"I think the economy is body," Prieskorn comimproving overall, and Christmas sales have been good, (but) we have a long ways to go," commented Bill Kritzman, who owns Kritzman's Inc. Clothing Store.

"Here, it's been pretty much holding its own," he added. "I don't expect any big increase" in sales. "Business is still good,"

said Coach Light Pharmacy owner Mike Weaver. "Christmas buying has started off as good or better" than last year. "It's positive. It's looking strong.

Sales at Schneeberger's are "good so far," Bud Schneeberger remarked, adding, "Our November was very good. We've been busy and it looks like December's going to be good, but we've only had a few days.'

The merchants agreed the local economy is a much better indicator of retail sales in the area than are state and national buying trends.

Shoppers may be boosting retail sales statewide, but if farmers have a bad year, as has been the case with this year's corn crop, businesses in Thumb area towns are going to feel it, Kritzman pointed out. "That's going to affect us for a good year," he said. State and national trends may be seen in smaller towns, but the impact is slower in coming and is typically much less dramatic, Kritzman said. "In the rural areas, the country stores, you don't get the big ups and you don't get the big downs," he ex-plained. "You're not making a lot of money, but you're not losing a lot, either." "We've seen some encouraging signs for sales in November," Ben Franklin Store owner Gerald Prieskorn said, adding, "What happens in December, it's hard to tell. Our biggest day will be the Sat-

# *Less hunting pressure* **Deer kill down in area**

whitetails during the 1992 firearm season, if the number of deer checked at the DNR's Cass City Field Office is any indication.

Statewide, the DNR estimates hunters bagged about 253,000 deer during the Nov. 15-30 gun season, 14 percent fewer than they did in 1991. The preliminary figure is based on traffic surveys and data gathered at check stations.

At the Cass City Field Office, officials checked about 240 deer during the firearm season, about 15 percent fewer than a year ago, said wildlife biologist Bud Jarvis.

A reduced harvest hasn't come as a big surprise to DNR officials, including those in the Thumb, who predicted the season would be challengin due to a

Deer numbers in the Thumb have been pared in recent years in an effort to reduce crop damage. Jarvis said the Thumb whitetail population will be allowed to come back to some extent, but he isn't looking for drastic changes in the numbers.

"I think with all the standing cornfields, there are a lot of deer scattered around," he

Raid TNU seizes pot, cash, farm in Kingston Twp.

> A drug raid in Kingston Township Monday netted 2 arrests, 20 pounds of high grade marijuana, cash and a small dairy farm.

The operation, conducted by the Thumb Narcotics Unit in cooperation with the Sanilac County Drug Task Force, culminated a 2month investigation into drug trafficking in the Kingston-Deford areas.

As a result, 2 suspects were apprehended at the scene, and investigators hope to tie others into the conspiracy through further investigation.

Aside from the marijuana,

valued at \$40,000, officers seized 14 rifles and shot guns, 2 handguns, a 1989 Ford stake truck, a 1986 Ford Bronco, \$9,000 in cash, a small dairy farm (including home and property), and miscellaneous items with an estimated value of \$3,000.

Names of the suspects are being withheld pending further charges.

The drug unit was assisted by the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department, Michigan State Police from the Caro post and the Lapeer County Sheriff's Department's drug dog.





# "If It Fitz...." Half-inning days




On a recent morning, my career in journalism reached an epoch. Soon after, the roof fell in.

The 8,300-ton ship is powered by 4 gas turbines that can develop 80,000 shaft horsepower. The ship is 563 feet long, has a crew of 339, and is armed with missiles, guns and torpedoes. U.S.S. Kidd also can embark its

# Signs require permit numbers

Michigan Department of Transportation officials have attached red violation notices to a handful of outdoor signs in the Cass City area, including a pair of signs welcoming motorists to the village.

The signs are located just west and east of the village. A state transportation official said the violations are minor and were issued in conjunction with the department's annual sign inventory

He said the Cass City signs

have permits, but the owners failed to display their permit numbers on the signs as required by law. The permit numbers must be a minimum of 4 inches high and must be displayed on the lower corner of the sign nearest the road.

Failure to comply with the law will result in proceedings leading to condemnation of signs in violation. Correcting the problem is easy, according to the officials, who said it's a matter of simply attaching the per-

mit numbers and contacting MDOT at (517) 754-7443.



After impact, the Skogstad vehicle struck a guard rail and a passenger, William H. Poullion II, 32, also of Flint, was thrown from the car. Nielsen's pickup traveled eastbound, struck the guard rail and went over the structure, rolling over several times.

**YOU CAN TREAT BEDWETTING** 

For about 25 years, medicines have been used for treating bedwetting and they have been quite effective. The most common mistake is rushing into treatment. There is no need to treat early; it is better to wait until the child is a little older and more mature. Failures are very disappointing to both the parents and child.

The first step in treatment is reassurance that the child is normal and that bedwetting is not a serious problem. Rewards for being dry are helpful, but being dry should be reward enough along with parental praise for successes. It is always harmful to scold or humiliate the child for failures.

Alarm devices are available and are one of the first choices. They require the child to be old enough to work the device and motivated enough to use it. If so, they are quite effective.

Studies in Denmark have shown that some children have low levels of an antidiuretic hormone which helps concentrate the urine during sleep. These children can be treated with a medicine called DDAVP which has recently become available as a nasal spray.

Limiting fluids in the evening may be of some value. Often it seems to make little difference, though. Medicines
