Village police probe several minor thefts

Incidents of larceny were up in the Cass City area last week as several residents reported thefts ranging from gasoline to food stamps.

Complaints filed with the Cass City Police Department included one by Terry Czekai, 6432 VanDyke Rd., who stated someone stole \$191 worth of food stamps from his mailbox sometime between July 9 and July 12.

Light vote predicted

Clerks report little absent voter demand

Requests for absentee voter ballots for the upcoming primary election have been less than overwhelming, according to area township clerks, who say they're expecting a typically light voter turnout Aug. 4.

Reasons cited by township officials ranged from fewer local races to voter apathy. There have been 18 absentee ballot requests so far from Elkland Township's 2 precincts, according to Clerk Norma Wallace, who commented, "They're going slow."

She said a lack of interest, at least compared to some past primary elections, may be the problem.

For example, in the 1990 primary, when 5 local candidates sought the District 2 Tuscola County Board of Commissioners seat, Elkland Township led county townships in voter turnout with 38.7 percent of its residents casting ballots.

This year, however, the same seat is being sought by only one Democrat and one Republican, and all township officials are running unopposed.

"I don't expect (voter turnout) to be as heavy" as 2 years ago, Wallace said. "If it's a local issue, then you get a lot. If it's not a local issue, then you don't."

Novesta Township Clerk Nurse Kloc said she believes people simply "aren't voting like they should. That's the one thing they can still go out and do, and they should, but they don't."

services, but no local primary races.

So far, Kloc said she's sent out 2 absentee voter ballots and has 2 other applications out.

"We usually have more than that. I usually have around 15, 16 or 17," she added. "We might still get a few more."

Similarly, no primary races are scheduled in Elmwood Township, where requests for absentee ballots have been light. Clerk Elaine Seibel remarked that trend is typical, however.

The clerk said she's had only 3 applications so far, and "If I have a half dozen, that will be a lot."

There may be more coming in, but absentee voter ballot requests are usually quite light in primaries, she continued, adding she expects the pace will pick up prior to the general election in November.

In Sanilac County, Evergreen Township Clerk Arthur Severance said he expects to see a dozen absentee voter ballots, slightly above normal.

That's quite a few, compared to the number seen to date by Greenleaf Township Clerk Clare Brown.

"So far, we haven't had any, which is unusual,"

Brown said. "We usually have a few. I'm sure we'll still get a few requests."

Asked about what he expects in the way of voter turnout, Brown said the number of primary voters typically equals 60 to 70 percent of the general election turnout. "I would hope we would have a fair turnout," he added.

Electors who won't be in the area to cast their vote in the primary can still receive

an absentee voter ballot by mail if they submit an application by 2 p.m. Aug. 1.

After that, electors qualified to obtain an absentee voter ballot may vote in person in their respective township clerk's office until 4 p.m. Aug. 3. Emergency absentee voter ballots, which require the applicant to demonstrate special circumstances, are available up to 4 p.m. election day.

Record Walbro profit, sales in second quarter

L.E. Althaver, chairman, president and chief executive officer, Walbro Corporation, reported sales of \$62,721,000 for the second quarter ended June 30, compared with \$52,574,000 for the same period in 1991. Net income for the quarter was \$3,549,000 compared with \$1,448,000 for the second quarter of 1991.

Fully diluted net income per share for the second quarter of 1992 was \$.43, based on an average of 8,423,030 shares outstanding. This compares with fully diluted net income per share of \$.31 for the second quarter of 1991, based on 5,589,161 fully diluted shares outstanding.

"Sales and income were both new highs for a single

quarter and reflect continued strong demand for Walbro fuel system products," Althaver said in announcing the results.

"Shipments of fuel pumps for automotive original equipment applications were very strong during the second quarter. Sales of fuel modules and fuel rails for automotive applications were also running at high levels," according to Althaver.

"Sales of diaphragm carburetors for small engine applications were quite high in the second quarter, while shipments of float-feed carburetors dropped somewhat due to normal seasonal patterns in the lawn and garden industry," he added.

Merchants report sidewalk sales good, not great

Rain early last week threatened to put a damper on Cass City's annual Sidewalk Sale Days, July 15-18.

But as it turned out, timing — not weather — had the biggest impact, as similar promotions held in other area communities at the same time cut into local sales.

Although the skies cleared in time for the annual town-wide event, merchants offered a mixed bag of reviews.

"I was a little disappointed," remarked Bill Kritzman, owner of Kritzman's Clothing Inc. "Even though we were up a little bit from last year, I just didn't think there were the people that I expected there would be."

Kritzman said a number of factors, including the economy, could be responsible for lighter crowds, but he believes sidewalk sales in Bad Axe, Sandusky, Marlette, Harbor Beach and Bay City had the biggest effect. Ben Franklin owner Geraldine Prieskorn offered the same observation and said the Big Wheel closeout sale in Caro also hurt.

"We're going to have to reevaluate the timing on that," she said, noting a huge fabric sale likely kept her sales from dipping below last year's levels.

"We didn't get the rush the

first day, but overall, I think we did as well as last year."

Prieskorn pointed out more street vendors as well as the annual book sale at Rawson Memorial Library and quilt show at the Cultural Center all helped draw shoppers to town.

The increase in independent vendors was due largely to the efforts of Mike Weaver, owner of Coach Light Pharmacy, who reported most of them were happy with sales during the 4-day event. "And, of course, we want to do that again next year," he said, adding greater variety attracts more shoppers.

As for sales, Weaver said traffic "was a little bit light" at his store.

"We hope to maybe approach it better and maybe stay away from other sidewalk sales" next year, he added.

Among those merchants reporting good sales was Geri Tordai of Special Scents.

"It went really well for us. Some of the crafters that were on either side of us did well, I thought," she said.

"We were very pleased this year — probably a record for us," remarked Tom Proctor, owner of Old Wood Pharmacy. "We had a lot of good bargains and good values."

1902

While looking for an article in the Chronicle files for 1902, I came across some interesting tidbits of information. The old files are yellowed and brittle, but always fascinating.

The Nov. 14, 1902, issue of the "Tri-County Chronicle" reported that the long awaited free rural mail delivery routes had been mapped out and were expected to be in operation by Jan. 1, 1903. I presume that country folks had to go to the post office for their mail until then.

An article in the same issue, by Mrs. John A. Logan, urged self reliance for girls. Mrs. Logan asserted that "American parents have always been and are too indulgent to their children, and to their daughters especially."

While admitting that the "innate spirit of chivalry in almost every man born on American soil" is good, she cautioned that every girl should be taught something practical which she could "turn to account if necessary, but she need not assume its practice until circumstances demand its assumption."

And, as if it were planned, the same paper offered an opportunity for the over-indulged females to do just such a practical thing.

Frutchey, McGeorge & Co. was looking for 20-25 ladies to pick beans at their elevator. The wages were "good, ranging from 50 cents to \$1.00 per day."

Vandalism was apparently existent, even in those days. An account in the Nov. 21 Chronicle told how sad and indignant George Scuphalm

was to find his grand new buggy with 2 of the top curtains and the cover of the box slashed. The burr from one of the axles was missing, too.

Someone had also cut the rings from the harness of Scuphalm's neighbor, Don Nutt, about the same time.

The special Christmas issue in 1902 featured a full color front page, which must have been very impressive in those days. Unless you're involved with the industry, you probably don't realize the amount of work printing with color takes, even now.

Undoubtedly, the Chronicle didn't do the work themselves in 1902. Nevertheless, it was pretty spectacular.

Cass City's crack team of checker players whopped the Gagetown team that year in a match game of 36 innings. Players for Cass City were Miller, Sage, Tyo, Ball, McLarty and Anderson.

The people of Shabbona turned out en masse that fall at the "spacious Ehlers hall" to hear G. R. Lovejoy, promoter of the Lovejoy railroad, present the merits of the road he proposed to construct in the near future. A vote to raise \$15,000 for the proposed road was unanimously carried.

Did Shabbona get its railroad? Did the checker team go on to Olympic greatness? Did they catch the buggy vandals?

For the answers to these and other questions, you'll have to wait till I have an excuse to peruse the files again.

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
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Rabbit Tracks

Better late than never department. We received a nifty looking card in the mail last week announcing a change in address for the Pioneer Work and Learn Center. That's the Center that was in Koylton Township before receiving the oot from township officials.

Enough of that ancient history and back to the announcement. The Center's card told us that the Center had relocated to Vassar on April 20. Should be well settled in by now.

Corn rootworm study set at Gingrich farm

A meeting will be held for corn producers to learn more about adult corn rootworm scouting and larvae control. The program is being presented by the Michigan State University Extension Service and the Huron County Corn Growers.

This meeting will be held July 30 at the Mel Gingrich Farm, located south of Bad Axe on the corner of Wadsworth and Bad Axe Roads at 7:30 p.m. One Restricted Use Pesticide recertification credit will be available for those who register at this meeting.

Participants will be given the opportunity to determine the level of adult rootworm infestation in the field this year using proper scouting techniques.

In addition, there will be a discussion on the effectiveness of various insecticide application rates on fields with above and below CRW adult rootworm threshold counts in 1991. Research in other states suggest that reduced rates of rootworm insecticide applied at plant-

ing result in effective control. Prior to the meeting, roots will be dug from the various plots, washed and rated for rootworm larvae feeding.

Gary Krug, State Corn Grower's president, will also be on hand to review some of the pending activi-

ties of the state association. This includes the corn check-off proposal that will be coming up for a vote in the late fall.

We don't like what is happening to the good blue collar jobs in Michigan and the nation, who does? I don't see the Democrats or the Republicans doing much to solve that.



A law to encourage smoking?

State Sen. Fred Dillingham, R-Fowlerville, is sponsoring legislation that would encourage smoking. Dillingham has also proposed legislation that would make it a felony for a doctor to help a suffering, terminally ill person commit suicide.

Talk about wanting to have your cake and eat it too. Dillingham wants to keep us alive and kill us too.

Much to the joy of the tobacco industry, Dillingham thinks Michigan needs a law forbidding employers from discriminating against employees for smoking outside their workplace.

I never heard of an employer committing this terrible crime against humanity. Downtown Detroit, for instance, is full of clumps of people openly puffing cigarettes in front of building entrances because they're not allowed to smoke inside. If they were afraid of a boss sticking his head out a window and firing them, they would crouch behind newspaper boxes and blow the smoke up their sleeves.

DO DRUNKS NEED RIGHTS, TOO?

Perhaps I'm naive. Dillingham and his supporters — including the American Civil Liberties Union, which I usually support — think employers might discriminate against present or prospective employees for smoking at home or elsewhere where there are no no-smoking signs. The government can't treat people like that in a free country. Smoking is still legal, and a man's home is still his castle, even if it smells like a trash fire and his children are gasping.

But why is this fight for freedom so narrowly focused? Besides smoking, there are several other legal habits that might offend an employer. How about the employee who gets drunk off the job, or becomes obese, or commits

adultery? Should the law protect them from the re- crimination of a blue-nosed boss?

How about freedom of political expression? Do we need a law forbidding a Republican boss from withholding the executive john key from an employee who dared attend a Democratic rally?

It has been suggested that Dillingham's pro-smoking bill should be expanded to prohibit these other possible discriminations. But Howard Simon, director of the Michigan ACLU chapter, disagrees. "If we added every form of life-style discrimination to it, it never would pass. We're establishing the principle with the most common form of life-style discrimination, namely smoking," Simon told the press.

After the nicotine principle has been established, presumably, the Legislature can aim added legislation at bosses who, say, discriminate against an employee because his skydiving addiction makes the health insurance department nervous.

Maybe. But you can't help wondering what's so preemptively important about protecting smokers' rights. A hell of a lot more people die from smoking than from skydiving. Is it really because anti-smoking discrimination is so

widespread? Or is it because the tobacco lobby is so powerful?

LAWS CAN STRETCH THEIR LIMITS

According to the latest report, Dillingham is a former smoker. I haven't had a cigarette in 40 years. I'm not proud that I still puff an occasional tiny cigar in a smoking section. But I'm surely not worried that my boss will read this and take away my office microwave privileges.

However, I am worried that Dillingham's bill could force the American Lung Association of Michigan to hire a smoker to be a stop-smoking counselor. Which would make as much sense as forcing a Baptist church to hire an atheist preacher.

There is no question that tobacco is a killer. But there is a huge question concerning why a government should pass a law protecting an employee's right to commit suicide through smoking off the job. Especially when there's no law protecting an employee's right to be a Democrat off the job.

Finally, how can the same senator say it's a crime for a doctor to help a sick person leave a painful life not worth living, and also a crime to curb the tobacco industry's right to make a healthy person sick enough to die?


DiNardi, Ozbat join 4-H staff

Former Navy chaplain

Rev. Ray new Salem UM pastor

It's unlikely the Rev. Kenneth B. Ray will find himself being airlifted by helicopter to give his sermons in Cass City, but if the need ever arose, the former U.S. Navy chaplain would be well prepared.

Ray, 45, was recently welcomed by members of the Salem United Methodist Church as their new pastor.

He and his family moved to Cass City last month from the Port Huron area, where they have served the North Street United Methodist church for the past 2 1/2 years.

Ray's 16 years in the ministry include a half dozen years as a Navy chaplain. Much of that time was spent among a crew of 5,000 on the aircraft carrier, John F. Kennedy.

"I used to be good at names until I went aboard the aircraft carrier," he recently joked.

Ray, who noted the senior chaplain wasn't big on heights, said his duties included delivering sermons aboard 3 destroyers. Getting there was half the fun, according to the pastor, who explained he would be airlifted by the "holy helo" from the carrier to the smaller ships, then attached to a cable and lowered onto their decks. "That was fun," he added.

Although the pastor enjoyed his duties, he resigned his commission as a Lt. commander in 1985.

Playing heavily in the decision was the loss of a child during an 8-month tour of duty overseas, and the effects of military life on his family, which includes wife Diane and daughters Amy, 20, Bethany, 10 and Laura, 8.

Ray spent the next few years serving a church in Alpena, where he stayed until moving on to the North Street church in 1990.

A former Social Security Administration employee, Ray entered the ministry in 1975 after receiving God's call to service. His training included studies at the Anderson School of Theology in Indiana, where he earned a 3-year degree in 2 years.

Over the next 4 years, he served as a youth pastor and deacon at churches in Kentucky and Wisconsin, respectively. He joined the Navy after becoming an elder in 1979.

Throughout his ministry, moving has been a part of life, but it's never easy, Ray said, adding, however, that he likes Cass City. (It's a

very nice community to raise a family."

As for his role in the local church, the new area pastor said his leadership style embraces the idea that "for a Christian to be fulfilled, he has to discover and utilize

his gifts of grace."

"Each church has unique gifts and abilities and each church has the gifts that it needs," he said. "It's a matter of getting them focused with what God is trying to accomplish."

The goal is clear, he continued. "It is the church's place...to be part of God's redemptive plan in history — the church is the body of Christ in the world. It can be a lot of other things, but it doesn't do them well."

Ray said he strives to meet the needs of people and at the same time remain faithful in preaching the word of God.

He smiled and added, "The Bible is inspired whether I am or not."

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Flying high

Snover area teen pilot soloed before he had driver's license

Ron King wants nothing to do with taking drugs, but the Snover area teen loves to get high — 2,000 to 3,000 feet high and cruising at a speed of a 120 miles per hour, to be exact.

King, 17, earlier this year realized a dream he's had for as long as he can remember: getting his pilot's license.

"It's always been a goal of mine. I soloed before I even had my driver's license," he commented recently at his Germania Road home, where he lives with his parents, Boyd and Linda, and sister Tami, 15.

The Marlette High School senior's earliest memories of flying date back to when he was 4 years old and his father would take him up. "He had a little booster seat for me so I could see out the window," he recalled.

The family owned a plane at the time but didn't keep it because it was too expensive for a couple with young children.

"We got (another) plane

about 6 years ago and I've flown quite a bit with my dad since then," King said.

The honor student received his pilot's license on his 17th birthday, April 6, 17 years after his father earned his license at a landing strip just north of Rolling Hills Golf Course in Cass City.

Although he had to wait until he turned 17 to get his license, King took his first solo flight a year before on his 16th birthday.

Typically, an individual completes ground school and takes their written exam before soloing, he said. "I kind of did it in reverse, but I already knew a lot about flying because of my dad."

GROUND SCHOOL

King completed his ground school training, which covers the basics of flying as well as meteorology and other topics, via a video course at home. He noted he went that route because of a

busy school schedule, including participation in cross country, track and basketball.

He finished ground school in about a month, then took and passed a computer exam in Southfield.

By that time, the area teen had surpassed the minimum 40 hours of flight time, including 20 with an instructor, required for a pilot's license. His time in the air included a 300-mile solo from Lansing to Traverse City to Sandusky, where his father keeps the family's single engine Cessna 172 Skyhawk.

King said getting a pilot's license isn't as tough as some might think.

"There's a lot of things (you've got to remember), but if you're determined and you stick right with it, it's not . . . bad," he said. "The main thing is you've got to be consistent."

Flying is similar to driving in some ways, but it's very different in other ways, he continued, adding there are

many regulations concerning air space, maintenance, daytime-nighttime flying, etc.

CAN'T PULL OVER

"I think the main difference is in flying, there's just so many things you've got to beware of. If you run out of gas, you can't just pull over."

Knowing what to do in an emergency is an integral part of flying, according to the young pilot. "You're trained to always be looking for a place to land," he pointed out. "If you're calm in the situation, you've got a good chance."

King's flying has won the confidence of his family, including his mother — his first official passenger.

"You hardly get used to him taking the car and he's taking the plane," she joked. She admitted to being "a little bit nervous" flying with her son at first, but said she quickly became confident in his knowledge and ability. And in a strong belief that the Lord will protect him.

Interactive TV technology on its way to Thumb schools

Interactive telecommunications technology is on its way to the 5 Thumb Intermediate School Districts of Huron, Lapeer, Sanilac, Tuscola and St. Clair through a project jointly designed with St. Clair County Community College.

A telecommunications link will be established offering the breadth and depth of courses necessary to be competitive and survive in today's world.

Funded by a \$90,000 grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek, the project is already underway and will extend through February 1994.

Because of the limited population base in the Thumb region, the college and intermediate school districts have undertaken initiatives to provide greater access to quality education through the use of interactive telecommunications technology.

Initial efforts are focusing on establishing a telecommunications link between the college's main campus in Port Huron and its Huron County Off-Campus Center in Bad Axe.

Electronic classrooms will be constructed at both sites and contain cameras, microphones, microcomputers with modems and facsimile machines. These will then be used to provide instruction to Huron County students enrolled in the college's associate degree nursing program. Students will be able to participate

more readily in the nursing program, eliminating the current 2 to 3-day per week 160-mile round trip drive to the Port Huron campus.

Eventually, this project will be expanded to incorporate the transmission of voice, video and data to individual schools throughout the Thumb area. This telecommunications technology will allow the sharing of advanced level science and foreign language courses, remote "assemblies" or "in-service" with special speakers, library reference information not available in all schools, school reports, and computer information.

The college is responding to Governor John Engler's message to the legislature on Michigan 2000: Achieving excellence in education, which stated that "Without sharing instructional programs through 'distance learning,' it will be impossible for each of our more than 3,200 public schools to provide a comprehensive education program. . . Perhaps our best use of distance learning may be consortia which would enable school districts, universities, and public TV systems to pool resources. School districts could form networks to bring advanced courses to small, isolated, or otherwise disadvantaged schools."

The W.K. Kellogg Foundation was established in 1930 to "help people help themselves." As a private grantmaking foundation, it

provides seed money to organizations and institutions that have identified problems and have designed constructive action programs aimed at solutions.

VanAllen takes part in exercise

Navy Chief Petty Officer William S. Van Allen, son of Douglas W. and Hilda M. Van Allen, Cass City, recently returned from operation ocean venture with Assault Craft Unit Two, Naval Amphibious Base Little Creek, Norfolk, Va.

This was the largest joint United States' forces exercise using airborne mine countermeasure operations since Operation Desert Storm.

Van Allen's unit practiced minesweeping and amphibious landings off the coast of Moorehead City, N.C. To accomplish their mission, they used a variety of methods of mine hunting sonar and detonating devices to clear the way for Navy surface vessels.

The 1974 graduate of Cass City High School joined the Navy in November 1975.

CONVENIENT

King acknowledged owning a plane has made getting his license convenient.

"Cost-wise, it was a big advantage, plus I didn't have to go through all the hassle" of renting a plane. He explained the typical plane rental fee is \$40 to \$45 an hour, compared to the \$15 to \$20 an hour he paid his dad to cover fuel and oil expenses.

Despite the cost, he tries to get up flying at least once a week, although sometimes it's hard to get away.

The practice is leading up to a big trip. "Dad and I are leaving . . . for a trip out west. We're going to visit an old college roommate of his in Alberta, Canada. We'll take turns flying."

Also on the agenda is a stop at the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, which may play a part in King's future.

"I'm still trying to decide," he said. "I'm considering (flying) as a career. I'm considering the Air Force Academy. It's such a big decision."

Law and dentistry are 2 other possible career options for the Sanilac County teen, who's content for now to look forward to his final year in high school. And many more hours in the sky.

The best thing about flying, he remarked, is the feeling of freedom.

"You take off and you're out there, and it's like nobody can touch you. This is the ultimate high."

See sheep in Michigan farm future

Sheep production in Michigan could make a worthwhile economic contribution to almost any diversified farm business by the end of this decade.

"Michigan has the opportunity to be a leader in farm flock production of sheep and lambs," says Margaret Benson, Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service sheep specialist. "I think that economic opportunities are ahead for this industry to supplement other agricultural enterprises or exist as the primary enterprise."

Her optimism stems from the fact that sheep industry policy is being rewritten and the economics are beginning to brighten after several years of basement prices.

Last year, producers saw the lowest prices for their product since before 1960. The cost of the burlap bag to hold the wool exceeded the wool market price. Ewe market prices in 1991 were \$15 to \$20 a hundredweight (cwt). Market lamb prices averaged around 57 cents in 1990 compared with \$1.25 a pound in 1978.

Federal and industry policies are being revised to provide more uniform standards in animal yield grading, disease control and wool market management.

"The evaluation that is going on now regarding price discovery, grading and disease issues will be clarified shortly, which makes me think that farm flock production in Michigan has the potential for a reasonable return on investment", Benson says.

Adjourn Paquette murder exam

The preliminary examination for a Sanilac County man charged in the stabbing death of a Detroit area resident was adjourned Thursday in Huron County District Court.

Judge Karl E. Kraus continued to deny bond to the suspect, Philip J. Paquette, 32, of Hemans, who remains in the Huron County Jail.

Paquette was previously charged with open murder following the July 3 stabbing death of Micheal R. Gravelle, 18, of Sterling

Heights, at a party in Huron County's Caseville Township.

Paquette's exam is scheduled to resume Aug. 6 at 2 p.m., according to county Prosecutor Leslie Hagen, who stated the hearing was adjourned because lab and autopsy reports had not been received yet.

The case remains under investigation by the Michigan State Police, with assistance from the Huron County Sheriff's Depart-

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CHRONIC FATIGUE SYNDROME

Is chronic fatigue syndrome just a new name for the same old fatigue, or is it a real disease? While medicine is having difficulty agreeing on a name or the cause, most doctors agree that there is such an illness.

The majority of persons with the illness are women-- usually hard-working, successful, middle-class women in their 20's or 30's. Chronic fatigue syndrome is remarkable in that it often comes on over a matter of days following a minor infection or illness.

To diagnose the illness, a doctor must document certain symptoms. The main criteria is the new onset of a persistent or relapsing fatigue which is severe enough to reduce a person's activity to less than half of her normal activity. This fatigue must also be present for at least six months.

A person must also have many other symptoms. These include a low grade fever, sore throat without "spots" on the tonsils, swollen tender lymph glands, generalized muscle weakness, aching joints without redness or swelling and neurological symptoms such as irritability, confusion or depression.

Another common problem is a sleep disturbance. Inadequate amounts of the deeper stages of sleep will make the symptoms feel worse. Certain medicines such as antidepressants can help the sleep disturbance.

Other causes of fatigue, such as cancers, infections, diabetes, and many other illnesses must be excluded by lab tests and a complete exam.

Owen-Gage board okays borrowing bid

The Owen-Gage Board of Education has approved a low bid of 2.99 percent interest from National Bank of Detroit for \$610,000 in tax anticipation notes.
