Micklash: Time to regroup **Voters kill proposed** school bond issue

It's back to the drawing board for Cass City School officials following an unsuccessful second attempt to win approval of a bond issue to construct a new middle school and add on to Campbell Elementary School.

Sunshine and mild temperatures greeted a turnout of some 50 percent of the district's 4,000 voters who cast ballots in Saturday's special election. In the end, the proposed

\$8.35 million bond issue was defeated by a 212-vote margin, 1,105 to 893. The total included 329 absentee voter ballots. There were 17 spoiled ballots. Fewer than a third of regis-

tered voters cast ballots in the first special election, April 25, when the bond issue went down by 119 votes, 682-563. Contacted Monday, school Supt. Ken Micklash said he wasn't surprised at Saturday's results, although he was disappointed.

"A little bit," he commented, "especially for all the people who worked so hard to get the issue passed." As for the future, Micklash said, "We're not sure. I think it certainly would be extremely doubtful that we'll see this issue back. We'll have to re-group and determine the next step."

What is certain is that some renovation work will be required at the middle school. "The fire code violations will have to be taken care of this summer; that's the minimum," the school superintendent said, adding he isn't certain what will be done beyond that.

Helwig suggested a lack of parental support may have been the biggest factor in the defeat.

"We just didn't feel that we had the support of parents; they didn't seem to get out and vote," she said. "If our parents had voted, this thing would have passed."

Denise Hallwood, who was also active in the Citizens for Education campaign, agreed, saying, "They (parents) didn't show."

The committee may have erred in not fostering more communication on the issue between students and their parents, Hallwood said. Despite accusations to the contrary, she explained, "We did try to keep it out of the classroom. Maybe that was a mistake.

"I'm so sad, so disappointed that this went down urday, one that would have attempted to save money and include some sacrifice on the part of teachers.

> "I saw an opportunity here that the board could take it upon themselves, with a little bit of effort, to save millions and millions of dollars, and they did nothing," he added.

The second attempt to get the same bond issue passed was a mistake, Papovich concluded. "A lot of people who voted 'no' do not want to build new now for any reason."

School officials said Saturday's turnout was the second highest in the district's history.

The biggest turnout was recorded in the midst of a financial crisis in 1982, when more than 53 percent of registered voters turned out for a special election involving a millage increase for school operations.

Ambulance on way to hospital collides with car

injured Saturday afternoon when an ambulance en route to Hills and Dales General Hospital collided with a car at the intersection of Main and Seeger streets in Cass City.

The accident occurred at about 1:40 p.m.

Cass City police reported ambulance driver Sue M. Pawloski, 45, of Cass City, was northbound on Seeger Street when she slowed for a

Two people were reported red light and then proceeded through the intersection, into the path of an eastbound vehicle driven by Craig E. Helwig, 38, of Cass City. Reportedly hurt in the crash were ambulance attendant Gail Hutchinson, 53, of Deford, and Harold W. Deering, 63, of Cass City.

> Deering was riding in the ambulance with his son, Harold L. Deering 41, of Deford, who was injured in a fall at home earlier and was

being transported to the hospital for treatment. Police said he sustained no additional injury as a result of the accident.

Also riding in the ambulance was Lisa Deering, 18, Deford, who was not injured. Helwig and his passenger, Erik Helwig, 9, also escaped unharmed.

A spokeswoman at Hills and Dales said Hutchinson was treated and released. She said the elder Deering was not treated

Reports state Helwig's vision was impaired by buildings and other vehicles at the intersection. Officers cited Pawloski for failure to yield, noting the ambulance did not have all of its lights on and the siren activated at the time of the crash.

According to family members, Harold L. Deering was transported to Hills and Dales, then taken to St. Mary's Medical Center in Saginaw. He is expected to be released this week.

'95 outlook positive

Record sales, profit in '94

L.E. Althaver, chairman, president and chief executive officer, Walbro Corporation, reported sales of \$325,205,000 for the year ended Dec. 31, 1994, compared with \$273,463,000 for 1993. Police arrest

Trapped otter a first in Tuscola

An otter accidentally caught in a trap earlier this month near Cass City represents an historical first for Tuscola County, Department of Natural Resources officials say.

"It's probably a first for Tuscola County, as far as we know, in recent history," said Bud Jarvis, a wildlife biologist at the DNR's Cass City field office.

The area's population of river otters was eliminated sometime back in the 1800s, according to Jarvis. The first known sighting of

an otter in the county since came late last winter, he said, when some Kelly Road residents reported seeing 3 otters --- 2 adults and one juvenile

- along the Cass River. Although the residents' description of what they saw matched that of otters, Jarvis added, "We could never

verify it." Proof that otters apparently have returned to the Cass River came Feb. 7, when a Deford man brought in a specimen that had gotten caught in one of his beaver

traps on the Cass River, south of Cass City near the Tuscola and Sanilac County lines.

The adult otter measured about 4 feet from nose to tail.

State law required the trapper to take the animal to a DNR field office to be tagged. Trappers are allowed one otter per season, Jarvis noted, but the regulation has never been an issue before.

DNR officials theorize that the otters, who feed on fish, moved up the Cass River after traveling to the area from the north by way of the Tittabawassee River.




School should change directions

Walbro solves chromium waste discharge problem

Walbro Corporation has taken several steps that have corrected the discharge of excess chromium into the Cass City Wastewater Treatment plant. President and Chief Executive Officer Lambert Althaver said Monday when explaining the problem the company experienced with the discharge. It began about a year ago, Althaver said, when the company switched from a zinc and aluminum casting to an all aluminum casting for the carburetors produced at the

Cass City plant. Something in the metal switch caused excess chromium to go into the system as the carburetors were washed.

Althaver said that several avenues were pursued to

solve the problem. First the chemicals used to wash the carburetors were changed. A full-time person was hired whose only work was to increase the number of samples taken of the discharged wash.

The waste then goes to the company's pre-treatment plant before it enters the disposal system. New equipment has been ordered to monitor the discharge, now conducted by the discharge supervisor.

Althaver stressed that at no time was the discharge a threat to the environment or the citizens of Cass City and the Thumb. The problem was only with the handling of the waste at the wastewater treatment plant and that has been corrected.

THREE MILLION dollar senior citizen complex construc-

tion is underway despite the winter weather.

Any way you measure it, 1994 was a good year for Cass City. Notable progress was made in the industrial community and in the health care services for the community.

Substantial growth was recorded in housing and commercial additions. Retail establishments came and went, but the area ended the the year with a wider array of choices than was available at the end of 1993.

A big plus for shopper convenience was the addition of Self-Serve Lumber west of Cass City.

Authorities at local industries reported increased employment. Greg Biddinger at Anrod Screen Cylinder Co. reports the number of workers up in the past year about 10 to 15 percent. Business is good and it appears that it will remain strong in the months ahead.

At the Orbital Fluid Technology plant in Cass City, President Lou Horner says that in 1994 employment increased from 43 to 56 persons. We will probably be adding a few more this year, he added, mostly in technical positions, as we produce products for customer evaluation.

Dan Hittler at Walbro reports that his company's employment in the Thumb increased 5.7 percent from 794 to 842 in the last year. World-wide the company's employment was up 5.8 percent from 2,800 to 2,965. Marshall Distributing started an expansion of offices and plant.

General Cable has been working on an overtime schedule and employment there continues strong.


