# Deford man killed in crash

Slick roads caused by a wet snowfall Monday night are being blamed in several traffic accidents in the Thumb, including a fatal crash that claimed the life of a Deford

A Tuscola County Sheriff's dispatcher reported that James R. Marshall, 47, Deford, died in a head-on collision about 6 1/2 miles southwest of Caro.

According to reports, Marshall was westbound on M-46 east of Sheridan Road at about 10:57 p.m. when an eastbound vehicle, driven by Rebecca L. Hollerback, 38, Caro, lost control on the slippery roadway and struck Marshall's vehicle.

Marshall, who was wearing a seat belt at the time of the accident, was dead at the scene. Hollerback escaped serious injury. The dispatcher wasn't certain whether or not she was wearing a seat belt.

Responding to the scene, aside from sheriff's deputies, were Michigan State Police troopers, Caro EMS, Vassar Area Ambulance Service and the Caro Fire

## **COMPLAINTS**

In other business during the 90-minute meeting, 2 parents approached the board with concerns regarding a bus driver's treatment of their children, who attend Bach-Kilmanagh Lutheran School.

The couple, who indicated they've contacted school officials repeatedly regarding the problem, stated the driver in question threatened to pull their daughter's hair. They also charged that the individual's driving "is horrid" and they're concerned for their children's

The couple added other parents share their concern, and that several plan to attend the next board session.

# Welfare cuts, recession taking toll on area poor

Assistance provided to other alternatives, such Thumb residents by the Human Development Commission in recent years has typically involved services designed to help people live more independently, such as job training and housing counseling.

But the need is shifting drastically, and the number of requests for help is soaring as the effects of state welfare cuts and the recession take hold.

Many of the pleas heard in recent weeks are heartbreaking:

A father calls, saying he and his family are about to be evicted from their apartment because they're no longer able to keep up with the rent; another family hasn't had heat in 3 days, and forecasts predict temperatures will fall below zero; a parent, unable to afford a refill of her child's medication, reduces the dosage to make it stretch.

"Those are the kinds of needs we're getting," said Pat Christie, community services director for HDC.

"If you don't have money to pay the rent, if you don't have medication for a sick child. . .how can you possibly think about job goals?" she added. "These people are coming in and simply asking for things to survive.'

"What I'm hearing is it's causing overcrowding conditions," she said, adding in many cases, families simply don't have the resources to support such living arrangements. "Another thing I think we're going to see is a deterioration in housing conditions.

What will happen when people decide to leave or are forced to move out remains a question, Christic said. "There are not a lot of alternatives.

HDC officials, who operate 2 homeless housing units in Tuscola County and 4 others in Lapeer County, began to see an increase in homeless housing requests in January.

The problem, Christie pointed out, is that the facilities are not designed to meet the needs of a lot of people. They're meant for use by families, which are allowed to stay while working with the HDC on a permanent solution to their housing problems.

in which the demand for help is on the rise.

At the end of January, the number of Thumb residents registered in HDC's commodity food program totaled 3,260, including 477 new households.

There were about 2,700 households registered 2 years ago. At that time, cheese — perhaps the program's most popular item --- was eliminated, and 800 households dropped out of the program.

Today, the food given away typically includes cornmeal, flour, butter, rice canned fruit, canned beans and, occasionally, canned meat and peanut butter.

"From my perspective, you'd have to really want these products to come out and stand in line for up to 2 to 3 to 4 hours," Christic said.

## **WORKING POOR**

She and Vandemark

pointed out that a majority of HDC clientele fall into the category of "working poor", those who have minimum wage jobs with no benefits. Christie added there's been an increase in the number of middle class families and single parents seeking help. Many are unemployed for the first time, have lost their job after working only a short time, or are still working but receiving fewer hours.

Overall, services provided by HDC in Tuscola, Huron, Sanilac and Lapeer counties were up 12 percent in 1991. That translates into an additional 4,000 clients participating in one or more of 26 programs, with the biggest increases seen in the areas of substance abuse services, food programs, migrant services and weatherization-energy assistance.

"We've had a tremendous increase in the phone calls alone," Christie said, noting the HDC in 1991 received 60,000 calls, a 12 percent





## "If It Fitz...."

## How's that for integrity?

Never mind if it's relevant for journalists to ask a presidential candidate if he ever cheated on his wife. A more important question is whether it's ethical for journalists to accept free booze and hors d'oeuvres anyone desiring .from favorable publicity.

At least, that was the question most often discussed recently at the Michigan Press Association's annual convention where an incredibly - laughably? -thin line was drawn between what is a conflict of interest for a member of the press and what is the innocent, good-fellowship acceptance of a beer from a friendly utility executive.

It will be recalled that after Bob Giles, editor and publisher of the Detroit News, attended last year's convention, he wrote to the MPA president that most modern newspapers ques-tion the ethics of elected public officials accepting cash donations and other freebies from pressure groups seeking favors.

So it's not surprising, Giles said, that many "editors and publishers concluded that their own considerations came down on the side of telling our friends outside the business that it wasn't such a good thing to accept their hospitality in this way anymore... (this) acknowledged the awkwardness of

entertainment from organizations we cover in our news columns and express opinions about on our editorial pages.'

MPA directors weighed Giles' complaint and made some changes for this year's convention, held at the Amway Grand Plaza Hotel in Grand Rapids. In the past, parties hosted by such companies as Dow Chemical Co., Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Michigan and Michigan Bell were listed in the official convention program. Also, they were from announced podium at convention lunch and dinner meetings.

But not anymore, by God. It's still OK for utilities, businesses and suppliers to serve free booze and food to the journalists. But there's no more advertising the parties in the convention programs or at convention meetings. Instead, printed invitations must go directly from the host to each individual newspaper.

Or - psst! - verbal invitations might be whispered behind a hotel lobby pillar. How's that for sternly cracking down on possible conflicts of interest and protecting journalistic in-

tegrity? And get this: The Michigan Education Association the teachers' union hosted a nice reception at this year's convention. It



continuing an appearance wasn't mentioned from of conflict by accepting con- podiums or in the program contained in a large envelope distributed to each MPA member attending. But also in the envelope was a handsome MEA card inviting everyone to the teachers' party.

Huh? One MPA director admitted to me it was probably a mistake to include the invitation in the envelope.

From what I observed, it wasn't a mistake that bothered many of the MPA membership, which includes around 300 newspapers. Instead, most conventioneers seemed angered by the implication that their reporting and editorial opinion could be purchased for a beer. They also were bugged by the dearth of free parties at which to prove they could drink without dripping on their integrity.

Several previous hosts, such as Dow and Blue Cross, didn't offer their traditional hospitality this year. Was it just because their generosity wouldn't be mentioned in a program or from a dais, for Lord's

Maybe not. One executive told me that, after last year's complaints, his insurance company thought its hospitality was no longer welcome and "we didn't want to embarrass our newspaper friends." Also, there's been some confusion about how the parties could be advertised other than through convention programs and meetings. Chances are many of the

# **CANCER IS COMMON**

**PROSTATE** 

Cancer of the prostate is one of the most common cancers in men--one in eleven men will eventually

develop it. It increases with age and is more common in men of

northern European descent. It also appears to be more common in men who have diets high in fat. Prostate cancer causes few symptoms and if it does,

they are similar to the symptoms of other prostate disease. There may be difficulty starting or stopping a stream of urine, frequency of urination (especially during the night), bloody urine, pain with voiding and pain in the back or thighs.

These symptoms are the same as with benign conditions of the prostate; the only way to find the cancer early is to see your doctor for an exam. Any change in urination should prompt a man to see his doctor sooner.

Every man over 40 should have a rectal exam when he has his annual physical. A new blood test, called PSA, is also available and is gaining popularity for screening for prostate cancer.

When a lump is felt in the prostate, a biopsy should be done to determine if the lump contains cancer cells. If so, further studies may need to be done to determine the extent of the cancer.

If it's in an early stage, surgery and radiation will cure the cancer in many men. At other times cancer drugs and hormone therapy are used. The outlook is generally quite good, especially when it is found early with routine exams.



## FIRST SAWMILL

After 2 years, Whittaker began working for the Elkton Box Company, and before long, he started operating the first of a number of sawmills he would own over the years.

He's worked primarily as an independent logger for the past 20 years. Much of that time has been spent in the company of his son, Larry, whom Whittaker describes as "the best cutter and operator I've ever had."

Larry recently accepted a position with Walbro Corp., but the pair still plan to work together occasionally.

Whittaker noted that at the peak of his business, he employed 13 men and ran 2 sawmills. He got out of the sawmill business in 1986 due to increased costs tied to labor. It simply got to be too much, he said. Whittaker added that it's become increasingly difficult for a small operation to stay in the black.

Still, he indicated he wouldn't trade his years in the woods for any other occupation.

## TRIED SHOP WORK

Whittaker confided that he tried working in a shop for about 3 months in 1953, but commented, "It just wasn't for me.' "I just love the outdoors,"

he said. "I've spent 40 years outside, year-round. I've worked (in temperatures of) 10-below zero and 90 above. I would work 50 weeks a year. The only thing that would stop me was mud in the spring.

Over the years, Whittaker

a steel wheeled tractor. In has cut timber from Port Austin to the Detroit area. He guesses he's handled an average of one million board feet of lumber each year over the past 4 decades enough to build about 4,000 homes.

Looking back, he said, a lot of things have changed.

'Timber today is worth more on the stump than sawed timber was in the 50's. In 1952, low grade standing timber was about \$12.50 (per thousand board feet). Today, timber is \$70 a thousand up to \$200."

Equipment, too, has changed. In the early years, chain saws "were clumsy and (didn't have) much power," he remarked. He explained that back then, the engines had to be held upright because of the carburetor design, a problem that was later solved by Walbro Corp. engineers.

Whittaker recalled paying \$350 for his first chain saw. In contrast, today, a good logging chain saw, which has twice the power of the old models, will cost \$700 to

Whittaker, who has cut several woods a second time in his 40-year career, indicated he feels responsible logging has a legitimate place in the management of natural resources. Woodlots have shrunk to some degree since the early 1950s, he said, but "there's still a huge amount of timber in the Thumb of Michigan."

The Cass City resident plans to continue harvesting a portion of that wood. Despite the risk' involved and some health problems in recent years, he said he isn't ready to retire just yet. "The 40 years has gone by

so fast, because I really enjoy what I'm doing," he concluded. "The Lord has been good to me.'



At times, she continued, the calls come in faster than staff members can answer "We certainly are seeing an increase in requests to the point to where we're not able to talk to every person who has a

The situation is expected to get worse before it gets bet-

"I think we're just touching the tip of the iceberg," Vandemark said. "I think by the end of February and in March, especially if it's a cold March, (the increase in requests for help) is going to be dramatic."

Christie agreed and said it's becoming increasingly difficult to spread fewer resources among more people.

Charitable contributions are more than welcome, she pointed out. Although the problems faced by the poor may not be evident at first glance, they're very real, she indicated.

"You're not going to see a bread line, in essence, because we don't have a bread line, but you are going to see people waiting in line in the cold for commodities.'

Of those seeking help, 40 percent are elderly, 20 percent are handicapped and 35 percent (in the 4-county area) live below the poverty level. In light of ever-shrinking state fuel assistance funds, the need for fund raising efforts such as Walk for Warmth is steadily growing.


