

Time for a clock? Council eyes new, tough ordinances

Cass City officials are looking at a proposal that would put more teeth into local ordinances.

The issue was discussed Tuesday night by the Cass City Village Council, which also established the 1997 millage rate during the rescheduled monthly meeting, and approved plans to purchase and install a large, courtyard style clock at the corner of Main and Seeger streets.

Trustee Sandie Haley, chairman of the council's Rules Committee, outlined the committee's work on updating about a half-dozen village ordinances with language that would make it easier to enforce the ordinances

Haley said the ordinances being looked at involve junk cars, refuse, dogs and curfews for minor children. In addition, the committee is reviewing new blight and noise ordinances.

Haley explained the proposed language changes would make a violation of the ordinances a civil infraction, rather than a misdemeanor, meaning police officers would issue tickets that would be handled in the court system, similar to the way traffic tickets are processed.

Haley said the committee is looking at a proposal calling for a fine of \$50 for the first offense, \$250 for the second offense and \$500 for the third offense.

With a civil infraction, Wilson explained, the ticketing officer, offender and magistrate meet, and the magistrate makes a decision regarding the case. If the offender fails to appear, the magistrate will automatically find in favor of the village. And, if an offender fails to pay, a contempt of court citation is issued, he said.

NO TAX HIKE

Turning to the village's 1997 tax rate, the council voted to levy a total of 18.5 mills, the same rate as in 1996.

The total breaks down into 12.5 mills for general operations, 3.5 mills for streets and 2.5 mills for debt (wastewater treatment plant). Tax revenue in 1997 is estimated at \$904,887, while expenditures are set at \$864,660, leaving a balance of \$40,227.

In other business, Cass City Downtown Development Authority members Jim Bolton, Tom Herron and Jim Kranz outlined a proposal to purchase and install a tower clock at the corner of Main and Seeger streets.

The project has been discussed since the village purchased the former Chemical Bank building. Village officials have talked about turning the corner lot, now used for parking, into a mini-park, with the clock serving as a focal point.

Kranz said the 4-sided clock, with faces measuring 30 inches in diameter, would stand about 15 feet tall. Cost of the clock is estimated at \$18,500, plus another \$1,500 for a base, installation and electrical work, according to Bolton, who said the DDA would like to complete the project this summer.

\$3,000 bonus for Micklash **New school** construction back on track

Construction at both the \$56,000 asbestos removal Cass City Middle School and the addition at Campbell Elementary School are back on schedule, overcoming the delay caused by a strike among the brick layers, Keith Hammis, project engineer, told the Cass City School Board at its regular meeting Tuesday night at the high school.

We are on schedule for the middle school and way ahead of the timetable for the Campbell addition, Hammis explained. That means that the Campbell addition will be ready for occupancy when school starts in the fall and the middle school doors will swing open at the start of the second semester in the 1997-8 school year.

Several other projects involving the middle school construction were decided. The board voted to buy plastic bleachers for the gym instead of wood. The plastic is expected to cost about \$1,850 more than the wood in a total expenditure of around \$30,000.

Supt. Ken Micklash has taken an active role in the construction at the 2 schools, supervising the purchasing and installation of about \$300,000 worth of items not covered in the construction contract. He also forfeited about 2 weeks of his vacation time.

To meet state requirements, the school day will be lengthened in 1997-8. At Campbell and Deford the school starts 8 minutes earlier (8:12 a.m.) and ends 7 minutes later

(3:07 p.m.) At the middle school classes will start at 8:15 instead of 8:20, ending as always at 3 p.m.

At the high school classes start at 8:20 (now 8:25) and end at 3:15 p.m. (now 3:10). A total of 180 days of instruction will be scheduled. Please turn to back page.

Troopers withheld the suspect's name pending his arraignment, which was scheduled to take place late Tuesday in Tuscola County District Court.

Public Notice - Weed Control

Notice is hereby given that the growing of noxious weeds on property within the Village of Cass City is prohibited by State Law and any such weeds must be cut by the property owner, tenant, or occupant of the property on or before June 1, 1997, and again thereafter on or before August 15, 1997.

"Noxious weeds" include Canada thistle (Circium arvense), dodders (any species of Cuscuta), mustards (charlock, black mustard and Indian mustard, species of Brassica or Sinapic), wild carrot (Dancus carota), bindweed (Convolvulus arvensis), perennials sowthistle (Sonchus arvensis), hoary alyssum (Berteroa incana), ragweed (ambrosia elatior 1.) and poison ivy (rhus toxicodendron), poison sumac (toxicondendron vermix), oxeyes daisies, ragweed, goldenrod, or other plant which is recognized as deleterious to health, safety, or public welfare and recognized as common nuisance.

If the weeds are not cut, the village will enter the property and do so; and all costs incurred shall be chargeable to the property owner, tenant or occupant, who may also be subject to prosecution and fine under State Law.
