Campaign kicks off Saturday

Cass City United Way goal increased to \$19,000

The Cass City United Way Board of Directors last week announced this year's campaign goal is \$19,000, an increase of \$1,000 over 1993.

The campaign officially kicks off Saturday and continues through Nov. 15.

"I anticipate that we will have another good year. I have a good feeling," said United Way President Dale McIntosh.

McIntosh has reason to be optimistic. The 1993 campaign proved to be another in a long tradition of successful United Way efforts in the Cass City area, thanks to the faithful support of local business and residents.

Last year's goal of \$18,000 was met and exceeded, with a total of \$23,789 collected.

Of the total, \$3,000 was spent on the local Christmas basket program and another \$18,150 was allocated last spring to various agencies that serve the community.

"Eighty-five percent of those funds stay in the immediate Cass City area," McIntosh pointed out. The remaining 15 percent is allocated to the Tuscola County United Way to help fund other agencies and services that benefit residents in this area, he added.

Local groups and agencies receiving local United Way dollars last spring included Rawson Memorial Library, Cass City Pony League, Cass City Cub, Boy and Girl Scouts, Village Bach Festival, Cass City Girls Softball, Cass City Boys Little League, AAUW RIF (Reading is Fundamental) program, AAUW Youth Theatre and math-science programs.

Cass City Food Closet, Cass City Literacy Council, Tom Thumb Singers, Toys for Tots and the Fourth of July Festival.

McIntosh, who also serves on the Tuscola County United Way Board, said the portion of dollars sent to the county level support a host of other agencies.

They include the Thumb Assault Crisis Center, 4-H, Catholic Family Services, Services to Crippled Children, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, American Red Cross, Thumb Area Legal Services, Boy Scouts of America,

Tuscola Substance Abuse Services and Area 10 Special Olympics.

McIntosh expressed concern over reverberations stemming from the resignation 2 years ago of then-United Way of America President William Aramony, who left his post under pressure after it was discovered he paid himself a salary of \$463,000 plus perks.

The fact is, local board members work on a strictly volunteer basis — there's no compensation whatsoever, McIntosh stressed.

Board members do a bulk

of the leg work in soliciting pledges, but they could use some help.

"If there's somebody out there who would like to volunteer their efforts to help canvas one of the zones in town, please call me at 872-4311," McIntosh said.

Village residents can expect a visit from a Cass City United Way volunteer in the near future. Anyone who is not contacted, but would like to make a donation, can do so by filling in and mailing a United Way donation form that appears elsewhere in this issue.

Budgeted revenues, expenses down in Owen-Gage Schools

The Owen-Gage Board of Education Monday approved a revised 1994-95 budget showing reductions in both proposed revenues and expenditures.

The anticipated bottom line is still encouraging, however, with revenues expected to exceed expenditures by more than \$30,000.

School Supt. Manuel Thies explained he has cut proposed revenues by about \$16,500, from \$1,706 million to \$1,689 million, largely due to a reduction in estimated tax revenue from non-homestead property.

The district originally expected \$70,605 in non-homestead taxes, but that figure has since been cut to \$60,527 plus a little more," Thies said.

Proposed expenditures, meanwhile, have been reduced by about \$12,000, from \$1,671 million to \$1,659 million.

The change is a result of retirement expenses, which weren't figured into the original budget, Thies said. He explained retirement costs are up by 9.21 percent this year, however, retirements and staff changes have enabled the district to spend less.

Retirement expenses are up by \$4,000 for the elementary staff and \$15,000 for the secondary support staff, and down \$6,000 for the elementary support staff and \$25,000 for the secondary staff.

In a related matter, the board received good news from the auditing firm of Laine Appold & Co. regarding the district's annual audit.

Company representative Lynn Krueger said the school's financial health improved in 1993-94, with assets and cash up and accounts payable down.

A year earlier, the district experienced a net loss of \$175,000, Krueger pointed out, adding last year's numbers showed a gain of \$76,000, boosting the fund balance from \$101,000 to \$177,000.

Krueger also noted the high school's hot lunch program

made money for the first time in several years.

IN OTHER BUSINESS

In other business Monday, the board:

- Voted in favor of a motion to no longer rent a district-owned house in Gagetown.

Thies recommended the action. He noted collecting rent has been an on-going struggle, but said that his biggest concern is liability due to the poor condition of the house. He suggested the structure be demolished.

The home is currently being rented. Thies said he will notify the tenants of the board's action.

- Approved a motion to offer students who are caught smoking the choice of a suspension or attendance at smoking cessation classes through the Huron County Health Department.

- Hired Jeff LaLonde as the new counselor and psychology teacher. LaLonde, an Eastern Michigan University graduate currently residing in Crosswell, replaces Ronald D'Aoust, who resigned.

- Hired Jim Brinkman as the boys varsity basketball coach and David Cook as the junior varsity coach.

- Learned Thies plans to Please turn to back page.

Student counts up, down in area schools

Last week's statewide student count offered good news in 2 area school districts, bad news in 2 others.

The critical student tally will be averaged with another count taken last February to determine how much state funding schools will receive from the state in the form of "foundation grants." An increase in students means more money, a decrease translates into a loss of funding.

In the Cass City School District, officials counted 5 additional students for a total enrollment of 1,643.

The net increase will be 2.5 students after averaging the number with the last student count, meaning the school will collect an extra \$10,815 based on the school's basic foundation grant of \$4,326.

The news could have been better. School Supt. Ken Micklash said officials had anticipated an increase of 20 to 25 students due to a large freshman class (140 students) and the graduation of 105 students. However, the numbers didn't materialize.

Still, Micklash indicated he's pleased with the relatively stable enrollment seen in the district over the past several years.

Cass City Schools had 1,638 students in 1993-94; 1,608 in 1992-93; 1,610 in 1991-92; 1,587 in 1990-91, and 1,630 in 1989-90.

Among other area districts, Kingston Schools counted one additional student this year. The district had 772 students in class Friday, compared to a tally of 771 students last February.

Owen-Gage Schools officials reported 316 students counted Friday, representing a loss of 7 students compared to the last school year.

The enrollment decline translates into the loss of 3.5 students, or about \$19,300 in funding based on the school's foundation grant of \$5,525 per student.

However, school Supt. Manuel Thies said the district will receive a little more money per student under the state's new funding method. "For all practical purposes, it will all wash out," he added.

Fewer students were also reported by officials in the Ubly Community Schools, where enrollment Friday totaled 912 students, compared

to 927 students last February. "Elementary and junior high (enrollment) remained the same, but we're down by 15 students in the high school," said district Business Manager Mark Tenbusch.

The drop in enrollment will cost the district \$31,500

based on the school's average enrollment and a foundation grant of \$4,200 per student.

Tenbusch said the loss of students will hurt, but it's difficult to say how much considering this is the first year schools are being funded under the guidelines of Pro-

posal A, a funding reform measure passed by Michigan voters last March.

Previously, per-pupil state aid was based on one count, taken on the fourth Friday after Labor Day.

Mother, son die in fire

A Koylton Township woman and her 3-year-old son perished in a house fire Friday morning.

Tuscola County Sheriff's Department detectives are continuing their investigation into the cause of the blaze that claimed the lives of Ellen Marie Hurd, 29, 6289 Mayville Rd., and her son, Joshua, 3.

Another child, David Hurd,

4, escaped with minor injuries. He was transported to Marlette Community Hospital for treatment.

Investigators said Hurd's husband, Timothy, was at work at the time of the blaze, and the couple's other 5 children were in school.

The fire was reported at 11:01 a.m., according to investigators, who said a neighbor saw smoke and drove down to the Hurd resi-

dence, a converted trailer home. The neighbor saw David Hurd running down the road, picked up the boy and called the sheriff's department.

The Burlington Fire Department was dispatched to the scene and the Kingston and Caro fire departments were called to assist along with Marlette Ambulance Service.

Board adopts meet policy, middle school council

The Cass City School Board adopted 2 new policies and made a motion approving the scope of an \$8.3 million bond application during a brief 35-minute regular meeting Monday in the high school board room.

Effective immediately, the board voted to accept language relating to public participation at future board

meetings. In an effort to encourage public involvement, the board voted to provide a time slot for public participation at every meeting of the board.

The time allocated for public participation will be the first item on the agenda, following approval of the minutes. The time allotment is

limited to no more than 30 minutes per meeting unless extended by the board.

Each person, after being recognized by the board, will be allocated 5 minutes to address concerns on matters pertaining to the school district. Additional time may be granted if supported by the board.

Additional opportunities for addressing the board during the meeting may be allowed if the board determines such action is appropriate.

"This (policy) should encourage public involvement, but at the same time give us some policy to fall back on," stated President Jim Turner. "It will also give people a chance to speak without staying for the whole meeting."

Superintendent Ken Micklash reminded that anybody can be added to the official agenda by calling the school office a week in advance.

The board also approved the adoption of a Middle Please turn to back page.

Grants for "Healthy Kids" initiative coming to Thumb

The Department of Social Services has approved 23 contracts totalling some \$3 million, including more than \$120,000 headed for the upper Thumb, to promote health initiatives for children.

As part of Michigan's "Healthy Kids" initiative, the money will fund programs designed to provide outreach services to promote children's health-care coverage.

Among the recipients is the Tuscola County Health Department, which will receive \$122,562.

The grant will fund a project aimed at increasing the number of Medicaid-eligible children receiving dental services in Huron, Sanilac and Tuscola counties. The project will utilize a mobile dental van for dental care at 18 rural sites.

The "Healthy Kids" initiative provides health care coverage through the Medicaid program for children under 16 years of age whose family income is less than 150 percent of the federal poverty level (\$17,766 for a family of 3).

"We are striving in Michigan provide health care coverage for all children, but particularly for 'working poor' families," said DSS Director Gerald Miller.

"This program also eliminates the lack of health care coverage for children as one of the major barriers that can discourage a welfare family from seeking or accepting employment."

The program is part of the

governor's "To Strengthen Michigan Families" initiative.

Earlier this summer, DSS requested proposals from state agencies aimed at one or more of 4 issues related to children's health care:

- Increasing use of health screening services.

- Promoting immunizations and oral health services.

- Promoting enrollment in the Medicaid program, especially for pregnant women and children without health care coverage.

- Developing ombudsman/advocacy programs to promote enrollment in managed care health programs.

A total of 82 proposals totalling more than \$25 million were received. After review of the proposals, 24 were recommended for funding.

In all 38 Michigan counties will receive services in whole or in part through the contracts.

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There are many things that should be avoided during pregnancy. Some of these—like x-rays, rubella, and medicines—are well known. But there are some substances people accept as being so normal that they feel there is no concern.

Alcohol is one of the most common chemicals we use and tragically, reports cite it as the most common cause of preventable birth defects, especially mental retardation.

Women who use alcohol regularly during their pregnancy greatly increase their risk of having a baby with birth defects such as facial malformations, growth retardation, limb defects, and heart abnormalities.

The brain develops throughout the pregnancy and is sensitive to excessive alcohol levels. If the mother drinks two ounces of alcohol daily, there is up to a 20% chance that the baby will have some abnormality.

Does occasional drinking cause any harm? Doctors don't know for sure yet if small amounts increase the risk, but binge drinking is known to have an effect. In fact, if it is taken during the critical period of heart development at about 5-6 weeks, it may cause heart defects in the fetus.

Other commonly used substances such as nicotine and caffeine may also add to the harmful effects of alcohol. A woman should avoid alcohol and other substances during pregnancy and, if in doubt about their safety, check with her doctor.

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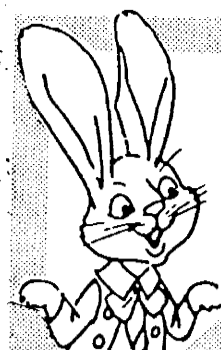

Three weeks ago Ed Connell called attention to an error in this column, informing me that it was 1935, not 1934, that the Chicago Cubs and the Detroit Tigers played in the world series. No, it wasn't the proof reader's fault.

Today's the day for a full confession and let me say that mistake wasn't all that was wrong, although what it said was the truth, but not the whole story.

It's all about that baseball that I talked about getting at the game. That was true. There was a different story printed in 1935.

Now, let me tell you what really happened before I confess what I and the men I went with reported. Before the game the pitcher, Cubs' Lon Warnacke, was shagging balls in the outfield and when he finished, tossed the ball in the stands. One of the group got it and gave it to me and I had it autographed.

Now the rest of the story. In the game we attended Hank Greenberg hit a home run into the left field stands where we were sitting. You guessed it. The guys told me to say it was Greenberg's home run ball that I was bringing home and I agreed.

At the time, my mother owned the Pinconning Journal and she decided to print

a small article about it. One of the instigators of the plan worked at the paper. He cautioned me not to say anything and to "stick to the story."

That didn't bother me much as I knew the worst I could catch was a severe reprimand from the home front.

But later in the week it appeared in the paper, I was petrified. The Bay City Times called and wanted the story with a picture. I'm 12 years old and now I'm scared. The guys in on the deal nixed my plan to make a clean breast of the whole affair.

The picture and the story appeared and the next day the Detroit Times ran a paragraph about it.

It was a horrifying week. I was sure that any moment the police would be knocking on my door and I would be hauled away to jail, where they would throw away the key.

It's still amazing to me today that the fan who snagged the real home run ball never surfaced and we got away without anyone being the wiser.

My mother never did learn what really happened and all the years I lived under her roof I wasn't about to tell her. I was afraid she might make me go to the Times and reveal the truth.

In last Wednesday's Free Press, in a review of Marlon Brando's biography, I read about: "Brando's introduction in Paris to a French diplomat's daughter, whom he instructs to pull on his finger. When she does, he farts."

And I thought, what a coincidence: Just a few days earlier, Lillian Lowell had asked me for the name of a poem that Edgar A. Guest, the late Free Press poet, wrote about the tiny Michigan towns of Ugly, where she lives, and Lum.

And, more coincidence: The annual Free Press/Mazda International Marathon is next Sunday, and it will once again be time to fartlek.

I first read that word 8 years ago in a Free Press ad offering training for marathon runners: "You could use some advice on speedwork, mileage, repeats, fartlek, hills, etc...."

I had no idea what fartlek meant, and neither did my dictionary. My best guess was that proper usage would be something like this: "Marathons are serious business, and runners shouldn't fartlek around, not even when passing gas stations."

slowest and movement invisible to the naked eye (and only dogs can hear the leather creak).

In 1986, when I first wrote about fartlek while sitting, a copy editor advised me it was against Free Press rules to use the four-letter word similar to fartlek. OK. It wasn't too difficult to be childish but not specific. That's why God invented euphemisms.

But it was different a couple of years later, when I wanted to write a scholarly column about Edgar A. Guest once saying that "Ugly sounds like a fart in the bathtub."

This was still before Marlon Brando met the French diplomat's daughter. But I couldn't find a euphemism intellectually precise enough to properly describe that sound in the bathtub. So I gave up on the project and wrote something frivolous about nuclear fission instead.

ERROR AVOIDED

Which may have been a good thing. Because after I recently mentioned Lum, Lillian Lowell sent me a

Guest poem containing this stanza:

Ugly has a gurgling name / Like the bubbling of a spring / And I wonder whence it came. / Lum is quite another thing.

So apparently Guest thought Ugly sounded more like a spring bubbling than gas passing. I apologize for the error I almost made.

Ugly is in Huron County, and Lum in Lapeer County. The first 2 stanzas of Edgar Guest's poem:

On the road to Point Au Barques, / Situated in the Thumb, / Is a narrow sign which marks / Roads to Ugly and to Lum.

And I think, as I go by, / "I must visit them some day!" / Lum is toward the western sky, / Ugly can't be far away.

Lowell wants to frame the poem and hang it in the Ugly Town Hall. But she needs help. She has all the words, but not the title. If anyone out there knows it, let me know.

Onward and Upward. Brando probably had no idea what would happen after that woman pulled his finger.

EUPHEMISMS SIT WELL

Wrong. A marathon expert soon instructed me that fartlek is a Swedish term that roughly translates into "speed play." It describes the method runners use to vary their pace - faster, slower, faster - to enhance their staying power.

You may recall that, as a loyal participatory Free Press employee, I annually try to sit longer than it takes the slowest runner to finish the 26-mile-plus international marathon course. And since learning about fartlek, I enhance my sitting staying power by varying the speed of the up, down and sideways scooches I make in my upholstered leather chair - slow,

ORDINANCE

Elkland Township Fire Run Charges Ordinance

An ordinance to establish charges for fire department services under Michigan Public Act 33 of 1951, as amended (MCL 41.801 etc.), and to provide methods for the collection of such charges and exemption therefrom.

The Township of Elkland, Tuscola County, Michigan ordains:

Section 1: Purpose

The within ordinance is adopted for the purpose of providing financial assistance to the township in the operation of a fire department from those receiving direct benefits from the fire protection service. It is the further purpose of the within ordinance to provide for full funding of the fire department operation which remains, in part, an at-large governmental expense based upon the general benefits derived by all property owners within the township from the existence of a township fire department and its availability to extinguish fires within the township and perform other emergency services.

Section 2: Charges

The following charges shall hereafter be due and payable to the township from a recipient of any of the following enumerated services from the township fire department:

- Structures & others \$300.00 first hour, \$200.00 additional hour, \$500.00 maximum
- Vehicular \$150.00 first hour, \$150.00 additional hour, \$300.00 maximum
- Hazardous Material \$300.00 first hour, \$200 additional hour, \$500.00 maximum

Section 3: Time for payment for run

All of the foregoing charges shall be due and payable within 30 days from the date the service is rendered, and in default of payment shall be collectible through proceedings in district court or in any other court of competent jurisdiction as a matured debt.

Section 4: Exemptions

The following properties and services shall be exempt from the foregoing charges:

- False alarms;
- First involving township buildings, grounds and/or property, and
- Fire service performed outside the jurisdiction of the township under a mutual aid contract with an adjoining municipality.

Section 5: Collection of charges

The township may proceed in district court by suit to collect any monies remaining unpaid and shall have any and all other remedies provided by law for the collection of said charges.

Section 6: Non-exclusive charge

The foregoing rates and charges shall not be exclusive of the charges that may be made by the township for the costs and expenses of maintaining a fire department, but shall only be supplemental thereto. Charges may additionally be collected by the township through general taxation after a vote of the electorate approving the same or by a special assessment established under the Michigan statutes pertinent thereto. General fund appropriations may also be made to cover such additional costs and expenses.

Section 7: Multiple property protection

When a particular service rendered by the township fire department directly benefits more than one person or property, the owner of each property so benefited and each person so benefited where property protection is not involved shall be liable for the payment of the full charge for such service herein before outlined. The interpretation and application of the within section is hereby delegated to the township fire chief subject only to appeal, within the time limits for payment, to the township board and shall be administered so that charges only be collected from the recipients of the service.

Section 8: Severability

Should any provision or part of the within ordinance be declared by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, the same shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the balance of this ordinance which shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 9: Effective date

This ordinance shall take effect immediately. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed 9/13/94.

ORDINANCE

Elkland Township Ordinance Establishing Fire Department

An ordinance to provide that the Elkland Township board may establish the Elkland Township Fire Department; establish jurisdiction and authority of the township board toward fire department; and repeal any parts or portions of ordinances inconsistent herein.

The Township of Elkland, Tuscola County, Michigan, ordains:

Section 1: Scope, purpose and intent

This ordinance is adopted pursuant to the authority granted the township board under Public Act 33 of 1951. The purpose of this ordinance is to provide that the Elkland Township board shall hereby establish the Elkland Township Fire Department to establish jurisdiction and authority of the township board over personnel selections; to establish authority to adopt rules and regulations for the conduct of personnel and maintenance of equipment; to employ and appoint a chief, fire fighters and officers, and to prescribe the powers and duties of fire department volunteers and employees.

Section 2: Fire department establishment, funding, powers and duties

There is hereby established the Elkland Township Fire Department. The township board, acting by resolution, shall appoint such persons who, based on experience, training, and qualifications would, in its discretion, best perform the duties associated with fire protection to the citizens of Elkland Township.

The township board shall approve an annual appropriation for the operation and maintenance of the department and its equipment, and for that purpose shall have the authority to use general funds, to initiate the creation of a special assessment district and levy assessments, sell bonds, establish user fees, or raise revenues in any other manner provided for under law for the operation and maintenance of the department; it shall provide for payment of any debts incurred incidental to its continued operation; it shall purchase necessary equipment, and/or construct public buildings for uses incidental to the maintenance and operation of a fire department. The township board shall establish rules and regulations for the operations of the department and the care of the equipment.

Section 3: Chief; duties

The township board shall appoint a chief who shall be the chief administrative officer of the department. The chief shall be accountable to the township board for the efficient and effective operation of the department, and for the department's compliance with all state laws, township ordinances and policies. The chief shall serve at the pleasure of the board.

The chief shall recommend, subject to township board approval, the appointment of an assistant chief, captain(s), lieutenant(s) engineer (drivers) and fire fighters as may be deemed necessary.

The chief shall develop written administrative rules to increase efficiency and effectiveness of the department, including pre-planning and post-incident critiques, regulations, assignment and scheduling of personnel, and shall plan for the long-range needs of the department.

The chief shall review all personnel and operating problems with and shall report monthly to the township board. A written report shall be filed annually with the township board.

As needed, the chief shall notify the township supervisor of major problems or issues that require board action. When such problems must be resolved immediately and it is impractical or will endanger the health, safety or welfare of the township to wait until the next board meeting to resolve the issue, the township supervisor shall be empowered to resolve the issue or problem, subject to the subsequent approval of the board.

The chief shall hold regular department informational and training meetings.

The chief may incur expenditures against the department budget as appropriated by the township board. The chief will monitor the unencumbered balances remaining in the department budget and shall make timely recommendations for budget amendments at such time as the need for such amendments become known. The department's expenditures shall not exceed the amounts appropriated. Capital outlay purchases that exceed \$20,000 shall conform to township policy regarding written quotes and competitive bidding.

The chief shall also be responsible for the following:

- Supervise the extinguishment of all fires that endanger the health, safety and welfare of Elkland Township.
- Enforce township fire ordinances or fire prevention codes.
- Ensure that all personnel are trained and qualified for the duties that they are expected to fulfill.
- Ensure that fire inspection and community fire prevention programs are conducted.
- Ensure that all equipment and buildings are properly maintained and in good working order.
- Ensure that all department personnel comply with departmental and board rules, regulation and policies.

Section 4: Officers

There shall be a chain of command established among the department officers in descending order of rank, from the chief to the assistant chief, captain(s), lieutenant(s), engineers to fire fighters. Each rank shall obey the orders of their superior officers. Temporary officers may be appointed by the senior officer present at any emergency to ensure the continuity of the chain of command. Such temporary appointments shall terminate when the officer with the given responsible becomes available.

The chief shall establish a job description for each rank. Each command officer shall be responsible that orders are carried out by subordinates.

Section 5: Fire fighters

Applicants for vacant fire fighter positions shall be of good character, possess a good driving record and shall be screened by a physician of the township board's choice and at township expense. The physician's examination shall determine if the applicant has any pre-existing conditions that would preclude the applicant from performing the duties associated with fire fighting.

All fire fighters shall serve an initial probationary period for a period of not less than six months. At the discretion of the chief, the probationary period may be extended. At the conclusion of the minimum probationary period, the chief may recommend that a probationary fire fighter that has met all of the qualifications contained in the fire fighter job description be given permanent fire status by the township board.

A probationary fire fighter shall be entitled to all compensations and benefits afforded to permanent fire fighters, but shall be restricted to perform only those duties for which he/she has been specifically trained. A probationary fire fighter shall not be issued department insignia or badges. Use of emergency signal devices on the private vehicle of a probationary fire fighter shall be at the chief's discretion.

Section 6: Disciplinary procedure

Violations of any township ordinances, board rules, department administrative regulations or convictions of a felony shall subject any personnel involved to disciplinary proceedings. A violation shall be documented by the chief upon good cause shown or when a violation occurs in his presence.

The chief shall provide a copy of the written reprimand to an alleged violator. The written reprimand shall state the rule was allegedly violated, the nature of any disciplinary action taken and the consequences of any further occurrences. Disciplinary action may range from a reprimand to a suspension, demotion or dismissal, or a combination of any of the above, depending on:

- Seriousness of the violation;
- Consequences to the safety of the others by the violation;
- Potential harm to the department of the township;
- Prior record of the individual, and
- The degree of wantonness, if any, of the act.

Any disciplinary action may be appealed to the township board, who shall affirm, deny or modify the disciplinary action taken by the chief. The township board may, on its own initiative, bring charges against any fire department personnel. Disciplinary action initiated by the township board shall follow the above procedures, except that the responsibilities designated above to the chief shall be performed by the township board.

In addition to such administrative rules that may be promulgated by the chief, theft of township property or other property at the scene of an emergency shall be cause for dismissal.

Fire fighters shall not respond to emergencies, meetings or training sessions while under the influence of alcohol or any controlled substances.

Section 7: Compensation

Compensation to fire fighters shall be in such amounts as may be determined from time to time by the township board. The department shall keep accurate records that indicate the amount of compensable time served by all personnel. The time records submitted monthly to the township board for payment and all such time slips shall be signed by the department personnel designated on the time slip.

Section 8: Public contact

The fire chief or his/her designee may release facts regarding fires or other emergencies to the news media. All other personnel shall refer all media inquiries to the chief or the designee.

Members of the public will be allowed in the fire station only when accompanied by a member of the department. The public will always be treated courteously and professionally by all department personnel.

Section 9: Emergency responses

When responding to emergencies, all personnel will drive emergency vehicles with appropriate concern for the safety of the public and defensive driving. Use of emergency signals on vehicles shall be considered a request for the right-of-way from other drivers.

Use of emergency signal equipment shall be permitted only when the department has been officially dispatched to an emergency.

Section 10: Department equipment

Protective gear shall be worn when engaged in fire fighting and while on the fire scene.

Lost or damaged equipment shall be reported as soon as possible to an officer. Township property shall be disposed only with the prior approval of the township board. All department-issued equipment shall be returned to the chief by personnel leaving the department.

Section 11: Use of fire station

Only township-owned vehicles and equipment may be kept at the fire station. Department equipment shall not be borrowed for private use.

Private vehicles must be parked in designated areas only.

Alcohol and controlled substances shall not be brought into the fire station.

Section 12: Soliciting donations

All fund-raising activities shall have the prior approval of the township board, and all revenues solicited in the name of the fire department shall be deposited with the township treasurer. Such funds will be disbursed by the township board.

Any fundraising activities on behalf of the fire department, yet not solicited in the name of the township or the fire department shall be conducted by a tax-exempt organization that has been designated as a 501-c-3 charity by the Internal Revenue Service.

The personnel of the fire department are authorized to incorporate a tax-exempt charitable organization that shall be known as "The Elkland Township Fire Fighters Association." The purpose of the association shall be to provide for the social development of personnel and the betterment of fire protection in the township. The association shall be incorporated under the laws of the State of Michigan, with bylaws approved by the township board. The association may elect its own officers. The financial records of the association shall be audited by the township board.

Section 13: Standard operational procedure

Standard operational procedure is to be reevaluated during January of each year by the chief with all officers, then presented to the township board for its review.

Section 14: Savings clause

Should any portion of this ordinance be declared unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect unaffected by the portion which might be so declared to be unenforceable.

Section 15: Effective date:

This ordinance shall take effect on 9-13-94. All ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Program's future debated CRP payments due soon

With approval of the FY 1995 USDA Budget, annual rental payments for land enrolled in the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service's (ASCS) popular Conservation Reserve program will be made within the next few days to landowners across the state.

Under the Conservation Reserve Program, farmers enrolled selected land in the program for a period of 10 years during which they are required to ensure that sound conservation measures are installed on the land, including the establishment of wildlife cover, tree planting or other practices that help reduce erosion and provide improved wildlife habitat. No crops can be planted on the land, except for wildlife food plots.

Although it has been 2 years since land could be enrolled in the program, a debate is already starting in Congress, as part of the 1995 Farm Bill discussions, on the future of this program.

The Conservation Reserve

Program provides many benefits to the public.

In addition to reducing farm program expenditures, controlling soil erosion and protecting water quality, CRP encourages the enhancement of wildlife and forestry resources. The Conservation Reserve Program is also widely credited for the strong resurgence of pheasant and other wildlife species in Michigan and other Midwestern states, in recent years.

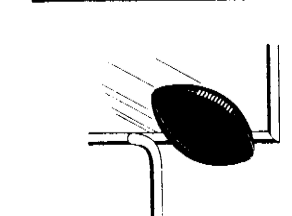

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Friday in circuit court

Berlanga waives arraignment

A Flint man charged in the Aug. 2 hammer beating of another Flint resident last August waived his arraignment Friday in Tuscola County Circuit Court.

Jesus Pablo Berlanga, 18, now faces a pre-trial hearing set for Oct. 17. Bond in the case was continued at \$250,000.

Berlanga is accused of assaulting an acquaintance, Richard Gordon Mills, 20, Flint, with a hammer at an Arbella Township residence Aug. 2.

Mills suffered multiple blunt-force wounds. He was treated at a Saginaw hospital and has since been released.

Investigators said Mills was with a group of gang members in Flint the night before the assault, and that he witnessed the shooting of a 12-year-old girl. The gang members apparently were hiding out at the Arbella Township residence where Mills was attacked.

In other circuit court proceedings last week:

•Terry L. Noble, 27, Attica, was found guilty of attempted prison escape following a 2-day jury trial. The jury returned the verdict after deliberating for about 2 hours, according to court records.

A, the Cass City School District received \$3,555 for each of its students, but the figure can't be compared to the new "foundation grant" of \$4,326 per student.

Micklash explained the foundation grant includes funding for other school expenses such as transportation, vocational education and social security costs. Last year's per-pupil funding included none of those.

Another big change centers on the makeup of school budgets.

In Cass City, for example, local taxes made up 40 to 45 percent of the budget before Proposal A. Now, local taxes account for 12 to 13 percent of the budget and state funding, 85 to 87 percent.

One thing hasn't changed, and that's the importance of having each student in class when the counts are conducted, Micklash said.

He noted that in the future, there will be funding adjustments for inflation.

The district will also receive increases in its foundation grant until the school reaches the state's base figure of \$5,000 per student. "(But) it will take us 3 or 4 years before we would get to that point," Micklash said.

School Athletic Council. The duties of the middle school council, which will include middle school teachers that are not coaches, are the same as the High School Athletic Council in all matters concerning middle school student athletics.

It is the board's contention that a council consisting of teachers, as well as coaches, administrators and students, who know the students will better serve the goal of the council.

Micklash told the committee, "An average cost associated with a bond application is between \$1,500 and \$1,800."

Also Monday, Dorland Kuntz, community education director, presented to the board an update on com-

community services relating to enrichment classes, Saginaw Valley State University offerings, and adult high school completion classes.

Kuntz informed the board that the adult education classes have a total enrollment of 66 students in 5 classes. Kuntz said enrollment is down a little from last year "because of the changeover," referring to the consortium formed with Caro Community Schools.

SVSU, which offers 10

The enrichment classes have 200 students signed up in 25 classes. Kuntz noted there is still time to sign up for classes offered at the high school.
