Ted Morgan: retiring sexton says nothing has changed

Ted Morgan has received some unusual calls during his lengthy tenure as the Elkland Township Cemetery sexton.

He recently recalled walking up to a towering pine tree on the west side of the cemetery several years ago, and seeing a man sitting halfway up the tree, while another man sat at the base of the

Morgan asked the men what they were doing. He didn't get much of an explanation, so he simply told them tree climbing wasn't allowed.

Then there was the time when he got a call from someone reporting that a man was standing on a large tombstone with his arms stretched out.

Morgan said he went to investigate and learned the man was trying to direct traffic for a road rally coming south on Schwegler Road to M-81. Morgan asked the man to get down, and he did, "jumping off like a bird. He could have gotten hurt doing

All in all, however, Morgan says his work has been fairly quiet, and everything has gone pretty smoothly over the years.

"I never thought in my lifetime I'd do this kind of work," the personable Cass City man commented with a chuckle. "But it turned out I enjoyed my work. It's just been a good job."

Morgan, 69, has been a familiar, helpful presence to grieving families in the area for 2 decades. In August, he will hand the reins over to

Morgan, whose wife, Marilyn, recently retired from her job as a secretary at Deford Elementary School, took the job of sexton after closing the books on some 25 years of dairy farming. At the time, Charles

Bigelow was closing out a 36-year career as sexton. "I worked with him for a year," Morgan recalled. "He was a good teacher and good man," he said. "He was the best."

STILL THE SAME

Morgan said the duties of sexton remain the same as they did when he started. "Nothing's changed out here, I don't think, for a long time," he added.

Taking care of burials --arranging for graves to be dug, helping with the delivery of vaults, putting in headstone foundations etc. — is still the first priority.

The duties also include overseeing layout of the graves, selling lots and keeping the books, he noted.

Perhaps the greatest amount of work goes into keeping the grounds maintained, no small task when the grounds cover 28 acres.

Morgan said it takes about 3 1/2 days for a crew of himself and 3 others to mow the cemetery. The busiest time of the year is in May and June, when the grounds are mowed weekly. "Getting ready for Memorial Day is a

big deal. But the work doesn't end

new township Sexton Don there. "There's always something to do," he continued. Headstones have to be straightened, weeds need to be trimmed, shrubs have to be trimmed and downed limbs picked up.

In terms of burials, Morgan said his working hours vary from week to week, much the same as a mortician. "You're on call all the time. When I go away, I have to call home every night to see if there's any business."

He acknowledged there are times when arranging for burials is difficult, especially when the deceased is a friend or acquaintance.

"You never know when or who," Morgan said. "That's hard, and (deaths involving) children. That kind of bothers me.

Censorship debated

O-G kids protest contract for football

lining football players' obligations, and censorship of profanity in school textbooks dominated a monthly Owen-Gage Board of Education meeting Monday night.

Two Owen-Gage football players, Aaron Baker and Dan Dorsch, addressed the board, saying they disagree with a proposed contract drawn up by football coaches Doug Hassler and Joseph Candela and presented to football players.

The contract states that players who don't sign don't play, according to Baker. 'We feel it is unfair because we are not getting paid to play," he said.

Baker also said he disagrees with a rule that players wear shirts and dress slacks on game days, rather than the traditional jerseys.

Baker and Dorsch stated their views are shared by a majority of their teammates.

Baker added the contract penalizes players who also play golf, because a player who misses a football practice to attend a golf meet is required to do 50 "up and downs", an exercise, to make up for the missed football practice.

Golf Coach Dave Salcido voiced support for the contract, saying Hassler and Candela are trying to give their players some direction. He indicated, however, that he doesn't want to see golfers punished.

"All they're trying to do. . is better the program," he said. "That's all they're trying to do."

In all, 26 kids have signed up for football, and 8 to 10 have returned the contract signed, according to Candela, who told the board he and Hassler came up with the contract in an effort to build a successful program.

"What we need, if we want to win, is commitment," he

Making players do "up and downs" for missing a practice is not a punishment, Candela stressed. It's a conditioning exercise that will reduce the risk of injury, especially in the case of a player who has missed the conditioning that takes place during a football practice, he

Candela and Hassler acknowledged the original pro-

The 12:15 p.m. blast leveled the plant, sending metal debris flying more than a quarter mile away. Homes and buildings shook, and smoke from the subsequent fire could be seen as far as Sebewaing, witnesses said.

Mattlin said the explosion occurred as a semi-tractor truck transferred liquid propane from its 10,000-gallon tanker trailer into a 10,000gallon stationary tank at the

Miraculously, there were no deaths, although 3 workers were hurt. Two of the injured were treated for burns and released. Mattlin said the third person, the driver of the semi-tractor, remains hospitalized at St. Mary's Medi-

cal Center in Saginaw.

Destroyed in the explosion was the propane tanker as well as most of the equipment at the plant site, including at least one, possibly 2, asphalt haulers, according to Mattlin, who noted 2 private vehicles were also destroyed.

Damage estimates continued to climb last week as investigators and plant officials added up the toll of lost equipment. "It's going to be more than \$1 million,'

Walter Swiastyn, 39, won one of 2 available 4-year seats on the Owen-Gage Board, receiving 206 votes Monday. Winning the other seat was newcomer Tom Mellendorf, 42, who garnered 179 votes. Also seeking a seat was Bill Perdue, who received 47 votes.

Swiastyn served on the Owen-Gage Board for 8 years before narrowly losing a reelection bid last June.

He and Mellendorf will fill vacancies left by veteran board Trustee Mary Ann Abbe and current board President Terry Muntz, who served 4 years. Both decided not to seek reelection. In other area school dis-

The back forty by Roger Pond

I've always wanted to be a farmer. I just never knew how to get started.

Help is on the way, however. The Farm Services Administration (FSA) has some new special assistance programs that seem perfect for people like me — who would like to start farming, but don't have the slightest idea how to go about it.

These programs target loan funds to qualified beginning farmers. A beginning farmer is defined as an applicant who has not operated a farm for more than 10 years. That lets me in.

I know folks will quibble about this. How can the government determine if a person has been operating his farm? (Except for asking the neighbors, of course.)

It's pretty obvious a guy like me isn't doing any farming but how about the borderline cases? The neighbors, or perhaps the wife, will have to rule on those.

Requirement number 2 for beginning farmer loans is the applicant "would actively participate in the management and operation of the farm." This means a fellow can't just head off to town and leave all the work for his wife to do.

It's a good thing some of the older guys didn't have to start out that way. The USDA is trying to change the face of agriculture.

Number 3, "The beginning farmer must not have an ownership interest in a farm that exceeds 25 percent of the average acreage for a farm in the county where the property is located.'

No problem. I only have 8 acres.

Fourth, the beginning farmer must "demonstrate a lack of resources needed to operate a farm on a viable scale.'

Me again. There's no chance I could operate a farm on a viable scale --- or any other scale for that matter. Finally, beginning farmers must agree to participate in management and training programs required by FSA. That's the kicker for me.

If a person meets all of the other requirements and still has the slightest chance for success, this one should get him. I have never seen a farmer trained by the government, but that should be interesting.

I know there are more requirements for these loans. But I'm so well-qualified in the major categories, the technicalities should be a piece of cake.

Some folks say I'm too old for a beginning farmer, but USDA newsletters put the kibosh on that idea. These missives state, "USDA programs are available to all without discrimination regarding race, gender, national origin, religion, age, disability, and sexual orien-

The way I see it, my only problem with a beginning farmer loan is the nagging suspicion they might expect me to pay it back.



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
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
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

Catherine Petroski

Cass City connection brings author to Thumb

While passing through Michigan, an author stopped by Cass City last Thursday to thank a man who helped her with her recent book.

Catherine Petroski, author of "A Bride's Passage," came to Cass City to meet a relative of the heroine of her book.

The book centers around a woman, Susan Hathorn, who married her husband, a sea captain, in 1854. Almost immediately she accompanied her husband on a sail at sea, which Petroski said was out of character for many women of that time.

Petroski got the idea for the book after discovering Hathorn's diary at the library at Duke University.

During the writing and researching of the book, Petroski said she hit a snag in the research which led her to Cass City, or Fred Auten, to be more precise, the grandson of Elizabeth Libby Auten. Elizabeth Libby Auten was the stepdaughter of Susan Hathorn, the subject of the book.

Fred now lives in Elizabeth Libby Auten's home. Fred said he believes she moved to Cass City in the 1880's.

Petroski said she contacted him to see if he had any pictures of Hathorn. She added there weren't many people to choose from when it came to people having any ties with Hathorn, for all blood relatives have since passed away.

"She has no direct live blood descendents," Petroski explained.

Auten told Petroski he did indeed have pictures of Hathorn, and he sent them to her. The photo is featured in the book as well as in many magazines which have printed reviews on the book. Petroski, who visited for the day, took the opportunity to visit with Auten and to see the house where Elizabeth Libby Auten resided while living in Cass City.

Petroski began research for the book in 1992, when she came upon Hathorn's diary stored at Duke University. She said she was so intrigued by the diary and what this woman endured, she decided to write a book about it.

"I just think she was an amazing woman," she said.

Fred Auten also commented he believed the woman was ahead of her time, and the story also tells a part of history that isn't in some books.

"The book fills the gap for what women were doing in the 1800's," he said.

Petroski said this is her first work of non-fiction, and she said she really enjoyed writ-

She said it is a challenge to tell a story of non-fiction and to draw the reader through it. "I love it," she said. "It can be a real creative enterprise."

The first step is to identify the weed species in the field. The next step is to select a postemergence herbicide or tank mix that will control the weeds present at the time of spraying. Table 1H, page 65, in E-434 will be helpful, Kells says.

"Consider which weed species are the most serious problem and then target those species," Kells say. "In most cases, growers will be better off if they focus on the worst weeds rather than try to do everything at

"All of the herbicide opto minimize potential herbi-

"In general, injury from systemic herbicides is of greater concern than injury from contact (burn) herbicides. This is not the time to take chances with 'hot' herbicide combinations or additives. I suggest staying near the lower end of the rate range with systemic herbicides and avoiding additives that 'heat up' the treatment.'

Drop nozzles are not popular for a variety of reasons, but they may be the only option for getting the herbicide in direct contact with the weeds while minimizing contact with the corn leaves and subsequent injury to the plants.

Kells says that growers should read the herbicide labels carefully and refer to page 40 of Extension bulletin E-434.

Details on Kells' recommendations postemergence weed control in corn are in the June 27 edition of the MSU Crop Advisory Team (CAT) Alert. The publication should be available from the county MSU Extension agricultural agent.


Rawson on winning university crew team

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

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

*Control your emotional outbursts around your children. Breakdown of control on a parent's part can be frightening to a child.

*Assure each child that you and your spouse were in love when the child was born. It's important that a child know that he or she is a product of

*In determining custody, put your own insecurities and fears second to the child's. You and your spouse should decide whether the child's best interest would be served through individual, joint or split custody arrangements.

*Don't put your child in the position of spying and reporting on the activities of your former spouse. This

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encourages feelings of divided loyalty and makes the child feel he or she has to take sides between 2 loved

*Avoid any romantic teasing with your former spouse. This behavior will confuse the children and encourage their reconciliation fantasies.

*When you begin dating someone else, allow your children and your new partner to get to know each other in a gradual, natural way. This often requires a great deal of time, patience and sensitivity toward a child who may be reluctant to accept the new person.

*Above all, don't ignore significant behavior changes in your child. Children who become very withdrawn or begin to act out in inappropriate ways may be sending out a signal for additional help in adjusting.

He acknowledged that "official cemetery greeter" is also part of the sexton's responsibilities. And it's been one of the nicer aspects of the job, he said.

"I like to talk to people. You get to know a lot of families and who they're related to. You get to know a lot of people.

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New technique saving land



The Dust Bowl of the 1930s caused President Franklin D. Roosevelt to say "The nation that destroys

(NAPS)-In the early 1930's, along with the greatest depression this nation ever experienced, came an equally unparalleled ecological disaster known as the Dust Bowl.
