

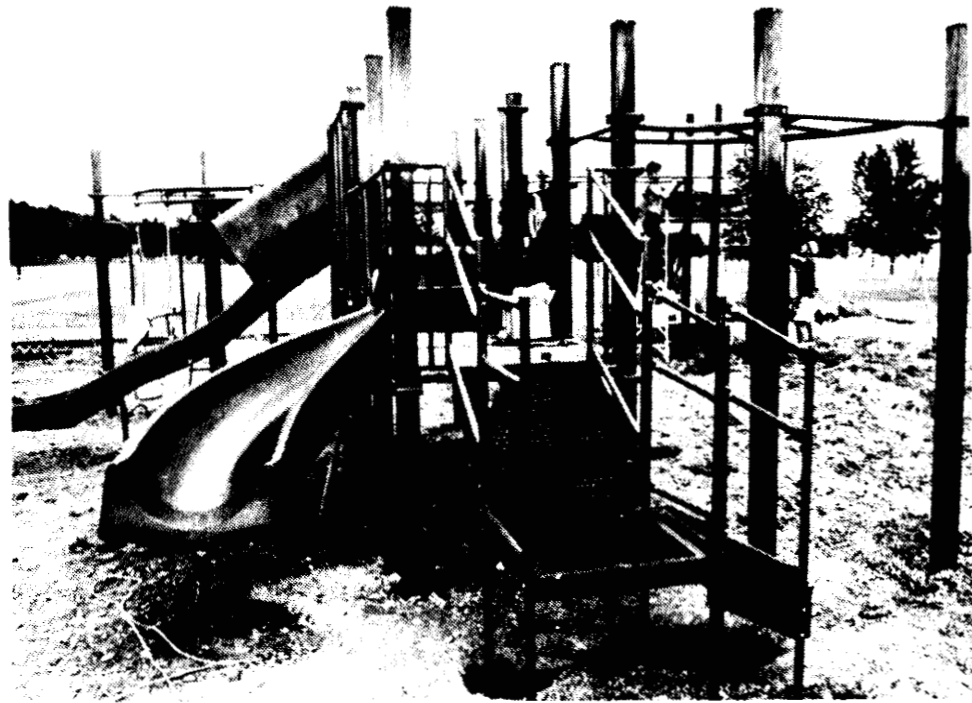

Community sponsored

New, safe playground equipment installed

Campbell Elementary School students already itching to get back to school will be doubly pleased with what they find when they return to classes later this month.

Brand new, top-of-the-line playground equipment has been installed just east of the Cass City elementary school, thanks to a major fund-raising effort.

A 3-man crew with Wake Pratt Recreational Construction, Troy, began installing the equipment Thursday and put the finishing touches on Monday.

"If everything goes just right, it will be ready (for use), maybe, by the end of the week," said Campbell Elementary Principal Dave Lovejoy.

The new, large deck playground system features a variety of slides, platforms, swings and climbing appar-

atuses, all installed over a 12-inch bed of pea gravel in a 70-foot by 74-foot area bordered by timbers.

The equipment, purchased from the Michigan-based Engan-Tooley & Associates, meets all consumer project Safety Code standards.

Lovejoy commented the system is the "Cadillac" of playground equipment. "It's just the best," he said. "It really is, and our kids deserve the best."

"We're really pleased," he added. "It was a cooperative effort on the part of the whole community. I can't stress that enough."

A major fund raising effort sponsored by school officials and the Cass City PTA guaranteed the \$32,000 needed for the project.

Monies are being raised through student and school-sponsored fund raisers, as

well as donations from the school district, individuals, service clubs and the Pinney Foundation.

According to Lovejoy, the work completed Monday represents the first 2 phases of a 3-phase master plan to improve the Campbell playground facility.

The third phase calls for the installation of a large slide, some landscaping and the addition of benches and picnic tables east of the swings. A committee overseeing the project is expected to meet to discuss the specifics.

The goal is to make the area more of a community oriented facility that could be utilized by residents when school isn't in session, Lovejoy explained.

He said estimates for the work are very rough at this stage, but "I think we're probably looking at another \$10,000 or \$11,000."

Owen-Gage parents protest pre-school program loss

Thies named superintendent

Owen-Gage School officials have decided to promote from within the district to fill the vacancy of Supt. Harley Kirby, who will retire effective Sept. 30 after 7 years on the job.

In a surprise announcement Monday, the Board of Education named high school Principal Manuel Thies to the post.

The decision came after a 25-minute executive session. The board, which didn't set a salary figure, asked Thies to come up with a recommendation to fill his job.

A veteran educator, Thies, 56, is no stranger to Owen-Gage. He was hired by the district in 1961 and has spent the majority of his tenure as a teacher of various science classes at the high school. He has served as junior/senior high principal for the past 2 years.

Thies' experience and skills will be tested in the coming months as the district comes to grips with a financial struggle that has forced school officials to pink slip 6 full-time staff members, including 3 teachers, as well as implement several other cost-cutting measures.

Those cuts, approved last month, drew more than 30 residents to attend Monday night's session.

A number of those present voiced concerns over elimination of the district's pre-school program. But the loss of band and fear that other cuts will be made prompted others to speak out.

One mother, whose son attended the preschool last fall, told the board her son didn't know his address, phone number, colors or numbers when he started preschool.

"He left (the program) with

all that knowledge. I'm very proud of him," she said. "He learned to love learning."

DISAPPOINTED

She said she is very disappointed to have to tell him he can't attend this year, and suggested elimination of preschool puts children in the district at a disadvantage. She asked the board if there is some way to save the program.

Board members indicated it's unlikely unless the preschool could support itself.

Board President Jack Brinkman pointed out the program ended the last school year nearly \$25,000 in the red. "We can't continue operating going that far in the hole," he said.

Trustee Ron Good agreed, adding, "We can't steal from the K-12 program to make this live."

Total tuition from 30 to 40 students last year amounted to only about \$3,550. Trustee Bill Kretzschmer pointed out, adding that in order for the preschool to be self-supporting, parents would have to shell out some \$700 per child.

CONCERNED

Another parent commented she could and would spend \$700 if it meant keeping the program going, but said she's concerned about those unable to afford that much tuition. As a result, some children will end up struggling to keep up with their peers, and that will cost the district money, she added.

She urged the board to meet with a committee of parents to discuss alternatives.

Others also spoke up, including a woman who vowed to remove her son from the district if no preschool is available for her other son.

Another voiced concerns about the board's decision to eliminate band and how that

will affect students planning to pursue music in college.

However, the father of a high school senior commented the board shouldn't negotiate planned cuts. As it is, he said, everyone is going to be affected, and there are many other districts in the same boat.

"I agree," said Thies. "If we sit down and negotiate each (cut), we're going to end up where we started."

"If we don't make an honest effort (to balance the budget), we're not going to be here in 5 years," said Trustee Terry Muntz.

Brinkman agreed, noting the district is facing a \$150,000 deficit, and if school officials don't come up with a balanced budget, the doors will be closed.

The board ended the discussion with an agreement to hear proposals to keep the

preschool open, but made it clear no school funds will be used to pay for the program.

2 HIRED

Turning to other matters, the board approved recommendations to hire 2 pink-slipped staff members to fill vacancies at the elementary school.

Bull fatally attacks Glenn Minard, 39

A Deford man was fatally attacked by a 2,000-pound bull on the family's Crawford Road farm Saturday morning.

Glenn R. Minard, 39, 1325 Crawford Rd., was pronounced dead at the scene.

Minard had gone out to the barn to begin chores at 7:30 a.m., and when he failed to return, his wife began searching for him, according to Tuscola County Sheriff's deputies, who said she found his body lying in the bull pen at about 6:40

p.m. and called police.

Deputies, who responded along with Cass City-Mercy Ambulance personnel, described the bull as very aggressive, and reported family members had to shoot the animal to get to the victim. Please turn to back page.

3 killed in separate Thumb area accidents

A local woman was among 3 persons who lost their lives in separate weekend traffic accidents in the Thumb.

Sandra J. McCoy, 30, of Cass City, died from injuries sustained in a one-vehicle accident early Friday morning in Sanilac County's Marion Township.

A spokesman at the Michigan State Police post in Sandusky reported McCoy was driving south on Ruth Road north of Richmondville Road at about 2:53 a.m. when she apparently lost control of her pickup truck. The pickup struck 2 parked vehicles and came to rest on the east shoulder of the road.

McCoy, who was pronounced dead at the scene, was not wearing a seat belt, according to troopers, who stated they believe she had been drinking.

Investigators believe al-

hol also was factor in a one-vehicle accident late Friday afternoon in Juniata Township.

Tuscola County Sheriff's deputies reported Richard F. Sohn, 36, of Marlette, died after losing control of his pickup truck on northbound Sheridan Road, south of M-46, and struck a tree.

Sohn apparently was traveling at a high rate of speed at the time of the 5:55 p.m. crash, according to reports, which state he was not wearing a seat belt.

The accident remains under investigation. A 9-year-old Vassar girl died Saturday morning after the car she was riding in collided with a semi-tractor trailer in Vassar.

The victim, Stephanie A. Sweezee, was a passenger in a car driven by her father, Paul Sweezee, 31, according to Vassar police, who

reported the vehicle was northbound on Brady Street and pulled into the path of the westbound semi-tractor, which was driven by Lloyd R. Gust, 52, of Saginaw.

Tuscola County Sheriff's deputies and Vassar police and fire fighters responded to the scene. Investigators said the Jaws of Life were used to extricate victims from the wreck.

Paul Sweezee, his wife, Connie, and a son, Jeremiah, 6, were all transported by Vassar Area Ambulance Service to St. Luke's Hospital, Saginaw, where they were treated for minor injuries and then released. Gust was not injured.

Paul Sweezee told police everyone in the car was wearing a seat belt.

The 7:15 a.m. accident remains under investigation.

Mother gives kidney to her son, Brent Kostanko

Life is a precious gift, and some are fortunate enough to get a second chance.

Just ask Brent Kostanko. Brent was born with two kidneys that didn't function extremely well. When he was 8 years old, doctors said there was a mere 10 percent chance he would need dialysis or a transplant.

A 1987 graduate of Cass City High School, Brent has had to live with poor kidneys all his life, until now. On July 21 he received a kidney transplant from his mother, Marcie.

The Kostanko family are no strangers to Cass City. They made their home here for 23 years. Marcie and her late husband, Tom, owned Kostanko's Mechanical Service and built the Thunder Road Speedway on M-53.

Marcie worked as an LPN at Hills and Dales Hospital for 4 years. After her husband was killed in a snowmobile accident in 1985, she went on to earn her degree as a registered nurse from Saint Clair Community College.

Marcie moved from Cass City in 1989. She currently

resides in Bridgeport, and is a registered nurse at Saginaw General Hospital.

Brent said his condition has not been the most fun thing to live with, but it

hasn't really kept him from doing what he wants to do.

Brent was crowned Snowcoming King his senior year at Cass City High School. He also participated

in wrestling and track, and he became an avid weight lifter as well.

There have been a couple times, however, that Brent's condition altered his plans.

He joined the Navy after high school, hoping to make a career of it, but after 2 years he was forced to exit the military on a medical discharge. He has been working at a construction company since his discharge.

"My condition kept me from going to school earlier because every time I started something, I was told I would need a transplant, so I had to quit," he said.

Brent is now hoping to start taking classes this winter at Saginaw Valley State University. However, he has to make sure his new kidney is functioning properly before he does anything.

He is still in the University of Michigan Medical Center after three weeks. Although his kidney is functioning right now, it has not been an easy fight, and it isn't over quite yet.

After the initial transplant, doctors had to operate on Brent again to make more room for his new kidney.

School funds decline as tax jumps

The Cass City School District will hold a truth-in-taxation meeting Monday at 7:30 p.m. prior to the regular school board meeting to explain how a tax increase of 3.92 percent will actually shake out to less operating dollars than was raised the previous year.

If the state formula for school districts remains unchanged, Cass City will have about \$18,000 LESS for operation than it did in the 1992-3 school year, Supt. Ken Micklash reports.

That's because the Headlee rollback in taxes was not contested earlier this year and the total millage raised was reduced to 30.775 mills from last year's 30.9 mills.

Micklash said that the school had \$5,456,037 for operation last year and is expected to have \$5,438,222 in the coming school year.

Without the truth-in-taxation meeting, that revenue would be cut to \$5,254,429.

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CARPAL TUNNEL SYNDROME

When your hand goes to sleep and feels "funny" it may mean that the nerve to the hand is being compressed as it passes through the wrist. Here, it has to go through a narrow "tunnel" which can easily get too tight for the nerve, thus causing carpal tunnel syndrome. This is more common in women and frequently affects both hands.

The symptoms generally occur first at night. The thumb and first two fingers of the hand become painful and numb. It helps to rub or shake the hand or hang it over the side of the bed.

The pain is often brought on by repeated movements of the wrist or fingers. Having the wrist cocked back, as in driving a car or writing on a blackboard, also frequently makes it worse. Repetitive trauma or overuse of the wrist from certain types of work may bring on or worsen the condition.

The pain can go up the forearm and even to the shoulder, making the diagnosis more difficult. In more severe cases, the thumb will become weak and the muscles can even wither away at the base of the thumb.

The diagnosis is confirmed by an EMG (a nerve conduction test). X-rays are also useful since old fractures, arthritis and other diseases can contribute to the problem. It may improve with medical treatment including anti-inflammatory medicines, physical therapy treatments, wrist braces and exercise.

Boyhood nostalgia

Recently I wrote, just in passing, that I once sold the Saturday Evening Post. I offered no details, and a young reader's curiosity was piqued. Kids don't sell magazines door-to-door these days. Exactly how did I go about it, and why?

I was so glad to be asked. There's a long list of things that paid scribblers turn to when they can't think of anything internationally important to write about. Boyhood nostalgia is at the top of my list.

And there's nothing more heart-achingly nostalgic than reminiscing about the Great Depression days when a runny-nosed little boy had to sell 10 Saturday Evening Posts a week or his dad would put him in a bag with 10 kittens and throw the bag

into the St. Clair River. (I remember once when Mother tried to use Dad's bag for collecting coal along the railroad tracks. He wouldn't let her. "That's my bag," Dad said, thus becoming the world's first hippie.)

When I was about 10 years old, I sold the Post for my cousin, Bobby Smith. He was only a couple of years older but already he was a neighborhood foreman for a magazine distributor. Bobby was one of those kids that a guy's mother was always pointing to and saying:

"Why can't you be like Bobby? He has 2 paper routes and 10 magazine routes and an Essex dealership. And you won't even get out of bed in the morning."

That's the kind of cousin I had to have, for gosh sakes. He was a real nice kid but, geez, he was always working and putting money in the bank and buying presents for his mother. One Christmas, I remember, he gave her a new coat. That was the same Christmas I gave my mother a clay ash tray I made in school—and I gave it to her in front of my paternal grandmother, who didn't know Mother smoked. Boy, merry Christmas.

Mother thought I would become more like Bobby if I sold magazines. But her plan never worked. I was the world's most reluctant salesman. I would ring

neighborhood doorbells only because Mother was watching out the window. (Does anyone except me remember doorbells you twisted instead of pushed?) My sales pitch went like this: "You don't want to buy a Saturday Evening Post, do you?" I was always right.

Each week I'd pick up 10 Posts from Bobby. A few days later I'd bring back 10. The day Bobby suggested I retire was when I brought back 11. A woman had browbeaten me into buying back a Post she'd bought downtown. One of the cartoons was obscene, she said. I never did find out which one, and I looked for 6 hours.

I went back to my wastrel life, but Bobby kept hustling. That kid worked hard at dozens of jobs until the day he was drafted into World War II. He was killed in the Battle of the Bulge.

I always associate the Saturday Evening Post with Bobby and the 1930s, when a nickel double-feature could turn on a boy for a week. Those were the days of simple pleasures, one of which was reading the Post, starting from the back and ending up with Alexander Botts, the incredible tractor salesman.

For me, those pleasures seemed to disappear during the war. I guess I became more sophisticated. Maybe I simply grew up, or grew bitter. Anyway, I quit reading the Saturday Evening Post. I guess I don't really know why.

But I think it had something to do with the fact that the most patriotic pictures that Norman Rockwell painted for the Post could never make me understand why my cousin Bobby, 19, had to die.

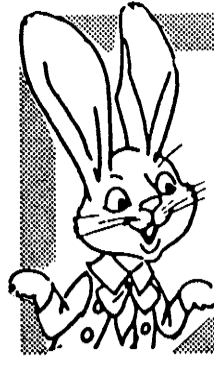
The true boater just loves to polish teak and wash imaginary specks of dust from inside or outside of the boat.

If you are looking to get away from it all, enjoy rustic solitude and commune with mother nature, stay away from the tourist meccas in northern Michigan.

At Mackinaw City for instance, summer tourists have brought city problems and city solutions.

There's a state-operated parking area for boaters using the marina facilities. A sign warns that violators will be towed. And they were, just like they do it in the city. I saw 2 cars taken away in a 15-minute span.

Times might be tough some places, but you would never know it by visiting Mackinaw City or other tourist areas. We stayed a night at a motel in Mackinaw City. The cheapest room available cost \$59, single. Most others were in the \$75 to \$125 area.

Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, the place was filled. By noon every motel in town had posted no vacancy signs.

We asked the owner if this was unusual. She replied that the motel didn't fill as early, but she has filled every room, every night since the middle of June.

You wouldn't expect me to take a vacation and not report on at least one restaurant would you? Of course not.

The Hack Ma Tack Inn is located on the Cheboygan River, about 10 minutes from Cheboygan. Boaters can moor on the docks owned by the restaurant.

It's a popular watering hole. We arrived at about 8 p.m. and had to wait an hour for a table and the place probably seats 75 or more.

It's a beautiful setting for a restaurant and it reeks with atmosphere.

The food is acceptable. The prices are in the upper middle range for the type restaurant it is. The cheapest meal is about \$15 and the most expensive about \$30. You won't find fancy salads and unique dishes there. If it were in a downstate competitive area, you'd expect more for your money.

I'd rate it a 6 on the 1-10 scale.

One more note. Talking with business people in the north revealed that August is the biggest business month of the year and the first week of the month more busy than the traditional Memorial Day, Fourth of July or Labor Day weeks.

That's because, they said, until the end of July families are involved in Little League, swimming lessons, etc., and postpone vacation until these activities are over.

Everyone I talked to said that so far this has been a banner business year, compared to the frosty 1992 summer season.

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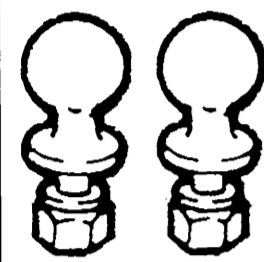

Too much violence shown on television

There has been a growing debate concerning the amount of violence on television recently, and one Cass City man knows where he stands.

"There is way too much violence on TV," said Bill Younglove.

This father of 2 feels that violence on television has a direct effect on young people and society as a whole.

"That's where the kids pick up that junk, right off the TV," he said.

Younglove said parents need to play an active role when it comes to what programs their children view on television.

"I think they should put more educational programs on TV myself," he remarked. "Some of those shows aren't fit to be on."

PA 134

Legislation allowing Amish dairy farmers to continue providing milk to cheese-making operations recently was signed by the governor.

Public Act 134, sponsored by Senator Joel Gougeon (R-Bay City), establishes the temperature and bacteria count allowable for milk being used for cheese.

"I am pleased to see this legislation signed and put into effect," said Gougeon, chair of the Senate Agriculture and Forestry Committee. "It makes good sense to allow Amish dairy farmers to continue their work as long as the safety of the public isn't in jeopardy."

PA 134 amends the Manufactured Milk Act of Michigan by setting new standards for handling and processing milk. It sets the temperature at 60 degrees for Grade B milk shipped in cans and used for making cheese. It lowers the acceptable level of bacteria for Grade B milk and adopts most USDA recommendations for dairy farm and plant standards. Dairy farms must also have a milkhouse for proper cleaning and storage of milking equipment and an approved water supply.

Grade B milk is produced at 550 dairy farms in Michigan. About 300 of the farms are Amish farms.

Due to religious reasons, Amish farmers are prohibited from using electricity and cannot achieve a temperature lower than 60 degrees. Since their milk is delivered promptly to the cheese makers, no problems have occurred due to the temperature.

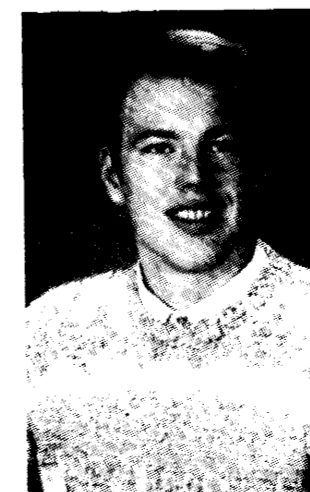

Farm Bureau official predicts Floods, drought to hit meat prices

Crop yields affected by the Midwest flooding and the Southeast drought and extreme heat will show up most prominently in meat prices, according to a Farm Bureau analysis.

"The initial effect may be for prices to decline as farmers sell off animals to avoid paying higher feed costs, but eventually the smaller supplies coming to market will force meat prices higher," said Ken Nye, director of commodity activities and research for Michigan Farm Bureau.

"The major crop impacts will be on corn, soybeans, oats and hay. The wheat crop prospects remain quite favorable, but corn and soybean yields will be severely reduced, with the total effect depending on the weather for the remainder of the growing season and the outcome of the surviving crops," he said.

Mixed reactions

Area residents ponder state property tax dilemma

Area residents have mixed reactions concerning the decision not to use property taxes to fund schools in Michigan.

In an unofficial survey conducted by the Chronicle, respondents agree a break in property taxes will be of great help.

"It's about time they reformed the whole system because, obviously, it hasn't been working for a lot of years now for a variety of reasons," said Curtis Landrith, Cass City resident.

Those surveyed did, however, express skepticism as to how schools will be funded and what actions legislators will take.

"My biggest concern is how are they going to get the money, and how are our property taxes going to be affected," commented Debra Ruggles, also of Cass City.

"How are we going to keep our schools going if we don't pay property taxes?" questioned retired school teacher Janet Martin, Gagetown.

"I want some assurance that what they say they're going to do, they do," added Landrith.

Everyone surveyed agreed that taxes will be raised to make up for the \$5.6 billion property taxes raised for schools. However, while they agree higher taxes on alcohol and tobacco would be suitable, there are other areas where respondents do not want to see higher taxes.

"They're going to have to raise the money some way, but I think we pay enough income taxes now," said Dorena Langenburg, Uby. Respondents also agreed that a higher tax on gasoline

would affect everyone, but some thought that was a good idea, while others said it would pose a major problem for some people.

"Gas tax would affect everyone, and everyone should pay, not just a certain group of people," said Ruggles.

"I think that would be a hardship for some people," said Langenburg.

Two of the people surveyed want to know what happened with the lottery.

"I'd like to know what happened to the promise they made about the lot-

tery," remarked Landrith.

"If they would've used the lottery like they were supposed to, then we wouldn't have any of this mess right now," said Kingston resident Rodney Sommerfield.

Sommerfield feels "we're already being taxed to death," but Martin is ready







and willing to pay extra for the cause.

"I'm definitely in favor of education," she said. "I want every student to get the best possible education."

"Hopefully the solution won't be worse than the problem," commented Landrith.

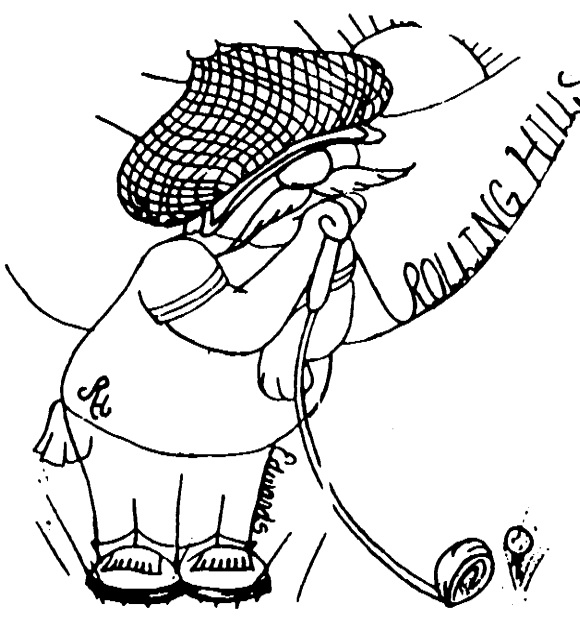

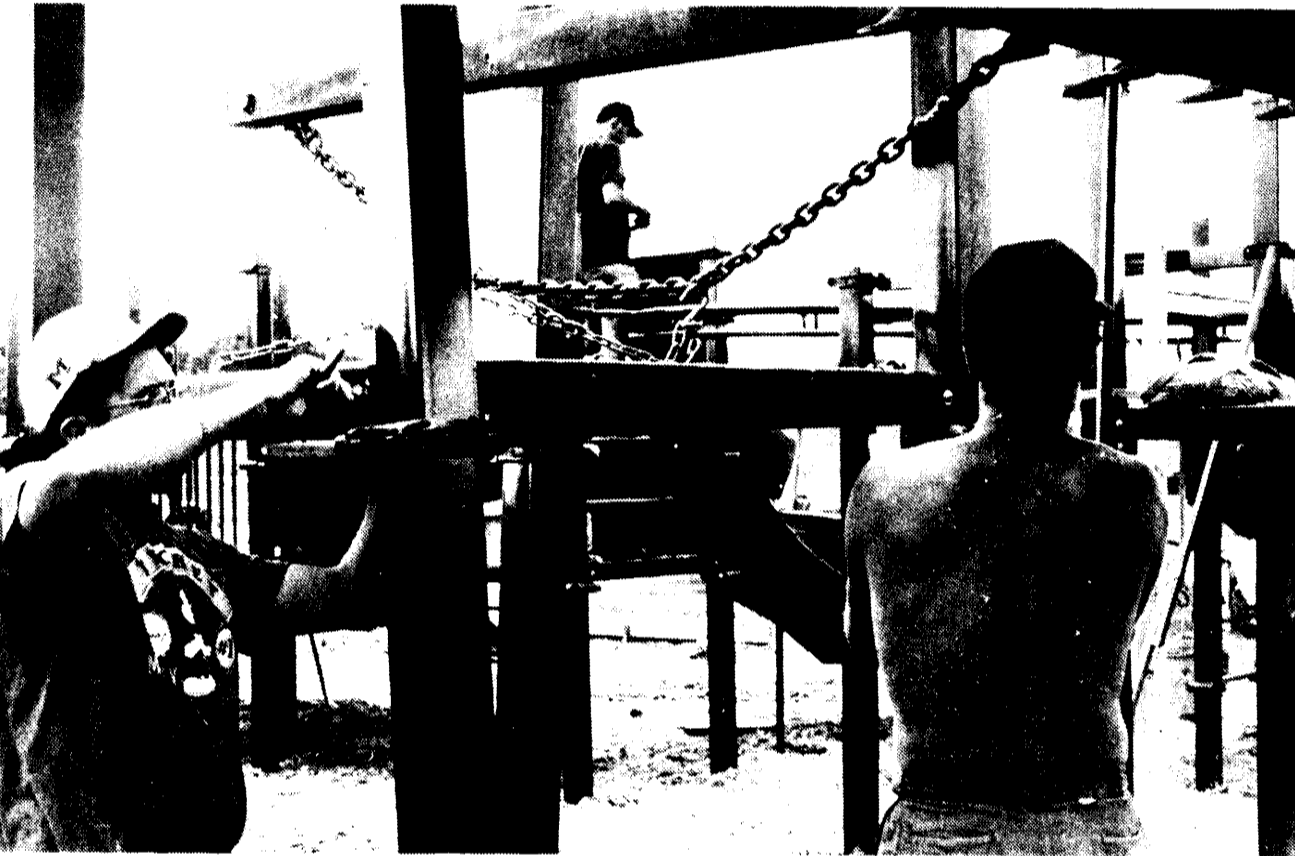
• Approved a request by William Harmon to allow his daughter, Brandy, to transfer to Owen-Gage from the Laker School District.

The doctors discovered his kidney was turning blue because it wasn't getting enough blood to function properly.

Brent and his new kidney made it through the second operation, but he has had to fight his body's tendencies to reject the kidney every step of the way.

"I do have an awful lot of faith," said Marcie. "It's just horrible waiting."

"It's hard knowing you've done all you can do and you don't know what the outcome is going to be," she remarked. "I can't give him another kidney, I just hope it works."

Brent's condition may be day to day, but he's taking everything in stride.

"Whatever happens, happens," he said. "Things are kind of out of my hands."

Brent can't wait to be well and out of the hospital, but he said he is thankful for the support he has received from so many people. He does, however, know who gets the most thanks of all.

"I'm pretty fortunate to have a mom like I do, to give me a second chance."
