# New Middle School plans inch forward

The Cass City School Board reviewed and adopted a revised budget for the 1993-94 school year that indicates the district will end the year some \$36,848 in the red, with expenditures of \$6.785 million, up from \$6.114 million in the last school year.

We have a conservative budget which may end up in the black, depending on costs such as heat, which makes a significant difference depending on the weather, Superintendent Ken Micklash told the board.

Even if the budget isn't balanced, he added, it is not something to worry about since the district started the year with a fund balance of \$771,257.

While it appears that revenues increased this year, Micklash said, they were actually slightly less because the state stopped paying FICA (retirement benefits) charges for the staff.

Although the budget is listed as revised from the one passed earlier to comply with the law, it is actually the first meaningful budget for the district. The revision is based on the money available, which was not known when the first budget was approved. A breakdown of revenues and expenses is listed in this issue, page 14.

The "O.N. B.A.S.E." project, which stands for Offenders Nabbed by Belt and Speed Enforcement, was kicked off at a news conference Thursday in Caro.

Sheriff Tom Kern announced his department applied for and will receive \$50,000 in federal funding through the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning. The money will pay for extra road patrols countywide involving the sheriff's department, Michigan State Police and several local departments, including Cass City, over the next 11 months.

This is the third year a special traffic enforcement

grant has been awarded to Tuscola County, which is one of 9 counties in the state to receive the O.N. B.A.S.E. funding this year.

hours of additional traffic patrols in the county that's all agencies," explained Sgt. Patrick Woidan, who co-authored the grant with state police Sgt. Bill Fraczek of the Caro

"We'll have over 2,500

"We're going to emphasize speeding tickets, seat belts and impaired driving," Woidan added.

Police officers plan to stop motorists clocked at speeds of 6 or more miles per hour over the speed limit, according to Fraczek, who said drivers may not be ticketed for speed, but officers will be checking for signs of impaired driving, as well as seat belt violations.

"I can't say enough about

belts,"he added. "They save lives. They prevent serious injuries.'

Woidan and Fraczek pointed out enforcement isn't the only objective of the O.N. B.A.S.E. project.

This project is unique in that public awareness and community involvement are key ingredients, they said, adding participating agencies plan to involve everyone possible by seeking opportunities to make short presentations to service groups, visiting each school in the county, and holding a countywide poster competition for students.

Road patrol officers, meanwhile, plan to make good use of every grant dollar, Kern indicated.

"We're going to be encouraging them to make those stops, write tickets and get some results," he concluded.

# Pot worth \$1,500 seized in Sanilac-Ubly area drug bust

An investigation into marijuana trafficking in the northern Sanilac County and Ubly areas has resulted in 6 arrests and the seizure of more than 1/4 pound of marijuana valued at some \$1,500.

Police have also seized \$242 in narcotics sales proceeds, a vehicle and a fire-

Ubly Police Chief Gene Bucholtz and Sanilac County Drug Task Force Director Bill Gray announced the joint investigation last Wednesday.

The operation began about 3 weeks ago when Bucholtz uncovered evidence of marijuana sales and use among a group of Ubly High School students.

Surveillance revealed the students involved all lived in the Tyre area of Sanilac County, according to Bucholtz, who contacted the Sanilac County Drug Task Force to pursue the investigation.

Task force officers conducted several surveillances and interviews in the Tyre

A search warrant was obtained for a residence on Huron Line Road, where \$150 in narcotics sales proceeds was recovered. More than 2 ounces of marijuana, packaged for sale, with a combined street value of \$720, was seized at 2 other locations in Sanilac County.

Gray said 4 15-year-old Sanilac County juveniles will be charged in Sanilac Probate Court with a variety of offenses — conspiracy to deliver marijuana, possession with intent to deliver, and possession of marijuana.

Continuing investigation last week resulted in 2 more arrests, according to Bucholtz and Gray, who stated additional searches had resulted in marijuana, vehicle and weapons sei-

On Wednesday, a followup interview with a 26-yearold Minden area man and a search of his residence netted a small amount of marijuana. Investigators said manufacture and possession of marijuana charges will be sought against the man.

On Thursday, Bucholtz intercepted a 17-year-old Sanilac County man near Ubly High School, seizing more than 2 ounces of marijuana packaged for sale and \$92 in suspected narcotic sales proceeds. Police confiscated additional small amounts of marijuana and a

# For B. A. "Curly" Calka 41-year real estate career near end

Cass City will lose a longstanding real estate business this year with the retirement of B.A. "Curly" Calka after more than 41 years of serving the Thumb area.

'I've got about 3 more deals to close and then I'm done," Calka said Friday, adding he expects to wrap things up in about a month.

Calka said his decision to close up shop was based, in part, on a desire to take some time to enjoy life with his wife, Pauline, who has also put a lot of work into the

business. "I just felt, why should I work for more money than I need when there's (others) in the area that could use it,' he added.

Calka had considered selling the business, but couldn't find any takers in the area. Advertisements in a Detroit paper drew a number of inquiries, he noted, "but they wanted me to teach

them the business, and it takes about 3 years" to do

He chuckled and added, "All the guys I broke into the business, they're retired." The longtime Cass City

resident had hoped to hand down the business to one of his 5 daughters, 3 of whom sell real estate in other areas. However, he pointed out, "Once they got a taste of the big city...

Calka's long and successful business career began rather modestly in the 10foot by 40-foot Eat Shop building on Main Street. He recalled looking for a

business after his honorable discharge from the Navy in 1946. "They told us at the discharge centers, 'You can get a loan from a bank'," he said. "Well, that was a bunch of bologna. When I went to the bank, they asked, 'What do you have for collateral?'.'

Calka found a place he liked in Marlette, but it was sold. He then heard about a building across from the hotel in Cass City. Unfortunately, he discovered it was far too large. He learned about the Eat

Shop building when he stopped to have lunch at the hotel. He put \$1,000 down —

nearly everything he had moved in, and began operating the diner. Two years later, Calka and

his wife were married, and in 1952, he began selling real estate with the United Farm Agency. "Both banks discouraged

me. They said there were enough real estate men in town," he recalled. "I said, 'I'm going to try it any-


St. Pancratius Women's Council met Nov. 1 with 24 women present. Nina Davis opened the meeting with a prayer.



The names were secured by combing the garbage from the abortion clinic. Judge John Kirwan tossed out the suit because the names were taken from a piece of paper in the trash and the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that trash isn't private. The case was never heard by a jury.

I'm sure that the minority group that opposes abortion is pleased with the decision. But does the end justify the This Chairtan Easter

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Suppose these same 2 women visited a doctor to have a breast removed for cancer and the operation was discovered the same way and advertised on a poster the same way.

It's sure that many who will support the abortion decision would be aghast if the women's right of privacy were not affirmed in court. An even more cele-

brated case in the courts in Michigan concerns Dr. Death, Dr. Jack Kevorkian.

We have respect for the prosecutor who took Kevorkian to court even though he personally supported his work in assisting terminally ill patients commit suicide.

Regardless of how you view Kevorkian's activities no one should be bigger than the law.

It may well be that the Michigan law is unconstitutional as some legal beagles claim. To find out it has to be

Until it is Kevorkian deserves to be in jail. When this was written he was out on bond of \$2,000 put up by one of his supporters. Offers of support came from all over the country.

The doctor has no intention of stopping his work and makes no bones about it. He's a zealot. Willing, evidently, to starve himself to death in protest.

# **Driving Miss Daisy**

The purpose will be to raise funds to construct a private tunnel between Oakland County Executive Patterson's office and Joe Louis Arena in downtown Detroit.

Last week, it was revealed that Oakland County Sheriff's Deputy James English said he was pulled off an armed-robbery-case stakeout and assigned to drive Patterson to the arena for a Red Wings game in early 1992. Patterson later explained that he preferred an armed chauffeur to driving his own car, or taking a bus or cab, because:

"You know, I am not wellliked in some areas of Detroit, and there is no use putting yourself at risk....And that is basically my theory for the last 20

It is encouraging to recall that Patterson was a private citizen at the time he had to risk his life to watch a hockey game. He no longer held his job as Oakland County prosecutor and he was still campaigning for his present job.

So, obviously, that means any Oakland County private citizen worried about crossing 8 Mile to see the Red Wings or Tigers just has to phone the Oakland County Sheriff's Office and request an armed chauffeur.

#### **DRIVEN BY SELFISHNESS?**

There's also good news for Oakland County citizens who sometimes drink too much in saloons and need a safe ride home. Deputy English said he and another deputy once were ordered to leave a child-abuse investigation and go to a bar where private-attorney Patterson

According to a newspaper account: "English said Patterson's wife drove Patterson home from the bar in a van while he drove Patterson's car home. The 2 deputies then helped Patterson into his home before returning to duty."

Patterson later claimed he didn't need a ride from the sheriff's department, and didn't ask for it. Patterson probably just let English drive his car to the Patterson home so the deputy could feel good about keeping the streets safe and earning his

#### ANOTHER AWARD DUE

Patterson and the deputies certainly had a special relationship. Patterson said he thought the deputies who chauffeured him during last year's campaign were offduty volunteers, working for his election, not for their regular employer, the public. And the deputies said the chauffeuring was so routine they called the assignment "driving Miss Daisy."







# McDonald tackles Long's Peak

This summer Litchfield teacher Darren McDonald traveled to Colorado to backpack in the mountains. His primary destination was Rocky Mountain National Park just west of Estes Park in northern Colorado, which contains Long's Peak, the 18th highest mountain in the continental U.S. at 14,256 ft. He is the son of Bud and Jeanette McDonald of Owendale.

McDonald has been hiking since college, is an experienced back-packer and a serious runner for the last 7 years. Long's Peak, a typical mountain, begins with forest, then alpine meadows, arctic tundra, and finally, above the tree line and tundra, is nothing but rock.

Long's Peak trail head begins at 8,000 ft. McDonald began the ascent at 6:30 a.m. mountain time. The first 6 miles of hiking were on regular trails through the forest and the Alpine Meadows. After hitting the tree line, he came to the tundra at 10:30 a.m.

Up from that is the boulder field. At this point he took off his big pack and continued with just a day pack (similar to a student book pack). From this point there was no trail, just rock climbing. He climbed through the boulder field to the landmark called "the Key Hole" at about 13,000 feet. All the high mountain winds funnel through this area. Going beyond this point to the summit can be very dangerous weather-wise, especially if lightning comes. It was cold and sudden gale force winds came through the Key Hole.

The trail on up is called the

trough. It had been snowed in. He talked to people who had spent the night there and had gone on up to the summit. All people going up this season, prior to McDonald, had used ice axes, ropes, and spikes clamped on their boots. McDonald said, "The trough was spectacular. It was all a big steep valley of snow, several football fields long." The snow had melted sufficiently for marks to be visible. To attain the summit, he had to go up the trough and through "the narrows". These are narrow rock ledges. The final 100 yards was about 45-degree to 60-degree angles. McDonald attained the summit at 1:00 p.m. It was flat and barren." Scurrying around up there were marmots, which are small squirrel-like creatures. McDonald said, "You could see Wyoming and all the other Rocky Mountain

ranges. It was real clear." McDonald took 8 quarts of water and used all of it on the climb. He said he felt good going up, but going down was especially hard because he wasn't adapted to the altitude. His muscles became sore and he experienced a headache, all caused by oxygen deprivation.



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

# MOST SPIDER **BITES ARE**

Most spider bites are poisonous. That is how they kill their prey. But very few are dangerous to humans. The fangs of most spiders are too short to penetrate a person's skin.

**MINOR** 

Only a couple of spiders are likely to cause any significant bites at all, and these are quite uncommon.

The brown recluse spider is the most common one in most areas. Like most spiders, it likes dark, musty places. It is found primarily in basements, outdoor toilets, and at the bottoms of woodpiles. Most of the time when a person gets a bite, it is because the spider has been disturbed and its territory invaded. One of the most common problems is getting a bite in an outdoor toilet. The other common occurrence is when a family does remodelling or construction work in the basement. The spiders do not like the disturbance and move to some other area in the house, perhaps a bedroom. The bites may occur at night so a person may not be sure what caused the bite at first.

Once a bite has occurred, the damage basically must run its course. Little, if anything, is known to help--antibiotics, ice packs, steroids, and surgery all provide no definite help. Close follow up is necessary to prevent complications, however. Skin infections in the ulceration is a common







# State to allow mental health funding transfer

bill sponsored by Senator Joel Gougeon that would allow financial and service responsibility for mental health services to be transferred from one county to another.

The House of Representatives passed Senate bill 659 on Nov. 2. The bill now moves to the governor's desk for his signature.

The bill would amend the Mental Health Code to allow the transfer of funding from one county to another. The bill specifically addresses the needs of the 2,500 to 3,000 people who have been placed in counties other than their home county for specific mental health service needs.


"Counties get the help they need to cut through government bureaucratic red tape with this bill. Now the state funding will follow the patients like it should," Gougeon (R-Bay City) said.

The Michigan Senate ordered immediate effect on a payment problem for more than 19 mental health facilities in Arenac, Bay, Midland and Tuscola counties. The state will now pay 100 percent to the receiving county.'

Prior to this bill, counties receiving transfers had to bill the original county for 10 percent of the cost of the mental health services. In most cases, the receiving county had to pay the bill because of lack of payment from the originating county. When a patient transfer is made under this bill, the Department of Mental Health would transfer 100 percent of the cost of the patient services when agreed upon by both county programs, resulting in timely payment from the

"It's an excellent bill that addresses a problem that has been created over the past 10 to 15 years," said Paul Tarr, legislative liaison for the Department of Mental



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

# **Child support** hot topic for friend of court

Usually one of the hottest issues in any domestic relations case is the issue of child support. Contrary to popular belief, the recommendation of an amount for child support is not based on gender, bias, partiality and/ or whim.

Actually, the Michigan Friend of the Court Act of 1982 and the Federal Child Support Enforcement Amendments of 1984 required the development of a formula to be used as a guideline in recommending child support amount Those laws further stated that, "The formula shall be based upon the needs of the child and the actual resources of each parent. The child support formula... SHALL be used as a guideline in recommending child support" by the Friend of the Court.

A subcommittee of the Friend of the Court Advisory Committee was established and began to work on a guideline in 1983. The subcommittee extensively reviewed methods currently in use for determining child support in Michigan and nationwide; held public hearings; conducted original research and received input from professional economists and other researchers. The Friend of the Court Advisory Committee, after reviewing public comment, first adopted the guideline in December 1986, effective May 1987.

The guideline is to be reviewed at least every 4 years as required by federal legislation. Comments regarding the guidelines can be made in writing to: Friend of the Court Advisory Committee, c/o State Court Administrative Office, P.O. Box 30048, Lansing, Mich., 48909.

The guideline gives the Friend of the Court direction in determining the incomes of each parent from various sources, of low income or no income. It directs deductions from income for benefits provided for the child, such as health care, employment obligations, like union dues, and support for other children. Additionally, the guideline provides how to make a recommendation of support in various types of custody arrangements, as well as provides for child care and health costs.
