**Cass City seeks millage**

## Area schools set for annual elections Monday

Barring write-in campaigns, only 2 of 4 area school districts will see competition for board of education seats in next week's annual school election.

Millage questions will also be few and far between in the area with the exception of the Cass City District, where voters will decide an important renewal request.

The annual election is scheduled for Monday. The polls will open at 7 a.m. and remain open until 8 p.m.

### CASS CITY

In Cass City, incumbent trustees James Turner and Marilyn Peters are the only candidates seeking the 2 available 4-year terms.

In addition, voters will be asked to approve renewal of the 18-mill non-homestead tax in place under Proposal A, which was implemented

over a year ago.

The millage, which is being requested for 5 years, translates into nearly \$600,000 in revenue annually to the district.

School Supt. Ken Micklash emphasized the millage is not a tax increase and would affect only business and other non-homestead property. Under the provision of Proposal A, primary residences and agricultural land are exempt from the millage levy.

### KINGSTON

Four candidates are vying for one open board seat in the Kingston School District. Seeking the 4-year term are Thomas Hand, Bernard Bishop, John Borek Jr. and James Watros.

Incumbent Jim Green did not seek reelection, according to school officials, who

said there will be no millage question on the ballot.

### OWEN-GAGE

Owen-Gage Board of Education Trustee Rick Ziehm faces no competition in the annual school election. He was the lone candidate to file a nominating petition for the one available 4-year term.

There will be no millage question on the ballot.

### UBLY

In the Ubyly Community School District, 3 newcomers are vying for a pair of 4-year terms.

The candidates are Ronald Briolat, Luann O'Berski and Janice Sageman. School officials said incumbent trustees J. Kevin O'Connor and Harold Swartzentruber did not seek reelection.

There will be no millage question on the ballot.

# Owners suing township for denying asphalt plant

As expected, a proposal to set up an asphalt processing plant just west of Cass City — a plan twice rejected by Elkland Township officials — is headed for court.

Triple T Farms, Cass City, has filed suit against the township in Tuscola County Circuit Court.

The suit asks the court to reverse a Feb. 28 township Zoning Board of Appeals decision denying a special land-use permit to operate an asphalt processing plant.

In addition, the plaintiffs, who are requesting an order forcing the township to issue a special land-use permit, are seeking damages in excess of \$10,000 plus court costs, interest and attorneys fees.

A hearing in the case has not yet been scheduled.

Triple T Farms representative Roy Tuckey of Cass City presented the plan proposal to the Elkland Township Zoning Board in January, 4 years after a similar plan was rejected in the wake of protests from nearby property owners.

Tuckey applied for a special land-use permit to process asphalt at a site located on some 90 acres of land south of M-81 and east of Koepfgen Road.

The site includes a gravel pit, which sat idle for a number of years before active mining resumed last summer.

The permit was unanimously denied by the township's 3-member appeals board in February following an hour-long hearing, during which several people — many of them residents of the Northwood Lake Condominium complex north of the proposed site — voiced concerns ranging from possible health risks to noise, fumes and dust, to the effect the plant would have on property values.

Tuckey's counsel, Sandusky attorney J. Anthony Sykora, told the estimated 70 residents in attendance that he believes an asphalt plant is an allowable use, one that would serve communities within a 20-mile radius of the plant.

Trucking gravel to another site would be cost prohibitive, according to the attorney, who said the proposed

plant would involve no permanent construction, only the placement of machinery, including \$273,000 worth of air pollution control equipment.

"The amount of dust that is produced daily amounts to less than one-half of a coffee can," he told the audience.

It's estimated the plant would be in operation for about 6 years. Sykora stated Tuckey was prepared to provide environmental studies and meet any other reasonable conditions of operation set forth by the township.

In the end, however, the appeals board voted to deny the permit based on a legal opinion obtained by the Saginaw law firm of Jensen, Smith & Gilbert, P.C.

The opinion states, in part, "It is reasonable for the Elkland Township Zoning Board of Appeals to conclude that a blacktop processing plant does not fall within the description of an agricultural zoning district use either permitted by right or by special land-use permit of a discretionary or non-discretionary nature."

The lawsuit filed by Triple T Farms contends the appeals board decision did not comply with the Open Meetings Act; was not based on the facts and law presented; was based on facts that were not in evidence; was not supported by written opinion; did not comply with the township zoning ordinance; was not based on proper procedure, and was not supported by competent, material and substantial evidence on record.

Moreover, the suit contends the decision did not represent the "reasonable exercise of discretion" granted by law to the appeals board, and was unreasonable, arbitrary and an abuse of the board's discretion.

The suit states the appeals board's decision prevented the establishment of a legitimate land use in the township, causing Triple T Farms to lose money.

Although the proposed asphalt plant site is zoned agricultural, the lawsuit notes contiguous property is zoned

manufacturing under the township's zoning ordinance.

Concerns similar to those voiced at the February appeals board hearing were aired 4 years earlier in 1990, when J.D. Tuckey, also of

Cass City, requested a change in zoning for the same property, from agricultural to manufacturing/distribution, in an effort to enable PTI Corp. to open an asphalt plant.

Eleven months after the

proposal was first presented, the township board denied the zoning request based on the facility's proposed location.

Tuckey later sold the land to 3 brothers, Roy, Charles and Donald Tuckey.

## Teresa Bucholz, 15, dies in auto crash

An Owendale teen was killed in a traffic accident Saturday evening in Huron County's Chandler Township.

The accident occurred at 8:52 p.m. on Filion Road, about 5 miles northeast of Elkton, according to a Huron County Sheriff's Department spokeswoman, who identified the victim as Teresa Marie Bucholz, 15.

Bucholz was a passenger in a vehicle driven by Stacy L. McCreedy, 16, of Elkton.

Investigators said McCreedy was eastbound on Filion Road, one-quarter mile east of Herford Road, when a vehicle driven by Elizabeth A. Greene, 16, of Pigeon, entered the roadway from a private drive.

McCreedy swerved to avoid impact, but was struck by the Greene vehicle. The McCreedy vehicle then ran off the roadway, struck a culvert and rolled over at least 3 times.

McCreedy and Bucholz were transported to Scheurer Hospital in Pigeon, where Bucholz was pronounced dead. McCreedy was treated and released.

Greene and her passengers, Devon T. Jurczak, 15, of Caseville, and Nichol J. Leipprandt, 15, of Elkton, were not injured.

Alcohol was not a factor in the crash, according to investigators, who said Jurczak and Leipprandt were the only occupants not wearing seat belts.

## Work experience helpful

# Advise grads to consider tech jobs

The pomp and circumstance is over, and Cass City High School's 101 graduates are off for careers at college, in the work force or with the military.

And although more than half the high school graduates are bound for 4 or more years of college, counselors are beginning to encourage students to look more carefully at 2-year programs in the technologies.

Nineteen Cass City High School graduates have plans to attend a 2-year or certificate program compared to the 58 planning to attend at least 4 years of college.

At Ubyly High School, about 60 percent of the graduates are planning to attend at least 2 years of post-secondary education, said Darlene Bailey, Ubyly High School counselor.

Bailey encourages students to choose the educational

path that best suits their talents.

The percentage of students from both schools attending some kind of college has remained steady for about 5 years.

"We do encourage our students to get some kind of additional training," said Curtis Cleland, Cass City High School counselor.

### TECHNOLOGY GROWING

But increasingly, the most useful training for many is coming in technological fields such as mechanics, electronics and graphic arts, Cleland said.

Cleland also encourages students to consider 2-year programs in growing fields such as small aircraft and slot machine repair.

John Cooper, employee relations manager for General Cable, said any additional training betters a high school

graduate's chance of gaining the more skilled and better-paying jobs with the company.

"We have had some excellent results through Delta College in machine trades," Cooper commented.

Liz Waidelech, manager of human resources at Walbro Engine Management Corporation, agreed that post-secondary education is increasingly important.

"Our business, especially manufacturing, has become so technical that high school has just become the foundation," Waidelech said.

### LOW UNEMPLOYMENT

This advice comes at a time when Michigan's unemployment rates are the lowest they've been in about 15 years.

In April, Michigan boasted a 5.6 percent unemployment rate, while Tuscola County

was only slightly higher at 7.8 percent.

But Hank Galnor, branch office manager for the Bad Axe Michigan Employment Security Commission, warned against students opting to begin work directly after high school.

"Unless they have some pretty decent skills, they're going to go into the work force at minimum wage," he said.

Cooper agreed, saying General Cable looks for at least one to 2 years of related work experience for its more skilled positions.

And Waidelech said any high school work experience, even a part-time job, demonstrates an applicant's good work ethic and sense of responsibility.

### CO-OP HELPFUL

Cass City High School's cooperative education program gives students a head start on gaining this experi-

ence. General Cable has been successful in hiring some of the graduates that held co-op jobs with the company in high school.

Some 42 seniors spent the 1994-95 school year working in areas ranging from food service to secretarial and farm work.

"That work experience is so important to a student," Cleland said.

Bailey said she has found work experience does not necessarily directly relate to a student's success after high school.

However future employers look at work experience as a sign of hard work, a good attitude and dedication, she said.

At Cass City High School, 10 graduates currently have jobs and 12 said they are looking. Four are entering the military and the same number are planning to get married.

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
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### Rabbit Tracks

### Inaugural Thumb TV broadcast set Nov. 1

Robert E. Townsend, Director of REMC #10, has announced the May 31 opening of bids for the equipment and construction necessary to put Thumb Area Television (TATV) "on air" this fall. Construction will include a 460 foot television transmission tower in Cass City, 150 foot tower in Peck, 100 foot tower at USA High School and the acquisition of a 140 foot former cable company tower in Crosswell.

After review by Communications Technologies, an engineering consulting firm, and action by the REMC Board and Tuscola ISD Board (fiscal agent of REMC), contracts will be written in late June. It is anticipated that ground breaking for the transmission tower can be scheduled for late July.

Broadcasting is tentatively scheduled for Nov. 1. TATV will broadcast from Cass City with the cable companies in most communities receiving and distributing 2 channels of educational and community programming to 95 school buildings and up to 20,000 households. Programming will include specific K-12 educational courses, BA and MA level college courses, professional development activities, television news broadcasts from around the world and community education and awareness broadcasts.

## The Haire Net

At first glance, the statistics indicate that we are winning the war, the results are that encouraging. Between 1985 and 1993, just 8 years, drug use in the United States dropped by almost 50 percent.

But as always, the statistics don't tell the whole story. Like a batting average doesn't reveal how many key hits are included, the kind that win games and are the real measure of the worth of the player.

The reduction in use of drugs is a case in point. The batting average is great, but we are striking out in one of the key areas, drug use by youngsters.

Inhalation abuse has been steadily increasing since 1991. Today 18 to 20 percent of teenagers in this country have used inhalants to get high. That's 5 million kids, 13 to 19 years, one in every 5 students.

Most of these abusers have no idea about how dangerous this is. A survey showed that two-thirds of youngsters, 9-13 years old, see little or no danger in trying inhalants once or twice.

According to Dr. Allen Leshner, director of the National Institute on Drug Abuse, sniffing or inhaling volatile solvents starves the body of oxygen, resulting in potential damage to the brain and nervous system. Even first-time users run the risk of instantaneous death.

Strangely enough, a survey among 415 parents indicate that the kids know more about the range of products that can be abused than their parents. Parents think primarily of glue as the product that can be snuffed to get high. The same survey shows that the kids know better. They know about glue all right and also about markers, spray paint, gasoline, rubber cement, correction fluid, lens cleaners and butane/lighter fluid.

Inhalants are not the only rising drug problem. Sadly, among eighth graders, the

use of marijuana is on the increase again. In the Cass City Middle School, 3 students were just recently expelled because of possession of marijuana.

It's true, of course, that alcohol is still the biggest drug abuse problem. It's also the one which receives the most attention. Very active are the Students Against Drunk Driving and Facing Alcohol Concerns Together Sensibly organizations. Tobacco abuse has been a continuing effort now for decades.

As far as I know, there is no similar organized effort at the local level to meet the rising problem of other drug abuse by younger children.

Inhalant drugs are far easier to come by than alcohol and the consequences even more deadly, especially for the young occasional user.







They will draft bills in committees, discuss them on the floor, lobby the views of real interest groups and even publish a newspaper chronicling the days' events.

"It's quite a transition because most of the time students are tested on their knowledge on paper," Reif said.

Participating next fall will be seniors Sean Booth, Charity Gaszczynski and Becky Smith; juniors Lee Dillon and Josh Lounsbury, and sophomores Julie Erla, Scott Haag and Shawn Henn.

The students all qualified with superior scores in the Regional Discussion Festival, a competition run by the Michigan Interscholastic Forensic Association as a preliminary to the Student Congress.

Each student earning a superior score of at least 63 out of 75 points automatically is given a seat in the Congress, while those scoring lower must wait until the fall to learn whether they qualify.

Josh Lounsbury earned a near perfect score of 74.

Participants are judged on criteria such as ability to analyze information and to speak effectively in a group. They also must demonstrate reflective thinking and knowledge of the subject matter. This year's subject is "What should be the U.S. policy toward the People's Republic of China."

Students must focus their bill-making on more specific areas and defend their reasoning as to why their bill would be effective.

Although the students have a lot of research ahead of them in next year's Performance English Class to prepare for the Congress, their thoughts are turned to less serious concerns for the moment.

"The biggest concern now is clothes," Reif commented.

Fifteen people appeared last week in Tuscola County Circuit Court on various felony charges.

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

# Nicole Doerr, 12, selected for dance class

The loud beeping of a garbage truck seemed to come earlier each morning.

And after a long day of classes and rehearsals, it was the last sound the 11-year-old girl wanted to hear in the morning.

It signaled another grueling day at the Joffrey Midland Summer Dance Workshop for Cass City's Nicole Doerr.

Doerr spent two weeks at the 1994 workshop, where ballet, modern dance, musical theater and pointe classes and rehearsals ran from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m., Monday through Saturday. Breaks were scheduled for meals, and Sundays brought a shorter day with time off to swim or relax.

And despite all the bruises, blisters and tears associated

with the demanding schedule, Doerr is going back.

She will leave Saturday for the workshop, which takes place on Saginaw Valley State University's campus. The workshop has grown to 3 weeks and will allow some 60 dancers aged 12 to 19 the opportunity to learn from some of the nation's best dance teachers.

Students take lessons from ballet masters and mistresses and other dance instructors from the Joffrey Ballet School in New York. Many have danced in the world-renowned Joffrey Ballet Company.

"I just feel that the more work I've done with professional dancers, the more I improve," Doerr commented, adding she too wants to be-

come a professional dancer.

## KISH GOING TOO

Doerr hopes she will have the opportunity to dance with her partner from the Sally Doerr Dance Studio in Cass City. Nehemiah Kish, a 12-year-old Caro resident, also was selected to take part in the workshop.

"While I was there, I felt I was in a different atmosphere; I felt like I wanted to dance," explained Doerr, the daughter of John Doerr and Sally Doerr.

And dance she did — right up to the performance at the Midland Center for the Arts that topped off the workshop. Last year, she danced in the ballet "Etudes" and played

an older lady caught up in the spirit of the 1920s in the musical "Million Dollar Babies." She must wait until she arrives at the workshop to learn what this year's show will include.

The performance was the exciting part of Doerr's experience, because she got to dance on stage "in front of everyone."

But even with one summer at the workshop and 10 years of dance experience under her belt, Doerr said the audition for this year's workshop was nerve-racking.

The Joffrey Ballet School ballet master who ran the auditions, John Magnus, is very strict and commands attention, Doerr commented. Each dancer was expected to know the dance combina-

tions without watching the other people auditioning, and all the combinations were different from those of Doerr's first audition.

## LOTS OF PRACTICE

Both Doerr and Kish, son of Mark and Charlotte Kish, had practiced diligently with Erin Beller, ballet mistress at the Sally Doerr Dance Studio in Cass City, before the auditions.

"Being selected is one of

the greatest rewards," Doerr said.

And rewards for Doerr and Kish's hard work and talent keep coming. Doerr will spend the 4th of July weekend in Myrtle Beach, competing in the Show Stoppers National Dance Championships. She will also perform on national television as part of the event.

In addition, Kish recently received a full scholarship to the Blue Lake Dance Camp, which he will attend in July.

"It just seems like we've had so many experiences lately," Doerr concluded.
