Parents demand help for child

Board reached a decision on a problem that has been on the agenda for 4 months, and now faces another brought by the parents of a deaf student. The 2 issues highlighted a busy session of the board Monday night at Deford School.

First the decision. The board had been mulling the selection process used in determining the awarding of the Paul Smarks trophy that indicates the outstanding senior scholar-athlete, and the AAUW trophy presented to the top senior female scholar-athlete.

What the 4-month hassle accomplished was to place on the record the method already in use to determine the winners and make sure that weight was given to athletes in programs where junior varsity letters were not available. Athletic director Russ Biefer said that the guidelines were ones that the vast majority approved.

The problem that may take longer to solve was presented by Ray and Bonnie Ferris, parents of Jared, who is deaf. The parents appeared before the board and demanded action. They say that students are bullying others on the playground.

What they want to see now is the number of monitors on the playground increased from 2 to 4. We'll come back as often as needed, Ray Ferris said, to get action. We have got lots of talk, but no action. Bonnie Ferris said that she wanted captions whenever available used with television programs.

Those are the Ferrises' short term goals. Long range, they want more awareness of the handicapped by all the staff so they do not have to repeat their battle with the school each year.

Budgets reviewed

Village costs to increase

The Cass City Village Council reviewed a pair of proposed 1997 budgets Monday night.

The budgets differ only in the area of major and local streets, but both would increase spending over 1996. Which budget will be adopted will be determined by the availability of a state grant that would fund 75 percent of the cost to rebuild Seeger Street, from the southern village limits to the old north village limits.

If the grant is approved, the 1997 spending plan would total about \$2.3 million, which translates into an increase of \$498,690, or nearly 28 percent over estimated actual 1996 expenditures.

Total cost of the Seeger Street project, including removal of the original cement lanes, is estimated at \$517,000.

Village officials hope to learn within the next few weeks whether the grant funding will be in place for the project. The grant would remaining 25 percent plus

engineering fees. Projected revenues in the budget total \$2,340,450, including a modest increase in anticipated property taxes due to new construction. Village President L.E. Althaver noted state shared revenue, which totaled nearly \$57,000 in 1996, has been eliminated. However, the village is expected to receive \$73,500 more in state sales tax rev-

The general fund budget includes an appropriation of \$25,850 from fund balance, which is estimated at \$491,984.

If the Seeger Street project doesn't receive grant funding, the proposed 1997 budget will total \$1,988,900, an increase of \$147,140, or 8.1 percent over actual estimated 1996 expenditures.

Under the second scenario. the village would spend \$62,000 in its Major Street Program to resurface Doerr Road and Garfield Avenue. and widen the roadway at the Main/Doerr Road intersec-

And, under Local Streets, an estimated \$63,000 would be spent to place curb and gutter and blacktop on Scotty McCullough Drive.

Depcinski honored for 55 years 4-H service

sk Huron County Extension Director Bob Johnson about bundling up wheat and other grains exhibited for judging at 4-H shows, and chances are good he'll tell you it's a lost art of

He's also likely to say that Wilfred Depcinski is keeping the art alive with skilled hands and love for 4-H. Depcinski, 73, began show-

ing crops at the state fair in 1947 and he hasn't missed a year since. In the process, he has shared his knowledge and time with countless Huron County youth through the 4-H program.

The retired farmer was among several 4-H adult and teen leaders who were honored at the annual Huron County 4-H Leaders' Banquet, held earlier this month in Bad Axe.

Depcinski, who has served 4-H for the past 55 years, started at the age of 18, when he helped take over the reins of the county livestock club.

Two years later, in 1943, he played a key role in founding a new 4-H club. "Ben Westrate was the district 4-H agent out of Tuscola County — he had Huron and Tuscola counties — and he talked me into starting up the Jolly Workers 4-H Club," Depcinski recalled. "We've been going ever since."

The club currently has about 14 youths ranging in age from 10 to 17, but membership has been as high as 50 young people.

As a club leader, he has helped students develop their skills, as well as the tricks of the trade, in showing crops and vegetables at various 4-H shows and state fairs.

"I help out as much as I can

in the livestock, too," he said. **OTHER ACTIVITIES**

An avid gardener who cares for some 300 fruit trees at his Ubly area residence, he has also been involved in other 4-H and state fair activities.

"I've been on the state crops development committee, and I help with Crop-O-Rama each year in March on the campus of Michigan State University," he said, adding he's conducted crop and wheat identification contests with Johnson.

For several years, he was active in coaching 4-H softball teams, including one squad that won the state championship in its division.

Depcinski has also worked as a county conference assistant at the annual Exploration Days in June, and for the past 4 or 5 years has served as clerk for crop judging at the state fair.

And he continues to show exhibits at the state fair. Just a year ago he won the top award in the best education crop exhibit for his display focusing on "heart smart" food choices.

But it's the young people who have kept him active in 4-H all these years. "Seeing the kids, how they come along," he commented.

'You've got to (love kids). I don't have any of my own. I guess that's my family.

'The training they get in 4-H helps them," he said. "They always say that a 4-H kid won't get into trouble. That's not as true (as it used to be), but a large percentage of them do not get into trouble."

"It's his life, in a sense," Johnson, who is in charge of Please turn to page 15.

INCLEMENT WEATHER AND SCHOOL CLOSING

During the weeks and months ahead we can expect ice, rain, snow and fog. Severe or adverse weather conditions will undoubtedly force the closing of our school buildings at one time or another during the school year.

Canceling school or not canceling is usually a no-win situation. Part of the problem is that our school district covers approximately 200 square miles. Our boundaries extend to Sebewaing Rd. to the north, Arnold Rd. to the east, Colling Rd. to the west (which is directly north of Caro) and Legg Rd. to the south (which is one mile south of Hemans). Each geographic area can, and often does, have a different ice, snow, rain or fog condition on the same day. There is no way we can satisfy everyone; nevertheless, we attempt to do the best we can with making a rational decision as early as possible regarding closing and delays.

On days in question regarding the opening or possible early closing of schools we suggest you listen to the listed radio or TV stations. Early morning decisions to close school will be made before busses are dispatched for the morning runs by 6:45 a.m. if possible. Please remember that on occasion, our Michigan weather changes rapidly, and things do not always go as planned. During these times we ask for your patience and understanding.

Tuscola County Sheriff's Department officials are pleased with early assessments of the department's Victim Assistance Program, which has been in place for about 9 months.

"I've heard some very positive things, personally," Undersheriff Jim Jashinske said last week following a meeting in which the volunteer advocates were presented with pagers.

The equipment was purchased with funds from a \$48,500 federal grant awarded to the sheriff's department and the Human Development Commission's Thumb Area Assault Crisis Center, which are working cooperatively in the effort. The grant will also be used to hire a coordinator for the

The county program currently has 13 volunteer advocates, who are called to service in the event of a homicide, suicide or any traumatic death, including fatal or serious injury traffic accidents; criminal sexual conduct; domestic abuse and other types of calls such as house fires and natural disas-

Victim advocates' duties include comforting and helping victims and making appropriate referrals to agencies and services available to

They also serve as a go-between for victims, their families and police officials and emergency service providers; accompany victims to the hospital, police station or shelter, as needed, and aid and educate victims as to their rights, Crime Victim's Compensation and the criminal justice system.

The volunteers receive 40 hours of initial training by a Michigan Sheriff Association trainer, followed by ongoing training sessions. Victim advocates are bound

MSU tech school offers alternative ag training

hands-on careers in agriculture can get good jobs without 4 years of study.

Michigan State University's Institute of Agricultural Technology (IAT), founded more than 100 years ago, is a 2-year program that continues to prepare its graduates for good paying jobs.

Cliff Jump, IAT director, says the program is an appealing alternative for students interested in agriculture who know what they want out of their education.

The IAT consists of 10 areas of study ranging from livestock and horse management to crop production and turfgrass management. The majority of students enrolled must complete 48 credit hours to receive an associate's certificate. This usually takes only 3 or 4 semesters.

Jump says that 99 percent of the students enrolled in the program have already worked in the industry and have a good idea that that is what they want to pursue as a career. Approximately twothirds of the nearly 400 students will return to their family farm operations.

"Job opportunities are great for those who are open to relocation, but about 90 percent of the graduates choose to stay in Michigan," Jump

"The dairy management program is designed to give students practical training in the dairy industry. Most come from family farms and want to take some technical knowledge back home with them." says Joe Domecq, dairy management program director.

Domecq points out that the many dairy farms and agribusinesses in the state offer many excellent job opportunities for students who don't have a farm to return

Students interested in but Jump says students often enroll because they are seeking a career change or an additional degree.

> "The students in the turfgrass program average 27 years of age and are usually looking for a second degree,' he says.

John Shelle, director of the horse management program. says the program enables his students to have all the opportunities of a technical institution at a university loca-

"The beauty of the tech program is that it provides a good education with handson experience and technical training in a university environment where there is a lot of educational opportunity through use of facilities and resources," he says.

A 4-year horse management program trains students for work in areas such as feed and pharmaceutical industries. The 2-year tech program is designed for students who desire to work with animals on a daily basis. This skills-oriented program often trains students to work with the animals as trainers or stable managers.

Only 25 students are allowed per year, so many are turned down for admission. Any growth in the program depends on availability of faculty members, university funding and facilities to support it.

The landscape and nursery program prepares students for careers in areas such as landscape design and construction, greenhouse maintenance and garden center management. Director Bob Schutzki says that both students enrolling in the program for a change in career and others just out of high school find it appealing.

"Students find the program a viable option in postsecondary education. Upon completion of the 16month program, they are able to focus and enter the industry right out of school," he

Jump says that the program is currently using interactive television (ITV) to give students who don't have the option to attend the university an opportunity to take the courses that they want or

"Currently, a basic soils class has 19 students enrolled right here on campus, and 15 students in Grand Rapids and 19 students in Traverse City who are learning via ITV," Jump says.

Four more courses will be taught next spring through ITV, he notes.

Though the program has some drawbacks, such as high tuition and competition from community colleges, Jump says that the results far outweigh them.

"It is the greatest opportunity for a young man or woman to get self-confidence when starting out," he says. "It is one of the best investments that they can make for their future.'

'The building itself is on schedule," school Supt. George Goodchild said last week, noting workers have been busy laying the foundations for new classrooms and a new technology lab.

Pavers were expected to complete work on a parking lot in front of the school any

Chemical announces dividends

Alan W. Ott, chairman of Chemical Financial Corporation, announced that the corporation declared the regular fourth quarter 1996 cash dividend, as well as a 5-percent stock dividend.

Unfortunately, a planned driveway leading to the elementary school won't be blacktopped until spring, Goodchild said, adding, however, "We may go ahead and use the drive when the ground freezes.

ter purification systems. The expansion totals 13,000


square feet and will involve construction of 960-squarefoot classrooms.

In addition, the bond issue is enabling school officials to repair a 26-year-old gymnasium roof, and install a new central boiler system that will provide room-to-room heat

Heat has been provided by several roof top furnace units that heat various zones of the school. But the equipment, which came with the school when it was built in 1970, has failed miserably in recent

Ross recalls 1944 toy auction

Friday, the day after Thanksgiving, is traditionally one of the busiest shopping days of the year, and as any parent knows, the selection of toys out there is end-But there was a time when toys were plenty scarce dur-

ing the Christmas season. Bernard Ross remembers that time well. He also recalls a local service club's effort to fill that void and, at the same time, raise money for the Cass City Community

The year was 1944, and although the end of World War II wasn't far away, American manufacturing efforts remained concentrated on the war effort.

Hospital Fund.

"There was a shortage of everything during World War II," Ross recalled. "They didn't make cars, they didn't make anything.'

At the time, Ross was a member of the Cass City Gavel Club, which was formed with the goals of improving members' speaking skills, as well as to improve their community.

During the club's first fall meeting in 1944, it was decided to make toys to be auctioned off for the benefit of the hospital fund, according to Ross, a Cass City native and retired businessman.

"Cass City had 2 good hospitals at the time," he said. "For Cass City to grow and improve, a new, modern, larger hospital was needed."

So, a committee was formed to lay the groundwork for the project. "First, we had to decide what we were going to make, then we had to design it and make a pattern for the parts," Ross

EXPERIENCE

Then-village Superintendent Bud Burt, drug store owner Warren Wood and electrician Ed Baker "had experience in wood work design and construction of wood toys and furniture," Ross added. "They also had the necessary tools to cut the parts for each toy.'

Crews were formed and assigned various tasks, such as cutting out parts, sanding and painting. Before long, some volunteers who weren't club members pitched in to help.

"We had a regular assembly line," Ross said, noting the club members worked in second floor rooms at what are now the Osentoski and Healthmart buildings in

"We assigned people work (according) to their talents. I didn't have any talent, so they put me on sanding," Ross joked. I became an expert at sanding each part for

He recalled Jim Gross was in charge of painting, and with a shortage of paint, the color of each toy was determined by what color was available at the time. Gross was nicknamed "one coat

Gross" after decided to use one heavy coat of paint on the toys, rather than 2 coats. When the dust cleared, the club had produced 300 toys, including doll cradles and beds, rocking horses, sleds

and pull toys.

"These weren't frivolous toys," Ross pointed out, referring to the solid construction of each item. "My grandchildren are using them

Ross explained he purchased a doll bed and cradle for his daughter, and a sled for his son. "I'm sure they'll (toys) go 2 more genera-

He recalled the toy auction was well received. "Bidding was fast and very good because some felt it was a donation to the hospital fund, and a very good toy."

According to an article published in the Dec. 22, 1944, edition of the Chronicle, total receipts and contributions totaled \$2,214.22 — \$2,048 after expenses.

"A free dance was held in connection with the auction of the toys," the article states. "Gunsell's orchestra fur-

nished the music and Lorn Brown, Howard Loomis and Jim Milligan served as callers. Dancing continued until the early morning hours and a 'good time was had by all.' The attendance was estimated between 300 and 400

people.' Ross indicated the attendance wasn't a big surprise. "You didn't have a television Saginaw for a play," he said. "It was a social event for the community."

The amount raised during the auction wouldn't be a lot of money by today's standards, he concluded, "but multiply \$2,000 by the percent of inflation from 1944-1996 (and it was) a huge suc-

The afternoon session will be on forage fermentation and silo management and how to optimize forage feeding. There will also be presentations by producers on their forage management practices.

Production of milk unchanged

Dairy herds in Michigan produced 458 million pounds of milk during October, unchanged from a year ago, according to the Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Statistics Service.

Average milk per cow was 1,405 pounds in October, up 5 pounds from last year. This is the first month since April 1996 that production and milk per cow have been at or above year ago levels.

The dairy herd was estimated at 326,000 head for October 1996, the same as the previous month and the previous year.

The preliminary value of milk sold dropped from last month's record of \$16.50 per hundredweight to \$15.90 for October. If this price holds for the entire month, it will be the first month to month decline in prices since March 1996.

The mid-month October slaughter cow price was \$31.00 per cwt., unchanged from last month but down \$2.90 from a year ago. Cows sold for dairy herd replacements brought an average of \$1130.00 per head in October 1996.

Dairy manufacturing plants in Michigan produced 1.0 million pounds of butter in September, down 23 percent from a month earlier and 27 percent below a year ago. Ice cream output totaled 1.98 million gallons, compared with 2.1 million gallons in September 1995.
