16th annual Bach Festival opens Tuesday

The 16th annual Bach Festival will open Tuesday at 8:15 p.m. at the First Presbyterian Church in Caro featuring Marilyn Mason on the organ and the Everest Quartet with Don Th. Jaeger,

The Festival resumes Friday, Nov. 25, in Cass City. This performance will be held at the First Presbyterian Church at 8:15 p.m. The world premiere of "Tales of Chelm" will have taken place only 2 weeks earlier, Nov. 12, in Midland, Texas.

"Tales from Chelm" (4 pieces for string quartet) was commissioned by Jack and Linda Hoeschler of Minneapolis, Minn., in honor of their children, Kirsten and Fritz. The quartet was inspired by the legendary children's stories about Chelm and its inhabitants. Chelm, a fictitious town in Eastern Europe, is noted for the fact that almost every member of its population is a fool. (For how the town came into existence, see The Fools of Chelm and Their History" by Isaac Bashevis Singer.)

Paul Schoenfield is one of n increasing number of

composers whose music is inspired by the whole range of musical experience popular styles both American and foreign, vernacular and folk traditions, as well as the "normal" historical traditions of cultivated music-making, often treated with sly twists.

Schoenfield, who has studied mathematics as well as music, holds degrees from Carnegie-Mellon University and the University of Arizona. He has lived on a kibbutz in Israel, and was for many years a freelance composer/pianist in the Minneapolis/St. Paul area.

The members of the Everest Quartet have performed throughout the United States, Europe, and the Far East. They hold degrees and performer's certificates from 3 of this country's leading music schools: The Cleveland Institute of Music, the Eastman School of Music, and Indiana University. Founded in 1992, the quartet spent 2 years as proteges of the Cleveland Quartet.

Program at Middle School

Vets gather for special observance

A special Veteran's Day observance at Cass City fiddle School Friday offered students an up close and personal look at area veterans who served with U.S. forces in nearly every conflict from World War I to Operation Desert Storm.

The day began with a flag raising ceremony in front of the school, with members of Veterans of Foreign War Post 544, Cass City, on hand. Later, 14 veterans, includ-

ing Tuscola County's only surviving World War I veteran, U.S. Army Sgt. Vernon McConnell, 98, of Cass City, met with students during an assembly held in the gymnasium. Each of the veterans appeared in uniform.

Following the Pledge of Allegiance and National Anthem, Jack Esau, a veteran who served with the U.S. Marine Corps, introduced several fellow World War II servicemen, including Rob-

veteran and a prisoner of war, and Norman Gray, a U.S. Army veteran who earned the purple heart. Also introduced were Andy Kozan, U.S. Army; Oscar Brooks, U.S. Army; Hazen Guinther, U.S.M.C., and Lawrence Englehart, U.S. Army.

Representing the Korean war was Ken Jensen, a U.S. Navy vet who served with the U.S. Marine Corps.

Four others in attendance served in Vietnam: Ron Lomasney (U.S. Army), Keith Adelberg (U.S.A.F.), Joe Merchant (U.S. Army) and Bob Rockwell (U.S.

Army). The youngest of the group was Aaron LaPonsie, a U.S. Army veteran who served during Operation Desert

Revised budget shows school to end year with slight surplus

A revised budget was cent of the budget and was adopted by the Cass City School Board Monday at its regular meeting and it showed an increase in available funds over the 1993-94 school year and an increase in the school's fund balance.

Because of the change in he way schools are funded, me new state aid formula will give the district over \$850,000 more than the total received for the 1993-94

Part of the revenue increase will be eaten up by a change in payment of teacher benefits. In previous years, social security and FICA pay-

ents were made by the state. That cost was shifted back to the district and Supt. Ken Micklash said that it amounted to 21.86 percent of instruction costs. The cost for these fringes increased about \$318,729

Another increased cost that approaches \$100,000 is the way the special education is paid for with the Tuscola Inrmediate School District,

Micklash pointed out. With extra money available, 2 172 teaching positions were added in the system. If budget-figures are accurate, and in previous years budgets have been conservative, finishing better than anticipated, the cash balance at the

end of the year will increase out \$37,000 to \$829,596. Micklash pointed out that the fund was about 11 per-

"It was a long 2 weeks," she said. "I was 8 months pregnant. I couldn't jump up and down, but I could yell pretty

loud." Sheppard, who received her first copies of the book on her birthday, Sept. 1, indicated the response has been good.

Cass Cityan loses 6 family members in crash

A Cass City woman lost 6 family's strong faith in God of her 8 brothers and sisters in a freak traffic accident on I-94 about 100 miles north of Chicago last week.

The tragedy sent shock waves through the First Baptist Church of Cass City, where Amy (Willis) Moody attends along with her husband, Alan, who serves as the church's assistant pastor and head of youth ministries.

The accident occurred at about 10:30 a.m. Nov. 8 on Interstate 94 just south of

into flames after striking a 90-pound piece of steel bracketing that holds mud flaps onto trucks.

Investigators said the bracket punctured, then lodged in the vehicle's gas tank, causing an explosion.

Five of the children - Peter, 6 weeks, Elizabeth, 3, Hank, 7, Sam, 9, and Joe, 11 - were dead at the scene of the accident. A 13-year-old son, Ben, survived, but had severe burns on 90 percent of his body. He died Wednes-

day morning.
Mr. and Mrs. Willis are listed in stable condition at Froedtert Memorial Lutheran Hospital in the Milwaukee area, where they are recovering from severe burns to their hands and faces.

According to Alan Moody, the family was on its way to a birthday celebration when the accident occurred.

"It was her (Amy's) brother Dan's birthday and they were headed up to Watertown, Wis., to take him birthday cards and birthday gifts. Moody said Amy, 26, is the oldest of the Willis children. Dan, 22, and another brother, Toby, 24, are both married.

STRONG FAITH

Moody, who returned to Cass City briefly early this week before heading back to Milwaukee to be with his wife and her family, said the

- knowing they will see their children again in Heaven — has carried them throughout the ordeal.

In fact, he said, Willis, who is pastor of the Parkwood Baptist Church in Chicago, and his wife have become spiritual celebrities of sorts at the hospital, where staff members having a hard time dealing with the tragic accident are being encouraged to talk to the couple.

"They're doing really well. They're open and talkative about it," Moody said. "There's a confidence in knowing what the Bible says is fact, and the guarantee that God gives us — that He's in control. It's times like this that you live by faith."

The accident has received media attention from coast to coast, including USA Today. Mr. and Mrs. Willis have been inundated with requests

Proposed increases in lunch and breakfast prices in the Owen-Gage School District were nixed by the Board of Education Monday night.

School Supt. Manuel Thies recommended that the board approve a 15-cent increase in lunch prices — from \$1 to \$1.15 at the junior/senior high and from \$1.35 to \$1.50 at the elementary - and a 10-cent hike for breakfast, from 80 cents to 90 cents in both buildings.

Thies, who noted there hasn't been a lunch price hike in 2 years, said he feels the adjustments are needed because of a lack of participation in the breakfast program among upperclassmen, resulting in a greater cost to

the district. "At the junior/senior high, we have, on most days, somewhere in the range of 12 to 15 students" who eat breakfast, and none of those are juniors and seniors, he

There was very little discussion following Thies' presentation. Board members took no action on the proposed price increases.

Owen-Gage officials have struggled for years with red ink in the school lunch program, which has built up some significant deficits in the past.

In recent months, Thies has implemented a number of cost-cutting measures. The junior/senior high lunch program is still operating in the red, but the situation has improved, according to the superintendent, who said the elementary lunch program is now close to breaking even.

POLICIES APPROVED

In other business during the monthly meeting, the board approved a pair of policies related to sex education and sexual harassment.

Junior/senior high Principal Joanne Hopper presented the policies, the first of which establishes a Sex Education **Advisory Committee**

The committee will be charged with reviewing materials and methods of instruction and making recommendations to the board regarding changes in materials and/or methods of instruction. The committee will also act as a liaison between school and community, assess local needs and reactions, and foster understand-

Ways to Stop **Smoking**

With the Great American Smokeout coming up on November 18th, it is time to think about stopping smoking again.

Most smokers want to quit smoking and have tried to stop at least once. Being successful is the hard part. The most important thing is having a real desire to quit. Without that, no amount of help from doctors or classes will keep you from smoking.

Even when you decide to stop smoking it may take several attempts, perhaps trying different methods, before you succeed.

Besides your own desire to stop, the most effective single thing is the encouragement of your physician. Talk to him. He can suggest helpful hints and perhaps prescribe medicines.

Classes or support groups can help give you much-needed encouragement and incentive. Their educational tips can be very helpful. Regardless which method you may choose, classes are worthwhile.

Behavioral methods involve choosing other activities over smoking. A person is taught new habits to replace the old. Biofeedback and relaxation techniques can help people who respond to stress by reaching for a cigarette.

Some methods involve aversion to the side effects of nicotine. By smoking excessively for a short period, a person develops symptoms of nicotine toxicity which cause a person to associate smoking with an unpleasant experience.

Recently, nicotine patches have become available which appear to help certain persons break the habit. There are also clonidine patches which reduce the side effects of nicotine withdrawal which can help once a person has completely quit.

After participating in an annual group shopping trip with about 20 ladies, it occurred to me that there are as many approaches to shopping as there are to life.



followed what he preached, family, grades and football in that order.

Check the record. MSU football players in the last 10 years lead the Big Ten with 54 academic all-conference players. If memory serves, there was a Rhodes Scholar sandwiched in there someplace.

The new man will come in and be sure to have a honeymoon period where all frustrated State fans will rally behind him.

If he fails to meet expectations and they want to throw the rascal out, he'll become

Did story lead to demotion?

Did something I wrote in August help cause the muchpublicized demotion of accompanied by denials. Deputy Fire Chief Gordon Giganic, who got the bad news while the ashes from Detroit's way-too-many

What I wrote 3 months ago was that firefighter Caleb Matlock, while on the public payroll and at the order of Fire Marshal Robert Michalik, waxed and polished a privately owned motorboat, allegedly so it would look nice when purchased by

But Stein never had any intention of buying the boat, which belonged to a friend of Michalik's. Both Michalik and Matlock were reprimanded by Stein and Fire Commissioner Harold Watkins.

So who tipped me to the story? It was a phone caller claiming to be "a longtime member of the Detroit Fire' Department." He wouldn't reveal his name for fear of losing his job, or at least losing the best regards of his superiors.

I checked out his charges with everyone involved and they turned out to be true, so I wrote about them.

Incidentally, a couple of weeks later, the same anonymous voice gave me another news tip about the Fire Department. But investigation proved it phony, so I left it out of the newspaper. That's how it works here; if a false charge has no known, veri-

fied source, it doesn't deserve publicity, even though

Back to Deputy Chief Giganic: He thought he was demoted for telling a TV reporter the city was poorly prepared to fight the Devil's Night fires, and for allegedly lying to Fire Commissioner Watkins about what he said on television. Giganic denies

Deputy Fire Commissioner Stein told me the question is moot because, before one Devil's Night fire was set, it had already been decided to demote Giganic "for other reasons.

Giganic's attorney told me Giganic was having a difficult time guessing what those other reasons might be. Could one be that Stein and Watkins think Giganic was the anonymous source for the embarrassing boat-polishing incident that I made public? If so, Giganic denies communicating with me in any manner.

As previously stated, I don't know, and Stein insists the thought never even occurred to him or Watkins.

OK, so what are the other for demoting reasons Giganic?

"It wouldn't be fair to Giganic to put them in the newspaper," Stein said.

Now for the cops: Recently I also embarrassed the Detroit Police Department by describing the scary experience of Royal Oak residents Ralph and Billye Diaz and their 3 children. On Sept. 1, their car and several others northbound on Woodward were damaged by bricks thrown by young men hanging around an abandoned

The Diazes, behind a shattered windshield, and other victims sped to the nearby 12th (Palmer Park) Precinct to get some cops to arrest the life-threatening throwers. The 12th Precinct said they'd have to go to the 11th

(Davison) Precinct because the crime was committed on northbound Woodward instead of southbound.

According to Ralph Diaz, the subsequent delay gave the punks around 15 more minutes to continue hitting cars with stones, bricks and bottles.

Last week, Lt. Preston McBride of the 12th Precinct told me officer training had been "stepped up and intensified to make sure it never happens again." He also said the department had apologized to the Diazes.

Venison booklet available

Properly handled, Michigan venison can be among the best wild game you've

ever eaten.

How to field dress, process, cook and preserve venison to assure high quality is detailed in "Michigan Venison," a 43-page booklet that is available through most Michigan State University

Extension county offices for \$2 a copy.

The booklet can also be ordered by writing to the MSU Bulletin Office, 10B Agriculture Hall, MSU, East Lansing, MI 48824-1039, or by calling 517-355-0240.

The booklet details how to field dress the venison carcass, process it into various cuts - - from round steaks to stewing meat - - and use them in meal preparation.

The meal preparation section of the booklet contains 23 pages of recipes ranging

from broiled venison steak to potato sausage.

The booklet also contains a venison nutrition chart that compares calories, cholesterol and percent of fat in venison and other meats.

The booklet was coauthored by Glenn Dudderar, MSU Extension fisheries and wildlife specialist; Alden Booren, MSU Extension food science and human nutrition specialist, and Sandra Andrews, former MSU Extension specialist in food science and human nu-

Flexibility

Developing and maintaining flexibility of the chest, low back and leg musculature is an essential part of any exercise program. Combining flexibility, a properly designed weight program and aerobic exercise will play a large role in maintaining a desired body weight, improving muscle tone, preventing injury, maintaining posture, and providing an increased level of energy.

Two of the biggest mistakes that people make when stretching are hurrying through the stretch and rocking or bouncing. For proper stretching of a muscle to occur, a stretch should be maintained for at least 30 seconds, preferably one minute. When stretching a muscle, extend until you feel a good stretch and hold that position. Rocking or bouncing in an attempt to stretch the muscle more will defeat the desired effect by actually causing the muscle to shorten rather than lengthen.

Stretching may seem like a waste of time, but in the long run can help limit those injuries that can keep you from enjoying your workout, sport or activities.

Copies of the book are available at Rawson Memorial Library in Cass City, as well as at Christian book stores and from Sheppard. The area resident, who is scheduled for a book signing at Walden Books, Saginaw, in December, has already sold 150 copies herself.

"I have another children's book I'm trying to place right now. It's a book of folk tales," she said, adding scripture verses are incorporated into the new book.

Looking back, Sheppard said writing has always played an important part in her life.

She recalled starting to write poetry when she was 10, and that her mother would send her stories in to a Sunday school paper.

"I really started writing seriously about 10 years ago, but I didn't have my first article published until 1988.

Christ publication, featured pointers on how church members can offer their minister emotional support. "The interesting thing about that is, I sold that article 9

times," she said.

It's a topic Sheppard is well acquainted with; her husband, Rick, is pastor of the Trinity United Methodist Church in Cass City.

"Since then, I've sold about 40 different pieces to, maybe, 30 different Christian magazines," Sheppard continued.

FAMILY ISSUES

Despite the success with a children's book, most of her writing targets adult audiences. "I write about family issues, church issues, raising kids," she said.

The Sheppards have 3 of their own: Christine, 12, Scott, 10, and Laura, 17 months.

"They're probably my best and worst critics," Sheppard joked. "That's the nice thing about writing; it's something you can do with a family."

With her first book and several articles behind her now, Sheppard acknowledged the accomplishments along with contacts she's made with editors and publishers along the way will help in her future writing endeavors.

She noted her successes have definitely boosted her confidence.

"I'm not afraid of editors anymore," she added, smiling. "I'm not afraid to call one up and say, 'I have this book, would you be interested in taking a look at it?"

The rejection letters still come in now and again, but Sheppard seems to thrive on the challenge.

We were met by an eager,


well-informed and courteous student body. Cass City can be proud of these young people, their teachers and administrators. Hope is still alive!


