

## Greed behind soaring costs

Flowers are sent regularly to patients in hospitals. But how about a hospital sending flowers to people at home in hopes they'll become patients?

That question was prompted by this letter from a suburban Detroit woman:

"My husband had cataract surgery as an out-patient at Royal Oak Beaumont Hospital. The total bill was over \$6,000. The hospital bill alone was over \$4,000. For a 35-minute procedure! For the patient, that might be just a bunch of numbers on paper when insurance pays the bill, but it is a lot of money.

"Two weeks after the successful surgery, a lovely plant arrangement from the O.R. Staff' was delivered to my husband. He wasn't awarded any 'best patient' prize. We assume this is done for who? All patients, all out-patients, all cataract patients? Lord only knows. Whatever the answer, it's outrageous, because we all know who really pays for the flowers.

"Have you ever heard of hospitals sending patients florists' arrangements? And why? They've got a stateof-the-art plant at Beaumont, but they're still trying to impress us with flowers?

"With medical costs off the charts and health care in deep trouble, some people appear to be having a glitzy good time with other people's money. I think this is exasperating silliness.'

#### **BRAGGING RIGHTS**

The writer asked that her name be withheld because "my husband is slated to return to Beaumont for another round.....Should I get excited that maybe we'll get another plant? Puhleeze!"

I phoned Beaumont and learned that, so far, the plants go only to out-patients in the Ophthalmology

"And many insurance plans pay only a certain percentage of medical costs, so a hospital jacks the price way up so the percentage paid will allow the hospital to make money. But the poor guy without insurance has to pay the jacked-up price" or go without treatment.

If asked, most U.S. citizens surely would say: Don't send me pretty flowers; send me a national health care system like Canada's.

# Democrats, incumbents win big in Tuscola County

away from a tradition of staunch Republican support last week, joining the state and nation in electing a new, Democratic president, although the vote was a mixed bag among area townships. ¿ Voters in Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties, meanwhile, all followed state voting patterns in approving Proposal B to limit the terms of state and federal legislators, and rejecting 3 other ballot proposals for tax cuts

and insurance reform. The turnout was heavy, with 79 percent of Tuscola County voters going to the polls, more than 72 percent in Sanilac County and 71 percent in Huron County. In the presidential race, it

was no surprise voters in traditionally Republican Sanilac and Huron counties favored George Bush. But Tuscola County turned from that same tradition, giving president-elect Bill Clinton the nod. It marked the first time in nearly 30 years that county voters elected a Democratic candidate.

Texas billionaire Ross Perot picked up more than 4,000 votes in each of the counties.

Among area townships voting for Bush were Elkland, Kingston, Novesta, Argyle, Evergreen, Greeneaf, Brookfield and Grant. Ellington, Elmwood, Koylton, Bingham and Shéridan townships, meanhile, favored Clinton.

In Tuscola County, it was a day for incumbents and Democrats, with voters giving incumbent Sheriff Tom Kern and Register of Deeds Ginny McLaren new terms.

# Report 7 fatalities, 1,732 injuries Car-deer crashes up in '91

An all-time high of 48,233 car-deer crashes with 7 fatalities and 1,732 injuries were reported on state roads last year, a 5 percent increase over 1990, AAA Michigan reports.

The 1990 tally was 45,945 crashes, in which one person died and 1,957 suffered injuries. In 1989, the previous peak year, there were 46,784 reported crashes with 6 deaths and 1,857 injuries.

Car-deer crashes are not strangers to Michigan. There are thousands every year, and they're increasing in number. They happen throughout the year, most occurring during fall and early winter months. Last year, 18,001 were recorded during October and November, 31.6 percent of the yearly total.

This year an estimated 760,000 firearm deer hunters are expected to take to the woods between Nov. 15-30, adding to the normal traffic flow and tourist

And, sadly, the car-deer crash story will be repeated. But anyone, not just hunters, can be involved in such acci-

Ironically, the size of the herd was 1.7 million last year, down from the peak year of 1989 when the herd numbered 2 million strong. This year's deer numbers are projected at 1.75 million.

"Last year was tough," said Basch, AAA Michigan's Community Safety Services manager, of the seesaw statistics. "The controlling factors are many food availability,

weather, size of herd and, most importantly, traffic volumes.

"A look at the southern tiers of counties shows this. There may be fewer deer per square mile than you'd find in the Upper Peninsula, but the number of car-deer crashes is uniformly high because there are more roads and more vehicles on those roads. In short, the fewer number of deer stands a greater chance of being

Last year, the top 5 counties in the number of cardeer crashes reported were Kent with 1,662; Calhoun, 1,363; Montcalm, 1,239; Jackson, 1,222, and Menominee in the Upper Peninsula, 1,117.

While there is no reasonable way to eliminate all car/ deer crashes because of the unpredictability of the animal, AAA Michigan advises motorists to always wear safety belts and heed the following tips:

• Car-deer crashes most often occur on paved local and county roads, although freeway motorists are not ex-

• The hours just before dawn and just after dusk are the most likely times to have deer move from area to area.

• If you see a deer, drive slowly, and assume that others are nearby.

 If you should approach a deer in the road, do not take unsafe evasive action. It is usually safer to strike the deer than another object, such as a tree or other ve-

• Be aware of eyes reflecting from your headlights. Drive at a speed that allows you to brake safely if you spot a deer.

• Should you strike one, report it to local or county police authorities. Also, to your insurance company. Repair bills for car-deer crashes generally average \$1,300 per car. If you choose to keep a deer you hit, first get a permit from the police department or Department of Natural Resources.

## **BENEFITS OF** BREASTFEEDING

In recent years, breastfeeding has become increasingly popular. Women are learning of many benefits, not only for the baby, but also the psychological and emotional benefits to themselves. The bonding between mother and baby is enhanced by the frequent interaction of breastfeed-

Breast milk is the natural food for infants. Babies receive the required nutrients in appropriate concentrations as well as antibodies from the mother which help prevent infections. However, supplemental vitamins and minerals such as fluoride and iron are usually indicated, as they are in

Breastfed infants tend to have less colic and less gas, and may swallow less air. Because the infant is not exposed to the allergenic proteins of new foods at a time when he is most susceptible to them, fewer food allergies may develop. The infant may feed as often as every 1 1/2 to 2 hours, however, which may be difficult for the mother who ends up with too little sleep.

Many women breastfeed until about 4-6 months when the infant can start solid foods. By then the baby may also be getting teeth.

There are few obstacles to breastfeeding that can not easily be overcome. A woman may worry that she will not have enough milk for her baby, but the amount of milk will increase along with the demand--with increased feeding. there is increased milk supply.
