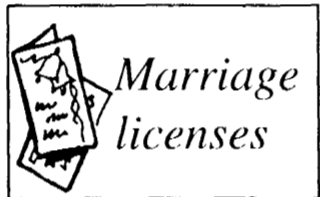
Erin Michelle Zdrojewski

Family tree is subject for Historical Society

The Cass City Area Historical Society met May 19 in the new meeting room at Rawson Memorial Library.

The program for the evening was presented by Sean Zawilinski on "Researching Your Family Tree Using Cemetery Records." Zawilinski and her mother have visited more than 115 cemeteries in the past 2 years while gathering facts about her family branches.

They used geological surveys, maps, and state gazetteers to locate both public and private cemeteries located in many states. She explained that county records are at the Tuscola County Courthouse, where birth and death records begin in 1866, and marriage records begin in 1851. Her mother gave her a certificate acknowledging that Sean is a member of one of the first families of Tennessee.

Zawilinski presented the society with a book called "How to Preserve Your Cemetery," and said that it is a sacred responsibility to respect and preserve cemeteries.

In other action, President Katie Jackson reported that the first in a series of Cass City Post Cards have arrived, and they include a 1914 com-

posite of Cass City buildings a 1950s picture of Main Street looking west, and a 1996 Christmas scene of Main Street looking east. These will be available for purchase at many locations throughout Cass City.

A special thanks was given to John Agar, George Bushong, Jerry Cleland and Bob Gengler, for recent meetings that have centered around family trees using the computer.

Jackson also reminded the membership that the museum, located in the municipal building, will be changed to a new theme, and that historical donations will be accepted either on loan or as gifts.

The society will participate in the Fourth of July celebration, and the group's annual meeting will be held Monday, July 21, at Rawson Memorial Library.

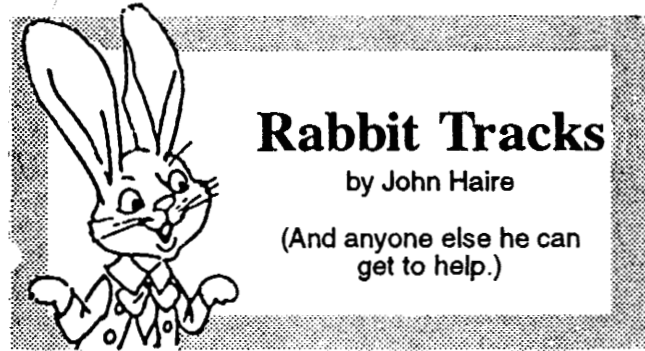

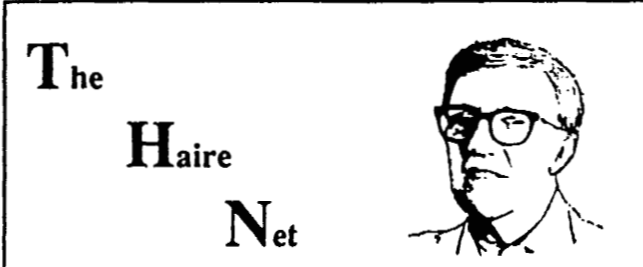

The TV newscasters are big on animals these days. There's nothing like a trip to the zoo or a cat up a tree to fill some time on slow news days.

I would hesitate to guess how many cats I've seen rescued on television. Each rescue reminds me of the big gray kitten we got from friends years ago.

Our friends had 2 kittens, but I knew right away which one we wanted. One was small and friendly, and the other was much larger - - but a bit wild.

I talked my wife into getting the wild one because I wanted a cat that can stand up for himself. One that strikes fear into the hearts of small mammals. A cat that can hunt bulldogs with a switch.

When we got home I put the kitty in the bathroom and promised to put him in the shop the next morning. The next day the kitty and I headed for the shop.

The cat's feet had barely hit the ground when he took off as if he planned to run the 30 miles back to his old farmstead. I couldn't catch him but finally caught up and herded him back toward the house.

The net hung about 3 feet from the ground and Russ was supposed to bag the cat with a fishing net when he hit the plastic. I reached up toward the cat.

"Nice kitty. That's a nice kitty. Just stick your leg over here."

Then, Awrrr, Phfft! Phfft!, Arawrrrrr! Yeoww-r-r-r!

Kerthump!" "Get the net! Get the net!" "Whoomp! "Got him!" "Good job, Russ! Now, put the cat in the shop and call the fire department to see if they can get me out of this tree."

Farmers to benefit from tax legislation

A farmer's cooperative may soon be able to exclude from the adjusted tax base the revenue and expenses attributable to business transacted with a farmer or farmer cooperative corporation patrons under legislation sponsored by Senator Joel Gougeon (R-Bay City).

The legislation amends the Single Business Tax Act and would apply after Dec. 21, 1990. "With more farmers joining cooperative corporations, more farmers will benefit from this legislation," Gougeon said. "In effect, this legislation reduces the tax base at which cooperative farmers are based and that is good news for many farmers."

A farmer's cooperative corporation would not be exempt from the tax if the corporations' incidental and emergency purchases are equal to or greater than either of the following.

Follow safety rules to avoid boat accidents

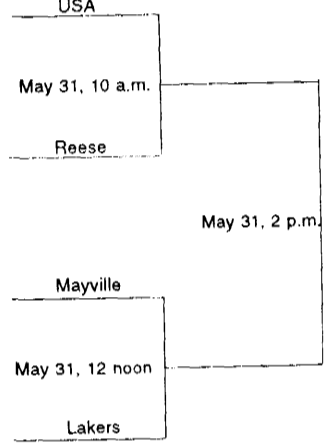
Hawks bow to Lakers in pre-district battle Tuesday

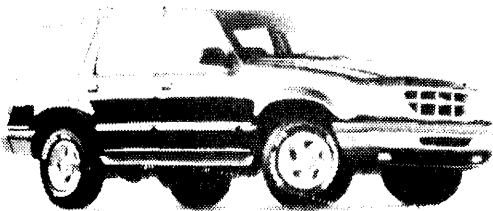

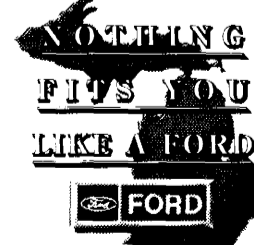

Do you know anything about a newspaper serving Gagetown in the above time frame? And if so, where I could find old copies or microfilmed copies?

In case it helps, her parents were Dr. William Joseph Sugnet and Nellie Hennessey Sugnet. Nellie's parents, William Hennessey and Margaret Rourke Hennessey, came to Gagetown in about 1879 from Canada. According to one relative, they were the second family to settle there and "it could have been

named Hennesseyville if William's horses had been faster". William was a blacksmith and he moved to Detroit in 1909 after his wife died.

I would greatly appreciate any help you can give me since I have been unable to find out anything about the Hennessey family.

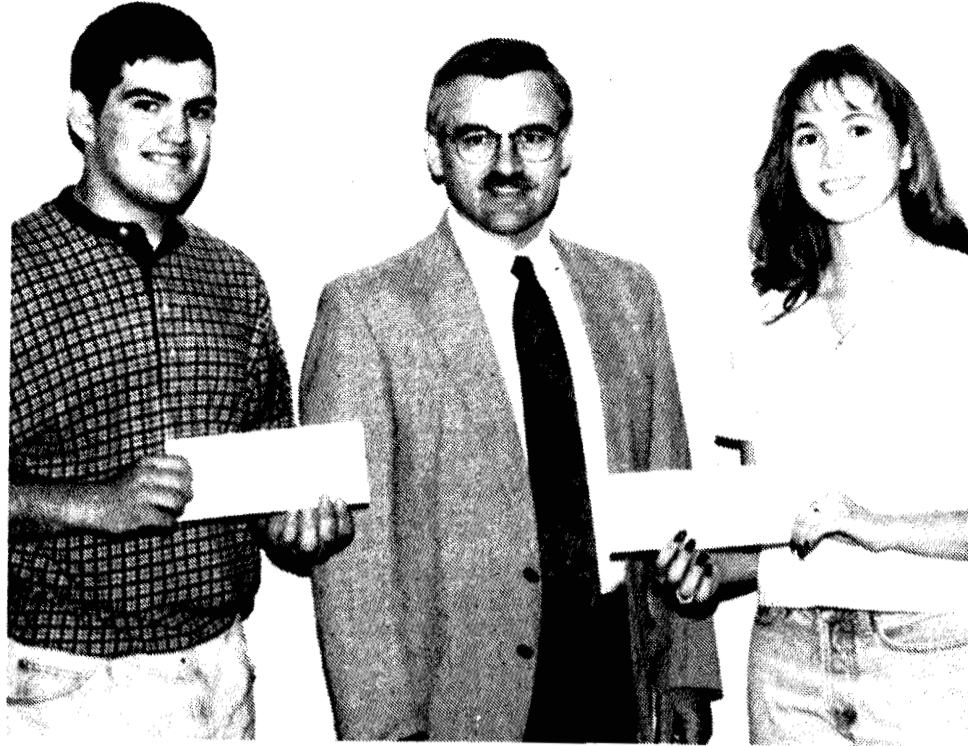

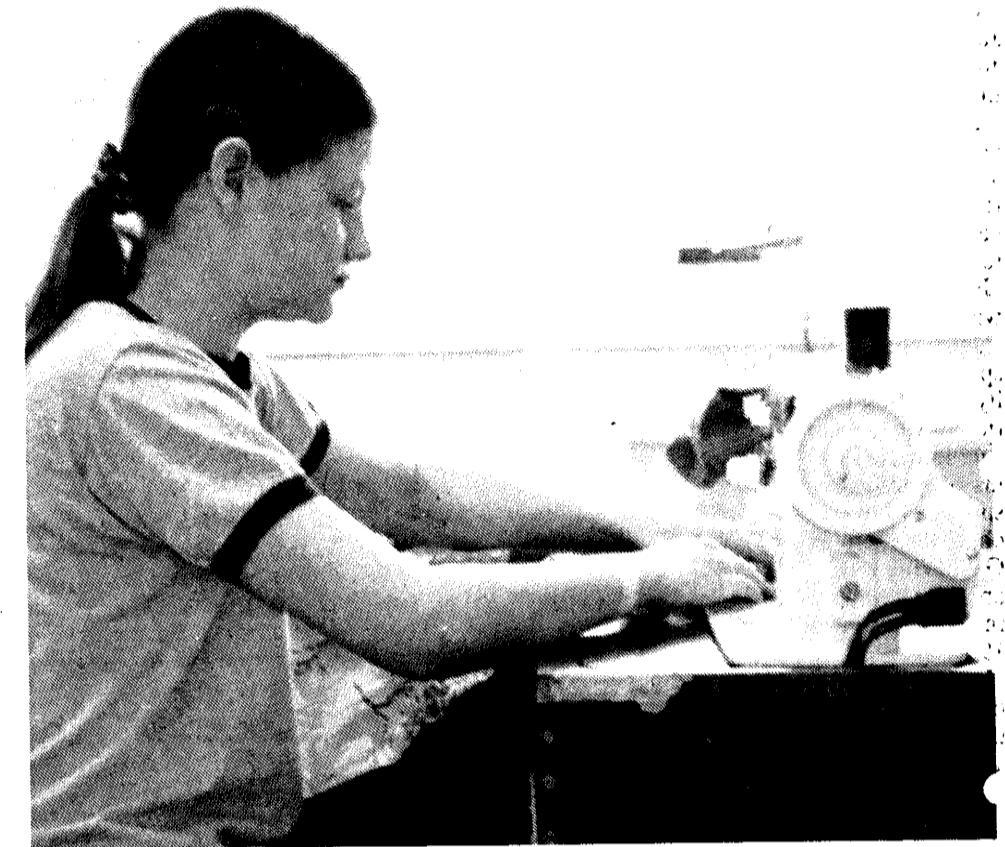
