"The Housekeeper's Book - 1776-1976" was compiled for the Cass City Bicentennial in 1976 by Katie Jackson and her home economics classes.

It's a fascinating collection of old recipes, household hints, and ads from a 1901 Tri-County Chronicle.

A recipe for Banberry Tarts by Mrs. Edward Pinney calls for 2 pkgs. of figs (10 cent ones).

Mrs. Pinney was the daughter-in-law of Elijah Pinney, who established the Exchange Bank, predecessor of the Pinney Bank, which is now Chemical Bank.

A recipe for Pocket Book Rolls, by Mrs. Charles Robinson, requires 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup sugar and 1/2 cup shortening.

Mrs. Robinson's husband operated a laundry in the early 1900s at the corner of Church and Seeger streets.

A clever quip amid the recipes said "Love never dies of starvation, but often of indigestion."

The book also includes the schedule for the stage line and livery owned by J.S.

"If It Fitz...."

The doctor

One morning in late August, my wife found a round piece of fruit in a grocery bag leaning against the outside of our apartment door. An enclosed note said, "From apt 2606, a vine ripened Texas melon. Enjoy."

"This is strange," she said, showing me the unexpected gift.

"Yes," I said. "There's only one 'I' in melon." Even I hate people like me.

"What's strange is we've lived across the hall from the doctor for 17 years, and this is the first time he's given us something," she said. "I wonder why."

We never gave the doctor anything, either. In fact, his front door is only about 3 steps from ours, but not once in all these years had we been inside his home, and he'd never been inside ours.

The doctor, around 60 when we first met, never married, lived alone and seemed to enjoy his solitude. We didn't have much in common. I'll never forget the day he got off the elevator and almost stumbled over me. I was sitting on our

hallway floor, eating potato chips and drinking pop.

I'd been picnicking with my granddaughter, Tricia, and her presence would have made it clear that I was simply a dopey grandpa, not a weird old man. But Tricia had just ducked into our apartment, leaving me alone with the tiny dishes and, suddenly, feeling very foolish.

The doctor looked at me without saying a word and hurried into his apartment. I'm sure he shut his door with relief.

Occasionally, we talked in the hallway or on the elevator. I always regarded the doctor as deliciously grumpy, especially when our building management didn't perform well. Recently a hallway re-carpeting project went askew, and we walked on bare cement for over a month. It was marvelous to hear the doctor grumble about paying a king's ransom to live in a 1900-era tenement building.

Once in a while my wife and I would bump into the doctor dining alone in a

downtown restaurant, or at a Detroit Symphony Orchestra concert. Sometimes he'd join us for a drink, and the conversation was interesting. But if we'd invited him to step across the hall some evening for dinner, he would have been shocked and uncomfortable. And vice versa.

It's not an uncommon situation in big apartment towers. Residents have their own interests and friends when they move in, and often see no reason to add to them, no matter who lives in the next unit or on the next floor. A few years ago, the man living next door to the doctor stopped living by jumping out his bedroom window and falling 26 floors. I didn't know his name until I read the obituary.

So, yes, the Texas melon gift was a surprise. And I was morbid enough to joke to my wife that maybe the doctor had a premonition he'd never get to eat the melon, so he gave it to the most handy recipient.

We always called him the doctor. A few days later, the newspaper obituary called him "John T. McHenry, M.D., 76, retired professor from Wayne State School of Medicine." He died Aug. 29 following heart surgery.

One of the listed survivors was a niece from California. I remember she visited her uncle a few months ago. I remember how proudly the doctor introduced her to me and everyone else on the elevator, and then when we got off, he introduced her to the people waiting to get on.

I remember thinking the doctor seemed awfully glad to have a relative visiting, and maybe he didn't enjoy living alone as much as I thought.

I'm sorry I never got to tell the doctor that, as he'd suggested, we did enjoy the melon with the extra I. But, heck, I really didn't know him.

So why do I feel so rotten?

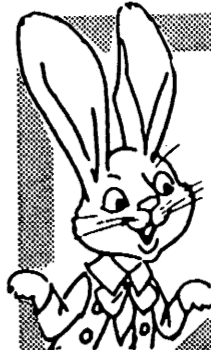
Firemen raise \$4,000 for MDA

Just in case you wondered how a man from Ohio could win the annual Rotary Quacker race, here's the reason. He's the son of Rotarian Robert Townsend of Cass City. Should be an excellent prospect for the ticket salesman in next year's race.

Here's an eye opener for you. Those state parks backed by our tax dollars do more than provide quality recreation for all of us. According to the Michigan Department of Education, the average day-use party of 3 spends about \$26 per trip. The average camper party of 3.5 stays about 4.7 nights and spends \$76 per trip. Park spenders generated nearly 7,500 jobs in 1992.

Speaking as a Cass City fan, the football team's start this year is especially disappointing. That's because hopes were high before the season started that the Hawks had the material to break the stranglehold that the Lakers have in Blue Bay competition.

Now it's back to the drawing board for the grid team while we rejoice with the success of the Lady Hawks in their opening games.

The story making the rounds last week after the visit of Governor John Engler to Ubyly was that it was the first visit by a Michigan governor since World War I. I know, Osentoski says, because a friend parked his oil truck in the spot reserved for the governor and later lost his job over it.

What grinds me and a lot of other folks, too, is the lack of common sense exhibited by members of the bureaucracy.

Rulings that may comply with the letter of the law, but not the spirit of the law.

Another of those cases was reported recently in the metro press. Perhaps you read about it. Three young boys were removed from their home and placed in a foster home.

With the help of grandparents, the parents of Lisa Williams, 24, the mother of the boys, three boys were removed from her home and placed with James and Pamela Williams, no relation, where they have lived for a year.

According to the James Williams version, the 3 boys were undernourished and appeared to suffer from physical and emotional abuse when taken from the biological parents' home. They were afraid of adults and virtually speechless at first, but ate voraciously and began to visibly develop personalities during their months at the foster home.

According to Lisa Williams, she is a young mother determined to get her sons back, her life together. She sees the James Williams family as overbearing and meddlesome and her parents as determined to break up her family.

The father of the boys is in prison for parole violation and the mother has submitted to random drug testing showing she is drug free and holds a minimum-wage job in Missouri. She is on probation for burglary and welfare fraud.

The James Williamses have been attempting to adopt the boys for 10

months. When the biological mother indicated that she would like to have the boys back, the Department of Social Services demanded that the boys be taken from the Williams home to another foster parent as a prelude to coming back to Lisa Williams.

While you have to applaud the mother's effort to straighten out her life and sympathize with her desire to have the children returned, you wonder what the DSS reps were thinking about.

Certainly not the children. A mother with a minimum-wage job doesn't have enough money to support a family of 4. More important, according to the DSS report when visitation with the mother was ordered, a son was very upset when he was ordered to visit his biological mother, saying he feared he was to be taken away from his foster home.

A state senate committee which heard testimony ordered the children back to the James Williams family and reversed the DSS action.

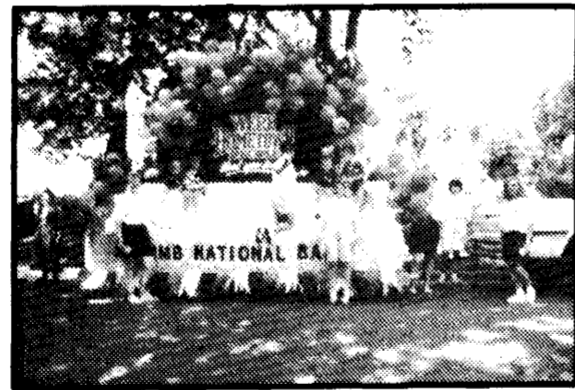
What raises the hackles is the amount of time and effort spent on this case by the DSS.

There are myriad numbers of cases where the DSS can and does act to protect the interest of abused children. Sure, the guidelines for the department say that every effort should be made to unite the biological parents with the children.

Sure, the DSS was acting within the letter of the law. But the object of the law is to protect the kids.

As I said, it bugs me when it takes a court case to decide which option is better for the children.

Hawks face Bad Axe in must win game after loss to Lakers

A football season that was bright with promise suddenly has deteriorated after just 2 games, to a situation where the Hawks face a must win at Bad Axe this Friday to avert a year that could become a disaster.

The visiting Elkton-Pigeon-Bay Port juggernaut rolled over the Hawks Friday, 42-6, and appears on the way to yet another Blue Bay League championship.

It was a game only until the early moments of the second quarter. The Lakers bounded out to a 12-0 lead in the first quarter. The first touchdown came on a 47-yard run by Eric Maust, a pulverizing runner who bowled over Hawk defenders all night. On his TD jaunt Maust broke 2 Cass City tackles.

The next Laker score came on an 87-yard drive. The Lakers ripped huge holes in the Hawk line and when a holding penalty threatened to halt the march, Brian Gebauer tossed a pass to Mike Ignash for 25 yards to keep the drive alive. Gebauer scored from 7 yards out.

Early in the second quarter it appeared as if Cass City was going to make a game out of it. Darren Wallace unleashed his air arm. He found John Phillips on a pass good for 25 yards and a pass down on the Caro 20. Then a moment later he found Phillips again for a touchdown.

The score revitalized the Hawk defense briefly. They stopped the Lakers on the

next series for one of the few times all night. But a fumble a moment after gave the Lakers the ball and it was all downhill from there the rest of the game.

The Green and White moved quickly for a pair of first downs to the one-yard line, from where Maust bulled over for the score.

The Lakers scored twice more in the third quarter. Maust ran over from the one and Don Osentoski ran 56 yards to score and added the 2-point conversion.

In the last quarter the Lakers wrapped up the scoring with another touchdown and a run for the extra points.

The bright spot in the dismal evening for Cass City fans was the play of Jason Morgan. He carried the ball

13 times for 52 yards in spite of being the focus point of the Laker defense. In addition, he made 21 tackles on defense, 6 unassisted.

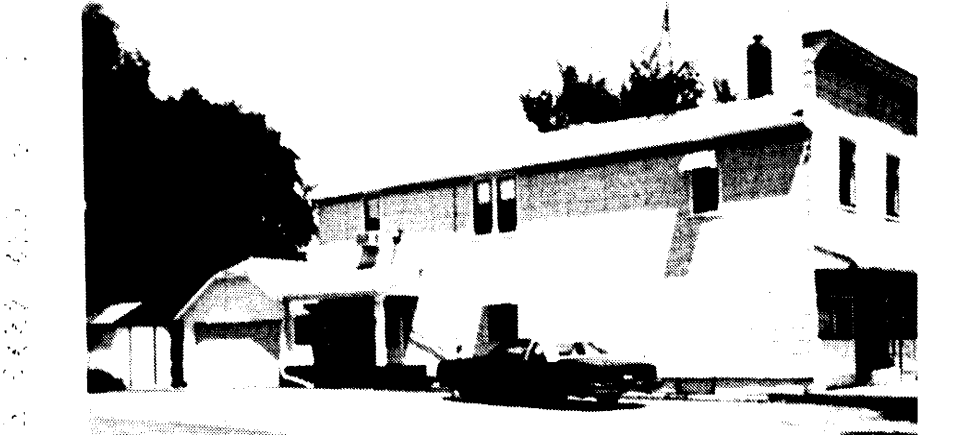

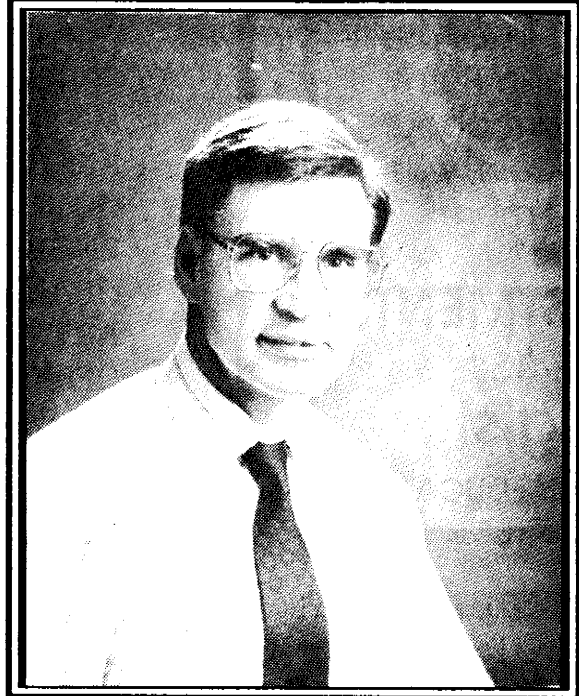

Recommend 4% pay hikes

ISD fact finding results in

A state-appointed fact finder in the contract dispute between the Tuscola Intermediate School District and the teachers' association (TIEA/TCBA) has issued his findings and recommendations for a settlement.

The Michigan Employment Relations Commission appointed attorney Gerald E. Granadier to review the contract proposals between the school district and the association. He conducted a hearing July 14 in Flint, during which both the district and the association submitted evidence. Both parties later submitted written arguments.

Granadier made recommendations on 6 unresolved issues, including both working conditions and salary proposals.

In the area of salary, he stated: "While the board did not specifically make an offer of salary it appears that it previously made an offer of 1.8 percent per year. The Association presented information by way of an article written in the Tuscola County Advertiser, dated Feb. 13, 1993, wherein it was reported that an offer of 3.6 percent per year was made to the Association.

"Your Fact Finder has fully digested and considered all the relevant comparisons and arguments set forth by the parties in all the oral and written matters submitted and makes the following recommendations for salary increase:

- 1. 1992-1993 - 4 percent.
2. 1993-1994 - 4 percent.
3. 1994-1995 - 4 percent.

Earlier in his report, the fact finder pointed out the association's request for increase in salary:

- 1. 1992-1993 - 5.25 percent.
2. 1993-1994 - 4 percent.
3. 1994-1995 - Indexed to inflation...plus improvement factor of 1 percent.

Other items on which the fact finder gave specific recommendations were work load, vacancies, transfers and promotions, calendar and longevity pay.

Also included in

Granadier's report were several items that were resolved at the time of the hearing and therefore were not included in the areas submitted for recommendations.

Kathy Daniels, president of the TIEA, indicated that although the members were disappointed that Granadier's recommendations were less substantial than hoped for, they stand behind their previous commitment to abide by his report.

"This will require that our association make significant compromises on several items our members felt were extremely important and very fair proposals," she said.

Daniels further stated it's the association's desire to negotiate as soon as possible with the board of education.

Although the teachers have been working without a contract for more than a year and remain available to

negotiate at any mutually agreeable time, the board's team is unavailable until Sept. 27, she noted.

It is the teachers' hope that a swift and equitable settlement will soon be reached to bring an end to one of the longest and demoralizing contract disputes in this area in years, Daniels concluded.

About 80 ISD professional staff members have been without a contract since the previous 3-year contract expired Aug. 31.

In recent homicide

Police seeking 2 suspects

Two Mexican males are being sought for questioning in the homicide of a Saginaw man whose body was found in the trunk of a car abandoned in a Gifford Township corn field Sept. 2.

One of the men is described as being 25 to 35 years old, 5 feet 7 inches to 5 feet 10 inches tall and weighing 220 to 250 pounds, with shiny black hair. No description was available for the second suspect.

According to Tuscola County Sheriff Tom Kern, Saginaw police have impounded a suspect vehicle believed to be linked with the homicide.

The body of 61-year-old George Johnson, Saginaw, was discovered by sheriff's deputies while investigating an abandoned vehicle complaint.

Investigators theorized the

victim, who died as a result of gunshot wounds, was murdered in another area and then transported to Tuscola County.

The case remains under investigation by detectives with the sheriff's department and Saginaw Police Department.

2 plead last week in circuit court

Two people entered pleas Friday in Tuscola County Circuit Court.

Stacy L. Augsburger, 21, Millington, pleaded guilty during his arraignment to attempted breaking and entering a building with intent to commit larceny.

The charge stems from an attempted break-in March 6 at a restaurant at 310 E. Huron Ave., Vassar, according to court records.

A pre-sentence investiga-

tion was ordered in the case, and bond was continued at \$2,000. Sentencing is to be scheduled.

John R. Parrent, 23, Reese, entered a plea of guilty to attempted possession of cocaine and use of marijuana July 20 in Denmark Township.

A pre-sentence investigation was ordered, and bond was continued at \$8,000. Sentencing is to be set.

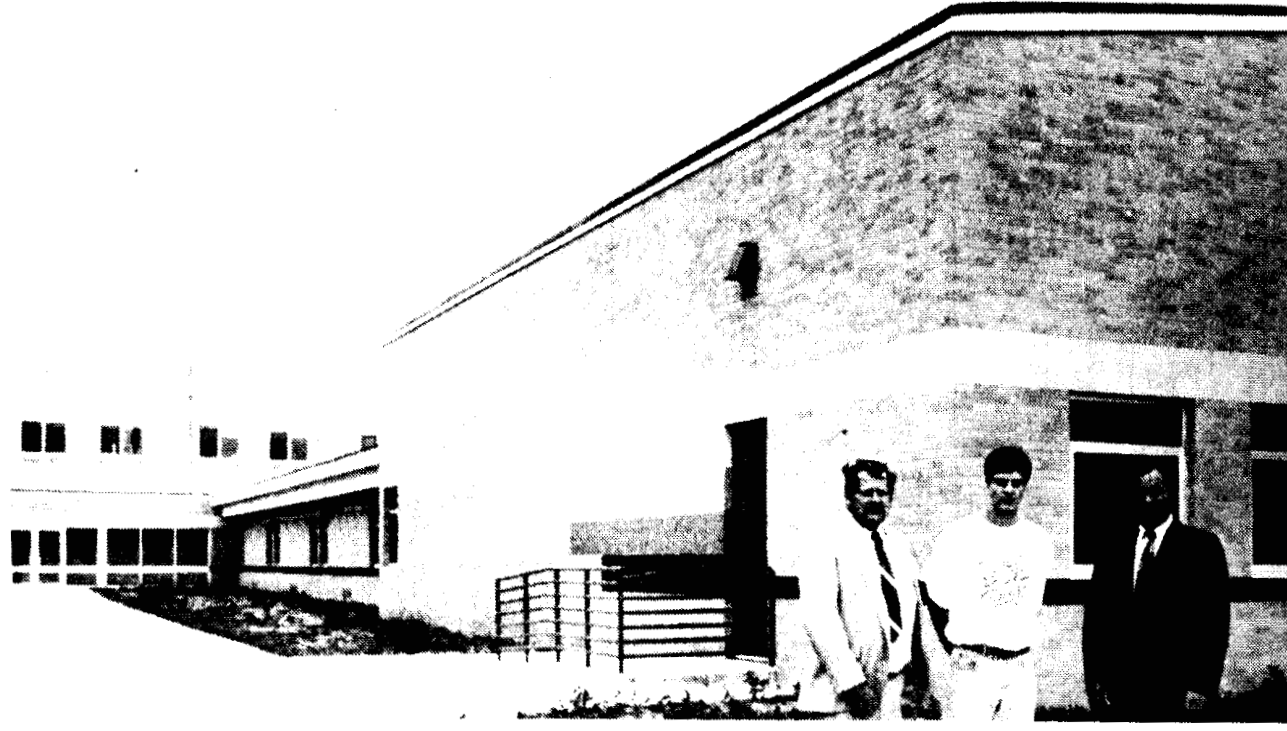

The board also heard from Sandy Karg, who asked that she be reinstated as a salaried, full-time cook at the high school.

Karg's position was one of several cut by school officials in an effort to reduce a projected budget deficit. She previously worked 6 to 7 hours daily, but was reduced

to 2 hours and given an additional 2 hours as a crossing guard and physical education aide.

Karg, whose mother, Kay, now handles all cooking duties at the high school, argued there's too much work in the cafeteria for one person, especially in terms of clean-up.

She said she would gladly continue to handle extra duties such as crossing guard if the board would reinstate her full-time job.

Thies recommended, and the board approved, a motion to table the matter and allow him to deal with the request after looking at the numbers involved.

Also Monday, the board:

- Approved a request to allow Renee Czekai to attend Cass City Schools.
- Heard the district's annual education report as presented by Hopper, with remarks by teachers Kathy Mason and Les Packard, who along with John Osterland are involved in the Huron County Phase III core curriculum development project.

Hopper noted monies for the teachers' participation in the Huron County Consortium were made available by the Owen-Gage Boosters.

Hopper also reported on extracurricular assignments, saying several people have volunteered to act as advisors this year in light of budget cuts. They are Vicki Merchant and Carol Dronsella (sophomore class), Diane Warack (freshman class and seventh and eighth grades), Brian Wright (eighth grade), and Faith Fahrner (trip club).

Paired advisors this year are Ron D'Aoust (senior class and National Honor Society), and Kim Fish (junior class).

A number of students also are volunteering their time, having formed a pep band, Hopper said.

Announced the annual Fourth Friday enrollment count, which will determine in part whether the district will be in-formula and how much state aid will be received, is set for Oct. 1 this year.

Numbers in the district are down this year, according to administrators, who reported 8 fewer students in the high school and 8 or 9 fewer students in the elementary due to a small kindergarten class.
