# Les Kendall suffers burns when gas fumes ignite

Victims of 2 area fires. Saturday and Monday, narrowly escaped with their lives as flames engulfed property.

An area man escaped with his life but lost all his possessions and suffered burns on his arms and head when an explosion sparked a massive fire that quickly engulfed his home Saturday night.

Les Kendall was transported by Cass City-Mercy Ambulance to Hills and Dales General Hospital, where he was treated and later released.

Elmwood-Gagetown Fire Department Chief Ed Rievert said fire fighters were called to respond to a barn fire and didn't know anyone lived in the structure, located just east of Hurds Corner Road about a halfmile north of Cass City Road, until they arrived. The call came in just shortly

after 6 p.m. "When we got there, it was already through the roof and really going," he said.

The flames erupted when gas fumes were ignited by a pilot light from some type of heater, according to the chief, who explained Kendall was transferring gas from one can to another when the accident occurred. One witness who was driving nearby at the time said the building appeared just fine one minute and was engulfed in flames the next.

Rievert said Kendall had 4 or 5 horses housed in the lower level of the barn-like structure, which was built into the side of a hill. "On the top, he had hay stored and on the other end he had living quarters.

Fire fighters remained at the scene for 5 hours.

Rievert estimated the damage at \$15,000 to \$20,000 plus contents. "He had no insurance on the structure and by what we see of it, it was a total loss," he said.

Kendall is staying in the area with his sister, Donna McAlpine, and can use anything in the way of donations. Those interested in helping out can call 872-

Elmwood-Gagetown firemen were assisted by the Elkland Township Fire Department, which provided manpower and a tanker. Also assisting with tankers were the Caro, Unionville and Owendale fire departments.

"We'd really like to thank the departments that helped us," Rievert said. "They were a tremendous help."

An unidentified motorist may have saved the lives of Shirley and Edward Periso Monday morning. He noticed that an attached garage was belching smoke as he passed by a little before 7

He hammered on the door and woke the couple, who succeeded in getting out of the home with their pet dog. An across-the-road neighbor, Delores Mathewson, called the Kingston Fire Department and later the Elkland Township Fire Department was called to

assist. Although the home suffered smoke damage, fire

fighters succeeded in saving the structure. The fire departments were aided by a 'dry hydrant", about a quarter of a mile away. It enabled the pumpers to reload quickly with an ample sup-

ply of water. The Perisos said that the garage contained many tools and a large amount of clothing. The contents were estimated to be worth in excess of \$1,000. No estimate of the damage to the home was available.

The Perisos were at a loss to explain how the fire started. There was no electricity or heat in the garage.

# Name Connolly new fire chief

Veteran Cass City fire fighter Milt Connolly was named the new Elkland Township Fire Department Chief Monday night.

The unanimous decision of the Elkland Township Board came after about an hour of discussion and interviews with Connolly and a second applicant, Dan Gee, another local fireman with some 18 years with the department.

"We had quite a lengthy discussion with both of them," township Clerk Norma Wallace said.

Connolly, who has nearly 30 years experience, had been serving as acting chief since the retirement last month of Dick Root, a 40year department veteran.

In other business Monday, the board increased open and closing fees at the township cemetery from \$150 to \$200. The fee is double for holidays and Sundays.

"We are getting more in line with other area cemeteries," Wallace said of the reasoning behind the new rate schedule.

No estimate was available on how much more income the hike will provide. Wallace indicated any new revenue will be a plus, however, considering the cemetery fund traditionally hasn't been self supporting.

In a related matter, the board approved a new policy for grave stones in the newer section of the township cemetery.

The policy states all markers must be made of hard stone and that the stone height is not to exceed ground level. Also required are a 2- to 3-inch border and weed barrier.



Those dandelion greens I wrote somewhat disparagingly about a few weeks ago deserve better, it seems.

A report in the Edell Health Letter regarding "healthy vegetables" rates dandelion greens near the top of the nutritional veggie list, along with such prestigious foods as kale, collard greens, red peppers, spinach and broc-

As good for you as those vegetables are, however, they fall far short of the 'healthiest.'

The Center for Science in the Public Interest rated the veggies on percentage of 6 nutrients plus fiber content, and scores ranged from 3 to 582. Judged best, at 582, was — Are you ready for this? — the sweet potato.

The raw carrot came in second, with 434 points.

At the bottom of the list nutritionally were garlic, mushrooms, cucumbers, alfalfa sprouts and eggplant.

Speaking of vegetables, have you ever unsuspectingly bitten into one of those tiny peppers that often lurk under an innocent looking pea pod in Manchurian dishes, and set your mouth

A slug of milk is the antidote. A protein called casein found in milk pushes its way to the nerve receptors and dislodges the pepper's ac-

tive ingredient. If no milk is available, cheese, milk chocolate, or anything containing milk will help.

While we're on a health kick, "Consumer Reports on Health" offers advice for allergy sufferers and explains how allergies come about. People with allergies have a "paranoid" immune system that overreacts to harmless substances and treats them like threatening intruders, according to CRH.

This results in the release of the chemical histamine, which causes the runny or stuffed-up nose, watery eyes and sneezing that character-

ize allergies.

Terfenadine (Seldane) and astemizole (Hismanal) are new prescription antihistamines that don't cause drowsiness and are effective, but they're more expensive than the older remedies. According to CRH, a week's worth of the drugs costs about \$11. They suggest taking the new drugs during the day and the less expensive ones at night.

After the CRH article was printed, a warning was issued that Seldane should not be taken in conjunction with ketoconazole, an anti-fungal medication for people with liver disease, or erythromycin, a prescription antibiotic. The combination could cause irregular heart

Other recommendations for alleviating the discomfort of allergies include spending as little time outdoors as possible, especially on windy days; keeping doors and windows closed, especially in the bedroom; using an air conditioner, which filters out dust and pollen, and doing necessary outdoor activities in the evening, when pollen counts are lowest.

So tend your allergies and enjoy the summer, and be sure to eat your dandelion greens and sweet potatoes.

The board for the Detroit School District announced that it wants a residency requirement for new teachers hired in the system. Predictably, the request has sparked a negative reaction from the Detroit Federation of Teachers, the union that represents the teachers.

Union President John Elliott says that residency has no effect on being a good teacher and could have a negative impact on recruiting new teachers.

Residency is not a new equest. The Detroit board tried to install the regulation in 1979 and failed.

While Detroit seems remote from little Cass City and its problems much different than ours, it could very well be that the issue could surface here.

After all, just this year the Cass City School Board adopted a policy requiring that all new persons hired in administration live in the district.

The rationale for any residency requirement, of course, is that persons should live in, pay taxes and take a role in community life. It's never been proved that residency fills that need with the exception of whatever taxes are paid.

The knock against residency is that it could have a negative impact on hiring the best teachers available. Right now that impact doesn't have much clout. But remember, it was only a few years ago that schools live is mere fluff.

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
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
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## PTA seeking more response from teachers

ORDINANCE NO. 129

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT AU-THORITY AND DESIGNATINGTHE BOUNDARIES OF THE DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT WITHIN WHICH THE AUTHORITY SHALL **EXERCISE ITS POWER** 

THE VILLAGE OF CASS CITY ORDAINS:

Section 1. Establishment of a Downtown Development Authority.

There is hereby created in and for the Village of Cass City, Michigan, an Authority to be known as the "Cass City Downtown Development Authority pursuant to Public Act 197 of the Public Acts of Michigan, 1975. The boundaries of the "Downtown Development Dis-trict" shall be as follows: a parcel of land situated in the Village of Cass City, County of Tuscola, State of Michigan, and more fully described in Exhibit "A"

Section 2. Purpose

The "Authority" shall analyze the impact of economic changes and growth in the Downtown District, and develop plans in coordination with the Village's Planning Commission, to promote orderly economic growth in the "Down town Development District." With the advice and consent of the Village Council, the "Authority" shall implement a Development Plan in the Downtown District as necessary to achieve the purposes of the Downtown Development Act, all in accordance with the powers granted by said Act.

Section 3. Membership, Appointment, Term, Vacancies.

Members of the "Authority" shall serve without compensation, but shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses subject to approval by the Board. The Chairperson of the "Authority" shall be elected by the members.

The Board shall not finally adopt a budget for any fiscal year until the budget has been approved by the Council. The Board may, however, temporarily adopt a budget in connection with the operation of any improvements which have been financed by revenue bonds where required to do so by the ordinance authorizing the revenue bonds.

# 2 projects aim at curbing gypsy moth infestation

effort to combat the destructive effects of gypsy moth infestation in Michigan, the Department of Natural Resources, working with several state and federal agencies, has initiated 2 projects to help control gypsy moths in the

The projects are part of an attempt to increase the number of natural enemies attacking gypsy moths in Michigan. This approach causes less damage to the environment minimizes pesticide use.

"We must continue to seek natural, biological controls of the gypsy moth in Michigan," DNR Director Roland Harmes said.

'The limited long-term effectiveness of pesticides, along with the related environmental concerns and expense, underscores the need to explore alternative methods of pest manage-

Gypsy moth caterpillars cause severe damage to tree foliage. They prefer oak and aspen, but will eat the leaves of other trees if pest population levels are Approximately 620,000 acres of trees were defoliated in Michigan in 1991 due to infestation.

The DNR is expecting higher populations of gypsy moths in the mid-Michigan area, and is currently working on a project with the U.S. Forest Service, the Illinois Natural History Survey and the Michigan Department of Agriculture to introduce a protozoa into local caterpillar populations.

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



After several months of work, the plan received approval from both the **Emergency Management** Division of the Michigan State Police and the State **Emergency Response Com**mission, which is under the umbrella of the DNR.

Jashinske said General Cable neither stores nor uses any "extremely hazardous" chemicals, but that some of the company's materials could cause some problems.

John Cooper, employee relations manager for the local plant, explained the biggest concern is the possibility of a widespread fire that could result in toxic

#### MUST BE REPORTED

"We have nothing at the plant that in and of itself is hazardous to the community," he said, adding, however, that the plant does use materials that are subject to reporting under the right-to-

Those materials are antimony oxide, copper and lead used in processing copper wire into cables for the telecommunications and electronics industries.

All 3 are "basically very stable (and) would present no immediate danger," Cooper said. "As far as the community is concerned, we would have no objection. .to reviewing these materials with anyone."

Cooper pointed out that General Cable already has guidelines in place regarding safe storage, use and disposal of hazardous materials. In addition, the plant has a sprinkler system, a reservoir and pump for fire protection.

If a fire were to get out of control and send dangerous fumes into the air, that's when the emergency response plan would kick in. said Milt Connolly, chairman of the county's LEPC and acting chief of the Elkland Township Fire Department.

"We've encompassed everybody so that everyone knows what their role is," Jashinske said.

The dangers inherent in hazardous materials accidents has prompted Connolly to begin talking about future purchases of specialized equipment, such as protective suits, to be used by police, fire fighters and other personnel who are often the first to arrive at the scene.

Perhaps one of the biggest toxic chemical dangers is transported through town on a regular basis in tanker trucks, Connolly said, and personnel who are first on the scene need to be prepared and equipped prop-

Jashinske agreed and added the local emergency planning efforts should prove valuable in terms of better coordinating emergency response to accidents.

## Prospects good for Lake Huron fishing

The stocking of 7 million trout and salmon in Lake Huron this year, along with stepped-up research and stocking procedures, should bring about significant improvements in the Lake Huron fishery in the near future, according to Department of Natural Resources fisheries managers.

Plans to plant 1.63 million yearling and 850,000 fall fingerling lake trout during 1992 reflect the second year of increased stocking for Lake Huron.

Lake trout numbers declined during the mid-to late 1980s in the Lake Huron basin following severe problems caused by an outbreak of a viral disease in state and

While the effects of the disease did not extend to adult lake trout stocked in the Great Lakes, the number of hatchery-reared lake trout available for planting was significantly reduced.

"The present levels of dis-

ease-free stocking for lake trout, along with increased stocking to levels ranging from 2.5 million to 2.8 million a year by the turn of the reevaluating the best times century, are expected to accelerate the rebuilding of planting time, and the potenthe lake trout fishery in central and southern Lake and salmon. These adjustments will result in a net increase of one teacher to the staff, which was anticipated because of the enrollment increase in the seventh grade, Micklash told the board.

School district residents will pay slightly less in school taxes this year than they did last year. Operating millage remained the same, but because the 1965 school debt was paid, the reduction in debt millage results in a quarter of a mill reduction. Bids from 3 concerns for the cost of borrowing operating funds were received and the low bidder was Chemical Bank-Bay Area at 3.14 percent.

Several new texts were approved. A music textbook to replace unused texts that are 30 years old was authorized. They will cost \$9,948.95 and include teacher aids. The texts will give the K-6 students more than just a period of singing, Supt. Ken Micklash reported, and include music appreciation.

New texts were also authorized for 10th grade math and 90 books for Algebra II and trigonometry will cost a total of \$2,719.50.

After officers were elected for the new school year (see picture), the board approved a raise for the school treasurer of \$300 yearly as requested by President Ben School board Hobart. members receive \$40 per year. The money was voted because the treasurer spends about 4 hours before each meeting auditing the school

### TAKING CARE **OF DIABETIC** FEET

Few things are more important in diabetes than taking care of the feet. The feet are a source of complications and infections, sometimes life-threatening ones.

Diabetes causes problems for the feet in two ways -- the circulation is damaged and the sensation to the feet can be decreased or lost. An ulcer, blister or burn can occur without being felt and by the time the infection is found, it can be very serious.

To prevent problems, a person should wash his or her feet daily and inspect them for blisters, sores or other problems. The skin should be dried carefully and the toenails cut straight across. If corns or calluses need to be treated, it is best to have it done by a doctor or nurse.

Wear comfortable stockings and properly fitting shoes. Check the shoes for any pebbles, protruding nails or other intrusions which may cause pressure on the foot. If the feet feel cold, it is best to wear more stockings and clothes rather than try to warm them by a heater or in hot water. Burns can occur without any pain and will take weeks to heal.

A person must avoid harmful practices such as smoking which will further damage the circulation.

Do not wear constricting or seamed stockings, or footwear which may cause excessive rubbing or pressure such as sandals or high-heeled shoes. Walking barefoot may be even worse. Stepping on slivers or other sharp objects is sure to cause an infection.

# 800 phone numbers not always free

The Michigan Public Service Commission is urging residents to be careful calling 800 numbers; They are not always free anymore.

Some advertisers are promoting a service and listing an 800 number for consumers to call. Once the company gets your call, they may tell you to stay on the phone. Or, they may ask you to press certain numbers on your phone if you want more information. Sometimes there is a charge from that point on.

It is possible the service provider has switched the call to a long-distance number or to a number outside the United States. In that case you may get long-distance or international longdistance charges on your telephone bill.

Another possibility is that the call is referred to a 900 number. Customers can call 900 numbers to receive a service or get information on a variety of things. These may include the weather, the stock market, or car values. A call to a 900 number always costs money. The charges,ranging from \$.75 to \$50.00 or more, may appear on your phone bill. If not, you will receive a direct billing from the provider of the service.

For your protection, the Federal Communications Commission has some rules on 900 numbers:

\* Companies must tell customers up front there is a charge for a 900 call.

\* Calls costing more than \$2 must have a short introductory message stating how much the call could cost. Callers get a chance to hang up and not pay for the call after hearing the mes-

\* If you don't want 900 numbers called from your telephone, call your local telephone company about a free "blocking" service. Most companies have it. you can still make other long-distance calls even though you block 900 calls.


\* Local or long-distance service cannot be shut off if you do not pay disputed charges from 900 calls.
