

# Neighbors help quell barn fire

Kingston Fire Chief Bill Kupiec credits the quick action of neighbors and others for saving a Deford area barn that caught fire Sunday night.

Fire fighters were called to the Kervin Zimmerman farm, 2140 Clothier Rd., at 7:05 p.m.

"There was quite a group of people there, and they were using water, portable extinguishers and whatever to keep (the fire) down," Kupiec said.

The effort paid off, according to the fire chief, who reported there was a lot of smoke and some roof damage where the fire had spread, but that it could have been much worse.

Kupiec, who noted dairy cattle in the barn had already been evacuated by the time firemen arrived, estimated damage to the structure at \$500.

He said the fire was caused by an electrical problem. Zimmerman was away and had some people taking care of chores at the farm, and someone accidentally threw a wrong switch, activating a conveyer that had not been used in some time, the fire chief explained.

# Joanne Hopper first woman high school principal at O-G

Owen-Gage Schools teacher Joanne Hopper was formally hired as high school principal Monday night.

Hopper, the first woman ever to be named to the post in the district, replaces veteran O-G teacher Manuel Thies, who in August was named superintendent after serving 2 years as high

school principal. That hiring followed Supt. Harley Kirby's retirement announcement, effective Sept. 30 after 7 years on the job.

Sun-induced skin cancers are common and well-known, but the skin can also show signs of several cancers of internal organs.

One of the most common of these is Paget's Disease of the breast. Here, a malignancy below the skin extends to the skin surface and causes a weeping, itchy, eczema-like rash of the nipple.

Occasionally a person will develop a darkening of the skin in the armpits which is called acanthosis. This is often associated with tumors of the hormone-producing glands. It can also be seen with benign tumors as well as in people who are obese, have a family history of this trait, and in some hormonal abnormalities.

Dark spots called keratoses often develop on the backs and chests of people as they grow older. Having a few is normal, but when a great number develop suddenly they can be associated with cancers of the stomach, colon, or female reproductive tract.

Hives is another skin reaction that can be related to cancers. Hives are most commonly caused by allergic reactions, but they can't be ignored if there are other signs of tumors.

You cannot be expected to remember all the skin changes associated with cancers, but you should see your doctor for any unusual and persistent changes in the skin. He can determine if a biopsy is needed or if other treatments are appropriate.

The skin is the easiest organ to check for cancer. You should check for any changes once a month and report any findings to your doctor.

According to Lisa Williams, she is a young mother determined to get her sons back, her life together. She sees the James Williams family as overbearing and meddlesome and her parents as determined to break up her family.

The father of the boys is in prison for parole violation and the mother has submitted to random drug testing showing she is drug free and holds a minimum-wage job in Missouri. She is on probation for burglary and welfare fråud.

The James Williamses have been attempting to adopt the boys for 10

Certainly not the children. A mother with a minimumwage job doesn't have enough money to support a family of 4. More important, according to the DSS report when visitation with the mother was ordered, a son was very upset when he was ordered to visit his biological mother, saying he feared he was to be taken away

A state senate committee which heard testimony ordered the children back to the James Williams family and reversed the DSS action. What raises the hackles is the amount of time and effort spent on this case by the DSS.

There are myriad numbers of cases where the DSS can and does act to protect the interest of abused children. Sure, the guidelines for the department say that every effort should be made to unite the biological parents with the children.
