## In Tuscola County

### Report 2 fatal accidents

Traffic accidents over the weekend claimed the lives of 2 Tuscola County residents, including an Akron teen.

Tuscola County Sheriff's deputies reported Rocky J. Clark, 15, of Akron, died after being struck by a car Saturday evening on Thomas Road near Dutcher Road in Fairgrove Township.

Clark was one of 2 pedestrians walking southbound on Thomas Road when the 10:36 p.m. accident occurred, according to reports. Deputies stated the driver of the vehicle, Clara Parrish, 69, of Akron, was northbound at the time and was momentarily blinded by the lights of an oncoming vehicle.

Investigators noted it was

dark at the time of the accident, and that the victim was wearing dark clothing.

Also killed over the weekend was Brian Mitchell, 38, of Millington, who was thrown from his vehicle in a one-vehicle accident early Sunday morning.

Reports state Mitchell was driving on M-15 near Swofwer Road in Vassar Township when his vehicle left the

roadway, entered a ditch, went airborne and struck a tree.

Mitchell was pronounced dead at the scene. He was not wearing a seat belt, according to investigators, who suspect alcohol was a factor in the crash.

Officers were assisted by the Millington police and fire departments, and Vassar ambulance personnel.

### Pot worth \$1,500 seized in Sanilac-Ubly area drug bust

An investigation into marijuana trafficking in the northern Sanilac County and Ubly areas has resulted in 6 arrests and the seizure of more than 1/4 pound of marijuana valued at some \$1,500.

Police have also seized \$242 in narcotics sales proceeds, a vehicle and a firearm.

Ubly Police Chief Gene Bucholtz and Sanilac County Drug Task Force Director Bill Gray announced the joint investigation last Wednesday.

The operation began about 3 weeks ago when Bucholtz uncovered evidence of marijuana sales and use among a group of Ubly High School students.

Surveillance revealed the students involved all lived in the Tyre area of Sanilac County, according to Bucholtz, who contacted the Sanilac County Drug Task Force to pursue the investigation.

Task force officers conducted several surveillances and interviews in the Tyre area.

A search warrant was obtained for a residence on Huron Line Road, where \$150 in narcotics sales proceeds was recovered. More than 2 ounces of marijuana, packaged for sale, with a combined street value of \$720, was seized at 2 other locations in Sanilac County.

Gray said 4 15-year-old Sanilac County juveniles will be charged in Sanilac Probate Court with a variety of offenses — conspiracy to deliver marijuana, possession with intent to deliver, and possession of marijuana.

Continuing investigation last week resulted in 2 more arrests, according to Bucholtz and Gray, who

stated additional searches had resulted in marijuana, vehicle and weapons seizures.

On Wednesday, a follow-up interview with a 26-year-old Minden area man and a search of his residence netted a small amount of marijuana. Investigators said manufacture and possession of marijuana charges will be sought against the man.

On Thursday, Bucholtz intercepted a 17-year-old Sanilac County man near Ubly High School, seizing more than 2 ounces of marijuana packaged for sale and \$92 in suspected narcotic sales proceeds. Police confiscated additional small amounts of marijuana and a firearm from his residence. Charges of possession with intent to deliver marijuana

on school property are being sought against the suspect, who will be charged as an adult.

In addition to the criminal cases which are pending, 3 civil forfeiture cases have been initiated in regards to the cash, firearm and vehicle seized by police.

Gray said there may be additional arrests as police Please turn to back page.

### New budget approved

## New Middle School plans inch forward

The Cass City School Board reviewed and adopted a revised budget for the 1993-94 school year that indicates the district will end the year some \$36,848 in the red, with expenditures of \$6.785 million, up from \$6.114 million in the last school year.

We have a conservative budget which may end up in the black, depending on costs such as heat, which makes a significant difference depending on the weather, Superintendent Ken Micklash told the board.

Even if the budget isn't balanced, he added, it is not something to worry about since the district started the year with a fund balance of \$771,257.

While it appears that revenues increased this year, Micklash said, they were actually slightly less because the state stopped paying FICA (retirement benefits) charges for the staff.

Although the budget is listed as revised from the one passed earlier to comply with the law, it is actually the first meaningful budget for the district. The revision is based on the money available, which was not known when the first budget was approved. A breakdown of revenues and expenses is listed in this issue, page 14.

### FACILITY PLANS

The board reviewed an 11-page facility study prepared by the superintendent. It included a projection of enrollment, the need for electronic capabilities and the age of the school buildings.

A comparison of the cost for erecting a new Middle School and renovation of the present building was presented.

It was estimated that renovation of the present building together with a new gym and 4 Campbell Elementary classrooms would be \$3.12 million. If a new heating system were included, it would add another \$1 million or more.

The total with a new heat system is estimated at \$4.3 million.

Without any change in the heating system, the renovation is expected to cost 1.658 mills for 19 years. A home with a state equalized value

of \$50,000 would pay \$41.25 a year more.

If an all new Middle School with the Campbell addition were built, the cost would average 3.463 mills for 25 years at a cost of \$86.58 a year for the same \$50,000

home. The board will mull the options available. Before making any decision it will probably wait for the results of a survey now being conducted which is expected to Please turn to back page.

### \$50,000 grant to spark increased road patrols

Tuscola County law enforcement officers will be cracking down on speeders, drunk drivers and those who don't wear seat belts over the next several months, thanks to a grant recently awarded to the county.

The "O.N. B.A.S.E." project, which stands for Officers Nabbed by Belt and Speed Enforcement, was kicked off at a news conference Thursday in Caro.

Sheriff Tom Kern announced his department applied for and will receive \$50,000 in federal funding through the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning. The money will pay for extra road patrols countywide involving the sheriff's department, Michigan State Police and several local departments, including Cass City, over the next 11 months.

This is the third year a special traffic enforcement

grant has been awarded to Tuscola County, which is one of 9 counties in the state to receive the O.N. B.A.S.E. funding this year.

"We'll have over 2,500 hours of additional traffic patrols in the county — that's all agencies," explained Sgt. Patrick Woidan, who co-authored the grant with state police Sgt. Bill Fraczek of the Caro post.

"We're going to emphasize speeding tickets, seat belts and impaired driving," Woidan added.

Police officers plan to stop motorists clocked at speeds of 6 or more miles per hour over the speed limit, according to Fraczek, who said drivers may not be ticketed for speed, but officers will be checking for signs of impaired driving, as well as seat belt violations.

"I can't say enough about

the importance of seat belts," he added. "They save lives. They prevent serious injuries."

Woidan and Fraczek pointed out enforcement isn't the only objective of the O.N. B.A.S.E. project.

This project is unique in that public awareness and community involvement are key ingredients, they said, adding participating agencies plan to involve everyone possible by seeking opportunities to make short presentations to service groups, visiting each school in the county, and holding a countywide poster competition for students.

Road patrol officers, meanwhile, plan to make good use of every grant dollar, Kern indicated.

"We're going to be encouraging them to make those stops, write tickets and get some results," he concluded.

### For B. A. "Curly" Calka

## 41-year real estate career near end

Cass City will lose a long-standing real estate business this year with the retirement of B. A. "Curly" Calka after more than 41 years of serving the Thumb area.

"I've got about 3 more deals to close and then I'm done," Calka said Friday, adding he expects to wrap things up in about a month.

Calka said his decision to close up shop was based, in part, on a desire to take some time to enjoy life with his wife, Pauline, who has also put a lot of work into the business.

"I just felt, why should I work for more money than I need when there's (others) in the area that could use it," he added.

Calka had considered selling the business, but couldn't find any takers in the area. Advertisements in a Detroit paper drew a number of inquiries, he noted, "but they wanted me to teach

them the business, and it takes about 3 years" to do that.

He chuckled and added, "All the guys I broke into the business, they're retired."

The longtime Cass City resident had hoped to hand down the business to one of his 5 daughters, 3 of whom sell real estate in other areas. However, he pointed out, "Once they got a taste of the big city..."

Calka's long and successful business career began rather modestly in the 10-foot by 40-foot Eat Shop building on Main Street.

He recalled looking for a business after his honorable discharge from the Navy in 1946. "They told us at the discharge centers, 'You can get a loan from a bank,'" he said. "Well, that was a bunch of bologna. When I went to the bank, they asked, 'What do you have for collateral?'"

Calka found a place he liked in Marlette, but it was sold. He then heard about a building across from the hotel in Cass City. Unfortunately, he discovered it was far too large.

He learned about the Eat Shop building when he stopped to have lunch at the hotel.

He put \$1,000 down — nearly everything he had — moved in, and began operating the diner.

Two years later, Calka and his wife were married, and in 1952, he began selling real estate with the United Farm Agency.

"Both banks discouraged me. They said there were enough real estate men in town," he recalled. "I said, 'I'm going to try it anyway!'"

During the 10 years the couple stayed in the Eat Shop building, Calka also Please turn to back page.

Slips & dips

It's been mentioned here before that I volunteered to do the typing for a compilation of favorite Guinther family recipes. With a family the size of ours, that's a raft of recipes.

Out of around 200 entries, nearly half are for cookies and desserts. No wonder some of us are putting on weight!

It was a tremendous temptation to skip proofreading the recipes after they'd been printed, since I'd already read them on the computer screen, but a slight perfectionistic tendency overruled.

It's a good thing it did! Otherwise, we would have suffered severe cholesterol overload by using 14 cups of butter instead of 1/4 cup in our pierogi, twice as much rice as necessary in our "African Chow", and we might have been hard pressed here in mid-Michigan to find a "coolie" sheet to put our dough on.

Now I admit that a few typos eluded me while reading them on the screen, but so help me! There's an "electronic Ernie" at work here too! When called back up for correction, several of the errors simply weren't there. When printed the second time, without a single change being made, everything came out right.

It's hard enough to deal on any level with Ernie, the invisible fellow who hides whatever it is you're looking for and may or may not put it back, but how do you cope when he messes with your computer and printer?

Anyway, since the holidays are approaching, here are some dip recipes we've assembled. (If any of them look strange, blame Ernie.)

### CRAB DIP (Marilyn Young)

1 can crab meat  
8 ozs. cream cheese  
Dash of garlic  
1 tsp. salsa  
Mix all together and put in mold. Refrigerate. When ready to serve, turn out onto platter and pour small amount of cocktail sauce over the top.

### SPINACH DIP (Sue Pawloski)

1 box frozen chopped spinach, thawed & drained  
1 pkg. dry Knorr vegetable soup mix  
1 TBS. lemon juice  
1 cup sour cream  
1 tsp. worcestershire sauce  
1 cup chopped onion  
1 cup mayonnaise  
Mix all ingredients. Allow to set in refrigerator 1-2 hours. Slice top off a loaf of French bread. Hollow out loaf, saving chunks of bread. Serve dip in hollowed out loaf and dip bread chunks into it.

### VEGETABLE DIP (Brenda Doerr)

2 cups small curd cottage cheese  
2 TBS. sour cream  
1/4 tsp. dry onion flakes  
1/4 tsp. garlic salt  
2 tsps. lemon juice  
A little dill  
Put all in blender and mix well.

Flower girl was Kendra Guilds, daughter of the groom.

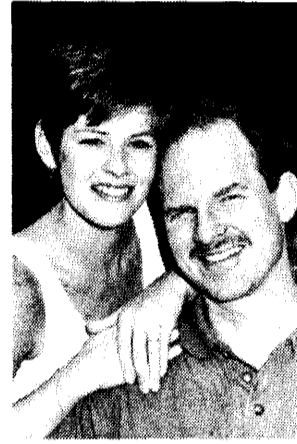

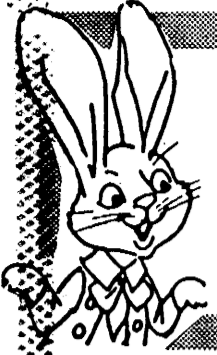

## American Education Week

# Get involved, Cross urges

American Education Week comes to Cass City Nov. 14-20 under the banner of "Better Schools Shape Better Tomorrows."

Mary Cross, president of the Cass City Education Association (CCEA), is urging all community residents to do something special this week to help make schools better.

"Spend a morning as a classroom volunteer," she suggested. "Or sign up for playground duty. Chaperone a field trip or invite a class to your place of business. Write a letter to the editor about something good that's happening in your child's school. Donate books to the school library. Or contribute to a local scholarship fund.

"If you don't know how you can help," Cross said, "just call the school nearest you and ask."

Effective schools need strong ties to the community and a bedrock of citizen support, Cross added. "It takes all of us, working together, to build strong schools that respond effectively to the education needs of our communities."

Our future depends on what we do in schools today, Cross continued. For our schools produce our future leaders, citizens, workers, and achievers. "And we know from experience that 'Better Schools Shape Better Tomorrows'."

CCEA is affiliated with the National Education Association (NEA), which joined with the American Legion back in 1921 to establish American Education Week as an annual event.

This year's 73rd annual celebration is co-sponsored by the 2 groups, the U.S. Department of Education, and 9 other national organizations. The week is observed in thousands of communities across the country.

I suppose it's naive to feel that personal prejudices shouldn't figure in decisions reached by judges. Perhaps my reaction to the decisions are colored by my prejudices. Just so you know, I don't favor abortion on demand, but feel that it is the best solution when babies are doomed at birth by physical or severe mental impairment. When the case about to be discussed is decided on appeal it will be evident which of us is swayed by emotion.

Briefly, the case under discussion concerned an invasion of privacy suit against 2 foes of abortion who printed the names of 2 women who were planning an abortion on a "Kill Your Baby" poster.

The names were secured by combing the garbage from the abortion clinic. Judge John Kirwan tossed out the suit because the names were taken from a piece of paper in the trash and the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that trash isn't private. The case was never heard by a jury.

I'm sure that the minority group that opposes abortion is pleased with the decision. But does the end justify the means?

Suppose these same 2 women visited a doctor to have a breast removed for cancer and the operation was discovered the same way and advertised on a poster the same way.

It's sure that many who will support the abortion decision would be aghast if the women's right of privacy were not affirmed in court.

An even more celebrated case in the courts in Michigan concerns Dr. Death, Dr. Jack Kevorkian.

We have respect for the prosecutor who took Kevorkian to court even though he personally supported his work in assisting terminally ill patients commit suicide.

Regardless of how you view Kevorkian's activities no one should be bigger than the law.

It may well be that the Michigan law is unconstitutional as some legal beagles claim. To find out it has to be tested.

Until it is Kevorkian deserves to be in jail. When this was written he was out on bond of \$2,000 put up by one of his supporters. Offers of support came from all over the country.

The doctor has no intention of stopping his work and makes no bones about it. He's a zealot. Willing, evidently, to starve himself to death in protest.

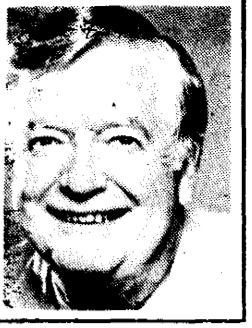
We agree with the doctor that ending a life where each day is filled with agony and there is no hope for the days ahead has merit.

# Driving Miss Daisy

It is expected that Sharon McPhail will hold a \$50-a-ticket party for L. Brooks Patterson. The purpose will be to raise funds to construct a private tunnel between Oakland County Executive Patterson's office and Joe Louis Arena in downtown Detroit.

Last week, it was revealed that Oakland County Sheriff's Deputy James English said he was pulled off an armed-robbery-case stakeout and assigned to drive Patterson to the arena for a Red Wings game in early 1992. Patterson later explained that he preferred an armed chauffeur to driving his own car, or taking a bus or cab, because:

"You know, I am not well-liked in some areas of Detroit, and there is no use putting yourself at risk....And that is basically my theory for the last 20 years."

It is encouraging to recall that Patterson was a private citizen at the time he had to risk his life to watch a hockey game. He no longer held his job as Oakland County prosecutor and he was still campaigning for his present job.

So, obviously, that means any Oakland County private citizen worried about crossing 8 Mile to see the Red Wings or Tigers just has to phone the Oakland County Sheriff's Office and request an armed chauffeur.

was apparently celebrating a criminal-case victory.

According to a newspaper account: "English said Patterson's wife drove Patterson home from the bar in a van while he drove Patterson's car home. The 2 deputies then helped Patterson into his home before returning to duty."

Patterson later claimed he didn't need a ride from the sheriff's department, and didn't ask for it. Patterson probably just let English drive his car to the Patterson home so the deputy could feel good about keeping the streets safe and earning his pay.

## ANOTHER AWARD DUE

Patterson and the deputies certainly had a special relationship. Patterson said he thought the deputies who chauffeured him during last year's campaign were off-duty volunteers, working for his election, not for their regular employer, the public. And the deputies said the chauffeuring was so routine they called the assignment "driving Miss Daisy."

Jessica Tandy won an Academy Award for portraying Miss Daisy in the movie. If Patterson can convince the dumbest fence post that he had no idea he was receiving extra-special treatment from tax-paid deputies, he also deserves an Oscar.

## PRECEDENT IS UGLY, TOO

Remember last year when Patterson's then 15-year-old daughter — too young to legally drive alone — caused a minor traffic accident while driving alone? Old Tough-on-Crime Patterson sped to the scene and asked the cops to let the girl go and prosecute him instead.

Later, when the embarrassing incident became public, Patterson denied he expected special handling from police because of who he was. He said any father would have done the same thing.

Sure. And any Oakland County citizen, afraid of the freeway drive to Joe Louis Arena, would ask the sheriff's department for an armed chauffeur.

But even a squad car could be bombed from an overpass by a crazed Detroit who suspects Brooks Patterson is hiding in the trunk.

The only truly safe way for Patterson to travel to Red Wings games is by private tunnel. At the party to raise tunnel-construction funds, Sharon McPhail and her friends could wear Patterson masks and tap dance to the theme from "Driving Miss Daisy."

And if Patterson's bulging persona of overblown self-importance causes him to become stuck in the middle of the tunnel, it won't be surprising.

## DRIVEN BY SELFISHNESS?

There's also good news for Oakland County citizens who sometimes drink too much in saloons and need a safe ride home. Deputy English said he and another deputy once were ordered to leave a child-abuse investigation and go to a bar where private-attorney Patterson

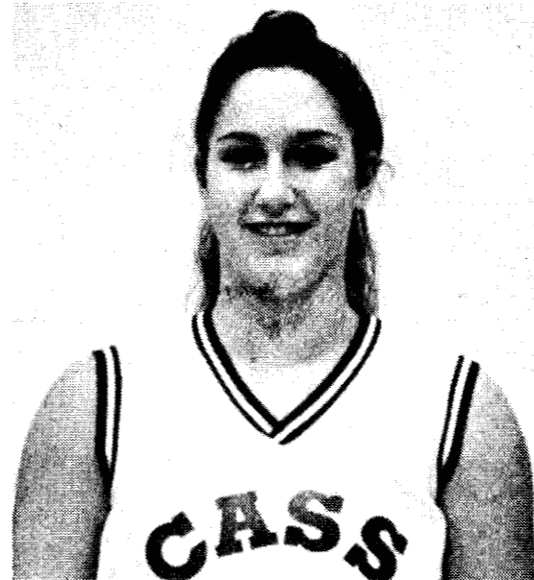

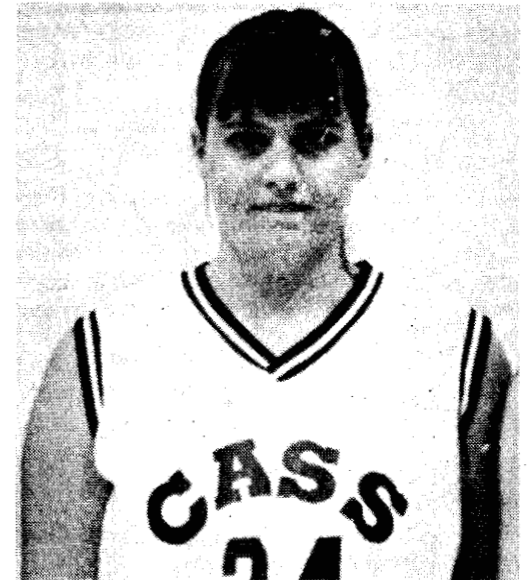

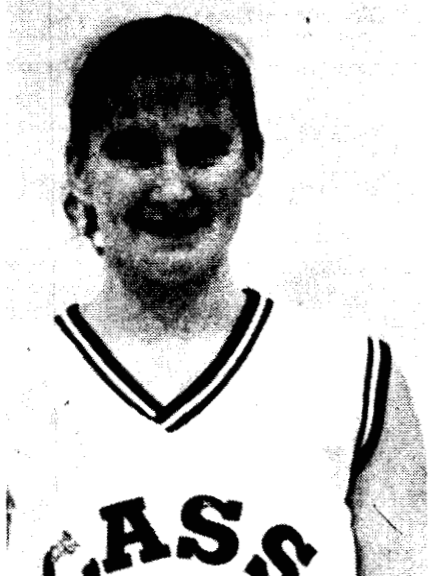

## Safety Tips for the Hot Tub

  - If you have heart disease or high blood pressure, check with your doctor before using a hot tub, sauna or whirlpool.
- And if you are pregnant, you should avoid using them entirely.

## 18th highest mountain in U.S.

# McDonald tackles Long's Peak

This summer Litchfield teacher Darren McDonald traveled to Colorado to backpack in the mountains. His primary destination was Rocky Mountain National Park just west of Estes Park in northern Colorado, which contains Long's Peak, the 18th highest mountain in the continental U.S. at 14,256 ft. He is the son of Bud and Jeanette McDonald of Owendale.

McDonald has been hiking since college, is an experienced back-packer and a serious runner for the last 7 years. Long's Peak, a typical mountain, begins with forest, then alpine meadows, arctic tundra, and finally, above the tree line and tundra, is nothing but rock.

Long's Peak trail head begins at 8,000 ft. McDonald began the ascent at 6:30 a.m. mountain time. The first 6 miles of hiking were on regular trails through the forest and the Alpine Meadows. After hitting the tree line, he came to the tundra at 10:30 a.m.

Up from that is the boulder field. At this point he took off his big pack and continued with just a day pack (similar to a student book pack). From this point there was no trail, just rock climbing. He climbed through the boulder field to the landmark called "the Key Hole" at about 13,000 feet. All the high mountain winds funnel through this area. Going beyond this point to the summit can be very dangerous weather-wise, especially if lightning comes. It was cold and sudden gale force winds came through the Key Hole.

The trail on up is called the trough. It had been snowed in. He talked to people who had spent the night there and had gone on up to the summit. All people going up this season, prior to McDonald, had used ice axes, ropes, and spikes clamped on their boots. McDonald said, "The trough was spectacular. It was all a big steep valley of snow, several football fields long." The snow had melted sufficiently for marks to be visible. To attain the summit, he had to go up the trough and through "the narrows". These are narrow rock ledges. The final 100 yards was about 45-degree to 60-degree angles.

McDonald attained the summit at 1:00 p.m. It was flat and barren." Scurrying around up there were marmots, which are small squirrel-like creatures. McDonald said, "You could see Wyoming and all the other Rocky Mountain

ranges. It was real clear." McDonald took 8 quarts of water and used all of it on the climb. He said he felt good going up, but going down was especially hard because he wasn't adapted to the altitude. His muscles became sore and he experienced a headache, all caused by oxygen deprivation.

In the descent, a storm

came up at the Key Hole. It started to snow. He was fatigued and couldn't concentrate. It took 10 minutes to get protective gear on. A few minutes later, the sun came out and he took off the storm gear.

He arrived back at the trail head at 7:30 p.m. It took 13 hours.

"I was pretty tired. It was harder than I thought, coming down especially."

\*Richard J. Dennis, 33, Kingston, was sentenced to 3 years probation and one year in the county jail, with work site privileges, for his guilty plea to operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor, third offense, Sept. 6 in Caro.

Dennis, who was remanded to the custody of the sheriff's department, was also ordered to pay court costs and fines totaling \$1,000 plus attorneys fees, a \$30 oversight fee and a \$30 victim crime fee. Bond was forfeited and will be applied towards costs.

## Investigate vandalism


Cass City police recently investigated a pair of complaints involving vandalism.

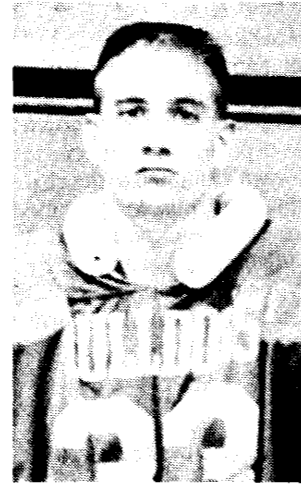

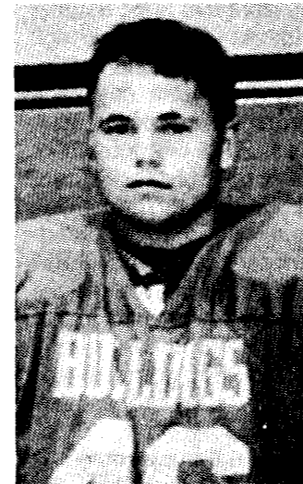

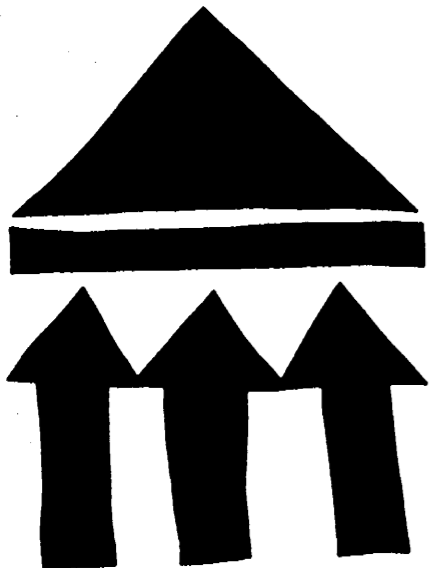

# Champions! One-point win brings Hawks title share

Held to one 3-point bucket until the last half of the last quarter, she shot the Lakers back into the game. It started when Cass City committed an ill advised foul as Bollen-

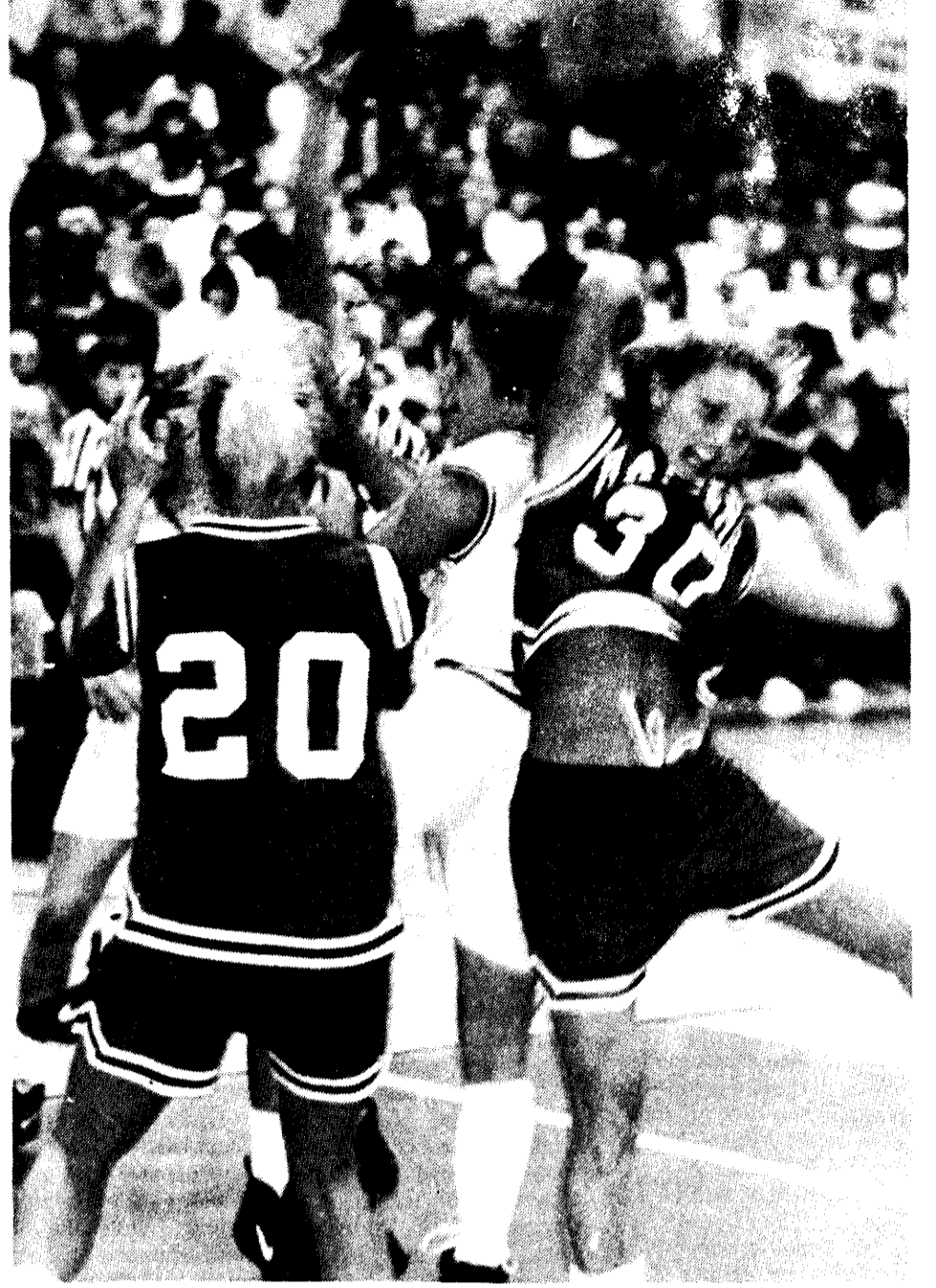
bacher was firing away from 3-point range. She missed, but converted all 3 foul shots and was on her way.

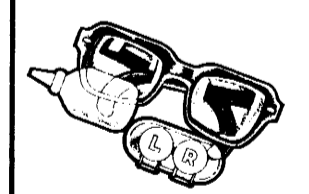

Following the morning worship service, a potluck dinner will be held at the church. Anyone from the community is welcome and invited to attend.







## MOST SPIDER BITES ARE MINOR

Most spider bites are poisonous. That is how they kill their prey. But very few are dangerous to humans. The fangs of most spiders are too short to penetrate a person's skin.

Only a couple of spiders are likely to cause any significant bites at all, and these are quite uncommon.

The brown recluse spider is the most common one in most areas. Like most spiders, it likes dark, musty places. It is found primarily in basements, outdoor toilets, and at the bottoms of woodpiles. Most of the time when a person gets a bite, it is because the spider has been disturbed and its territory invaded. One of the most common problems is getting a bite in an outdoor toilet. The other common occurrence is when a family does remodeling or construction work in the basement. The spiders do not like the disturbance and move to some other area in the house, perhaps a bedroom. The bites may occur at night so a person may not be sure what caused the bite at first.

Once a bite has occurred, the damage basically must run its course. Little, if anything, is known to help—antibiotics, ice packs, steroids, and surgery all provide no definite help. Close follow up is necessary to prevent complications, however. Skin infections in the ulceration is a common complication.

The black widow spider is quite uncommon and causes severe symptoms of muscle spasms and twitching. Black widow spider bites are seldom life-threatening, but small children may have a significant illness after a major bite.

Tuscola County has an enhanced emergency 911 system, which enables dispatchers to immediately trace the origin of all 911 calls.

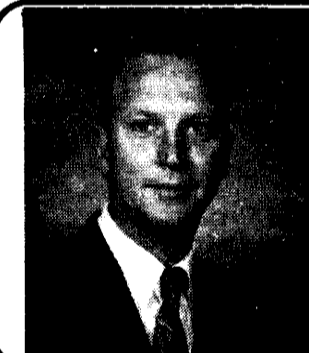
According to reports, police contacted high school

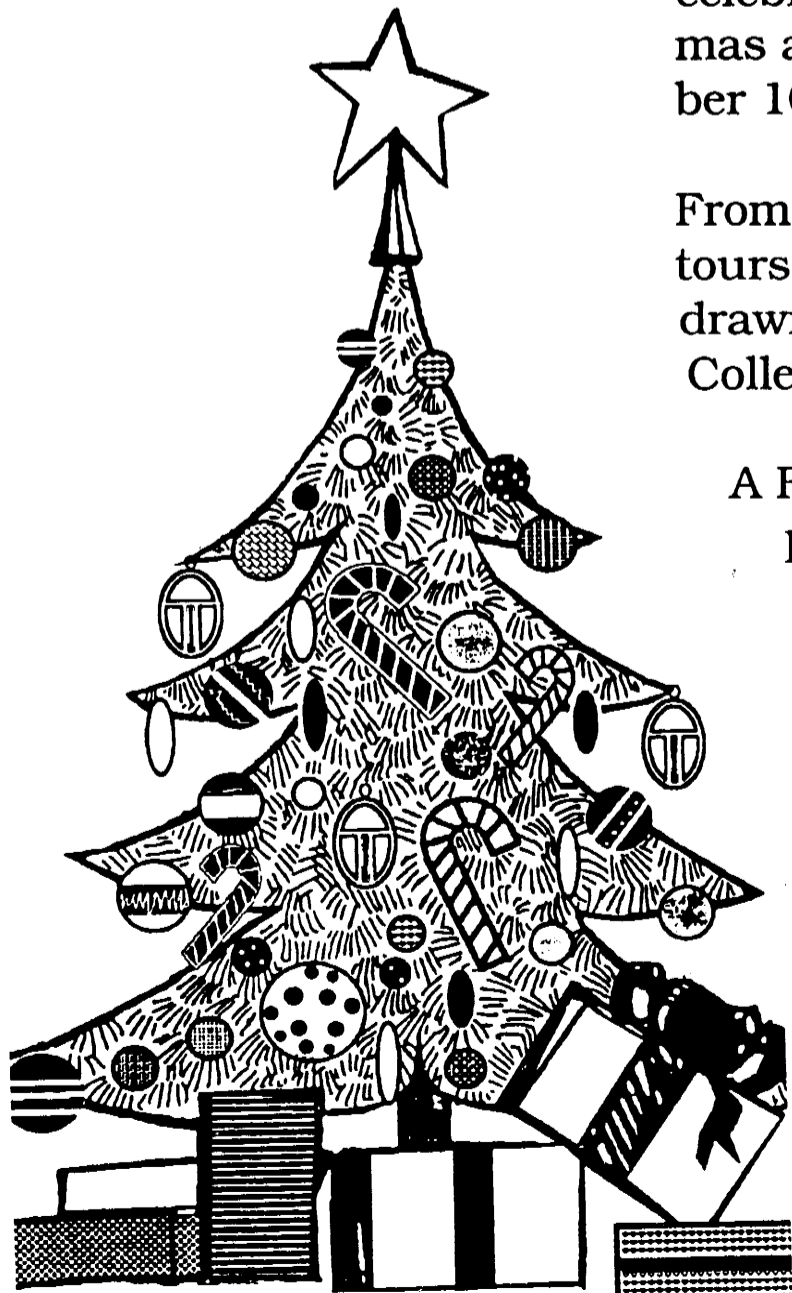

## State to allow mental health funding transfer

The Michigan Senate ordered immediate effect on a bill sponsored by Senator Joel Gougeon that would allow financial and service responsibility for mental health services to be transferred from one county to another.

The House of Representatives passed Senate bill 659 on Nov. 2. The bill now moves to the governor's desk for his signature.

The bill would amend the Mental Health Code to allow the transfer of funding from one county to another. The bill specifically addresses the needs of the 2,500 to 3,000 people who have been placed in counties other than their home county for specific mental health service needs.

"Counties get the help they need to cut through government bureaucratic red tape with this bill. Now the state funding will follow the patients like it should," Gougeon (R-Bay City) said. "This bill will resolve the

payment problem for more than 19 mental health facilities in Arenac, Bay, Midland and Tuscola counties. The state will now pay 100 percent to the receiving county."

Prior to this bill, counties receiving transfers had to bill the original county for 10 percent of the cost of the mental health services. In most cases, the receiving county had to pay the bill because of lack of payment from the originating county.

When a patient transfer is made under this bill, the Department of Mental Health would transfer 100 percent of the cost of the patient services when agreed upon by both county programs, resulting in timely payment from the state.

"It's an excellent bill that addresses a problem that has been created over the past 10 to 15 years," said Paul Tarr, legislative liaison for the Department of Mental Health.

continue to follow leads and conduct interviews.

The recent drug trafficking investigation is the second involving drug activity in northern Sanilac County in recent weeks.

A raid at the Backwoods

Saloon, commonly known as the Tyre Bar, last September netted more than 500 grams of nearly pure cocaine valued at some \$204,000 — the largest amount ever seized in the Thumb.

The drugs were headed for the Bad Axe and Cass City areas, according to officials with the Thumb Narcotics Unit, which conducted the investigation along with Bad Axe police and the Huron County Sheriff's Department.

The bar owner was arrested and charged with possession with intent to deliver 225 grams or more but less than 650 grams of cocaine. If convicted, he faces a mandatory minimum sentence of 20 to 30 years prison.

# Vassar man arraigned on pot charge

A Vassar man was arraigned on drug charges last week in Tuscola County District Court.

Allen J. Short, 36, Vassar, faces charges of conspiracy to deliver marijuana and delivery of marijuana, according to court records, which state the defendant was indicted by the Multi-County Grand Jury.

Bond in the case was set at \$20,000. A preliminary examination was scheduled for 9 a.m. Nov. 24.

# Child support hot topic for friend of court

Usually one of the hottest issues in any domestic relations case is the issue of child support. Contrary to popular belief, the recommendation of an amount for child support is not based on gender, bias, partiality and/or whim.

Actually, the Michigan Friend of the Court Act of 1982 and the Federal Child Support Enforcement Amendments of 1984 required the development of a formula to be used as a guideline in recommending a child support amount. Those laws further stated that, "The formula shall be based upon the needs of the child and the actual resources of each parent. The child support formula... SHALL be used as a guideline in recommending child support" by the Friend of the Court.

A subcommittee of the Friend of the Court Advisory Committee was established and began to work on a guideline in 1983. The subcommittee extensively reviewed methods currently in use for determining child support in Michigan and nationwide; held public hearings; conducted original research and received input from professional economists and other researchers. The Friend of the Court Advisory Committee, after reviewing public comment, first adopted the guideline in December 1986, effective May 1987.

The guideline is to be reviewed at least every 4 years as required by federal legislation. Comments regarding the guidelines can be made in writing to: Friend of the Court Advisory Committee, c/o State Court Administrative Office, P.O. Box 30048, Lansing, Mich., 48909.

The guideline gives the Friend of the Court direction in determining the incomes of each parent from various sources, of low income or no income. It directs deductions from income for benefits provided for the child, such as health care, employment obligations, like union dues, and support for other children. Additionally, the guideline provides how to make a recommendation of support in various types of custody arrangements, as well as provides for child care and health costs.
