## Ambulance on way to hospital collides with car

Two people were reported injured Saturday afternoon when an ambulance en route to Hills and Dales General Hospital collided with a car at the intersection of Main and Seeger streets in Cass City.

The accident occurred at about 1:40 p.m.

Cass City police reported ambulance driver Sue M. Pawloski, 45, of Cass City, was northbound on Seeger Street when she slowed for a

red light and then proceeded through the intersection, into the path of an eastbound vehicle driven by Craig E. Helwig, 38, of Cass City. Reportedly hurt in the crash were ambulance attendant Gail Hutchinson, 53, of Deford, and Harold W. Deering, 63, of Cass City.

Deering was riding in the ambulance with his son, Harold L. Deering 41, of Deford, who was injured in a fall at home earlier and was

being transported to the hospital for treatment. Police said he sustained no additional injury as a result of the accident.

Also riding in the ambulance was Lisa Deering, 18, Deford, who was not injured. Helwig and his passenger, Erik Helwig, 9, also escaped unharmed.

A spokeswoman at Hills and Dales said Hutchinson was treated and released. She said the elder Deering was not treated.

Reports state Helwig's vision was impaired by buildings and other vehicles at the intersection. Officers cited Pawloski for failure to yield, noting the ambulance did not have all of its lights on and the siren activated at the time of the crash.

According to family members, Harold L. Deering was transported to Hills and Dales, then taken to St. Mary's Medical Center in Saginaw. He is expected to be released this week.

# Voters kill proposed school bond issue

It's back to the drawing board for Cass City School officials following an unsuccessful second attempt to win approval of a bond issue to construct a new middle school and add on to Campbell Elementary School.

Sunshine and mild temperatures greeted a turnout of some 50 percent of the district's 4,000 voters who cast ballots in Saturday's special election.

In the end, the proposed \$8.35 million bond issue was defeated by a 212-vote margin, 1,105 to 893. The total included 329 absentee voter ballots. There were 17 spoiled ballots.

Fewer than a third of registered voters cast ballots in the first special election, April 25, when the bond issue went down by 119 votes, 682-563.

Contacted Monday, school Supt. Ken Micklash said he wasn't surprised at Saturday's results, although he was disappointed.

"A little bit," he commented, "especially for all the people who worked so hard to get the issue passed."

As for the future, Micklash said, "We're not sure. I think it certainly would be extremely doubtful that we'll see this issue back. We'll have to re-group and determine the next step."

What is certain is that some renovation work will be required at the middle school. "The fire code violations will have to be taken care of this summer; that's the minimum," the school superintendent said, adding he isn't certain what will be done beyond that.

### REACTION

Saturday's vote surprised supporters of the bond issue, including members of the Citizens for Education Committee, which worked to educate the public and get the vote out.

"I think we felt we identified our positive supporters, but there were people who voted who haven't voted in years," committee member Joan Helwig commented. "I know our opposition was out pounding the streets, and that hurt."

"I also think that 95 percent

of the people who voted 'no' didn't go to the middle school and see what we were talking about, and that hurt, too."

Helwig suggested a lack of parental support may have been the biggest factor in the defeat.

"We just didn't feel that we had the support of parents; they didn't seem to get out and vote," she said. "If our parents had voted, this thing would have passed."

Denise Hallwood, who was also active in the Citizens for Education campaign, agreed, saying, "They (parents) didn't show."

The committee may have erred in not fostering more communication on the issue between students and their parents, Hallwood said. Despite accusations to the contrary, she explained, "We did try to keep it out of the classroom. Maybe that was a mistake."

"I'm so sad, so disappointed that this went down

because of our children. We need this."

### OPPOSED

Robert Papovich, who has opposed the proposed bond issue from the start, said Monday he was surprised only at the margin of defeat Saturday.

"Basically, I think it went along pretty much like it did before," he added. Actually the percentages were about the same, (but) I thought it was going to be 2-to-one against.

"The school board and the faculty and the committee profess to want people to have all the information, and then proceed to keep people confused, and that's the way I saw it."

Papovich, who offered his own proposal for funding construction of a new middle school over a period of time, said he would like to have seen school officials bring a different plan to voters Sat-

urday, one that would have attempted to save money and include some sacrifice on the part of teachers.

"I saw an opportunity here that the board could take it upon themselves, with a little bit of effort, to save millions and millions of dollars, and they did nothing," he added.

The second attempt to get the same bond issue passed was a mistake, Papovich concluded. "A lot of people who voted 'no' do not want to build new now for any reason."

School officials said Saturday's turnout was the second highest in the district's history.

The biggest turnout was recorded in the midst of a financial crisis in 1982, when more than 53 percent of registered voters turned out for a special election involving a millage increase for school operations.

## New asphalt plant?

### Zoning board to consider proposal at special meeting Feb. 28

The Elkland Township Zoning Board of Appeals will hold a special meeting later this month to consider a land-use question involving a proposed asphalt processing plant.

The meeting is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Feb. 28 at the Elkland Township Hall, 6691 Church St., Cass City.

The special session will focus on a land-use permit application submitted by Roy Tuckey to operate an asphalt plant just west of Cass City. The site is composed of about 90 acres located south of M-81 and east of Koefgen Road.

An attorney representing Tuckey contends a land-use permit would allow operation of an asphalt plant. However, zoning board members tabled the matter in January pending consultation with a township attorney.

A legal opinion has since been obtained, according to

zoning board Chairman Roger Root, who said that opinion will be presented at the upcoming special meeting.

Tuckey's proposal comes 4 years after a similar plan involving the same land was nixed in the wake of protests from nearby property owners. Opponents of the plan voiced concerns regarding dust, odor and noise, and how an asphalt plant would affect property values.

The earlier proposal was somewhat different than the current plan in that 4 years ago, then-property owner J.D. Tuckey asked the township to re-zone the property from agriculture to manufacturing/distribution.

The proposal was rejected by the township board 11 months after it was first presented. The board acted on a recommendation from the zoning board, which based its decision primarily on the

plant's proposed location along the southwest edge of town.

The fate of the latest request lies in how zoning officials interpret the zoning ordinance.

Towards that end, the township board last week hired a professional planner and consultant.

The hiring of Alan Howard Kunder Associates, Saginaw, was approved during a Feb. 13 monthly meeting. The agency, which drafted the township's existing zoning ordinance, will be paid \$60 an hour for his services, township Clerk Norma Wallace reported.

In other business last week, the township board appointed Connie Gee deputy zoning administrator. She will serve in the absence of her husband, Zoning Administrator Danny Gee, who is on a leave of absence due to health problems.





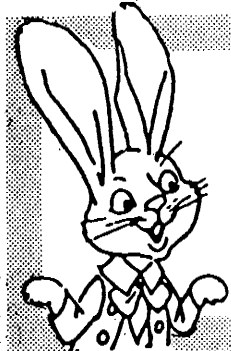

That's why, I suppose, I blew 50 bucks on Valentine's Day for dinner for 2 at the Crossings Restaurant at the Ashman Court Hotel in downtown Midland.

Before getting into what the money went for let me assure you that it's not necessary to spend that much. My "Valentine's Day Special" cost \$25 and the total bill was \$43 without the tip.

Besides the cost of the meals, the bill included the cost of a draft beer and a coke. Incidentally, when I have a chance to sample a private brand beer I jump at it. At the Crossings I had no choice, they only offered draft beer with private labels. I forget what the second brand was called. I wrote down what I received just so I could tell you. It's "Watneys". It tastes like all beer does to me. I never can tell one beer from another, they all taste the same, but I always bite for a new brand.

But back to the meal. My \$25 orgy started with a glass of champagne. Now I'm not big on champagne, but what the heck, it came with the meal and so did the dessert. More about that later.

The meal started with appetizers served buffet style. Your choice of any or all. Naturally, I had them all: Bacon-wrapped oysters, baked artichoke, crab cake and Cajun beef kabobs (4 pieces of spicy beef on about a 4-inch skewer.) I had 2. Following that was lobster bisque and a salad bar that included fresh fruit and cheeses, 6 different salads and iced shrimp.

The entree was served at the table with a choice of one of

six different pork, beef and shrimp combinations. I selected chateaubriand (after the waiter explained that it was slices of prime rib in a special sauce).

It was served with a choice of baked or chintilly potatoes or rice pilaf and fresh vegetables stir fry.

The desserts were also available buffet style and included petit fours, tortes, assorted mousse, parfaits, cheesecake and strawberry shortcake. All I could down was about 3 bites of a small piece of cheesecake.

A word about the restaurant. Ramp parking is available under the restaurant, free to customers. The service was good considering the place was jumping with every seat in the restaurant taken. We were squeezed into the last vacant table in the lounge.

The big question is was it worth the money? Taking the bull by the horns, let me say unequivocally yes and no.

Eat there regularly? No. As a special occasion for all of us who love to eat at places a little out of the ordinary, yes.

Rating it on the one to 10 scale. A big 8.5 for quality. Quality and price, perhaps a 7.

# Good/bad-cop story has a happy ending

It took two months, but Blake Allington finally got his car back from the police. He shouldn't have had to wait two days.

This is a variation on the familiar good-cop, bad-cop routine. Allington expressed great gratitude for the good service he got from the Bloomfield Hills Police Department, especially Director of Public Safety David Piche.

But neither Allington nor Piche could say anything good about the jerk-around service Allington got from some Detroit cops who apparently couldn't recognize a scam when it jumped up and bit them on the badge.

The jerking began Dec. 11 when, after Allington was stopped for a minor equipment violation, Bloomfield Hills police had to confiscate his 1991 Ford Escort because computer information from Detroit police said the car had been carjacked from the previous owner — a Detroit woman — on Sept. 1.

claim that was rejected after her insurance company verified that Allington owned the car two weeks before the alleged carjacking.

Never mind that even a rookie cop would have suspected strongly that someone was trying to cash in twice on the Ford Escort — by selling it to Allington and by collecting insurance for a bogus carjacking. As Director Piche later told me: "No question — it was an attempted scam."

But Detroit police decided the carjacking story, with no legal paper to prove it, was just as good as Allington's story, verified by the secretary of state and by the insurance company. Also, there was Allington's assurance that "I have probably 20 witnesses to the fact that I owned the car on Sept. 1 and I'd be glad to take a lie detector test."

Allington and Director Piche. However, Piche felt sorry for Allington, "a nice kid" who lives in Auburn Hills and needs transportation to classes at Lawrence Tech in Southfield.

So last week Piche guided Allington through 48th District court where a judge, after viewing the evidence from the secretary of state, ordered that Allington be given his car back immediately. The "carjacked" woman was invited to court to plead her case, but she declined. Big surprise.

Piche also made sure Allington didn't have to pay the two-month impoundment fee, which topped \$500. Instead, a courteously discounted bill was sent to the Detroit Police Department.

Piche said he wasn't expecting prompt payment.

## JUDGE EXPEDITES THE TRANSFER

Lt. James Elliott, at Detroit's 2nd (Schaefer) Precinct, told me in January that the woman claimed the carjacker also stole the car title, and she had a witness who said the car was parked at her home Sept. 1. And in the Detroit Police legal department, Sgt. Louis Feurino — a lawyer — said it was a case of two people claiming ownership of the same property, and police couldn't tell which was telling the truth, so the two claimants would have to fight it out in civil court someday.

In the meantime, Detroit police insisted, Bloomfield Hills police must keep the car impounded in a Birmingham lot, despite protests from

## '95 outlook positive

# Record sales, profit in '94

L.E. Althaver, chairman, president and chief executive officer, Walbro Corporation, reported sales of \$325,205,000 for the year ended Dec. 31, 1994, compared with \$273,463,000 for 1993. Net income was \$14,595,000 for 1994, up 16 percent compared with \$12,567,000 for 1993 before cumulative effect of accounting change for post retirement benefits of \$2,900,000 net of tax.

The company posted net income per share of \$1.70 for 1994, compared with \$1.47 for the same period in 1993 before cumulative effect of accounting change. Average shares outstanding were 8,602,077 in 1994 and 8,537,375 in 1993.

"Sales of Walbro Automotive's fuel system products in the U.S. reached record levels in 1994, driven by new applications and strong vehicle sales," Althaver said in announcing the results.

"Marwal Systems S.A., Walbro's European joint venture, also had a good year, aided by an upturn in vehicle sales in Europe and increased productivity at its Chalons, France, facility," he added.

"However, facility expansions and fuel tank plant

start-up costs, along with under-utilization of Walbro's fuel rail facility, had adverse effects on Walbro Automotive's profits in 1994," Althaver said. "In addition, higher interest rates and foreign exchange losses from the weak U.S. dollar also negatively affected profits for both Walbro Automotive and Walbro Engine Management."

"Overall, Walbro Engine Management had an exceptionally good year, with record sales and earnings for 1994 due to the world-wide strength of the portable power equipment and lawn-and-garden industries," Althaver said.

"Sales of small engine carburetors varied dramatically through the year, however," he noted. "After beginning at a record pace, orders dropped below normal seasonal levels in the third and fourth quarters due to backlogs in the certification process our customers must follow to meet new California emissions standards."

"Looking at 1995, the outlook is positive," Althaver said. "We anticipate a significant increase in carburetor orders in early 1995 as our customers' products are cer-

tified. In addition, sales of small engine ignition systems and aftermarket sales of automotive and small engine products have been strong and should continue to grow."

"Our automotive fuel tank plant is now on-stream with its first production contract and additional tank business and new applications for other fuel system products are expected in 1995 as well," he added.

"In addition, our pending acquisition of the Fuel Systems Division of Dyno Industrier AS, Oslo, Norway, would expand our fuel tank business into Europe. Dyno supplies plastic fuel tanks to most European vehicle manufacturers from operations in France, Spain, Norway, Great Britain, Germany, and Belgium," he noted.

"Anticipation of continued strength in the U.S. automotive and small engine industries, signs of improving economic conditions in Europe and the continued introduction of new fuel system products in several markets combine to suggest that 1995 will be a year of solid growth in sales and earnings for Walbro Corporation," Althaver concluded.

## Trapped otter a first in Tuscola

An otter accidentally caught in a trap earlier this month near Cass City represents an historical first for Tuscola County, Department of Natural Resources officials say.

"It's probably a first for Tuscola County, as far as we know, in recent history," said Bud Jarvis, a wildlife biologist at the DNR's Cass City field office.

The area's population of river otters was eliminated sometime back in the 1800s, according to Jarvis.

The first known sighting of an otter in the county since came late last winter, he said, when some Kelly Road residents reported seeing 3 otters — 2 adults and one juvenile — along the Cass River.

Although the residents' description of what they saw matched that of otters, Jarvis added, "We could never verify it."

Proof that otters apparently have returned to the Cass River came Feb. 7, when a Deford man brought in a specimen that had gotten caught in one of his beaver

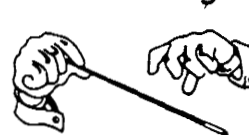
traps on the Cass River, south of Cass City near the Tuscola and Sanilac County lines.

The adult otter measured about 4 feet from nose to tail.

State law required the trapper to take the animal to a DNR field office to be tagged. Trappers are allowed one otter per season, Jarvis noted, but the regulation has never been an issue before.

DNR officials theorize that the otters, who feed on fish, moved up the Cass River after traveling to the area from the north by way of the Tittabawassee River.

Senior Angie Wildman also contributed to the victory with 23 attacks going for 15 winners. Several of Wildman's kill shots were launched from the middle row.

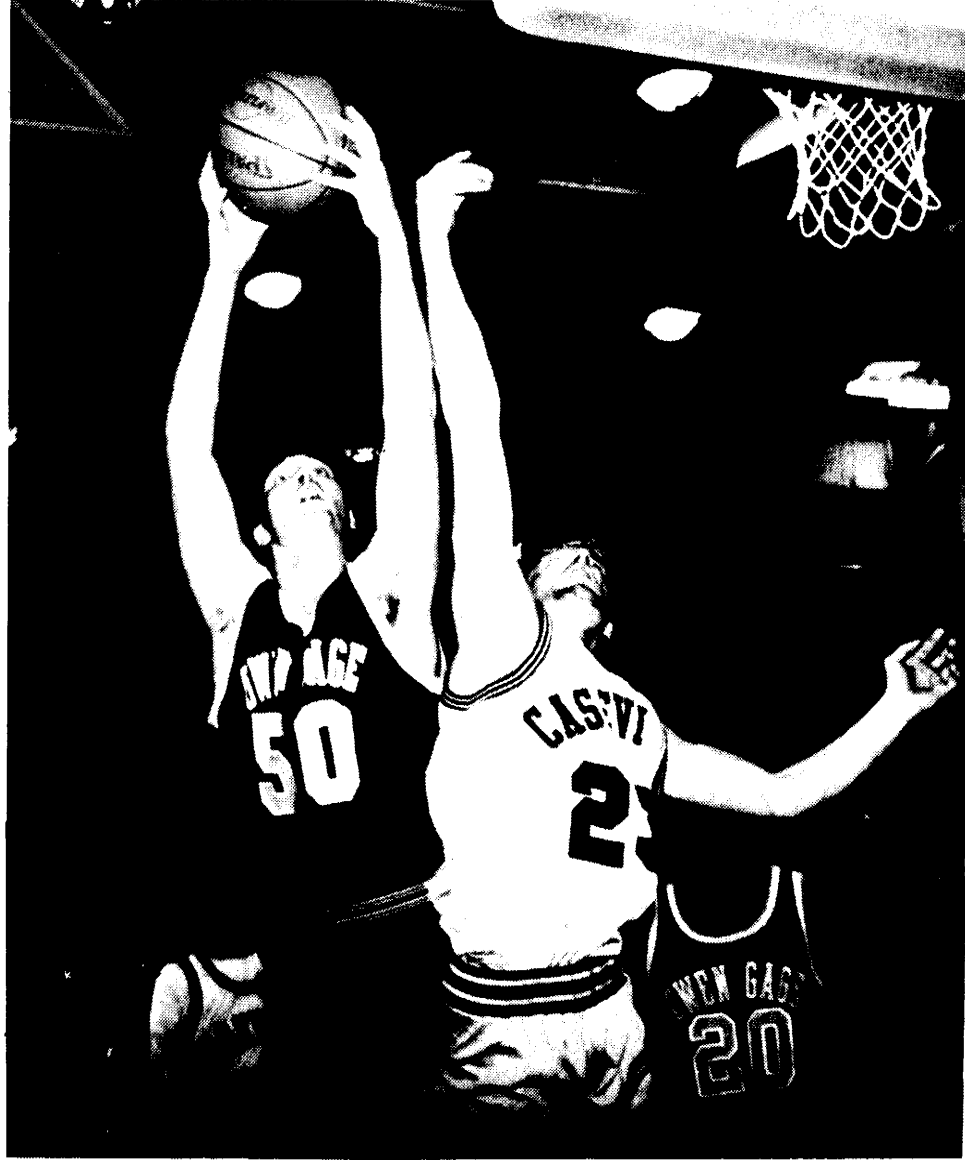
Earlier last week, on Tues-

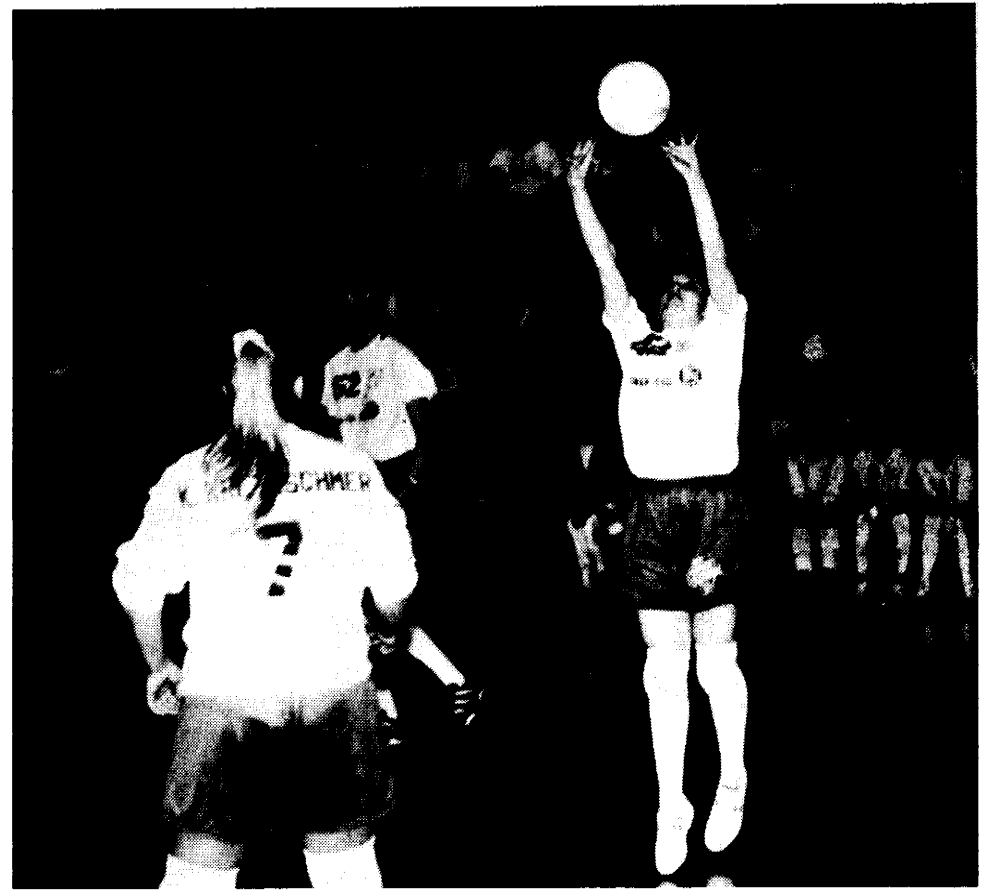

Coach Don Markel's Red Hawk grapplers advanced 2 wrestlers during Saturday's Goodrich District for regional competition at New Lothrop.

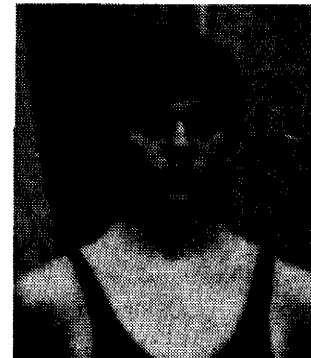
Representing Cass City in this Saturday's regional tilt will be Nathan Hendrick (172) and John McNaughton (106).

Sunday marks the 50th anniversary of the day the Marines hit the beaches of Iwo Jima. My husband and several others here in Cass City were in that landing. With many prayers my husband came through that battle. Then they were preparing for the invasion of Japan.

I know there were a lot of people who said that the atom bomb should not have been dropped but it saved thousands of our boys. We

didn't start that war and they didn't mind killing our people at Pearl Harbor.

Did people ever read the account of the Bataan Death March? It was the most inhuman treatment you could ever imagine. Read that account and you won't feel so bad. I know that the bomb was a terrible thing, but it saved thousands of our boys' lives. They expected all the first waves of marines to be killed in the invasion of Japan and my husband would have been there. It saved his

life and brought him home to us for many years, but in the end it also took his life.

He operated the bulldozer at Nagasaki to clean up the mess and later was diagnosed with lymph gland cancer, which was attributed to his exposure to the radiation.

We lost 7,000 of our most precious resource on that volcanic rock that was only 50 years old and 7 miles long. That was enough.

# Tractor safety classes set

Parents and students have requested that 4-H Safe Tractor Operation and Farm Machinery courses be offered after basketball season. Therefore, classes are now being offered in Huron, Sanilac and Tuscola counties. Co-sponsored by the "Farming Safely in the Thumb" and the 4-H councils, they are open to all youth 10 years and older.

This year, a new class will be offered for youth 10-12 years old, "Introduction to Safe Tractor Operation." It will meet 2 hours/week for 3 weeks and provide basic information on farm and tractor safety issues. This is a safety education class geared for the younger student.

For youth over 12, there will be the regular 4-H Safe Tractor Operation Course which will provide a "Certificate of Training" for those youth who successfully complete the requirements, which include weekly homework assignments, a written exam and a practical driving test. These courses are classroom instruction only. Any tractor operation must occur at home under parental supervision.

Also being offered is a Farm Machinery course in each of the 3 counties for youth 14 and over that have successfully completed, or are currently enrolled in the 7-week Tractor Safety Course. A minimum of 10 students must be pre-enrolled for a class to meet as scheduled. There will be a \$5 fee for each class.

The following classes are being offered:

Sanilac County: Carsonville High School - beginning Tuesday, March 7,

7-9 p.m.; Marlette Middle School - beginning Thursday, March 2, 7-9 p.m.

Huron County: Huron Area Technical Center, Bad Axe, -beginning Tuesday, Feb. 28, 7-9 p.m.

Tuscola County: Reese High School - beginning Monday, Feb. 27, 7-9 p.m. Youth must be pre-enrolled, and the \$5 fee must be pre-paid. Enroll by calling Geraldine R. Smith or Sandra Koglin at the Huron County Health Department, 1-800-833-8550 or 1-517-269-9721.

The instructors are farmers, or come from a farm background. Parents are encouraged to attend the sessions with their youth. Several parents who have attended in the past indicated that the course is a "good refresher" for any tractor operator.

Cass City fifth grade students received a free book last week in honor of the memory of the late Arthur P. Holmberg, a longtime Cass City educator who devoted years of service to the community.

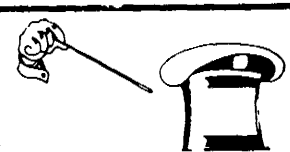

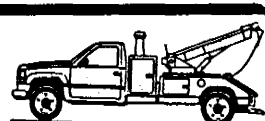

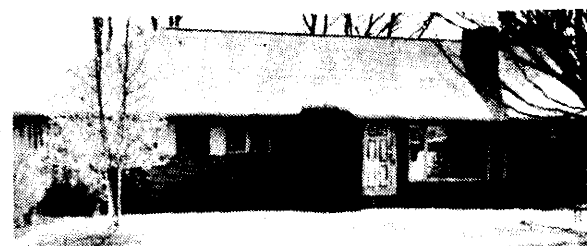

Hartwick said Northern Aurora is a Division II corps with a membership of about 80 bandmen, who can range in age from 14 to 22 years.

## Ankle Sprains

Ankle sprains result in a stretch or tear to the ligaments and are very common in sports or recreation activities. ## Walbro solves chromium waste discharge problem

Walbro Corporation has taken several steps that have corrected the discharge of excess chromium into the Cass City Wastewater Treatment plant, President and Chief Executive Officer Lambert Althaver said Monday when explaining the problem the company experienced with the discharge.

It began about a year ago, Althaver said, when the company switched from a zinc and aluminum casting to an all aluminum casting for the carburetors produced at the Cass City plant.

Something in the metal switch caused excess chromium to go into the system as the carburetors were washed.

Althaver said that several avenues were pursued to

solve the problem. First the chemicals used to wash the carburetors were changed. A full-time person was hired whose only work was to increase the number of samples taken of the discharged wash.

The waste then goes to the company's pre-treatment plant before it enters the disposal system. New equipment has been ordered to monitor the discharge, now conducted by the discharge supervisor.

Althaver stressed that at no time was the discharge a threat to the environment or the citizens of Cass City and the Thumb. The problem was only with the handling of the waste at the wastewater treatment plant and that has been corrected.

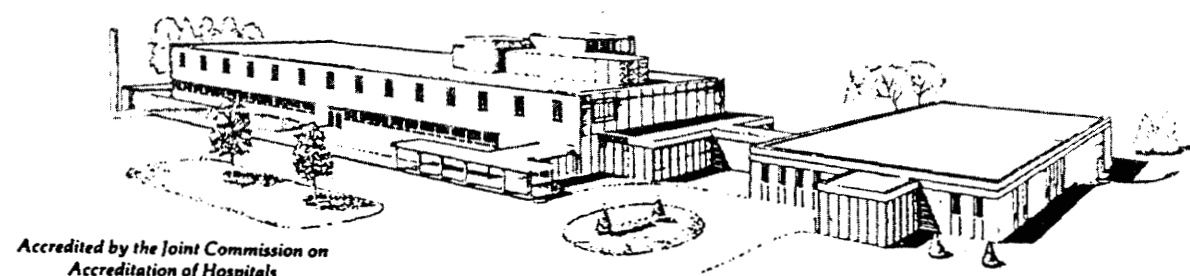

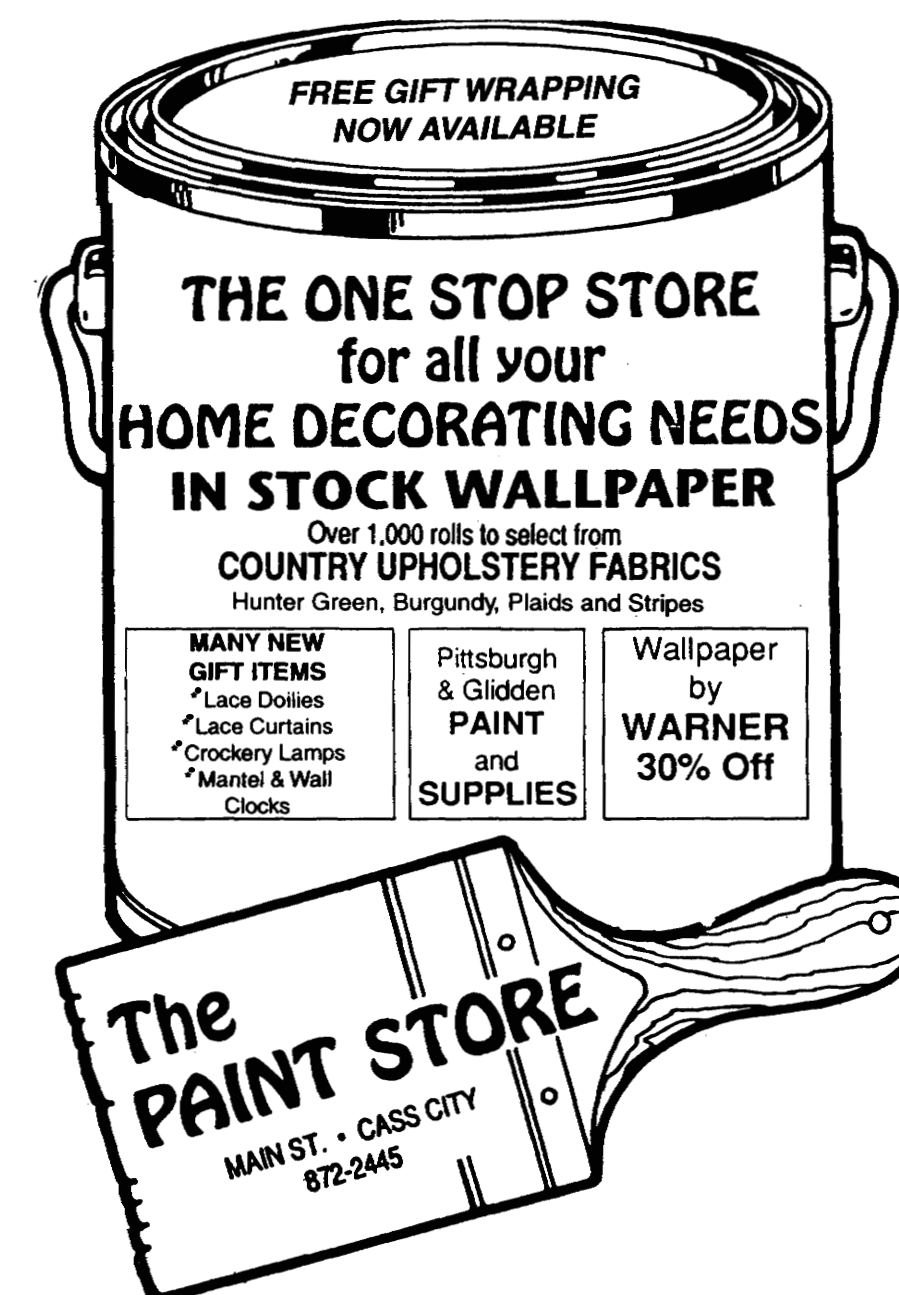

"This accomplishment has set new standards of quality both within General Cable Corporation (and) in all of the wire and cable industry."

General Cable Corporation has been in Cass City for 35 years and currently employs 206 full and part-time employees.

The company manufactures copper telephone wire for inside building applications.

As an industry leader in new product development, its cables are heavily used in the development of what is generally known as the "information highway."

"Contrary to popular belief, copper wire plays the major role in the information highway as concerns the wiring of buildings for modern telecommunications," Valdez said.

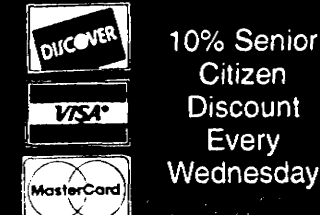



Quality bikes cost more than usually offered in department stores, but they are better buys down the road because of the long lasting quality of better bikes.

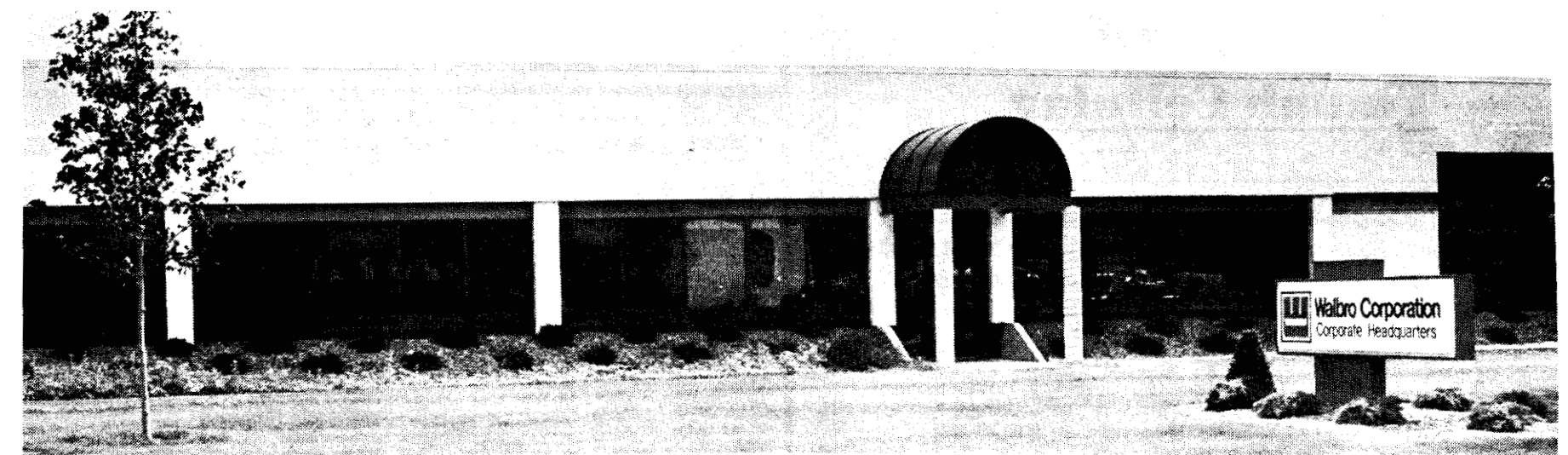

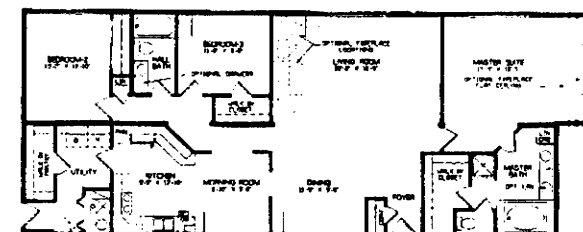

Any way you measure it, 1994 was a good year for Cass City. Notable progress was made in the industrial community and in the health care services for the community.

General Hospital president and administrator, the community enjoyed a significant increase in health care.

Two new physician groups opened practice in Cass City. The Family First Community Health Center at 4674 Hill Street offers Monday through Friday service from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. At the hospital, the Enhanced Immediate Care office is open for non-emergency care from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m.

There is also 24-hour emergency care at Hills and Dales. Over the years the area has shown significant growth in a steadily ascending curve. Last year there was a record increase of over \$5 million in new construction in the village. That was nearly a half million dollar greater increase than the previous record set 2 years ago.

The state equalized value of property in the village has nearly doubled in the last 10 years.

In 1984, the SEV was \$23.44 million. Five years later the valuations increased to \$34.95 million and in 1994 the SEV was \$44.13 million, according to village records.

The valuation of Elkland has shown equally significant growth over the last 10 years.

In 1984, the SEV was \$43.579 million. In 1989, it had grown to \$48.134 million. Last year, the valuation was \$60.267 million.

A recent announcement that Baker College has purchased the former Jordan College building assures the community will retain the college and enable students to secure college credits while remaining at home.
