Middle school disposal?

Award bids for \$200,000 2-room school addition

Bids were accepted for the 2-room addition to the Campbell Elementary School building Monday night and the addition will be completed within the prebid estimate of \$200,000.

Actually, the bids authorized by the board totaled \$184,224.00, but still remaining to be paid are the architect and engineering fees and work to be completed by R. C. Hendrick on a time and material basis.

Supt. Ken Micklash pointed out that Hendrick has supervised the bids at no cost because the firm is already managing the work for the new middle school.

There were many bidders for the work that was divided into 14 different categories, with from 2 to 8 firms seeking each of the various bid contracts. The difference between all of the high and low bids was \$72,000, Micklash said.

Several of the firms that won contracts for the addition were already on site for work on the middle school. Several area firms were low bidders including Thomas Roofing, Cass City, for roofing and sheet metal, \$8.862; Martin Electric, electrical work, \$10,495; Men of Steel, Kingston, for metals, \$15,000; and Booms Construction, BadAxe, masonry, \$77,280.

Another major bid pack was for the mechanical work which went to Paul's Plumbing and Heating, Bay City, for \$34,190.

The deadline for completion of the work is Aug. 15 and the addition will be ready for school opening in the fall.

Keith Hammis, project superintendent for the middle school, reported on construction progress and said that the building is on schedule to be completed for the start of the second term of the 1997-98 school year.

FUTURE PLANS

Now that construction is

well underway, Micklash said, it's time to consider what will be done with the present middle school build-

There are 2 options. One is to raze the building and the other to sell it for use as housing, the superintendent told the board. To use it for housing, a change in the zoning will be necessary because the area is now zoned for single family dwelling.

A committee was appointed to meet with the village planning commission to see if the zoning can be changed. It will also discuss if Rose Street that runs directly in front of Campbell Elementary could be changed to a one-way street. Serving on the committee will be James Turner, Danny

Haag, and Randy Severance. Dave Knight is an alternate.

OTHER BUSINESS

Aid fund established

Community rushes to aid of fire victims

Elkland Township fire fighters along with a state fire marshall spent the better part of last Wednesday sifting through the charred remains of 2 Main Street buildings destroyed by fire the day be-

What they found, according to Fire Chief Ron Pawloski, was a fuse box in an upstairs apartment that apparently had gone bad.

The resulting 7-alarm blaze injured 5 people, most of

homeless and caused nearly \$1 million in damage.

Community groups, meanwhile, moved quickly to help the families recover by collecting cash, clothing and household items.

Pawloski said the families, including several children, lost virtually all of their belongings. Anyone interested in making a donation can obtain additional information by contacting the First

them firemen, left 3 families Baptist Church, Hills and Dales General Hospital or Cass City Schools. În addition, canned goods and other non-perishable food items may be donated at the Cass

City IGA. Pawloski confirmed electrical problems were to blame for the fire. "The wiring was old. It just shorted out," he said last week, noting the fuse box was located at the rear of a second floor apartment above Sommers' Bak-

ery and Restaurant.

DAY OF HEROES

Fire fighters were called to

the scene at 2:19 p.m. Even before they arrived, however, apartment tenants were being evacuated thanks to the efforts of a passerby from Caro and a Sommers restaurant employee.

Pawloski said Eric Esckelson of Caro saw the smoke, grabbed a gas mask he had in his car and entered the building to help carry children and pets to safety.

Esckelson suffered smoke inhalation and was taken to Hills and Dales General Hospital for treatment, Pawloski

Debbie Wilt, who along with her husband, Charles, purchased the bakery last fall, credits employee Roger McKnight with saving the lives of Charles and others. Charles was sleeping when the fire broke out, she said, and McKnight ran upstairs and pounded on doors, waking him up and helping others to get out.

The Wilts have 3 children; 2 girls, ages 6 and 8, and a son, 4. Two of the kids were at school when the fire

started, and the third was with Debbie, who was on her way home from Sebewaing when she saw the smoke rising above Cass City.

Wilt said 3 adults and a child lived in one of the neighboring apartments. Arthur and Sandy Brinkman, and their 6 children lived in the other. Sandy, along with one of her children, and 2 others she was babysitting, was home when the blaze started, but all escaped along with several pets.

Another hero was Cass City Industrial Park tenant Detroit Edison, which sent a pair of bucket trucks to the scene, enabling fire fighters to attack the blaze from above. .

7 DEPARTMENTS

In all, nearly 70 firemen from 7 departments worked feverishly to quell the flames both in front and behind the bakery as the fire spread to the west into the Tri-County Medical Equipment Co. building.

The blaze threatened the Ben Franklin Store, just west of Tri-County Medical, and The Paint Store, located just east of the bakery. However, neither business sustained! significant damage.

Some tense moments followed a flashback of fire and smoke that caught a fireman in the face as he sprayed water through a second-floor window.

Pawloski indicated the breathing apparatus worn by . the fire fighter — Elmwood-Gagetown Fire Chief Paul: Lopez — probably saved his? life. Lopez was also taken: to Hills and Dales General: Please turn to back page.

Another Elmwood Road resident, Tom Burns, said the condition of the road resulted in a broken ball joint in one of his vehicles. "I'm getting tired of this. It's getting ridiculous," he added.

The residents said they have called the road commission, but "it's like talking to that wall."

Gruber said it's his understanding that township Supervisor Maynard Stine must give the road commission the go ahead to work on the road - that the township will pay for the work. But that isn't happening, according to Gruber, who pressed Stine for an answer as to why he hasn't approved repairs.



Council reviews audit

Edison tree trimming set to begin

A presentation on Detroit Edison's plans for tree trimming in the area, and an annual audit report highlighted a monthly meeting of the Cass City Village Council

Monday night. Detroit Edison spokesman Jim Owens explained the tree trimming/line clearing program, saying a firm contracted by Edison will be trimming trees in Cass City and throughout Elkland Township, as well as in portions of Elmwood, Ellington and Novesta townships over the next several weeks.

Owens said residents will be contact before trimming

In most cases, he said, Edison will request permission to remove trees where needed or requested. However, he added, the company does not request permission to trim trees because the utility is required by the FCC to maintain specific line clearances.

The number one objective, he explained, is to trim trees for safety and to maintain reliability of the system.

Owens acknowledged the work draws some complaints, but he assured the council that Edison will do all it can to explain the line

clearance program to residents, and to talk with customers when a concern arises. He noted there have been few complaints so far this year.

Turning to the audit, Joel Chamberlain of Yeo & Yeo CPA P.C., Marlette, gave the village's 1996 finances a clean bill of health. Chamberlain noted rev-

enues totaled \$1.528 million and expenditures were \$1.588 million. The resulting deficit was covered by fund balance, leaving the general fund balance of \$151,000 at the end of the

The village's SEV totalled \$44,599,000 in 1996, with tax revenues coming in at \$898,000.

IN OTHER BUSINESS

In other business, the council voted to review the lease the village has with the school regarding use of athletic facilities.

It was noted the school board recently approved a motion to extend the lease another 25 years, to the year

The current 25-year lease, in which the school agreed to pay the village \$1 per year, was inked in 1976.

The reason behind extending the lease now, Micklash explained in a letter, is that if the school is to invest money on capital improvements of leased facilities, school attorneys have advised that the length of the lease should extend beyond the life of various projects.

"In 1998 it will be necessary to do some track maintenance that will cost several thousand dollars," Micklash stated. "The stadium needs continual maintenance and there is discussion of improving the parking area

around the facility."

Also Monday, the council: Opened bids for the purchase of a 1997 F700 Ford Truck.

The council accepted the low bid of \$28,905.48, submitted by Tubbs Brothers of Sandusky. A second bid of \$29,067.98 was submitted by Diesel Truck Sales Inc., Saginaw.

•Learned the village will save several thousand dollars on a portion of planned pool repairs.

An initial cost estimate listed installation of a stainless steel gutter at \$127,000. But DPW Supt. Gary Barnes presented a sample of a concrete tile, manufactured by Tuckey Concrete Inc., that will be used instead. The cost is estimated at \$2,400 plus labor.

 Let stand a recommendation from the council's Parks and Recreation Committee to freeze the wages of summer employees to 1996 lev-

The wages range from \$4.25 per hour for co-op students, to \$8 for a manager at the park and wastewater treatment plant, to \$10 per hour for the parks and recreation director.

•Noted Elkland Township recently contributed \$2,000 to the village's annual summer recreation program.

•Approved transfer of the 1996 Class C liquor license granted to Gilligan's. The transfer was requested due to a change in ownership.

In a related matter, the council agreed it will urge the new owners to clean up the building inside and out to meet current village standards.

•Recognized wastewater plant Supt. Rick Mohr, who was recently awarded a plaque in recognition of 6 years of service as a member of the Michigan Rural Water Association Board of Directors.

 Addressed a question from Fred Matthews, representing Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, Cass City. Matthews said the church will be celebrating its 50th year in 1998, and members are considering purchasing an electronic bell tower to be used prior to services and on special occasions, such as weddings.

Matthews asked if there are any village ordinances that might affect those plans. Council members replied they can see no problem with the proposal.
