For drains, roads, bridges

County's rain loss less than expected

Local officials delivered a far less than expected \$2.09 million estimate of damages from this month's near flood conditions to the state's Emergency Management Division Monday ... but the number might triple.

The report was faxed to Lansing by Deputy Jim Jashinske, Tuscola County Emergency Services coordinator, in an effort to qualify the county for state and federal disaster relief funds.

The overwhelming waters July 7 and 8 hit the county drains the hardest, and the commissioner has only begun to assess the damages. At \$1.7 million, the drainage system estimate already surpasses the other public damages combined, but that includes less than 5 percent of the county's drains. The figure included 25 of the 554 drains within Tuscola County.

The county sent a representative portion of the drain problems because there was not enough time to survey all 12,058 miles of ditch within the county before the application was sent Monday afternoon, explained Drain Commissioner Sarah Pistro.

Early reports originally anticipated drain damage estimates near \$20 million, but since then Rowe Engineering Inc. of Caro has been contracted to help get a more realistic look at the damage. Pistro expects the final figmillion, she said Monday.

Pistro has been walking the drains 12 hours per day since the first signs of flooding began almost 2 weeks ago. Another engineering firm and other county commissioners soon will be helping to assess the damage.

Speed is a primary concern for the commissioner. She hopes to determine final estimates quickly and Pistro said she hopes the government follows suit. Reconstruction will not begin until there is money to pay the

ranged from \$4,200 for debris clean-up to \$400,000 for repairs to the 131 roads and bridges that were washed out. Private property damage estimates were not available, but Jashinske said more than 500 homes endured minor damage while more than

100 suffered major damage. The most severe problems developed to the west and south of Cass City, in Indianfields, Millington and Dayton townships — especially near Cat and Shay lakes.

Jashinske requested that the governor designate Tuscola County a disaster area in a multi-county declaration. Surrounding counties, including Sanilac, Huron, Saginaw, Lapeer and Gratiot, also are seeking disaster aid to recover from the storms, which dropped more than 6 inches of rainfall on Cass City in less than 20 days.

If Gov. John Engler does declare the counties disaster sites, state funds will be forthcoming and federal aid will be requested. According to Mike Gadola of the State of Michigan Emergency Management Division, a recommendation should be made to the governor within days, and then the decision is in Engler's hands.

Jashinske said signals from the state have been "encouraging," but he does not know when or what relief would arrive in the area.

Cass City commodity site closes

There's bad news and worse news for area residents who participate in the federal surplus commodity program.

The bad news is funding shortfalls have prompted the closing of the Cass City distribution site. The worse news is there's talk in Washington of eliminating the program altogether.

The Cass City distribution site (village park) is closed effective immediately, according to officials with the Human Development Commission (HDC), which administers the program.

The next distribution is scheduled for July 28. Area residents are encouraged to pick up their commodities at the Caro distribution site, located at the HDC Warehouse, 165 Butler St.

Pat Christie, community services director for HDC, said it appears the program likely will not be renewed next year.

"Originally, when it was started it was considered to be a temporary emergency

Christie explained the program was implemented in 1982, partly in response to the availability of federal surplus foods which, in some instances, were going to waste. In recent years, however, the supply of surplus commodities has disap-

> With the future of the program uncertain and the last of 4 annual food distributions remaining this year, HDC officials decided to close the Cass City distribution site, one of 3 in Tuscola County.

Cass City was chosen because it's the smallest among 11 sites in 4 counties served by HDC, Christie said, adding registration at the local site totals 75 families, with an average of 65 picking up

commodities. In contrast, registration at the Vassar site totals 190 families, and there are 310 families registered at the Caro site.

The current radio system is 20+ years old. The technology is outdated, repair costs are high and parts are no longer available, so upgrading is not a solution. There is no back-up system. This system does not have county-wide paging capability and there is no privacy on this system. Police, fire and ambulance agencies cannot talk directly to each other. It is a safety hazard for users making liability an issue. The proposed state system is 3-5 years away, and long term costs are unknown. There would be no local control of costs with the state system and no paging for fire and ambulance.

The proposed new system will offer the latest technology. It will feature county-wide walkietalkie coverage. Safety features will include radio user ID, which will automatically let dispatchers know who is calling. It will provide communication privacy for drug team use, etc. It will also provide county-wide paging for fire, ambulance and other governmental paging. It will

have Mobile Data Terminals (M.D.T.s) for police, fire and ambulance, which will reduce the workload for dispatchers. This will provide accurate reporting for police, fire and ambulance and all agencies will share data. This system will be compatible with the state system.

The cost for this facility is included in the ballot issue. The facility will reduce radio equip-

ment costs. The building will feature multiple uses including the Emergency Operation Center

and a training room. Tuscola County Central Dispatch will not be dependent on other agencies. The staff of T.C.C.D. will focus soley on 911 service. There will be expandability as the needs of the county grow. WHAT WILL THE COUNTY-WIDE MILLAGE PAY FOR? It will pay for the costs in providing radios, pagers and M.D.T.s., as well as the dispatch cen-

ter building, dispatching equipment and support for a new county-wide communication system.

Every county based police, fire and ambulance service is included in this system. WHAT WILL THE TELEPHONE SURCHARGE PAY FOR? It will pay for all of the operational costs such as the costs of staffing and operating a

911/Central Dispatch Center in Tuscola County. WHO WILL RUN THIS 911/CENTRAL DISPATCH CENTER?

Public Act 29, 1994, gives that responsibility to the County Board of Commissioners. The Tuscola County Board of Commissioners will: 1) create the 911/Central Dispatch Center independent of any one police, fire, or ambulance; 2) appoint a director to manage the 911/Central Dispatch Center, and; 3) appoint police, fire and ambulance representatives to a committee which will establish operational guidelines.

WHAT WILL THIS COST EACH INDIVIDUAL TUSCOLA COUNTY PROPERTY OWNER? The telephone surcharge is currently 4%. This is an approximate monthly cost of 83c per household. The proposed surcharge will be 20% for the years 1995, 1996 and 1997. This will result in an approximate monthly telephone surcharge of \$2.71. This monthly surcharge will reduce to 16% in 1998, for an estimated monthly surcharge of \$2.24.

The millage request is 1 mill for 3 years. Based on a home valued at \$50,000 (S.E.V. of \$25,000), this will cost the homeowner an additional \$25.00 per year for three years. This millage will expire in 1997.

While it's reasonably sure that the promoter was quoted correctly, the opinion here is that there is a little bit of hype connected with the announcement.

One was the price of the lots. The promoter claims that the top, choice lots were priced at \$1 million. Everybody can oh! and ah! about lot that costs \$1 million....much more impressive than \$950,000, for

instance.

I'd bet a cookie that none of the lots bring that price. Perhaps \$250,000 less, which would make it only a cheap \$750,000. A real bargain clearance.

There has been considerable discussion around town about the school's second request for millage for a new middle school building. In essence, what is questioned is why the board would submit an identical proposal after the first had been rejected by the voters.

Although it's been only a few weeks since the proposition was defeated, there have been substantial done.

changes. When the issue was presented, taxpayers were digesting a new tax proposal which cut property taxes to 6 mills for homeowners.

The community was split on whether building new or remodeling was the proper choice. When it was discussed, I leaned toward rebuilding, although I would have voted for either.

Since that time, virtually 100 percent of the people I talked with that I figured would know about building (the professionals) told me that remodeling was sure to suck up more dollars than anticipated and end with a building that would need continuing cost attention. I joined the new building ranks.

Some school boosters feel that a more aggressive campaign would have carried the day. That's debatable and I don't buy it.

While the vote in the first election was heavy compared to the usual voter turnout, the 1245 votes cast is less than a third of the eligible voters.

What school supporters are fighting is finding enough voters without children in school altruistic enough to pay for a better educational system just because of its

value to the community.

They are out there. The trick is to find them and get them to the polls.

It can be done, but it's going to take a lot more work by a lot more people to get it

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SPRAINS and STRAINS

We all sprain our ankles at one time or another. Usually we can just ignore it and the pain and swelling goes away over a few days.

Sprains can, however, be more troublesome than most people think. A person may easily re-sprain the ankle once there has been a bad sprain.

Sprains vary from mild ones where there is just a minor tear or stretching of the ligaments to severe sprains where the ligaments are completely torn on the outside of the ankle.

When you get a sprain, there are four things to do to help it recover quickly. Resting it and applying ice right away to keep the swelling down is most important. Also elevating the leg and using an ace wrap to compress the swelling is useful.

When the ligaments are completely torn, the ankle joint is unstable and needs to be given time to heal. Since ligaments heal as slowly as bones, a cast or splint is needed to hold the torn ligaments in place until they have had a chance to heal. This usually takes about 4-6 weeks. Surgery may even be considered in very athletic persons.


If the tear doesn't heal well, an unstable ankle joint is apt to cause further problems with "weak ankles", recurrent sprains and eventually arthritis.

After healing, it helps to do strengthening exercises and tape the ankle to protect against further injuries.

Rain may create need for nitrogen

In some cases, farmers may want to adjust nitrogen applications to make up for recent losses due to heavy

"Rainfall above 5 inches may have moved some of the nitrogen supply deeper into the soil profile," said Dennis Stein, MSU Extension ag agent.

Farmers may want to consider that, after the soil is saturated, each inch of rain that is absorbed can move the available nitrates 4 inches deeper in the soil profile, Stein explained, adding it's important to remember the rain that was absorbed has the ability to leach nitrates; water that leaves the field surface will not leach

nitrates. MSU Extension offices have additional information on nitrogen movement and can work with you in development of a replacement program if needed.





Wright, who is a delivery driver with UPS in Cass City, was cited for his loyal service contributions to UPS. He began his career in 1964





Christie, who noted it takes an army of 300 to 350 volunteers to run the program in the 4-county area.

Although loss of the surplus food distributions will have an impact on residents, Christie pointed out participation in the program has been steadily declining in recent years. Perhaps the biggest reason, she said, is that a number of popular products such as cheese, powdered milk and flour, are no longer available.

Today, the program offers butter, cornmeal, rice, canned meats and vegetables, raisins and peanut butter. Participants receive 3 to 5 products per distribution. Christie said HDC officials hate to lose any program, but if one has to go, the surplus

food distributions may be the

"Sometimes difficult decisions have to be made," she added, "and if you have to make a choice, there are probably some other programs that benefit people more overall."

Christie acknowledged closing of the Cass City distribution site probably will create a hardship for some area residents, and HDC officials will try to lend a helping hand.

Residents may want to ask a friend or relative to pick up their products for them, and there are volunteers available to pick up commodities for senior citizens, she said.
