How should the pastor

When it comes to looking 2) What is the primary

3) What would you look for in a church?

4) What are the greatest needs the shurch ought to strive to meet?

#### RESPONSES MIXED

Responses to the first quesdown the middle between "whatever a pastor prefers" and "a suit." Another 21 percent said "a robe", while "a shirt and tie" and "casual dress" each was selected by 11.5 percent.

Nearly 30 percent of respondents said other priorities keep them from attending church regularly.

Some 26 percent gave no reason, 10 percent said there's something wrong within the church, and the remaining respondents offered a variety of responses Some 17 percent said spiriranging from no desire and no belief in God to not wanting to be preached at and too many religions.

"The top 6 responses indicate that the church needs to be working hard to improve its image, and to make clear its purpose for existence,' Wester commented.

Responses to the third percent saying that in seeking a church, they look for sincere and spiritual). Another 23 percent said practical and Bible-based, said.

while 19 percent said they're unsure and 12 percent said denomination was a deciding factor. Programs, a small church and people of the same age rounded out the answers.

"The pastor and/or elders of the church must work hard at studying the word and teaching Bible-based messages."

Nearly half — 43 percent of respondents gave no answer to the fourth ques-

tual needs, 12 percent said physical needs and 10 percent said "bring unity and harmony." The other replies indicated the church should address the needs of the people within the church, address certain topics, the needs of youth or no needs.

"The answers given (this question) probably reflect the needs with the question also varied, with 26 responder's life. The church must strive to listen to each need as perceived by the people (friendly, unified, individual, but should strive to minister to the whole person - physically, emotionpreaching that is interesting, ally and spiritually," Wester

Overall, Wester commented he believes churches should address areas that are keeping some people from attending church.

The perception that there is something wrong with the church, for example, might be rectified in part if church members lovingly confront one another when there's something wrong in their life, he said.


"Obviously, there are some things that we can't compromise, but there are some barriers we should break down...as long as it doesn't compromise the Biblical demand by God for a church."



When it comes to cholesterol, wild game is surprisingly higher than domestic animals. One hundred grams of choice beef contains 72 milligrams, compared to 116 milligrams in white-tailed deer.

# **HEART ATTACK RISK FACTORS**

Heart attacks have been on the decline since 1968 and can still go lower. By correcting a few of the risk factors that we have learned about, you can decrease your chances of ever having a heart attack.

There are three main factors that contribute to heart attacks, and each of them can be corrected. These three risks are high blood pressure, high cholesterol and smoking.

High blood pressure is easy to diagnose by simply having it checked. When it is elevated, it can be treated with changes in lifestyle, diet and medicines. In a few cases, the blood pressure is caused by a correctable obstruction of the kidney arteries or other lesions.

Smoke causes the blood to clot and plug the arteries more easily and the lung damage also makes the heart work harder. It is very important to stop smoking and now there are stop-smoking classes and medicines to assist you. Together, these are fairly effective.

Check your blood pressure and cholesterol once a year and avoid smoking. Doing these things will give you a healthier heart.







and 126 children, she said. Overall, the program served nearly 1,000 clients in Tuscola, Huron, Sanilac and Lapeer counties.

Aside from emergency shelter, services provided by the facility to victims of domestic and sexual assault include counseling, advocacy, information and referral, a 24-hour crisis line and support groups.

Elimination of the emergency needs program translates into a loss of about \$12,000 a year for the Thumb area shelter, Kopka

Offenbecher pointed out the center has also lost staffing. When state cuts began last February, she said, 2 full-time positions were eliminated, leaving a staff of 5 full-time and 2 part-time employees. Because the center is a residential facility, it must be staffed 24

hours a day. Kopka said state cuts have affected a number of sources

of revenue.

"With other cuts that have been made through the DSS. . .I think many women are fearful of getting enough assistance at the shelter,' she said.

That worries officials at the area crisis center.

"Every 15 seconds a woman is battered in this country," Offenbecher remarked. "When you take into account there's 260 million people, that's stag-

Kopka agreed the problem is very real and very local. 'Woman are killed (as a result of domestic violence) more often than people think. And it happens here," she said.

Domestic assault and disturbances are a common occurrence in Tuscola County, according to Sheriff Tom Kern, who doesn't see that trend fading, particularly in light of tougher economic times.

"I think it's only going to get rougher, the way it looks," he said.

Last month, the sheriff's department handled nearly 70 domestic disturbance complaints, compared to 44 in October 1990. Kern cautioned that the numbers include all domestic disturbance calls, not only those involving a battering situINCREASED

Kopka said the number of women seeking help from the crisis center has increased every year since the facility opened in 1986. Despite funding cuts, she indicated every effort is being made to ensure that help continues to be available to those who need it.

At this point, she continued, "We're trying to look at ways that we're going to make up (lost funding).'

Residents who would like to help are being asked to make a holiday donation to the crisis center in the name of a friend or relative to help provide shelter for victims of abuse. Gifts may be purchased on behalf of the assault crisis center through the HDC by calling 673-4121 or 1-800-292-3666.

Kopka encourages women caught in a violent relationship to contact the crisis center and not delay seeking

"I wouldn't want fear to keep them in that situation." she commented, adding crisis center officials will do everything they can to help.

"We're still here and we'll do the best we can to weather these cuts."
