

Record profit year reported at Walbro

L.E. Althaver, chairman, president and chief executive officer, Walbro Corporation, reported sales of \$200,130,000 for the year ended Dec. 31, 1991, compared with \$166,678,000 for 1990. Net income in 1991 was \$4,838,000 compared with \$1,217,000 in 1990, an increase of 298 percent.

Net income per share was \$.98 for 1991, based on an average of 4,952,951 shares outstanding. Net income per share in 1990 was \$.28 based on an average of 4,289,161 shares outstanding.

1991 results include a fourth quarter plant closing and restructuring charge of \$2,230,000 before taxes, partially offset by a \$1,177,000 before tax gain on the curtailment of one of the company's pension plans. The net effect was a reduction in net income of \$695,000 or \$.12 per share in the fourth quarter. Had these adjustments not been made, fourth quarter net income would have been \$2,448,000 or \$.41 per share.

Althaver noted that Walbro's 1991 total revenues set a new record. He credited the successful introduction of new fuel system products in the automotive original equipment and replacement markets and an upturn in sales of small engine carburetors in late 1991 with pushing Walbro's sales over the \$200 million mark for the first time.

"Overall, sales of automobiles in the U.S. have suffered greatly due to the recession. However, many vehicles equipped with Walbro products are selling well. In addition, new Walbro product applications came on-stream in 1991, helping to build revenues," Althaver said.

"Shipments of Walbro fuel systems products to the small engine industry rose dramatically in 1991," he added. "After more than 2 years of weak demand, orders for diaphragm and float-feed carburetors grew in late 1991 to the point where all Walbro carburetor plants were working at or near full capacity by the fourth quarter."

Althaver also noted that sales of Walbro's lines of replacement parts for automotive and small engine applications grew in 1991, aided by expanded product offerings.

Althaver attributed the company's earnings improvement in part to a reorganization and to continued cost reduction efforts which enhanced profitability in 1991, as well as to increased sales.

"The major reorganization which was initiated in late 1990 is now essentially complete. Corporate operations have been streamlined and operating responsibilities have been shifted to Walbro's automotive and small engine operations," Althaver noted. "The reorganization has resulted in improved efficiency and greater responsiveness to Walbro's major markets."

At Kingston meeting

To explain need for bond issue

A proposed \$1.36 million bond issue for renovations and new construction at Kingston Elementary School will be outlined at a public informational meeting Monday.

Sponsored by the Kingston Elementary Parent Teacher Organization, the meeting is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m. in the elementary school cafeteria.

During the session, school Supt. Jerry H. Laycock will

explain the financial aspects of the bond proposal as well as present a video depicting the need for a new addition and the planned renovations. A sketch of the proposed addition will be on display.

Laycock and school board members will also answer questions at the end of the presentation.

Voters will be asked to approve the bond issue at a special school election

slated for March 28. The deadline to register for the election is Thursday.

According to Laycock, the proposed improvements would accomplish several objectives.

The main goals include adding 4 new classrooms, lavatories and a multipurpose room that would include a new kitchen and serve as a cafeteria, gymnasium and auditorium.

Post office fetes Dale Bullock for aiding elderly man

Dale Bullock winces at the suggestion that he's a hero, but U.S. Postal officials say the veteran city carrier may have saved the life of an elderly Cass City man last month.

Bullock, 42, was surprised Thursday with the presentation of a special achievement award and \$100 bonus at the Cass City Post Office. The incident that netted the recognition occurred in January while Bullock was delivering mail on the route he's walked for a dozen years. It was a typical day until he approached one particular residence.

"I just walked up to put the mail in, and I could hear the smoke detector alarm going off," he recalled.

Bullock became concerned about the elderly gentleman who lived there. "I tried the front door, but it was locked," he said. "I could hear him in there, talking, so I went around to the back of the house."

Bullock knocked on the back door, but no one answered, so he walked in. Upon entering the smoke-filled kitchen, he discovered that the disoriented resident had placed an electric frying pan on top of a newspaper in the oven, and then turned the oven on, leaving the door open.

"I think (in) a few more minutes it would have ignited," he remarked.

After shutting off the stove, Bullock spoke with some neighbors, who contacted the man's family and agreed

to keep an eye on him until someone could arrive.

After making arrangements with the neighbors, the 15-year postal service veteran completed his route and returned to the post office.

"He never said a word" about the incident, Postmaster Bill Zinnecker said, noting he learned about what had happened through an appreciative phone call from the man's neighbors.

Zinnecker wrote up a report on the incident and sent it in to the home office.

Carriers are encouraged to keep their eyes open for anything unusual on their routes, and there have been

incidences over the years locally involving a mail carrier happening upon a heart attack or stroke victim. But Zinnecker said this is the first time in his 27 years that he can remember something like this happening in town.

"I certainly feel he did prevent at least a fire," he added.

"It's the first time I ever had an experience quite like that," commented Bullock, who is married and has 2 children, ages 15 and 21.

Despite the attention, he said he doesn't feel like a hero.

"I'm just glad I could be there and see to it his life was not threatened," he added.

Arraign John Brinker for Tuscola County break-ins

A Lapeer man was recently arraigned on charges stemming from 2 break-ins in Tuscola County last month.

John K. Brinker, 26, Lapeer, faces 2 counts of breaking and entering with intent to commit larceny, 2 counts of larceny in a building and one count of safe breaking.

Court records state he is accused of breaking into a store at 1215 E. Caro Rd., Caro, Jan. 28, and stealing a screw gun, cooler and cash. Two days later, Brinker allegedly broke into a school at 9444 W. Saginaw Rd.,

Richville, stole a camera and some cash, and broke into a safe or other depository.

Bond for Brinker was set at a combined \$50,000 cash. A preliminary examination was to have been held today (Wednesday).

Others arraigned recently on felony charges include Gordon K. Bender, 34, of Vassar, who faces a charge of larceny over \$100.

Bond in the case was set at \$5,000, and a preliminary exam was scheduled for 9

"Hated to quit"

Jack Downing to end 26-year postal career

Neither snow nor rain nor gloom of night shall keep a postal carrier from his or her appointed rounds.

"Just make sure you have a shovel," quips rural carrier Jack Downing as he sorts mail in the back room of the Cass City Post Office.

Downing ought to know; for the past 26 years, the Gagetown native's been delivering the mail in all kinds of weather, and he's battled more than his fair share of snowbanks.

This summer he'll make his last mail run.

"I hate to give it up, but there comes a time for everything," remarked the personable Downing, who is retiring after 30 years, which includes 4 years credited for military service.

Downing operated a family-owned gas station in

Gagetown for 10 years before embarking on his postal career. He began delivering mail on a rural route in the Gagetown area in January 1966. He worked out of the Gagetown Post Office for 14 years before transferring to Cass City in September

1980.

Although delivering mail out in the country day after day might appear boring, Downing said it's never been dull. He explained that there are "little changes" everyday, and he enjoys the varied scenery; flat farmland, wooded areas, dairy operations.

And then there's the weather.

USED TO BE FUN

"It used to be fun getting out there, fighting those snowbanks. But when you get older, it gets to be a drag," he commented. "That's one of the reasons I'm hanging it up."

Downing has made many acquaintances over the years on his routes, and says people have helped him get out of more than one snowbank.

"If people know you're in difficulty, they'll give you a hand — they'll be down with a tractor (or) pickup."

"Fall's the nicest time of the year," he continued, noting it's a time of beautiful scenery and a time for counting pheasants, a task mail carriers help the DNR with twice a year.

"I've noticed quite an increase" in pheasants this year, Downing pointed out. "That's one thing I'm looking forward to — getting a (hunting) license in the fall."

The area resident recalled doing quite a bit of pheasant hunting back in the good old

days of the late 1940s and early 50s. He grinned and added, "That's when they were thick."

MORE MAIL

Looking back on his career, Downing said the biggest change he's seen is in the volume of mail he handles.

"I can remember going out of Gagetown and I'd have a day's mail all in my arm," he remarked. That armful consisted of about 3 bundles, he added, compared to an average of 15 bundles today.

Despite the increase, Downing has remained true to the mail carrier's creed. For the past dozen years, with few exceptions, he's delivered the mail each week, Monday through Saturday, to 350 stops along his 86-mile route north and east of Cass City.

He's worked to set and maintain a pattern for his route, which enables folks to know just about when he'll be at their mailbox each morning.

Likewise, Downing has come to know each household on his route. Being aware of residents' mailbox habits has proven valuable, such as when Downing noticed one particular gentleman hadn't picked up his mail as usual. A check of the house revealed the man had suffered a stroke.

Knowing and visiting the people he serves is among the things Downing says

he'll miss the most. He acknowledges it won't be easy to give up his daily run, and admitted retirement scares him a bit.

"I'll probably be out of here a week and be wishing I was back," he joked, adding he and his wife of 36 years, Harriet, don't have any specific plans yet, although they're looking forward to visiting their children.

The couple's oldest son, Greg, 34, is a pediatrician at Children's Hospital in Kansas City; daughter Kim, 33, is pursuing a doctorate in political science at Rutgers University, and son Kevin, 27, is studying the history of science and working on his doctorate at Princeton University.

Regardless of what Downing decides to do in retirement, he can bank on the luxury of feeling satisfied with his career.

"It's been a wonderful job; the change of scenery, meeting people. He (Cass City Postmaster Bill Zinnecker) has been a great boss, and we've got a tremendous office staff here."

He added, "When I first started what I was concerned with (was) security, and I found it — 30 years of it. And I managed to get the kids through school, and accomplished what I wanted."

"I don't think I'd change anything for a moment."

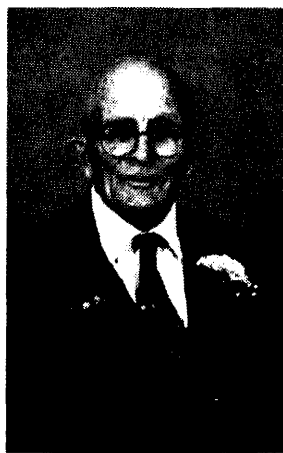

The Lion's Paw. Was It Really A Thorn Or An Ingrown Toenail?

Ingrown toenails penetrate the skin and cut into the flesh of the toe's edges. Untreated, it may result in severe complications from inflammation to serious infection, ulceration or gangrene. Anyone may be affected, however, persons between 10 and 30 are particularly vulnerable.

Causes vary and may include: tight shoes, incorrect cutting of nails, injury or congenital malformations. Symptoms begin with redness, swelling, drainage and pain at the nail edges. If these signs are disregarded, especially by diabetics, a dangerous infection may spread. Red streaks may appear along the top of the foot. Infection may enter the bloodstream and proceed up the leg. Fortunately,

most of my patients don't allow complications to go that far.

Some people think cutting a V in the middle of the nail will prevent problems. Scientifically, it is of no value.

The nail grows from the root, not from the front, and the V-cut does not cause the sides to grow towards the middle.

Treatment may be brief and PAINLESS. It involves removal of the offending portion of the nail and measures to reduce inflammation and control infection. If you are diabetic or have impaired circulation, an ingrown toenail, left untreated, may end in a fight to save as much of the toe, foot or leg as possible.

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

"I smelled something suspicious when I got back to our room last night," she continued. "It was chocolate. I looked at my pillow, but there was no chocolate on it. There was none on his pillow, either. He ate both our chocolate mint wafers."



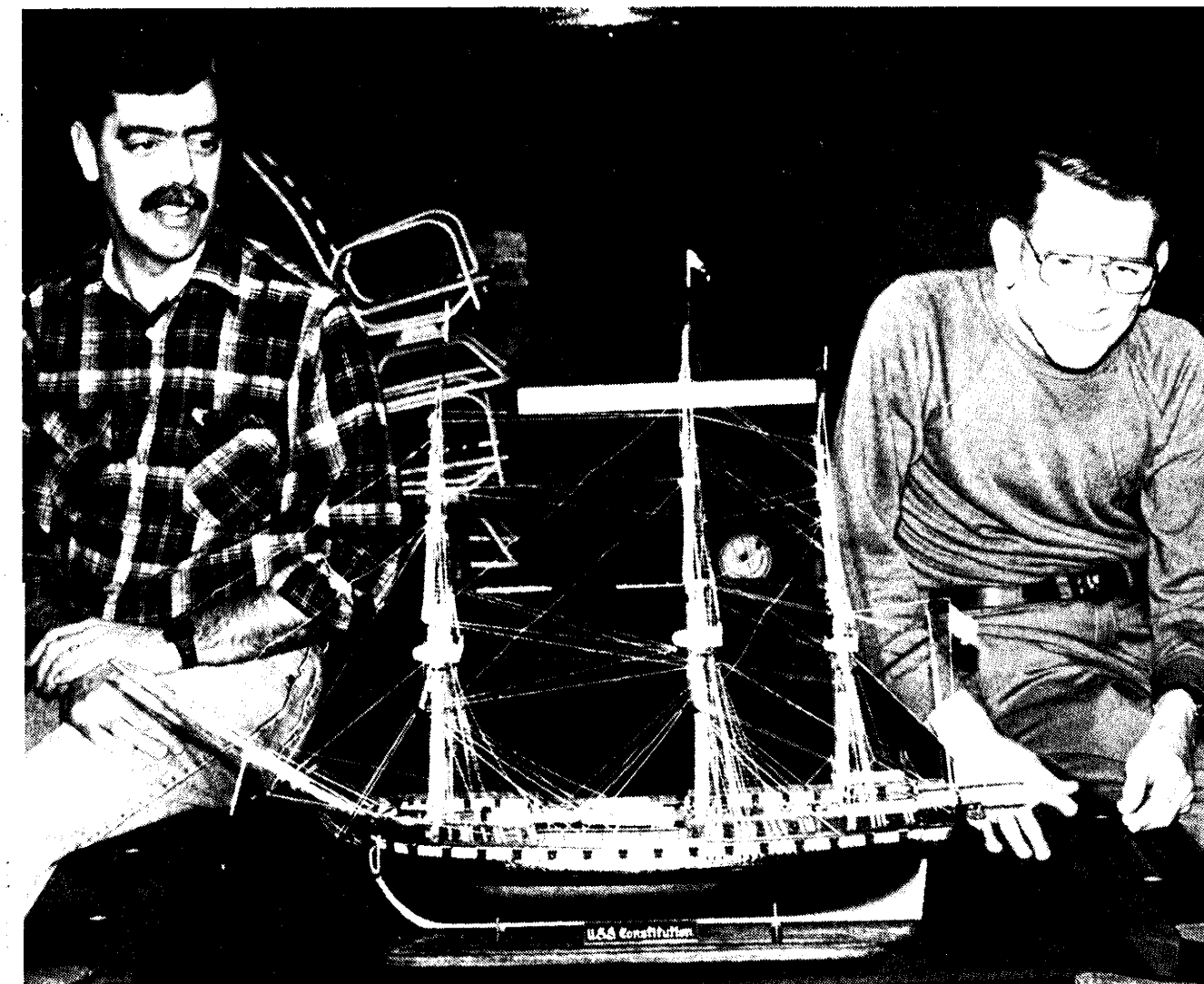

Terry King, Sigmund Pieper

Area pair share model, model building interest

Terry King's scale model of the U.S.S. Constitution, perhaps better known as "Old Ironsides," would likely impress even the pickiest of model building enthusiasts.

From bow to stern, the ship is a study in intricate detail, featuring 1,100 parts and 150 separate riggings. It measures 3 feet in length and 27 inches in height.

It's no surprise the project is a source of pride for King, who spent an estimated 2,000 hours fitting, gluing and tying.

What's unusual is the model was just recently completed, some 17 years after the Cass City resident first cracked open the kit.

Actually, King says the model might never have been completed if he hadn't met Sigmund Pieper, a fellow model devotee and Cass City resident who's built a

dozen or so masted ships in his lifetime.

King explained that he started the project in the early to mid-1970s. "I had always built models," he said. "I guess I figured that this would be the ultimate challenge. I knew it could be done."

Over the next 5 years, King worked steadily during the winter months, spending an hour after hour on the project.

The model was 90 to 95 percent complete when he turned his attention to making a move to Cass City from the Sebewaing area. Consequently, the ship was shelved and he never resumed work on the project.

LOST INTEREST

"It was just a matter of having a new house built and I had other things to do," King recalled, adding he also developed other interests, among them model railroading. "I just kind of lost interest (in the ship) and it began collecting a lot of dust."

For years the ship was stored in the basement of King's Hospital Drive residence. Although he couldn't motivate himself to finish it, he also couldn't stand the thought of getting rid of it.

Then, about a year ago, he met Pieper.

"Sigmund and I happened to run into each other in church, and I found out he was building boats," King said. "I told him I had one that was sitting in moth balls. I should say sitting in dust."

A short time later, King told Pieper that if he wanted to finish the model, he could keep it.

Pieper took him up on the offer. Sort of.

GAVE IT BACK

He used light bursts of air to clean dust off the ship's deck and hull, painstakingly cleaned the rigging with small, soft paint brushes, and then spent about 2 months finishing the assembly and rigging. Then he gave it back to King.

"The more I worked on it, I could see it belonged back in Terry's hands," he said. "Terry letting me finish it was really a compliment."

"He did a great job, just the cleaning alone," King said. "I felt great about it—that it (was) finally done."

The pair, who have both built a variety of models, from monster trucks to aircraft, agree there are few projects as challenging as masted ships.

On a scale of 1 to 100, King said he'd rate the level of difficulty at about 110, particularly when it comes to the rigging. "I don't think you can get into anything" more challenging, he remarked. "A lot of times the (instructions) are misleading."

"These (models) aren't

made for speed."

Pieper added, "It's a study in engineering, and there's a name for each line."

RIGGING

The rigging pattern, right down to each tiny knot, is designed to be authentic, according to Pieper, who has enjoyed building models "ever since I could handle a knife." A big part of the challenge, he said, is installing one line without causing any other line to tighten up or slacken.

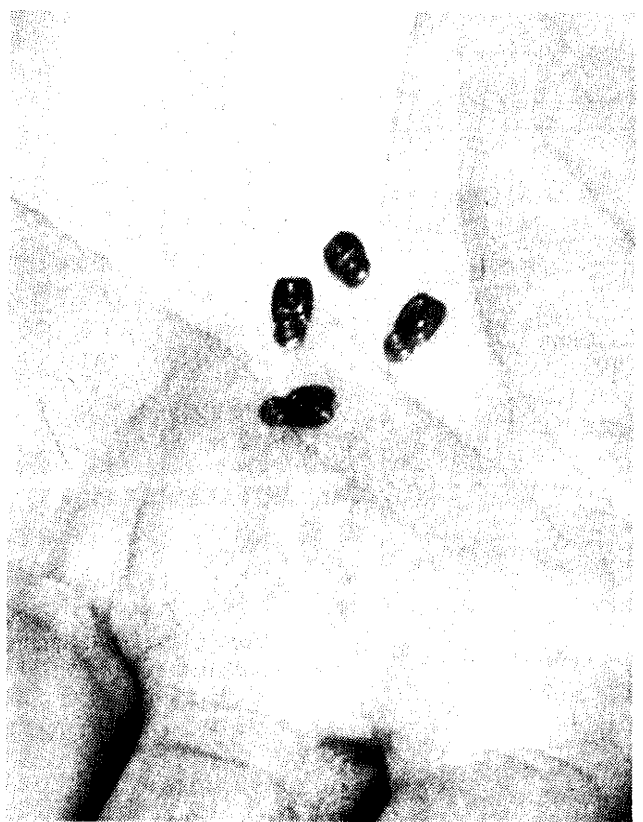
"You'd best be in a good mood," he pointed out.

For both Pieper and King, the bottom line is the pleasure model building brings.

"I guess (it's) personal satisfaction when you're done — of being able to do something with your hands," King commented. "I can only watch so much television."

Pieper indicated much of the pleasure he receives from the hobby comes when he gives a model ship to someone as a gift, or sells one, and the recipient appreciates the skill and effort that went into it. Although he's built a dozen such models over the years, including one for Walbro Corp. founder the late W.E. Walpole, he hasn't kept one.

"The satisfaction is in being able to complete it," he said.

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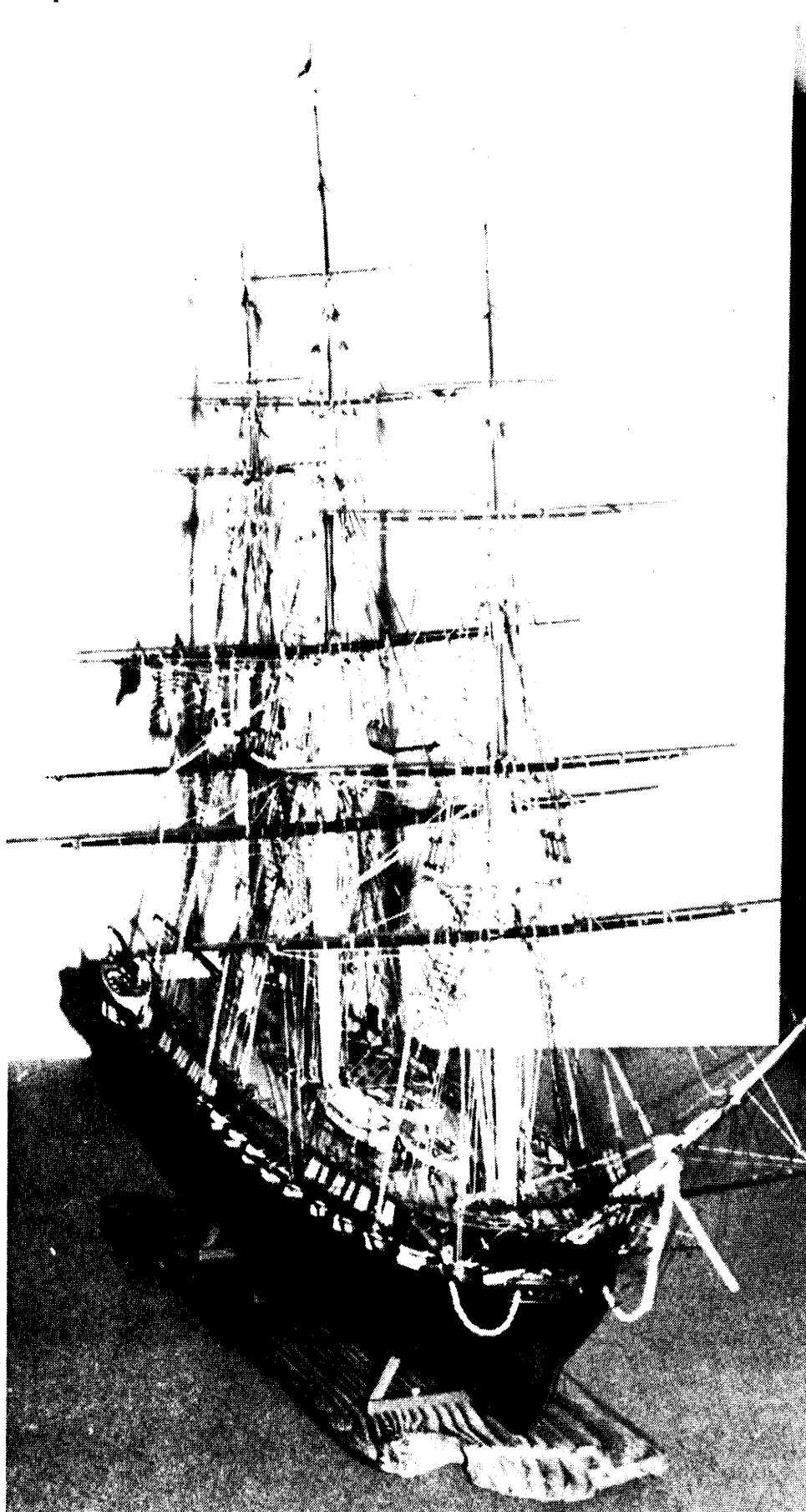

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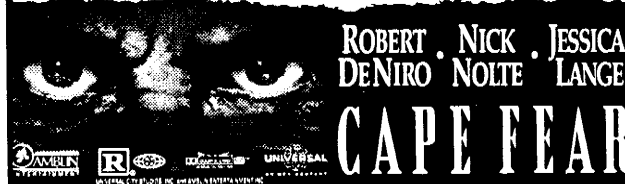
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Bulldogs lose pair to Peck and C-PS

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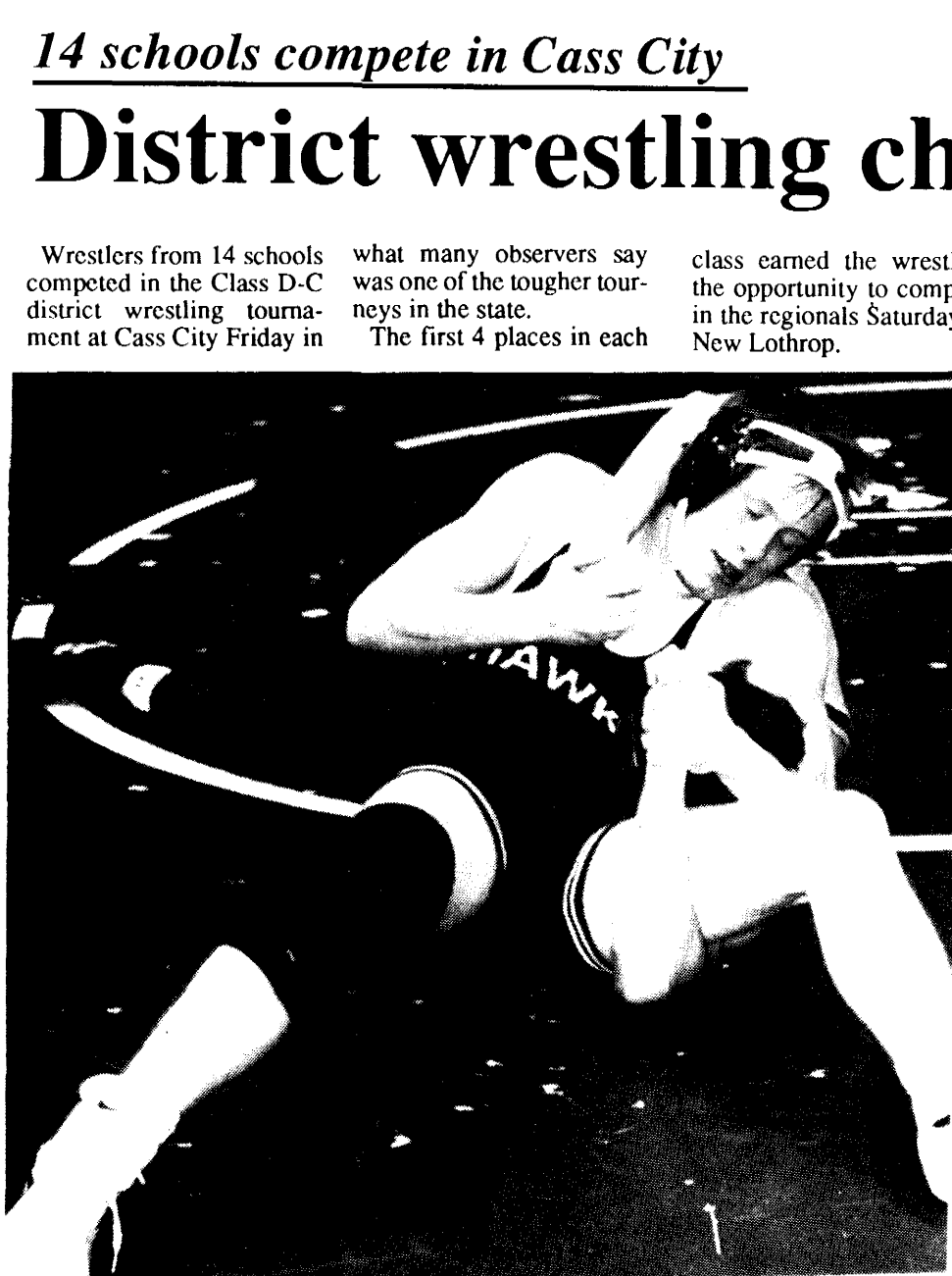

She was born Sept. 21, 1941, in Pontiac, the daughter of Claude and Hilda (Gerbert) Parkin.

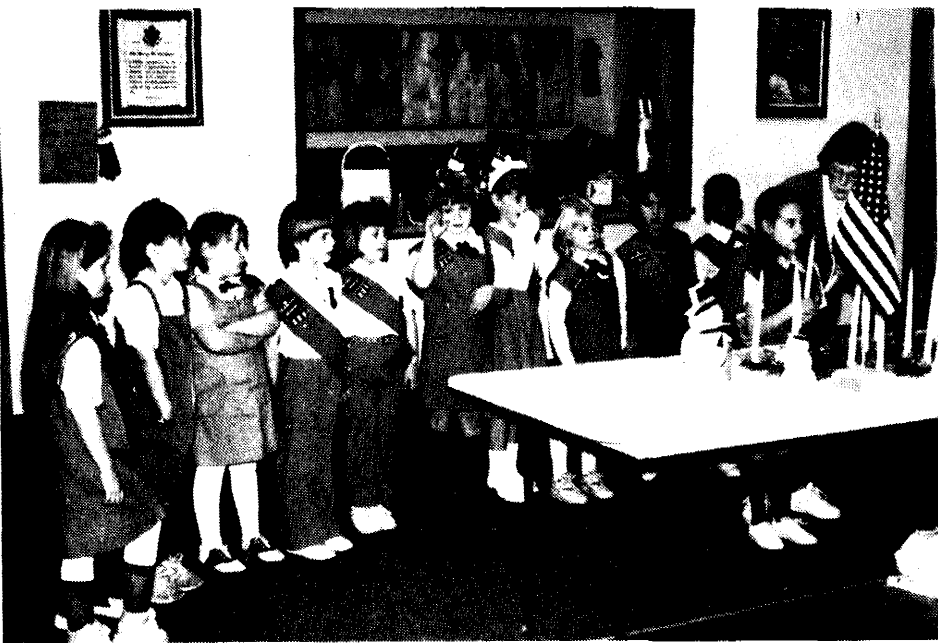

Group organizing for Lyme disease sufferers

A Caro area woman is organizing a Thumb Area Lyme Disease Support Group, which will meet on the first Thursday of each month from 6:30 to 9 p.m. in the Administrative Building of the Caro Regional Mental Health Center, Caro.

The first meeting is scheduled for March 5.

Organizing the new support group is Jan Monson, herself a Lyme disease sufferer.

"In September 1990, after many years of health problems, I was diagnosed with Lyme disease," Monson said. "Since then, I have attended the Lyme (disease) support group in Saginaw.

Monson noted Lyme disease is a bacterial infection, resulting from a deer tick bite, that leads to a variety of symptoms.

"It has been communicated to me, by word of mouth, that there are many in the greater Thumb area who also have been diagnosed with Lymes. Since I have found the information and emotional support so beneficial in my learning to cope with my illness, I am starting a support group. . ."

Monson said the doctor-patient relationship has changed in recent years and now emphasizes a mutual helping-learning union.

"The doctors help us find a diagnosis and treatment, but it is up to us to cooperate and learn about our disease in order to aid in managing it," she added. "As patients, we are expected to share the responsibility of our health care."

"In the Thumb Area Support Group, we will share the updated diagnostic and treatment procedure passed on by the Saginaw support

group from the physicians and clinicians studying the disease."

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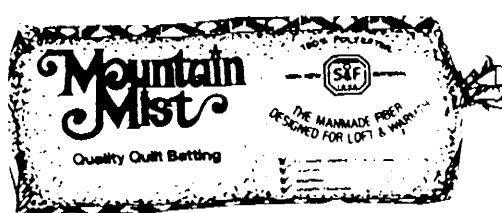

Commissioners named

Suit charges illegal meetings

A Caro resident has filed suit against the Tuscola County Board of Commissioners and 5 individual commissioners, charging them with violating the state's Open Meetings Act on several occasions.

The suit, filed last week by an attorney representing Terry Brinkman, specifically names commissioners Norma Bates, Ken Hess, Michael Green, Robert Russell and Terry Houthoofd.

Two commissioners were not named — former board Chairman William Worth and Mary Lou Burns, who recently left her board post to accept the position of Friend of the Court administrator.

Brinkman alleges the board members held illegal closed sessions Sept. 12, Oct. 8, Oct. 18, Nov. 7, Nov. 12 and Nov. 26. He claims the board in each case failed to conduct a roll call vote to go into executive session, and didn't state a purpose for each session.

Brinkman also charges that the board held an illegal meeting via a conference telephone call prior to Jan. 13, and that the board failed to properly post a Nov. 7 special meeting.

According to the suit, Brinkman is seeking a court order halting the board's alleged non-compliance with the Open Meetings Act. He is also asking for a judgment of up to \$500 from each of the named commis-

Right now there are scads of folks chortling over their good fortune to be basking in the sun while the folks back home are putting up with another typical Michigan winter.

Al Connolly, 78, of 6168 Shabbona Road, Deford, is one season-around resident who doesn't envy them a bit. I've been to Florida, he snorted, and they don't have nothing there except bugs and snakes. I used to go there, he confides, but not anymore.

Connolly's opinion about Florida came up in a discussion of the question of the week: If you could go anyplace you wanted, where would you go?

Without a moment's hesitation, Connolly says, "I'd head for Christmas in the Upper Peninsula to do a little ice fishing in one of those nice warm shanties and catch some of those big black sturgeon."

Connolly is retired now, but he has left his mark in the Thumb and Michigan. He was the superintendent of a construction company that worked throughout southern Michigan and in the Thumb.

The Catholic church and the high school in Bad Axe were some of the buildings I was involved in, he says.

Connolly was born in San Francisco and moved to Detroit in 1922. He has 13 children, with 2 teenagers still at home.

The expansion would take place at the south and west ends of the existing school, which was built in 1932, with additions in 1957 and 1965.

Planned renovations would create a new library on the main floor, restructure some small classrooms to accommodate special needs, such as federal programs (Chapter I) and special education services, and create science and computer labs, conference areas and storage facilities. Another goal is to make the building's main floor barrier free.

School officials are seeking the improvements in part to relieve overcrowding in the building. With 400 students, the facility is beyond capacity, and there is little in the way of office, conference and storage space, Laycock said.

Another of the school board's goals "is to get some technology in the building," he continued, adding the addition of science and computer labs will do that.

Overall, the proposed improvements are "not going to solve all the problems, but it's something that needs to be done," the superintendent remarked. "This will get us by for a while."

Laycock noted the school district currently levies 2.65 to 2.85 mills for debt. He said the estimated proposed 25-year bond issue would increase the levy by about one mill to 3.8 mills for the first 4 years, and then drop to 2.5 mills and, eventually, one mill.

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Good news: jobs up at Walbro; village valuation increases

Despite the severe downturn in the economy, there has been growth in the community and good news on the industrial front.

For the second year in a row, property values in Cass City have increased by more than \$1 million.

Of more immediate impact, is the report from the 2 largest industrial employers in Cass City. Jesus Valdez, manager of General Cable Corporation in Cass City, says that despite consolidation within the company, Cass City employment will be about the same and promises to be stable throughout 1992.

In fact, the work load at the plant could increase, Valdez explained, because 2 plants will be closed and the work there distributed among other plants. Cass City will probably pick up some of that work.

Valdez says that the productivity at the plant and the quality of the work were keys in keeping Cable active and busy in Cass City.

The news is also good at Walbro Corporation, where

Lambert Althaver, president and chief executive officer, says that all laid off employees have been rehired and the recession-caused dip in demand seems to have turned the corner. The general outlook now until the end of the year appears positive, he adds. Right now Walbro has 450 working in Cass City plants compared

to 350 a year ago.

In addition, authorities say that Detroit Edison hopes to begin construction on the 18 acres that it purchased in the Industrial Park from the village. Edison will have its Thumb headquarters there.

The village has also purchased 30.3 acres for future industrial expansion just west of Doerr Road and ad-

jacent to the now fully developed Industrial Park. There is a 60-foot right-of-way for a road at the north edge of the property and sewer and water is available when needed.

Much of the expansion in the village has been through the construction of condominiums. Eight units with an

estimated cost of \$920,000 were issued in 1991, following a trend started in 1990, when also 8 units were constructed with a value of \$650,000.

The news was not as bright on the retail front, but 3 new businesses were opened since the last progress edition, including the most recent, Little Caesars.
