# Old favorites, new features mulled for Fourth Festival

Expect to find many old favorites together with some different exciting attractions when the annual July 4 Festival rolls around this summer.

An estimated 25 persons attended an organizational meeting Thursday night, chaired by Jane Hittler.

Although the actual program is far from fixed at this early date, area residents can be sure that a few of the more popular events will be back. Heading that list is the annual fireworks display. Dennis Kundinger from Sebawaing, who handled the fireworks last year, said that he had some ideas for improving the display this summer.

How much it will be enhanced will depend on finances. The organization hopes to hold a raffle to augment its funds. A fund raiser April 1 is in the planning stage. Right now there is \$2,980 to start the year. The down side is that in 1992 the committee dipped into its reserves and spent more than was taken in.

Another very popular event that will come back is the Cruise Night and antique car display. Jim Perry attended the meeting to help the group arrange for the show, which annually draws oohs and ahs from spectators.

Cruise Night is planned for Friday, one of the few events that will not be staged Saturday, July 3.

A golf tourney, which originated last year, will return and will be played on the Thursday preceding the Fourth. Persons who entered reported a good time last year and the event helped pay for other expenses connected with the celebration.

One of the new events kicked around at the meeting, but not yet finalized, will be boat or canoe races at Northwood Shores and the return of a water battle staged by the firemen.

An attempt will be made to rent the giant stage owned by the Tuscola County Fair Association and place it on the football field. All the various musical acts and dance shows would be held there, with plenty of seating for spectators.

Jordan College is expected to return with a solar car and a future car exhibit and the facility will be open to the public.

Gary Jones, who annually handles the parade, will do so again this year.

Geraldine Prieskorn, who has been in charge of the event for several years, will serve as honorary chairman this year. Co-chairmen for

1993 are Hittler and Tom Meismar.

Helping for the first time will be members of the newly formed Cass City

Garden Club. June Thomas, representing the club, said that a float in the parade and an exhibit in the arts and crafts was planned.

# Vassar man dies in truck-train crash

A Vassar area man died after the pickup truck he was driving collided with a CSX train about 3 miles west of Vassar early Saturday morning.

Troopers at the Michigan State Police post in Caro identified the victim as Martin W. Hecht, 19, 8750 W. Saginaw Rd.

According to reports, Hecht was northbound on Lorenzo Road just south of Simpson Road at about

12:13 a.m. when his pickup struck the eastbound train en route to Brown City from Saginaw.

The train's engineer told troopers he blasted the train's horn as the engine and 10 cars approached the signed intersection at about 40 miles per hour. He indicated it appeared Hecht didn't attempt to stop until he was within 10 to 20 feet of the tracks, and then it was too late.

Hecht, who was wearing a seat belt at the time of the accident, was transported by FlightCare Helicopter to St. Mary's Medical Center, Saginaw, where he was pronounced dead at 5:30 a.m.

Troopers were assisted at the scene by Vassar Area Ambulance personnel and the Richville, Vassar and Reese Bloomfield fire departments.

The weekend crash marked Tuscola County's third traffic fatality of 1993.

A recipient of the Daughters of the American Revolution scholarship, Muntz plans to major in journalism and minor in commercial art at Central Michigan University.



# O-G accepts bid for \$161,800 school roof

Owen-Gage School officials are moving ahead with a major roofing project following voters' approval last week of a \$185,000 bond issue.

The Board of Education awarded the contract to Lynch Insulation and Roofing, Millington, during a March 2 special meeting. Lynch's quote of \$161,800 came closest among 6 bids to the project specifications, according to school Supt. Harley Kirby, who said the board followed the recommendation of architect William Vogan of Port Huron.

Kirby noted Lynch is the contractor that replaced the southern portion of the Gagetown Elementary School roof in 1991.

During a monthly meeting Monday in the Owendale High School library, the board authorized its roof committee to meet with the builder and architect March 18 at 2:30 p.m. to discuss plans to begin the work.

"They want to do it as soon as possible," Kirby said of the project start-up date, "but they would prefer to do it when the weather breaks."

Voters approved the special bond issue 162-48 in a special election held March 1.

The bond issue, which will cost residents an average of 2 mills for 3 years, will pay for 2 inches of insulation and replacement of the entire junior/senior high building roof with a Dura Last Roof. The remainder of the elementary building roof will also be replaced.

Other costs include those related to the special election and attorney and architect fees.

## PROFICIENCY

In other business Monday, the board heard a brief report from junior/senior high Principal Manuel Thies, who recommended that the district develop and implement a proficiency test for eighth grade students next year.

Thies said he made the recommendation during a

recent teachers meeting, during which instructors agreed they will no longer accept late homework.

It's important that school officials begin keeping closer tabs on junior high students' academic performance, Thies told the board, because today's eighth graders will have to meet state test requirements in order to graduate.

"This year's eighth graders, to get a diploma... will have to pass a proficiency test or they will not get one," he said. "It's something that's there. We will have to deal with it."

Turning to other matters, the board approved a motion to extend Kirby's contract for another year, and heard concerns voiced by 3 parents.

The recommendation regarding Kirby's contract was made by a special committee composed of board members Jack Brinkman, Tom Fritz and Mary Ann Abbe. Salary details have not been worked out yet, Brinkman said.

# Gougeon faces Watson in Monday's election

Area voters will cast ballots in a special election Monday that will fill the 34th District state Senate seat previously held by Sen. James A. Barcia, D-Bay City.

Barcia vacated the post after being elected to the 5th U.S. Congressional District in November.

Vying for his seat, representing Tuscola, Huron, Bay, Arenac and Gladwin counties, are Republican Joel Gougeon, 50, and Democrat Terry Watson, 44, both of Bay City.

Both candidates emerged

from a special Feb. 23 primary election with impressive victories — Gougeon over one Republican challenger and Watson over 5 other Democrats — although the turnout was poor. Only 4 percent of Tuscola County Voters cast ballots. In Huron County, the turnout was 5 percent.

Gougeon, a Bay County businessman, is a former 2-term Bay County Commissioner. He was defeated by 7,000 votes in the 97th District State House race last year against Democrat Howard Wetters.

Watson, a Bay City police officer, ran a distant second last year behind Gerald Van Alst in the Bay County sheriff's race.

Next week's special election is one of 2 being held to fill open Senate seats in Michigan. The other is in the 19th District near Jackson.

The races are important to both political parties because the winners could affect the balance of power in Lansing in 1994, according to political analysts. Currently, the Senate is controlled by Republicans, 20-16.

# Thieves loot Cass City laundromat

Thieves broke into the Wash King laundromat Thursday night but got away with only a small amount of change, according to Cass City police, who are investigating the burglary.

The incident occurred sometime between 8:10 p.m. and midnight. Reports state employee Lisa Mester discovered the break-in when she arrived for work the next morning.

Police said the individuals responsible — probably youths — gained access through an overhead garage door at the rear of the build-

ing at 6400 Main St.

Once inside, they removed the hinge pins from a door to get into an office area where they took a small amount of change. They also carried a candy machine from the front of the laundromat to the rear of the building, broke into the machine and took an undetermined amount of change.

In other reports, William Freeman of Sterling Heights reported someone broke into his mother's home at 4456 Seeger St.

The incident occurred sometime prior to Feb. 22,

according to Freeman, who stated he found nothing missing from the residence.

The person or persons responsible kicked the rear door, knocking out a lower wooden panel, and broke the door jamb hasp, reports state.

Also last week, Mike Fetterhoff reported someone kicked in the door to his car while the vehicle was parked at Board Chrysler-Plymouth-Dodge, 6617 Main St., Cass City, where he is employed.

Fetterhoff told police the incident occurred between 7 a.m. and noon Friday.

# Relax! Records show it's an ordinary (Mich.) winter

February offered plenty of cold and snow, but the month's winter weather didn't break any long-term records.

In fact, the winter of 1992-93 appears typical for the area as a whole compared to recent years, according to statistics compiled at the Cass City Wastewater Treatment Plant.

A total of 14 inches of snow was recorded last month, almost 3 times the amount received in February 1992, but nearly 2 inches less than the total snowfall in February 1991. More than 20 inches of snow was recorded in February 1990.


The February totals in 1989 and 1988 were 9.8 inches and 12.47 inches, respectively.

February 1993 was definitely among the coldest in recent years, with an average high of 28 degrees and an average low of 11 degrees. Temperatures reached freezing only once and dipped to sub-zero levels on 7 days, including lows of minus 10, 11, 14 and 19 degrees.

In contrast, February temperatures were a bit milder in each of the past 3 years, with average of highs and lows of 33 degrees and 23 degrees (1992), 34 and 21 (1991) and 33 and 17 (1990). February 1989 and 1988

were bitter, however. The average high and low in 1989 were 28 and 13. In 1988, the temperature never rose above 32 degrees and remained in the single digits on 13 days for an average high and low of 29 and 10.

As for snowfall, this season's total of 43.28 (as of March 5) is more than was received in all but one of the past 5 winters. The exception was 1989-90, when nearly 47 inches fell from November through March.

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"If It Fitz...."

Sacrificial lambs?

In a letter-to-the-editor opposing physician-assisted suicide for even the most terminal, pain-tortured patients, Roman Catholic Archbishop Adam Maida proclaimed: "In a strange sort of way, as the saying goes, suffering is good for the soul. . . . When we come face to face with people who are suffering, we learn to see the real value of a person —

the gift of life itself." Oh, my, yes. Echoing my sardonic thoughts, Donald Montgomery of Okemos responded to Maida: "Maximize the misery! Maim your neighbor, it's good for him and for you, too. Take a handicapper to lunch, they're fun to watch. Down with anesthesia! Bring back the hair shirt."

Those remarks are right on, but flippant. For a more thoughtful response, I turned to a woman who constantly feels the terrible pain that the archbishop so easily shrugged off with: "Suffering — yes, even terminal suffering — has value and meaning."

I've previously quoted this sixtysomething, suburban Detroit grandmother, withholding her name to spare family and friends full realization of her suffering. For 15 years she's had the same unbearably painful pelvic disease — vulvodynia — that forced Marjorie Wantz, in 1991, to use the "medicid" services of Dr. Jack Kevorkian. She also has the same doctor as Wantz.

'AKIN TO SACRIFICIAL LAMBS'

"Maida said, 'Persons with terminal illness or those born with severe physical or mental limitations are needed by all of us, because they help us to see the full range of gifts within the human person.' That sounded to me very much like those suffering people are akin to sacrificial lambs," she said.

"As for suffering 'being good for the soul because it draws us out of ourselves and helps us be more sensi-

tive to others and our need for them' — well, obviously Maida has never known terrible, unremitting pain that does not respond to treatment or drugs.

"In every case I know of, including my own, when you love someone who is in great pain and you cannot help them, it is agonizing. . . . In a June 19 essay, Maida wrote, 'Anyone who has watched a loved one slowly fading from this world knows how deeply touching those last hours can be.' He makes it sound like a warm-fuzzy Maxwell House moment.

"I can't believe that during his days as a priest, ministering to the sick and dying, he only saw people die quietly and without pain, slowly fading' away. All of us would welcome that kind of death. . . . But how many of us will be that lucky? For many, dying can take months or years of pain, incapacity and emotional distress."

REAL ACTION ENCOURAGED

Those words were written by a woman who still hopes doctors will find a way to ease her suffering. But she won't wait 15 more years, in so much pain it's increasingly difficult for her to bear — let alone enjoy — any part of her existence. She is comforted by the thought that euthanasia may be available when she wants it. And — although she wouldn't put it so bluntly — she shares my contempt for the righteously ignorant legislators and right-to-lifers who insist it should be a crime for a doctor to help her leave an unbearable life.

"The right-to-lifers are well-organized, well-funded and very active. The majority of people are in favor of physician-assisted suicide, but very few become actively involved, probably because they see their own deaths as in the distant future. They would like the option then, but are not willing to take the time, or donate the money, now to avail themselves of it," she wrote.

"Unfortunately, among those of us who do, many are physically unable to attend meetings, go to Lansing for hearings, etc. And, obviously, we don't have funding from churches.

"So anyone who is really interested in actually doing something more than writing to the editor or admitting they are in favor when pollsters ask, I urge them to contact The National Hemlock Society, Box 11830, Eugene, OR 97440, or Janet Good, president of Hemlock of Michigan, phone 477-1823 between 9 and 5 weekdays."

There were 1,320 new dairy products introduced in 1992, says the Dairy Council of Michigan.


That astronomical number is derived by counting every new flavor of ice cream as a new product and using the same method with yogurt and all other dairy products.

# Burk creates custom badges

Members of square dancing clubs from Michigan to Texas are sporting some of the sharpest name badges around thanks to an area man who has combined a hobby with his love for square dancing.

Alvin "Fin" Burk has been creating custom name tags and badges for 4 years in a tiny workshop in the basement of his Severance Road home.

"It's just a hobby, that's all," the lifelong Shabbona area resident recently remarked.

"I've been thinking about retiring some time, and I thought that this would be a good thing to get into because it's hard for square

dancers to get name badges," he added. "They have to order out of state."

The name tags created by Burk come in all different sizes and shapes. Some feature fancy designs and others have only names engraved in them.

He starts with one-foot by 2-foot sheets of plastic that come in more than 30 different colors. He cuts out the badge forms individually and bevels the edges. Burk uses a specialized machine called a pantograph to engrave letters and designs in the badges.

He can reproduce just about any design or create one of his own, using a homemade pattern that is

transferred to a template.

Burk adds extra color here and there with hobby paint and a special machine that uses air pressure to force small amounts of pigment through a syringe and hypodermic needle.

The process can take anywhere from 10 to 25 minutes per piece. "It depends on the badge itself, how much there is to it," he explained.

Burk depends on word of mouth advertising, but he has plenty of opportunities to show samples to his biggest customers — square dancing clubs.

He and his wife, Juanita, are avid square dancers. The couple, who recently celebrated their 46th wedding

anniversary, started dancing in 1976. "We dance an average of 3 nights a week," he said, noting they also teach a community education square dance class on Wednesday nights at Cass City High School.

The Burks' contacts with a host of square dance clubs has resulted in plenty of work for Alvin in his hobby shop.

"I've made badges (for groups) all the way from Alpena to southern Detroit. I've shipped badges to Florida and Texas, and I just sent some samples to Indiana."

The orders vary from one to 100 pieces or more and can cost as little as 50 cents

each or \$4-\$5 each, depending on the size and amount of work involved.

Although most of the badges Burk makes are for square dancing enthusiasts, his handiwork can also be seen over classroom doors at Campbell Elementary School in Cass City. He made name plates for teachers and aides at the school, where his wife has been employed as a secretary for 27 years.

Burk also created badges and refrigerator magnets for the Shabbona United Methodist Church, engraving the names and service times of the church as well as a sketch of the building on each piece.

Burk, who guessed he spends 12 to 15 hours a week on the hobby, is semi-retired from C.R. Hunt Construction Co., where he's worked as a mechanic since 1975. He still works part-time for the Cass City business.

When he isn't working or enjoying an evening out square dancing, he likes to spend time in his basement workshop.

"A lot of times I spend most of my spare time at it," he said. "I've really been enjoying this. It's a nice hobby."





Most canned foods such as soups and vegetables, sandwich meats and spreads, cheeses, and prepared foods are very high in salt added by the manufacturer. And the problem may be made worse by sodium-containing preservatives such as sodium nitrate, sodium phosphate and others.

Much salt is added during cooking. This is one of the easiest areas to cut down on. The salt can be added at the table if necessary and salt placed on the surface of the food gives more flavor to the food.

At the table, a person must break the habit of adding salt before tasting the food. You should taste first and add salt only if it is needed. You will soon enjoy the true flavor of foods.

# Cass City joins project

The Saginaw Basin Watershed Council recently announced the second-round recipients of the School River Monitoring Program.

An additional 7 Saginaw Basin high schools, including Cass City High School, have been selected to participate in the program, bringing the total number of schools involved to 17.

The School River Monitoring Program (SRMP) provides schools with the

unique opportunity of exposing high school students to a hands-on field experience. The program is designed to encourage involvement from a wide range of high school students, including those in the language arts, social studies and science.

The program is intended to be year-round endeavor culminating in a River Project "Congress" meeting this spring.

Nine standard water quality tests are performed by the students in the program. The water quality examination includes tests for pH, fecal coliform, temperature, nitrates, dissolved oxygen, phosphates and turbidity.

The Watershed Council supplies the schools with the equipment necessary to successfully operate the SRMP. It is the intention of the Watershed Council to provide the schools with the proper testing equipment so that a long-term, self-sustaining monitoring program can be successfully established in the Saginaw Basin.

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
