Fire razes uninsured barn

A fire Friday evening at about 11 p.m. originating in an electric fence razed a small barn and killed livestock at the farm of Marshall Angle, about a half mile south of Mushroom Road on Cemetery Road.

The blaze was discovered by Ann Yost, Angle's granddaughter, who told him that the barn was glowing. She noticed the fire on the way to the nearby trailer home to pick up fuses. Prior to the fire the fence had already blown 2 fuses.

Lost in the fire were a ram, a goat and 4 baby pigs. Also badly burned was a horse that the veterinarian that was called said may still not survive. Cold weather will increase its chances, Angle said, because it eliminates the problems of flies.

The barn was not insured. I tried, but the insurance company refused to insure it, the owner explained. Whether the contents are

Attorney General Frank J. Kelley announced last week that 39 customers of 3 auto dealerships owned by Robert Scott, including Ouvry Chevrolet-Olds, Inc., doing business as Scott City, will be reimbursed for money they lost in dealings with the 3 companies.

Included were at least 4 from the Cass City area. They are:

Melvin McFarland, 4402 Rescue Road; Mike Kostanko, 6748 Kelly Road; Stanley Szarapski, 6020 Kelly Road, and James A. Mester, 5441 Shabbona Road, Decker.

Kelley filed a lawsuit against the dealerships, owner Scott and Transamerica Insurance Company of Michigan, the company which bonded the dealerships. Ingham County Circuit Judge Carolyn Stell directed the company to pay the consumers who were cheated.

Report busy year at fire department

The Elkland Township Fire Department responded to 88 alarms in 1991. The year saw fire fighters spend 2,355 hours fighting blazes that caused a combined \$368,750 in damage.

had 58 calls in 1990. He didn't have a specific figure, but said the total loss in 1991 was much greater. According to the chief, fire

fighters responded to a total of 14 fires involving residential class structures, including 11 homes. Total damage in those blazes, 3 of which involved arson, is estimated at \$191,100. The 3 fires with the greatest

single losses involved the Harland Lounsbury dairy farm — \$150,000 (Feb. 18), Gilligan's and the Cass-T-Way Inn — \$100,000 (July 31), and the Lee Voss home — \$75,000 (Jan. 23).

Also in 1991, there were 8 "other" structure fires, involving buildings such as barns and offices, that comprised another \$174,150 in losses, while vehicle and other fires accounted for 4

damage. There were 17 grass and rubbish fires. Fire fighters also assisted

other departments 17 times and responded to 10 calls involving medical emergencies (Jaws of Life), 5 for hazardous materials (spills, leaks, etc.), 3 for "other"

alarms and some \$3,500 in hazardous situations (power line down, etc.) and 4 miscellaneous situations.

New ruling nixes problem for townships

Area township clerks heaved a collective sigh of relief last week when the Michigan Republican Party said it would rescind a rule requiring voters to declare 30 days in advance if they intended to vote Republican and sign a card indicating this preference. The Democrats previ-

ously had voted to have persons who wished to vote Democrat sign a card before entering the polls, but not in advance. A survey of 6 area town-

ship clerks revealed the reason for the concern. In none of them had 50

percent of the registered voters signed a party preference card.

In the Chronicle 6-township survey, Ellington Township would have suffered most if the rule had not been changed. Just 210 of the 850 registered voters

there, 24 percent, had signed party preference cards.

Evergreen Township Clerk Arthur Severance said that 38 percent, 206 out of 532 registered had signed cards. He expected perhaps 100 would vote in the primary before the rule was changed.

The remaining township clerks reported cards signed by nearly 50 percent. Norma Wallace said that "less than half" of Elkland Township's 1990 registered voters had signed. Grant Township with

450 registered reported that 220 (48 percent) had signed while Nursie Kloc at Novesta Township said that 213 out of 769 had signed. However, she added, of the 769 registered, 294 had registered with driver's license applications and had never

The trip will last 2 weeks and will cost \$2,795 per member.



Passenger Safety Awareness Week. The week, which includes Valentine's Day, Feb. 14, ties in with Michigan's "Buckle Up for Love" slogan.

There are lots of "weeks" that we dismiss without notice because they are trivial or an obvious public relations ploy for one industry or another. We call attention here because statistics prove that children buckled up or in approved safety seats are less likely to be killed or injured in an automobile accident.

Since the child passenger safety law went into effect in 1981 there has been a 29.5 percent decline in kids' traffic deaths and injuries.

We could do much better than that if everyone obeyed the law. In 1990 42 children under the age of 15 were killed in auto accidents.

In addition, 73 were killed in 1990 between the ages of 15 and 19.

That's considerably better than the 119 that died in 1981, but not nearly as good as we should be doing if everyone obeyed the seat

"I've paid taxes and worked all my life, until now. It's obscene that I have to go 3 weeks without any income. It makes me ashamed to be a Michiganian," Heard said, adding that he'd complained to the MESC, the governor's office and his state senator, but all he gets is "a check's-inthe-mail snow job.'

LAWMAKERS AREN'T **SUFFERING**

So I phoned the MESC

office in Livonia, where Heard has waited in line for 90 minutes to be told his overdue check will soon be in the mail. Manager Dan Previch told me he was sorry that many checks have been late, but it can't be helped. Because of compensation extensions and a Christmas rush, there has been too much work and too few people to do it. But lately, he's hired more clerks some right out of the jobless line in his office — and the situation will soon improve.

I hope so. Michigan legislators are spending nearly \$1 million of our money for antiques and handcrafted furniture to outfit their renovated state Capitol offices. It's difficult for a frivolous columnist to operate comfortably in a state that can pay \$2,500 each for 20 custom-built chairs for lawmakers' pampered rumps but can't give jobless people their paltry unemployment checks on time.

It's a real shame. But until desperate people such as Glenn Heard become as important to our legislators as their office furniture, I probably won't be able to give Vic Damone's 900 pairs of slacks the serious attention they deserve.

Fire department reports busy year

fires, handling hazardous materials situations and responding to accidents with the Jaws of Life, firemen completed a variety of training sessions.

All volunteers must have 24 hours of fire fighter training each year plus 17 hours of hazardous material training. Two hours of mandatory training are held at the fire hall each month.

Four men completed Fire Fighter I training, which consists of 132 hours, and 2 others completed the Fire Fighter II program, also comprising 132 hours. The latter certification enables a firemen to work for any department in the nation.

Each of the men have had 4 hours of hazardous materials awareness schooling, and 6 have had 24 hours of hazardous materials training. Some have also attended advanced sessions through Delta College and at seminars throughout the

The Cass City area fire department, staffed by 25 volunteers, is a "paid on-call department," meaning personnel are paid only for their time fighting fires. They receive mileage, but no compensation for training.

The department's area of primary responsibility covers nearly 160 square miles. The area, which has an estimated 6,000 residents, includes Cass City, Deford, Elkland Township and Novesta Township, and portions of Evergreen, Greenleaf, Grant, Ellington and Kingston townships.

Airport authority effort underway

A group of Tuscola County business and community leaders is planning for 1992 to be the year for a proposed airport authority, paving the way for further expansion at the Caro Municipal Airport.

The goal of forming an airport authority is being promoted by a committee that was created following the Tuscola 2001 strategic planning process, which took place last year.

Among those on the airport authority committee is Margie White, who explained that state law allows 2 or more units of government to incorporate an authority for the planning, improving, enlarging and maintaining of an airport.

"Any county, city, village or township can become a member. Membership can be given either upon the creation of the authority, or at a later time upon a majority vote of the existing members," she said.

Committee member L.E. Althaver remarked that the cost of operation and expansion of any airport, including the Caro Airport, is becoming cost prohibitive for one community to under-

"If such an authority is formed, it will give the group the opportunity to leverage local funding and receive state and federal dollars through various grants," he added. "Right now, there is no need to raise the operating budget at the airport substantially."

According to Caro village officials, over the last 5 years, the village's general fund contributed \$19,000 per year to the airport's budget. The majority of that money went towards capital improvements, such as hangars, a runway extension and weather equipment.

Another person who supports the formation of an airport authority is Wes Raven. "The airport is access to our area. It is like our streets and highways, except it doesn't have to concern itself with connecting links. It automatically connects with every other airport in the country," he said.

Members of the committee stated that a good airport means employment. The airplane is a tool of modern business, and industry lo-

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


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


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North Huron presses O-G to 74-50 loss

A Sheridan Township man has been formally charged in what is being described as the biggest ever drug bust in Huron County.

Paul D. Dean, 41, faces counts of possession with intent to deliver 225 grams or more but less than 650 grams of cocaine, possession with intent to deliver marijuana, and use of a firearm in the commission of a felony, according to Huron County Prosecutor Leslie A.

Dean was arrested Thursday after police searched his home and found large amounts of cocaine and

marijuana, as well as cash and weapons.

The search warrant was executed by officers from the Thumb Narcotics Unit, Michigan State Police and Huron County Sheriff's Department.

The officers seized about 296 grams of cocaine, with an estimated street value of more than \$36,000; 40 pounds of marijuana, with an estimated street value of \$60,000; drug paraphernalia; \$28,000 in cash, and numerous weapons, including 3 handguns and one machine gun.

ARE YOU AN ORGAN DONOR?

A 17- year-old athlete weakens and becomes short of breath with little exertion. He has a viral infection of the heart which weakens it to the point that it is lifethreatening.

Matching studies are done and he is given a pager--he will have to get to the transplant center in an hour or two when an organ becomes available. He waits for the call--day or night--when his life-saving organ becomes available. Sometimes the call doesn't come.

Other patients are on waiting lists for kidneys and must face dialysis every few days. There are also waiting lists for livers, corneas and other organs.

Finding donors is the biggest problem. A kidney can be donated from a relative without harming the donor, but organs such as eyes and hearts can not be. These must be obtained from victims of accidental deaths where these organs are still healthy. Then careful matching of the organs to the appropriate recipient must be done to lessen the chance of rejection.

Since time is crucial in obtaining and processing donor organs, the decision to donate is best made beforehand--not by your family at a time of great

You should make the decision to donate organs in case of an accidental death. Then let your relatives know and also sign the "Anatomical Gift Statement" on the back of your driver's license. You could give someone the gift of life or sight.



Conspiracy accusations not true--Houthoofd

Letter to the Editor: This letter is in response to an official statement made on Friday, Jan. 24, 1992, by Tuscola County Friend of the Court, Mary Lou Burns, and later supported by Tuscola County Circuit Court Judge Patrick R. Joslyn, to Marlin Kibbe, who broadcasted over the Caro Radio Station WKYO their accusation that Terry Houthoofd, chairman of the Tuscola County Board of Commissioners, Erma Brown, Tuscola County Clerk, and Michael Hoagland, Tuscola County Controller, conspired to hold back Jan. 23, 1992, payroll checks to the employees of the Tuscola County Friend of the Court office with the order being made by Terry Houthoofd not to pay the employees.

This accusation is a fabrication and an untruth on the part of Judge Patrick R. Joslyn and Mary Lou Burns.

On Jan. 21, 1992, a memo was sent to the County Controller from Judge Joslyn with carbon copies sent to the county's clerk and treasurer, advising that he no longer would abide by the agreement between himself and the county board, which arrangement called for the entire budget and expenditures of the Friend of the Court's office for 1992 being paid through what is known as the 215 Fund. Instead, the judge wanted to revert to a very cumbersome system of administering certain expenses for the Friend of the Court through

Friend of the Court Fund. In the memo he also said that he would no longer authorize the payment of any operational expenses until this action was taken. The result of the judge's action was that there was no budget in existence from which the board could pay operational expenses incurred by the Friend of the Court's office. On the afternoon of Jan. 23, 1992, Terry Houthoofd, Michael Green, and Erma Brown met with Michael Hoagland to discuss the dilemma the board was in due to the judge's memo stating he would not authorize operational expenses. Direct contact was made by Michael Green with the judge advising him that payroll could not be cut due to his Commissioner memo. Green tried to explain to the judge that we could not pay the employees through any other account, but after extensive discussion, the judge still would not agree to the payroll checks being paid out of the 215 Fund. A phone call was then made to the State of Michigan Treasury Department to ascertain

whether we were wrong

about being able to cut pay-

roll from any other account.

We were advised that it was

not legal to do so out of any

other account than that of the

215 Fund. After further dis-

cussions among the mem-

bers present, the decision

was made that it was not fair

nor did we want to get the employees in the middle of

the game the judge appar-

ently wanted to play. With

that decision made, Chair-

man Houthoofd directed the county clerk to pay the Friend of the Court employces out of the 215 Fund despite the lack of the judge's approval even though a question existed as to the legality of Commissioner Houthoofd ordering the payment out of the 215

At no time was there ever any conspiracy between Terry Houthoofd, Erma Brown or Michael Hoagland not to pay the Friend of the Court employees, nor was there ever any order by Commissioner Houthoofd not to pay the employees, as alleged by Judge Patrick R. Joslyn and Friend of the Court Mary Lou Burns. The real truth of the matter is that the accused three, with the help of Commissioner Green, did everything in their power to get the judge to cooperate so the employees would not be innocent victims. It was the actions of the judge and the Friend of the Court which brought about this unfortunate incident and not the actions of any county commissioner, controller or county clerk. The allegations as set forth against Commissioner Houthoofd, Michael Hoagland and Erma Brown by Judge Patrick R. Joslyn and the Friend of the Court, Mary Lou Burns, are simply not true.
