Crisis Center survives budget cuts

Concern that state budget cuts would shut down the Thumb Area Assault Crisis Center haven't materialized, but shelter officials say the loss of emergency needs funding is hurting the Thumb program.

More worrisome, they say, is that some battered women may be delaying a decision to leave a violent relationship for fear that help won't be available.

The reduction in funding

"has really affected our program. It's been a real difficult time for our clients," said Lori Offenbecher, case manager at the Thumb Area crisis center.

Before the state's emergency needs program was eliminated last month, shelter programs received payments from the Department of Social Services for eligible clients for up to 30 days, according to Offenbecher.

"It's not a lot, but it helped out with expenses," she said. On top of that, Offenbecher added, eligible women received a first month's rent and security deposit to help them start over again.

"Now, that isn't available. That means these women have no resources, so they have no means to permanently remove themselves from the (violent home)

situation." "Most of the women who come into the shelter have no income, so they basically become homeless and indigent at the same time," she explained. "I can tell you that most of the women who come here have only the clothes on their backs."

SAFETY NET

"It's kind of like the safety

net's been pulled from underneath them."

About 70 percent of the women who go to the shelter qualify to receive the emergency needs funding, according to Karen Kopka, director of the Thumb crisis center, a program of the Caro-based Human Development Commission.

Last year, the crisis center housed 83 women, including 49 from Tuscola County.

Success! United Way over goal with \$18,500

A slump in the economy hasn't dampened the success of the Elkland-Novesta United Way campaign.

In fact, the area effort has more than topped this year's goal of \$16,000.

"We're looking real good, I'm happy to report. We've been real successful," Elkland-Novesta United Way President Dale McIntosh said.

As of Tuesday morning, donations totaled some \$18,500, he added. "To say the least, I'm very, very happy with the way things look."

This year's goal was set \$2,000 short of the 1990-91 goal. The amount was reduced due to concerns over a sluggish economy.

The 4-week campaign ended Nov. 15, but donations are still coming in,

according to McIntosh, who is serving in his first year as president of the area United Way organization.

He attributes this year's success to several factors, including a continued tradition of generosity in the area, particularly among hourly and salaried employees and their employers.

In addition, he said, "We really expanded the numbers of people involved in the campaign process and we've reached greater numbers of people."

McIntosh explained that about 20 volunteers, in addition to the 10 members of the United Way Board of Directors, were actively involved in soliciting contributions from individuals, business, industry, schools and others.

Another reason the campaign has enjoyed success

year after year is people know that a majority of their contribution is going to stay in the community, McIntosh continued.

"United Way hits so many organizations within the Cass City area. It seems everybody is affected by some of the organizations we support."

Money collected during the annual campaign is distributed in the spring.

This year, some \$18,500 was allocated locally to organizations such as the Girl, Cub and Boy Scouts, Rawson Memorial Library, little league, Village Bach Festival, AAUW, Village of Cass City, Cass City Food Pantry, Cass City Players, Cass City Literacy Council and the Tom Thumb Singers.

Residents' objections halt rehabilitation facility

Plans to build an athletic and rehabilitation facility in Cass City are on hold following discussion at a village Planning Commission meeting last week.

Hills and Dales General Hospital officials had proposed building the one-story, 4,000 square foot facility on 2 lots adjacent to the hospital, just north of where Hill Street dead ends into Dale Street.

But concerns voiced by a number of residents during the planning board's Nov. 19 meeting prompted hospital President Ken E. Jensen to withdraw his request to rezone the lots from single family to multiple family use. The change was needed to proceed with the project.

A dozen residents attended last week's meeting, village manager and planning board member Lou S. LaPonsie

said.

"There were a few others who weren't here, but sent a letter," he added. "(Their comments) were all pretty much along the same line; they all wanted to see the rehabilitation center constructed, but yet they thought maybe (the hospital) could do it on other existing properties."

Traffic was among the residents' concerns, according

to LaPonsie, who said many of them stated it was their understanding the property in question would remain residential in nature.

Aside from citizen comments, LaPonsie said Jensen outlined the hospital's plans during the 50-minute session.

"It was a very peaceful meeting," he added. "People were very interested in what he had in mind."

Jensen has said the new facility would house the Michigan Athletic and Rehabilitation Center, a subsidiary of Hills and Dales Health Care Corporation.

Plans call for the center to serve as a rehabilitation/fitness facility where clients would be evaluated for muscle injury, work with specialized fitness equipment on a daily basis and receive treatment. The center would serve both industry and individuals in the Thumb.

Despite last week's setback, Jensen indicated the project is still alive. "It's on hold right now. We'll have to give it some more thought," he said. "We've got several other options and we're looking into them."

Benefit concert starts annual Bach Festival

A benefit performance Tuesday, Nov. 26, at 8:15 p.m. by Dr. Marilyn Mason, university organist for the University of Michigan, opens the 13th annual Bach Festival held, as always, during Thanksgiving week.

The benefit concert by Dr. Mason was scheduled at the First Presbyterian Church in Caro. It was made necessary because state funding was eliminated. The guest artist is donating her time and talent. Tickets for the benefit performance are \$20 for adults and \$10 for senior citizens and students.

For the three concerts scheduled in Cass City, tickets are \$15, reserved, \$10 general admission and \$8 for students and senior citizens. Mason has spent over 40 years as U of M organist and chairman of the organ department. She has expanded the range of opportunities for organists and female musicians. The artist was the first woman to play at Westminster Abbey, the first American organist to play in Egypt and the first woman organist to play in Latin America. During one year

invitations took her to 5 continents. She has commissioned and premiered 45 works.

Thirty top quality musicians will perform in the 3 Cass City concerts at the First Presbyterian Church. They will be held Friday and Saturday at 8:15 p.m. and Sunday at 2 p.m.

Returning to direct and conduct the concert, as he has done since the Festival started in Cass City, will be Don Th. Jaeger, who currently is music director of the Midland Odessa Symphony and Choral in Midland, Texas.

Among his achievements in a long, distinguished career was direction of the Midland Symphony Orchestra for 12 years, and concurrently for 7 years conductor of the Traverse Symphony.

Highlights of the season will be the Peasant Cantata by Bach, Britten's Simple Symphony, Haydn's Concerto for Horn in D Major and, as a finale Sunday afternoon, selected recitations and arias from the Messiah.

In the 1920 file book, I got only as far as the basketball season before other duties called me away.

Cass City's basketball team won the Class B championship that year, defeating Grayling, Jennings, Corunna and Greenville in the state tournament at Mt. Pleasant.

Frank Champion was the coach and the team members were James Brooker, Earl Gowen, Frederick Pinney, Creighton Cathcart, Stanley Craft, Park Jones and Andrew Champion.

The girls' team apparently wasn't as successful. On that roster were Dunlap, Ohls, Benkelman, Ewing, Gordon and Marshall. (No first names given.)

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from 1920 that caught my attention.

The Exchange Bank of E. H. Pinney & Son had just installed steel cages to "safeguard the deposits of our customers." According to the article, the number of bank robberies had increased greatly in the past year.

The Akron Leader became the third Tuscola County newspaper to suspend publication within an 18-month period, and 5 Huron County newspapers increased their subscription price from \$1.50 to \$2.00. The Chronicle was apparently still going strong, and a bargain at \$1.50 a year.

The T & M clothing store advertised men's 2-piece wool underwear for \$2.35 and \$2.75. A fleece-lined set was \$1.35, and men's work shoes were going for \$3.85.

E. W. Jones grocery offered 3 packages of toasted corn flakes for 25 cents. Also for a quarter, you could get 2 large cans of pumpkin or 2 packages of Teco pancake flour.

The prices might make you long to return to those "good old days", but some of the other articles tend to temper the desire.

A February 1920 Chronicle told about a woman and baby found dead in their home, where her husband and 3 other small children were terribly sick with influenza, and another daughter, 13, had pneumonia.

Every issue in those days contained obituaries of people who had died of influenza.

Feminists were at work back in that era, but their aim then was more easily defined than sexual harassment. They were struggling for the right to vote. This is from an article in an early 1920 Chronicle.

"The American woman's long fight for equal suffrage enters upon its final stage this week, when the annual sessions of state legislatures convene. Suffrage leaders have every hope of ratification by a sufficient number of states to insure full participation by 28,000,000 women voters in the presidential and congressional elections next November."

Women may not have arrived yet, but we've come a long way in the course of a generation. (The ratification was certified in August of that year.)

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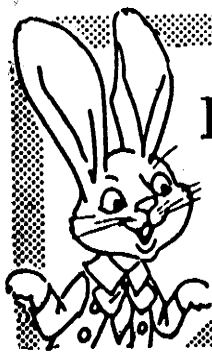

Students learn about banking firsthand

Deford Elementary School students are learning firsthand that a penny saved is a penny earned. . . plus interest.

The students also are learning about banking, including the ins and outs of making out a deposit slip, thanks to a project initiated in the school this year by Thumb National Bank.

According to Thumb National employees Colleen Langenburg and Jeanine Comment, the program brings the bank to the students.

"We come twice a month," Langenburg explained. During the visits, students take their pennies, nickels, dimes, quarters and dollars to the cafeteria, where they wait patiently in line to make their deposit.

"The kids fill out their own slips, so they learn how to do it, and then anytime they make a deposit, we have some prize for them; a sticker or pencil," she said.

Comment remarked the deposits have ranged from a penny to as much as \$20.

"At the end of the school year, we issue all of them a check," she noted, adding it gives the students a chance to see the interest earned on

their deposits.

One trouble with my taste in television is that I'm frequently out of it when the latest television star and hot show are the topic at party time. And if the show starts after 10 p.m., count me out. There's no TV on in the mornings either.

So, what does all this prove? You guessed it. Nothing. But I think it illustrates a point. Familiarity breeds contempt. To capture

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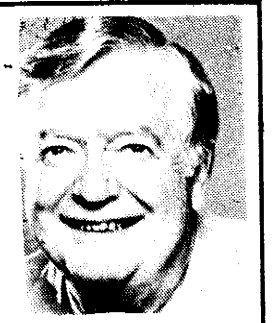

Secret government

The Detroit cop's superiors wouldn't allow him to talk to me, but they couldn't muzzle his wife. She was too outraged to keep quiet. It's the type of outrage that should be aimed at Mayor Coleman Young and Police Chief Stanley Knox for refusing to explain their actions—or lack of actions—to the taxpayers who pay their salaries.

Last month I wrote about the \$20 parking tickets issued to several teachers at Finney High School by Officer Gerald Flannery. Teacher Marilyn Williams-White said they were cited for illegal parking on a stretch of street where there was no sign prohibiting parking. She said Flannery told her there used to be a sign and he was issuing tickets on that basis.

At the 5th (Jefferson) Precinct, Lt. Stanley Dziuba told me he couldn't comment. He also said he couldn't ask Flannery to return my call. It was no surprise. In Young's underground administration, managers routinely are instructed to withhold public information from the public and its only practical news conduit, the dratted media.

A sign of stonewalling

So the column had to be written with no response from Flannery. But subsequently there was a phone call from his wife, Bonnie.

She wanted me to know the no-parking sign was "maliciously removed" by unknown persons. She said Williams-White and the other ticketed teachers darn well knew this and were taking advantage of the situation.

The teachers would continue to stop at a dangerous intersection after the stop sign had been removed by vandals, Bonnie Flannery noted. The teachers were setting a poor example for their students, and the illegally parked cars could hinder fire fighters in case of a school fire, she added.

I asked Bonnie Flannery whether my quoting her might get her husband in trouble with police brass. She said she didn't think so, but even if it did, she had a right to be heard because, "I'm not a police officer."

OK, I'm pleased to oblige the officer's wife, and only sorry the city's arrogant stonewall policy prevented me from talking to the offi-

Mixed-up priorities

One worse example: Last Sunday's Free Press, in horrendous detail, described an armed auto theft that led to a kidnapping and rape. The husband of the victim, ousted from the family car, immediately phoned 911. Police never showed up, even after a second call during which the 911 operator advised the husband to "calm down."

Subsequently, the Detroit Police Department's official explanation was: "No comment."

How do they get away with that crap? Easy. In any other city, the mayor would fire a police chief who dared spit so egregiously in the public eye. But in Detroit, it's everyday policy, dictated by the mayor.

Detroit, where the cops — led personally by Knox — have time to throw homeless people out of tents pitched on private property. But no time to respond to an auto theft, kidnapping and rape. And no comment.

It's astonishing, outrageous and...routine.

72-38 in regional play Fowler ends O-G season

The Owen-Gage basketball team's season ended Monday at Vestaburg, where powerhouse Fowler defeated the Bulldogs, 72-

38, in regional play.

Fowler, whose record now stands at 23-0, was too tall, too strong, too quick, and simply too much for the

Bulldogs, who finish the season at 17-7.

But as head coach Dean Roller commented, don't feel too bad for his 1991

The Bulldogs accomplished 2 of the 3 and with a couple of lucky bounces could have copped the league crown.

Fowler took control of the contest from the outset when they jumped out in front 21-7 in the opening quarter.

Kristen Nobach, who had a game high 21 points, loosened the Bulldogs' defense by connecting on long range jumpers, including 3 triples. Fowler added to its lead in the second stanza, going inside to Nicole Harr and Kara Hafner, who each posted 10 markers. The Bulldogs trailed at the half, 39-16.

Michelle Tkacz, who was held to just 3 first half points, started to heat up in the last half and finished with a typical 21-point performance. But it was too little too late, as Fowler had built a 61-26 edge after 3 quarters.

"Fowler was intimidating. They stand 6' 5", 5' 11", 5' 10", and we missed some easy shots early," said Roller.

Besides Tkacz's 21 tallies, Jill Susalla and Lisa Dorsch finished with 6 points each, Lori Ondrajka posted 4 and Lynn Cummins netted 2.

After the loss, it didn't take Roller long to find something to look positive on.

"We've got 4 starters returning next year."

Basketball fans were treated to a real beauty Friday night at Owendale, where the Bulldogs edged Akron-Fairgrove, 53-49, to capture the district title.

Ondrajka never hesitated and calmly responded to the pressure by swishing both free throws and advanced the winners to regional play.

Season ends Saturday

Hunters taking more bucks

Thumb area hunters taking part in this year's regular firearm deer season appear to be taking a higher percentage of bucks compared to recent years.

Other than that, the season, which ends Saturday, has been fairly typical, according to DNR officials.

As of Thursday, the DNR Cass City Field Office had checked 185 deer since gun hunters took to the field Nov. 15. "That was exactly the number we checked on (that) date last year," said Bud Jarvis, a wildlife biologist.

A lot of nice bucks, including a 12-pointer, have been brought in, he noted. Overall, 70 to 75 percent of the deer were yearlings, which is normal.

The total includes 150 bucks. Last year, 107 bucks had been checked by the same date, according to Jarvis, who said only 19 percent of the deer checked this year were antlerless, compared to 43 percent in

1990.

"What does all this mean? Probably nothing, because it's all voluntary," he remarked.

Jarvis pointed out, however, that the numbers correlate with a significant reduction in the number of antlerless deer permits issued this year.

By the end of the firearm season, Jarvis said he ex-

pects 250 to 300 deer will be checked at the Cass City Field Office. The purpose of the check stations, set up statewide, is to get a picture of the overall health of the deer herd.

As has been the case in recent years, the Thumb herd appears to be in good shape; farm fed, big, fat and healthy, Jarvis commented.

11 swine producers participate

Eleven swine producers from 3 counties in the Thumb area will be delivering their pigs to Michigan Livestock Exchange in Cass City Dec. 9 as part of the 1991 Michigan Genetic Improvement Program (MGIP).

The pigs will then be shipped Dec. 10 to Routh Packing Company in Sandusky, Ohio, where carcass and

health data will be obtained.

MGIP is sponsored by the Michigan Cooperative Extension Service, Michigan Livestock Exchange and the Michigan Pork Producers Association. The purpose of the program is to help producers monitor the health status, carcass merit and growth potential of their pigs.

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The newspapers are valued at \$51.25, according to reports, which state the incident remains under investigation.

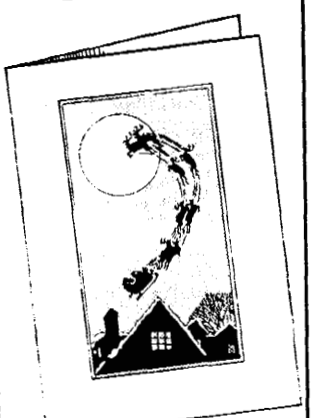

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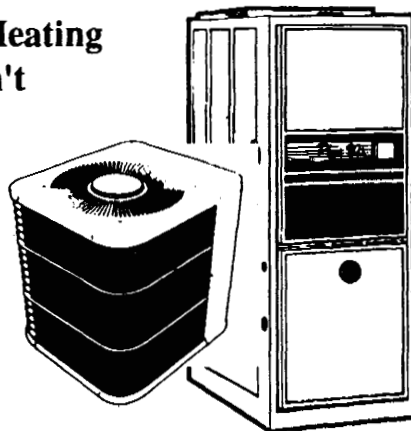
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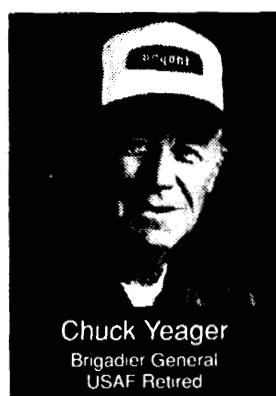
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Glorious season ends

The Eagles quickly showed that the team was more than just big. Paced by freshman Ann Lemire, a devastating ball handler and shooter, the Eagles time after time broke down the floor for fast-break baskets.

Equally as frustrating to the Hawks was the defense the Eagles threw at Cass City. Coach Art Pelzer used zone defense all night featuring a variety of traps on the ball handler and it paid big dividends. Time after time Cass City coughed up the ball without getting a shot.

Less fat in wild game

When it comes to cholesterol, wild game is surprisingly higher than domestic animals. One hundred grams of choice beef contains 72 milligrams, compared to 116 milligrams in white-tailed deer.

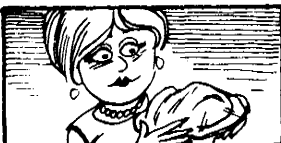

and 126 children, she said. Overall, the program served nearly 1,000 clients in Tuscola, Huron, Sanilac and Lapeer counties.

Aside from emergency shelter, services provided by the facility to victims of domestic and sexual assault include counseling, advocacy, information and referral, a 24-hour crisis line and support groups.

Elimination of the emergency needs program translates into a loss of about \$12,000 a year for the Thumb area shelter, Kopka said.

Offenbecher pointed out the center has also lost staffing. When state cuts began last February, she said, 2 full-time positions were eliminated, leaving a staff of 5 full-time and 2 part-time employees. Because the center is a residential facility, it must be staffed 24 hours a day.

Kopka said state cuts have affected a number of sources of revenue.

FEARFUL

"With other cuts that have been made through the DSS, I think many women are

fearful of getting enough assistance at the shelter," she said.

That worries officials at the area crisis center.

"Every 15 seconds a woman is battered in this country," Offenbecher remarked. "When you take into account there's 260 million people, that's staggering."

Kopka agreed the problem is very real and very local. "Woman are killed (as a result of domestic violence) more often than people think. And it happens here," she said.

Domestic assault and disturbances are a common occurrence in Tuscola County, according to Sheriff Tom Kern, who doesn't see that trend fading, particularly in light of tougher economic times.

"I think it's only going to get rougher, the way it looks," he said.

Last month, the sheriff's department handled nearly 70 domestic disturbance complaints, compared to 44 in October 1990. Kern cautioned that the numbers include all domestic disturbance calls, not only those involving a battering situation.

INCREASED

Kopka said the number of women seeking help from the crisis center has increased every year since the facility opened in 1986. Despite funding cuts, she indicated every effort is being made to ensure that help continues to be available to those who need it.

At this point, she continued, "We're trying to look at ways that we're going to make up (lost funding)."

Residents who would like to help are being asked to make a holiday donation to the crisis center in the name of a friend or relative to help provide shelter for victims of abuse. Gifts may be purchased on behalf of the assault crisis center through the HDC by calling 673-4121 or 1-800-292-3666.

Kopka encourages women caught in a violent relationship to contact the crisis center and not delay seeking help.

"I wouldn't want fear to keep them in that situation," she commented, adding crisis center officials will do everything they can to help. "We're still here and we'll do the best we can to weather these cuts."

Both men were to have faced preliminary examinations today (Wednesday). Bond for LeFave was set at a combined \$8,000, while Fuller's bond was set at \$20,000.

In addition, Fuller faces 2 counts of delivery of cocaine (less than 50 grams).
