On video tape

Village pioneers recall early days in Cass City

learning more about the history of Cass City — what it was like to run a business, heal the sick or teach in a rural school years ago can satisfy their curiosity by visiting the local library.

A "Living History" videotape series, featuring interviews with a number of Cass City's longtime citizens, is available for checkout free of charge at Rawson Memorial Library.

The series is the result of a joint effort between the library and the Cass City Historical Society.

Historical society member Marian Keating, who spearheaded the project, explained the goal has been to capture the treasury of historical information and memories held by a number of the area's older residents.

"I guess what we're really concentrating on at the

Area residents interested in present time are people who were involved at the beginning of activities in Cass City," she said.

"We haven't had any real criteria" in selecting individuals to be interviewed, said library Director Barbara Hutchinson. "We've just picked people who were prominent in the community, or someone who has an interesting story."

The local history series curfently consists of 10 tapes, each averaging about 90 minutes, with more volumes planned.

Hutchinson said the interviews typically involve 3 or 4 interviewees and a moderator. Local resident Frank Pemberton is taping the interviews using home video equipment, she explained, adding the historical society is looking into purchasing some videotaping equiptaped in August 1993 and feature Ray Fleenor, Herb. Bartle and George Cole talking about Cass City's early

In the months that followed, a host of other citizens were interviewed, including Dr. H.T. Donahue, the late Arthur Holmberg, Dr. Edwin Fritz and the late Warren Wood. Another volume features Helen Baker and Lucy Auten, both longtime active citizens, teachers and school board members in Cass City.

Another interview showcases former businessmen Bernard "Bun" Ross, Jim Gross and Arlan Hartwick, who recall economic development in the village and the arrival of Walbro Corp. to the community.

"One recent interview that was really interesting was with Jim Milligan and Clarence Merchant on the Hutchinson said. "We reschool teachers and we have some shots of a rural school still in existence in Huron

Last week, Jack Esau, local historian and veteran, interviewed 3 Cass City men who had interesting stories to tell about their experiences in the

The tape features the area's only surviving World War I veteran. Vernon McConnell: James "Jay" Crane, who was stationed at Hickam Field Air force Base in Pearl Harbor when the Japanese attacked Dec. 7, 1941, and Bob Speirs, a machine gunner with the 8th Air Force who spent 12 1/2 months as a prisoner of war at the infamous Stalag 17 after he was shot down over Berlin in April

24-hour care plan

2 new physicians to practice in Cass City

January will mark not only the start of a new year, but the arrival of 2 new physician groups to Cass City.

The news, announced Monday, culminates an intensive 8 weeks of interviews conducted by new Hills and Dales General Hospital President and CEO Deborah A. Sopo, who began her duties just 14 weeks ago.

Sopo said the new physician groups, ECI/Emergency Consultants Inc. and Family First Community Health Services — will officially join the community Jan. 1, 1995.

ECI/Emergency Consultants Inc. will staff the hospital's emergency department 24 hours a day, 7 days a week with on-site providers starting at 7 a.m. Jan. 1.

"Within 6 months, ECI will have a permanent core group of board certified physicians and mid-level practitioners, such as physician assistants and nurse practitioners, placed (at the hospital)," Sopo said. "It is the mutual goal of Hills and Dales Hospital and ECI to assist in relocating these providers to our community,

"We believe expanding our emergency services will better serve the needs of our community," Sopo commented.

"Twenty-four hours a day on-site coverage will also allow Hills and Dales Hospital to enhance its immediate care clinic, which has been a popular service for many patients who find they need medical attention when their doctor's office is not open.

The change will also benefit physicians already serving Cass City, by all but eliminating the need for them to leave their practices to handle emergency cases. "That sometimes caused delays for their patients," Sopo said, adding patients can be referred back to their own physicians for follow-up treatment.

the hospital is opening its own primary care physician office — Hills and Dales Ambulatory Center.

"This is the first step in reengineering Hills and Dales Hospital into a health care system," Sopo explained.
"Our goal is to provide the majority of services locally by bringing health providers to our patients."

The ambulatory center, in essence, will be a family practice based within the hospital, according to Sopo. who emphasized the doctor and other medical personnel on staff will remain in the community, allowing patients to get to know them and vice versa.

The ambulatory center's office hours will be published in the near future.

"We are in the process of negotiating hours with ECI," Sopo said. "Services will be available 5 or 6 days a week with early and late clinics available certain days of the

to make appointments after Dec. 15 by calling 872-2121 and asking for the ambulatory center.

Dr. Thomas C. Zguris will be the hospital's regional medical director for the emergency department and ambulatory center. A Michigan native, he is board certified in emergency medi-

FAMILY FIRST

The other physician group moving into town, Family First Community Health Services, will be located in Dr. Richard's Hall's former office at 4674 Hill Street. Dr. Hall closed his office in August after 17 years in the community.

Staffing the new office will be Dr. Ernest J. Sorini and Kevin Was, a certified physicians assistant. Appointments may be made by calling 872-4725 or 872-4446.

Sorini is the owner and

First, a company that owns and operates multi-site Rural Health Clinics.

"Since Dr. Sorini was born and raised in Montana, it is understandable why he is dedicated to providing needed primary care services to individuals in medically under served areas such as Cass City," Sopo

Was, who received his training in the Marines, has been a physician's assistant with Family First in Westland for 8 years. He has family ties to Cass City and is looking forward to relocating here, Sopo added. "Even though (he) is a licensed family medicine specialist, he has a special affinity for pediatrics care."

In the future, Sopo hopes to bring specialists into the community on a rotational

Coach Reif reports

Rookie debaters offer interesting challenges

As a team compention, debate hasn't risen to the heights of popularity enjoyed by basketball, football, baseball and other high school sports.

But the activity, which combines public speaking skills with effective persuasion, is equally as challenging as its counterparts on the court, gridiron or diamond. Maybe even more so.

Jane Reif, a teacher and debate coach at Cass City High School, has 18 students in grades 9-12 involved in debate this year, and not one of them had a stitch of experience when they walked into her classroom.

"Their first competition was their first debate," Reif said, adding preparing rookie debaters for their first meet offers some interesting challenges.

"They have no idea that what I have told them is true. It's really like trying to teach someone basketball in a classroom, without a court

and without a basketball." Still, the students are doing surprisingly well.

"We're over .500 for the whole group. That's pretty unusual for the first time out," Reif pointed out. "It's not unusual for a team to go through an entire season without a win.'

One of Reif's teams, composed of Natalie Ramsey and Becky Smith, is 5-2 on the year, and Ramsey has garnered top speaker points in all but one of her 6 rounds of debate so far.

This is Cass City's eighth year of involvement in debate, which is offered as a combination of Reif's Performance English class and as an extracurricular activ-

Although Reif's students have enjoyed some success over the years - one of her teams qualified for state competition last year in Grand Rapids — the teacher confided Cass City doesn't have an established program yet, with students remaining active in debate for 3 or 4

vears "It's just like any other

class; you have choices to make," she said, referring to the many demands on students' time.

"This year we're concentrating on the novice and JV levels of competition (because) we did not have people coming back with experience."

The debate season runs from September through January, and schools can participate in league or tournament competition. Cass City, a member of the 14school Lower Thumb Debate League, is active in

Each year in March, a national debate topic is chosen, and all schools focus on that topic — this year it's immigration - throughout the

Reif said debate teams from each school are composed of 4 students - 2 affirmative and 2 negative speakers.

In competition, she explained, affirmative speakers must present their arguments in 3 parts: they must explain why the status quo is causing harm, reason why the status quo can't solve itself, and present a plan for change and specifics on how to implement that plan. Negative speakers then must refute the affirmative arguments.

The winner in each round is decided by a single judge, who takes into account the speakers' analysis, reasoning, organization, refutation, evidence and delivery.

"The students are rated not only on the team performance, but also on their speaking ability," Reif said. Debate, she emphasized, is not a matter of walking into a competition and offering an argument off the top of your head.

Compared to pure participation activities such as theaire, "debate is more academically challenging. You have to figure out not only what to do, but you have to have the research and knowledge," Reif said. "It's



When to Remove the Tonsils

Tonsils aren't taken out as much as they used to be, but there are still a number of good reasons to have them

When the tonsils are taken out for the right reasons, your child will have fewer infections with strep (though the number of viral infections is not decreased), less swelling of the glands in the neck, and less chance of getting mono. There will most likely be less mouth breathing and less absence from school due to illness.

The main reason for removing the tonsils is recurrent infections--four or five documented strep infections in a year. If an abscess develops in or behind a tonsil, it needs to be drained and treated with antibiotics. The tonsils should be removed a couple months later when the inflammation has subsided. Occasionally, if only one tonsil is enlarging, the tonsils are removed to rule out a tu-

Another problem is when the tonsils or adenoids are large enough to cause obstruction to breathing. This may result in sleep apnea (periods of 10 to 30 seconds where the child does not take a breath). Your child may show fatigue and poor performance in school.


The adenioids are usually removed because of airway obstruction, chronic adenoid infection, or recurrent fluid build-up in the ear.

The tonsils and adenoids are often taken out at the same time even though there are different reasons for removing them. The doctor will make sure that any obstruction to breathing is not caused by polyps, nasal congestion of other causes that would need to be treated in other ways.





If that proves out, look for a world golf senior tour, although most seniors remember the comparatively meager purses they played for when young and appear more satisfied than their younger counter-

parts. No need to cite other examples of striving for somerent situation is. Millionaires want to become multi-millionaires and billionaires are always in the news with plans

to make more and more. It's harder to find examples of people who are satisfied with their life and have no great need to make it better. Always contented.





Offer free tests for many women

The Michigan Department of Public Health has eliminated charges to clients of the breast and cervical health screening program. They now offer free mammograms and pap tests for all women who qualify. Prior to this, a woman paid on a sliding fee scale based on her income and the number of people living in her household. The cost ranged from free to \$85.00.

The breast and cervical health screening program is offered locally by the Associated Health Departments of Huron, Sanilac and Tuscola Counties. This program for women 40 years and older includes a pelvic exam with a pap test, a clinical breast exam, and a mammogram. The examinations are done by a nurse practitioner at one of the 3 county health departments, in Bad Axe, Caro or Sandusky. Mammograms may be scheduled at Marlette Community Hospital,

and Dales General Hospital, Scheurer Hospital or Bay Diagnostic Center for Women in Bay City.

To be eligible for the program, a woman must be 40 or older and her income must fall within the following

Income and household size determines eligibility margins: one person, \$18,400; 2 persons, \$24,600; 3 persons, \$30,800; 4 persons, \$37,000; 5 persons, \$43,200; 6 persons, \$49,400; 7 persons, \$55,600, and 8 persons, \$61,800.

The cure rate for breast and cervical cancer is approaching 100 percent with early detection and diagnosis. All women age 40 and older mammograms and pap tests on a regular basis. If you or someone you know is not getting this screening done by their personal doctor, call the health department for more information at 269-9721 or 1-800-833-8550.

Reschedule annual ASC election

The law, which reorganized USDA, created a new agency - - the Farm Service Agency - - which encompasses all of the commodity support and basic conservation programs of the former Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), all of the risk management programs of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC), and the farm lending activities of the Farmers Home Administration

(FmHA). Bruce said the new committee system, when fully implemented, will exercise increased responsibilities in its enlarged role.

"Rescheduling the elections on a nationwide basis avoids confusion which could occur from hastily drawn rules and regulations," Bruce said, "and will create efficiencies by using funds which would have been spent on this year's election process to be used in training committees in performing their added





the hospital president, who said she chose to go with physician group practices because many of the new doctors are choosing not to go into private practice, instead opting to join group practices. The decision provides them with manageable hours, Sopo said, noting the debt faced by doctors fresh out of school makes it difficult to start out on their own. Sopo said she chose 2 physician groups that are especially oriented towards rural

A STRETCH

health care.

Financially, it will be a stretch for the hospital at first, but increased volume should make up for it in the long run, Sopo said.

The question, she added, is "can we afford not to have them? We believe we have weighed the risks very carefully. They're in this for the long haul; they're here to help us.
"It's a win-win situation,"

"This federal program, administered through the public health department of the state of Michigan, facilitates the recruiting and retention of top-notch medical and mid-level practitioners in under served areas," Sopo explained.

She lauded all those at Hills and Dales who have "rolled out the red carpet" in recruiting the new medical providers.

"People of the community have also graciously volunteered to make our new providers welcome and comfortable in Cass City," she concluded. "I know that our new docs and mid-level providers will soon feel at. home, if everyone is as warm and wonderful as they were to me when I arrived.
