Crash kills one, injures one, Friday

A Frankenmuth man was killed in a 2-vehicle accident Friday morning in Denmark Township.

The victim, Michael C. Roach, 32, Frankenmuth, was eastbound on M-46 about a quarter-mile west of Vassar Road when he apparently lost control on the snow-covered roadway and skidded into the path of a westbound pickup truck driven by Robert R. Rabideau, 44, of Caro, Denmark Township Police Chief Fred Hecht reported.

The pickup struck the car on the passenger side, Hecht said, adding the force of the impact threw Roach from his vehicle.

The Vassar Fire Department's Jaws of Life were needed to extricate Rabideau from the wreckage. He was taken by Vassar Area Ambulance Service to St. Mary's Medical Center, Saginaw, where he remained in critical condition early this week.

The victim was transported by Vassar Area Ambulance Service to St. Luke's Hospital, Saginaw, where he was pronounced dead.

Both drivers were wearing seat belts at the time of the 7:13 a.m. crash, according to Hecht, who stated the accident remains under investigation.

Little protests tax plan

Up salaries 3.8% for school employees

Monday night granted 3.8 percent raises to all nonunion employees of the school, a boost a half percent higher than the current rate of inflation.

The increase boosts the minimum salary paid at the school to \$7.50 per hour and the maximum to the superintendent, who will receive \$63,651 next year. A complete salary breakdown appears in this issue.

A committee of President Ben Hobart, Allan Hartwick and Beverley Auten recommended the wage increases.

They said that 13 area schools were compared. The salaries of the administrators ranged slightly above the average and that of the superintendent 9th among the 13 schools.

Keith Little, Cass City area farmer, spoke to the board about the proposed adding of a mill for middle school renovation when the present high school debt is paid off this year.

He said that the money should be taken from the \$700,000 cash contingency fund. He also presented a clipping from an article that showed that Michigan paid farm real estate taxes of 33.18 per acre, the third highest in the nation.

PRESENTATIONS

March promises to be a special month at the school. It is "Celebrate Youth Arts Month" and "March is Reading Month."

Special activities for both have been scheduled by the teachers. Arts Month will be highlighted by a performance day by high school students March 18 and an all-district arts show at Rawson Memorial Library March 9-17.

Three teachers reviewed the art program at the school for the board. Judy Hoelzle told about the new elementary art course. Linda Edwards presented the middle school curriculum and Karen Wallace, the course at the high school.

The reading emphasis will feature the return of the program which has students reading to volunteer persons in the community, Cathy Cooper said. It is expected that each student will read to one of these volunteers and also to one of the school principals. The program was an outstanding success last year, Cooper feels, and she believes that this year's will be equally as beneficial.

CHECK EARLY FOR FLU

If you get the flu, see your doctor early. If it turns out to be the serious form of influenza, it is very important to begin treatment early--within the first couple days.

Each year the Center for Disease Control reports about 25,000 deaths from the complications of influenza. About 75% of these are people over 65 years old. Even though the flu shot should be obtained each year, many fail to do so, and a few people have contraindications to taking it.

Fortunately, there is also a medicine available which will prevent the infection, or at least limit the infection if it is started early in the infection. The medicine is an antiviral antibiotic which is taken by mouth.

When it is given to limit an infection, it is very important to start it early. If the medicine is not started within the first couple days, it will not help reduce the symptoms. You should see your doctor if you develop a fever along with a cough, fatigue, aching or other symptoms.

The medicine, called amantadine, has a number of side effects which may be troublesome for persons taking it. It is likely to cause insomnia, difficulty concentrating and fatigue. More severe side effects include seizures and delirium which prevent using the medicine indiscriminately; it is still better to get the flu shot.

A newer antiviral antibiotic called rimantadine is gaining popularity since it may be better tolerated by older patients. This is one of a series of articles brought to you in the interest of better health by



I hesitate to tell you this because it appears that all I do is eat out at places more expensive than I can afford. Remember, if you will, that these things run in streaks and while in recent weeks I've reported on different restaurants, weeks will go by when I have nothing to report because I haven't been any place.

This week's restaurant review is one that is familiar to many, if not most, of the diners in the area.

It's the Embers in Mt. Pleasant. To be more specific, it's the Embers' Friday Sea Fare buffet.

For most of us, I'd guess, the cost would restrict attendance except on special occasions. Unless it's for strictly business purposes like for editors of columns of trivia.

Anyway, this is what you get. On the salad bar you have the usual fruits, salads and vegetables. You also have shrimp (unpeeled), creamy marinated herring, fresh cold salmon, clams in the shell, escargot, stuffed mushrooms and clam chowder.

The hot dishes start with little round, boiled potatoes apparently flavored with a meat sauce. There was corn on the cob. The Embers is noted for its inch-thick pork chops specially prepared in a marinated sauce. That was offered. Also served was shrimp (peeled) in a special sauce, seafood fettucini, 2 kinds of fish and prime rib.

There were 4 kinds of bread and I saw a dessert tray, but I don't know whether it came with the buffet. You can only gorge so much.

The price? \$21.95 each without tip.





The Krugs, who own and selves in the goat business. operate Pinecreek Farm, 2095 Phillips Rd., Deford, have built a name for them-

The couple are celebrating 10 years of breeding, raising and showing angora goats, whose soft mohair is prized for use in making everything from dolls to sweaters to

"We started out with 2 neutered male goats," Debbie recently recalled.

The goats were pets at first, but the couple have since added to their stock and in the process created a successful mail order mohair business.

The number of goats on the farm varies. "Right now, we're down to 80 goats, but at least 40 of them are due to have babies," Debbie said, noting she and her husband practically live in their barn this time of year.

The Krugs also recently completed shearing, which adds to the hectic schedule.

Aside from the goats, the Krugs have a pair of llamas, which they purchased a year ago to protect their herd. Dogs have been a problem, Debbie remarked, and llamas don't like dogs. They've even kept the deer out to some extent," she added.

Debbie estimated she and Don annually sell 1,500 to 1,600 pounds of mohair.

"The average goat will shear 8 to 10 pounds of hair twice a year," she explained. 'They'll grow an inch of hair a month."

After the shearing is completed, the mohair is washed, picked, carded and dyed. Debbie does much of the dying herself, but said the bulk of processing is done by Zeilinger Wool Company, Frankenmuth.

She pointed out mohair is strong and naturally flame retardant, but lacks "memory," so the fiber is blended with wool, which she buys from Phil and Janet McPeck of Decker.

The Krugs offer a variety of mohair types, from adult stained fiber at \$1 per pound to kid mohair, an extremely soft and usually very long mohair that goes for \$6 a

"We sell it all over the United States," Debbie said. We sell it to other hand spinners and craft people. We do a lot of mail order (business), but most of it is picked up as a result of the fiber shows we go to."

The couple advertise in national spinning publications and show their goats and mohair at various events. They've attended fiber shows in Michigan as well as Ohio, Maryland and fiber at \$1 per pound to kid mohair, an extremely soft and usually very long mohair that goes for \$6 a pound.

Aside from mohair, Debbie also sells crafts, such as dolls, which she creates with the fiber.

A member of the board of directors of the Northern Angora Goat Ranchers Cooperative, she noted mohair that isn't suitable for hand spinning is shipped to a warehouse in Texas and sold all over the world for clothing and fabric.

Although keeping up with the mohair end of the business keeps the Krugs busy, the couple devote a lot of time to showing their goats.

Their efforts have paid off time and time again, including winning grand champion and reserve champion honors at the Michigan State Fair every year since the class was introduced in 1989. In 1992, they also won grand champion and reserve champion doe honors, as well as a herdsmanship trophy and breeders award.

Despite the work, Debbie said she and Don enjoy their business and meeting new people at the various shows and events they attend.

"It still is fun," she concluded. "If I didn't enjoy the goats, I wouldn't do it."





Blisters and Their Treatment

Blisters are a common problem and everyone knows how much of an inconvenience they are. Blisters are the body's protest against too much friction. They can be debilitating if treated incorrectly but can be healed easily if proper care is provided.

The key to blister care is prevention. Here are some tips to prevent blisters: Wear two pairs of socks. The inner pair should be made of wool because they are better than cotton at absorbing moisture. Certain areas that are prone to getting blisters can be dabbed with skin lube or petroleum jelly to reduce friction. Talcum or foot powder will also help to reduce friction.

If a blister does arise, do not tear it open. A doughnut shaped pad found at most drug stores should be placed around the blister to protect it and allow the fluid to be reabsorbed.

If a blister is sure to break, it should be thoroughly cleaned and pierced with a sterile needle. Light pressure should be used to drain the blister. The blister should then be cleaned again and bandaged to prevent infection.
