Report best beet crop since 1990

A snow storm that hampered the Thumb over the weekend will slow the area's sugar beet harvest, but it didn't hamper enthusiasm among growers and Michigan Sugar Co. officials.

"This crop is probably the best — the highest tonnage crop — since 1990," said Robert Braem, Michigan Sugar's vice-president of agriculture.

"We're well ahead of schedule and the harvest has gone very well up until yesterday afternoon," he added Monday.

Braem said the weekend storm "will slow the harvest for a short period, but we'll get back at it."

An estimated 90 percent of the beets expected by Michigan Sugar Co. have been harvested to-date. "We're looking for 2 million tons in total," Braem explained, noting the Caro plant is slated to receive 350,000 tons, while the remainder of the crop will go to the company's plants in Croswell, Sebewaing and Carrollton.

Braem said yields are averaging close to 20 tons per acre, significantly better than the 17 or 18 tons per acre seen in recent years. And, he pointed out, sugar content is

Asbestos payment helps

School forges ahead with final expansion plans

Supt. Ken Micklash announced plans for continued improvement of school facilities made possible by a \$46,542 payment for damages in asbestos removal and a healthy general fund. The capital improvement plan was authorized by the Cass City School Board in its regular monthly session Monday at the school.

Micklash passed out copies of a check received in September as the second payment received due to asbestos litigation, and indicated that the school would receive a third check in the fall of 1998 so that the total payment will probably be \$155,000.

The first payment was used to blacktop the parking area on the east side of the high school and the Deford parking lot. The check received this year will be used for the parking areas at Campbell School, the annex building and the parking lot at the athletic field at Cass City Recreational Park.

In the school's general fund budget, \$200,000 has been reserved to convert the middle school annex into a childhood center for Campbell School's preschool and kindergarten program. The addition to the annex follows the addition at Campbell and Micklash said that when all the projects are completed, the district will have the same amount of space as was requested in the first bond proposal rejected by the voters.

Over a 3 to 4-year period, the 2 expansions will have taken an estimated \$400,000 from the general fund. The improvements have been made while the school has added to the contingency fund, which will reach \$992,395, according to the revised budget adopted by the board Monday.

The budget adopted by the board calls for an increase in

expenditures of .0344 percent to a total of \$9,183,264 from actual 1996-7 expenditures of \$8,877,576. The 1997-8 fund balance is ex-

pected to be \$992,395. Micklash said that he did not expect that the newly adopted budget will need to be revised. A breakdown of

the budget appears on page 14.

Approve service contract

Okay annexation of Methodist Church land

The Cass City Village Council Monday voted in favor of an annexation request and approved a 2-year waste service contract that guarantees no fee increase for village residents.

The annexation request was presented in a letter from the trustees of the United Methodist Church of Cass City, which is currently constructing a new building just north of the village. The annexation involves a 5-acre parcel and would provide the new church with village sewer service.

The request was accompanied by annexation requests from John and Kally Maharg, Grant and Mary Hutchinson and Tom and Linda Herron, all of whom have agreed to grant the church 66-foot easements to allow the village to run a new sewer line to the church.

The council adopted a resolution recommending approval of the requests by the Tuscola County Board of Commissioners, which will be petitioned to take up the matter. The county board typically grants such requests after holding a public hearing.

Turning to village waste service, the council approved a proposal presented by Dave Lewis of Cove Sanitation Inc., Bad Axe, who offered the village a 2-year extension at no additional cost.

The extension locks in the current charge of \$8 per household per month for weekly garbage service, composting and recycling as stipulated in the village's current contract. Cove has served Cass City for the past 3 years.

In other business during the monthly meeting, the council learned Village Manager Lou S. LaPonsie will represent Cass City at a meeting called to discuss the Michigan Department of Transportation's proposed takeover of some primary county roads and some of the major streets throughout the state, including some in Tuscola County.

The meeting will be held Wednesday, Nov. 5, starting at 1 p.m. at the Tuscola County Road Commission's office in Caro.

In a letter to the council, County Highway Engineer Robert J. Wellington noted the road commission has not yet made a decision on the proposed takeover. "We feel MDOT's proposal needs further study and discussion locally before" making a decision, Wellington stated.

The only road in Cass City affected by the state's proposal is the one mile of Seeger Street located within the village.

LaPonsie indicated his biggest concern regarding the

proposed takeover is whether the state would continue to reimburse the village for maintenance of the roadway, as it does now for maintenance on M-81.

Also Monday, the council:
• Approved a bid of \$3,975 submitted by Robert Bliss to put a new roof on the village pool building. Also vying for the job was Ray Hendrick, who submitted a bid of \$4,885.

• Learned the individual who has been offered the job of Cass City village manager has accepted the post. Jane A. Downing of Romulus is scheduled to begin her new duties Monday, Nov. 3. She fills a vacancy created by LaPonsie's retirement at the end of the year.

• Heard from resident Doug Mills, who asked if hunting is allowed on the now-closed village landfill property. Mills said hunters and other traffic are clogging a private road on the property, and he asked that a gate be installed to curb the problem.

LaPonsie said hunting is not allowed on any village property. The council agreed to look into the matter further, with plans to post the land as soon as possible.

Survey planned

Seek area bus service in Cass City

Having a dependable mode of transportation is a lot like many of today's conveniences; driving is easy to take for granted until that car, or the ability to drive, is taken away.

Just ask Mary Ann Cooper, a senior citizen in the Cass City area, who, like many others, is unable to drive due to health reasons.

Cooper, who drove for some 50 years before poor eyesight forced her to hang up her car keys about 3 years ago, misses the independence driving meant for her.

"Everybody's willing to take me, but it's very hard to ask," she said. "When I want to go someplace, I have to bug my husband. He never complains, but once in awhile it would be nice to just go."

Cooper is among a number of residents who would very much like to see a bus service come to the Cass City area.

It's an idea whose time may have come.

Caro Transit Authority officials are looking into the possibility of expanding bus service beyond Indianfields and Almer townships. Towards that end, officials are in the process of preparing a mail survey to determine if there is enough interest to proceed.

"We're interested in going county-wide," said Lois Sutton, who serves as chairman of the Caro Transit Authority, a public non-profit corporation that contracts with the Human Development Commission to operate the Caro Thumbbody Express.

Sutton said the service, which has 7 buses, all equipped with wheelchair lifts, is funded by state and federal dollars through the Michigan Department of Transportation. In addition, one-mill taxes are levied in both Indianfields and Almer townships.

The local tax dollars make it possible to charge very reasonable rates to residents living in the 2-township service area, according to HDC Business Director Judy Murphy, who oversees administration of the bus program.

Currently, she explained, adults ages 18 years to 59

years pay \$1.25 for a one-way trip anywhere within the service area. Riders ages 5 to 17 years pay \$1, senior citizens pay just 60 cents and riders under the age of 5 ride free.

"I don't think there has been a rate increase, I would say, in the past 8 to 10 years," she said.

The bus service occasionally provides rides to residents living outside of Indianfields and Almer townships, but it's expensive. A senior citizen living in the Cass City area, for example, would be charged \$7.50 for a ride to Caro, while a younger adult would pay \$15.

Murphy pointed out demand for bus transportation in the existing service area is high. "More than we can

meet at times," she added. "With days like this (Monday), we are generally busier."

Among the growing clientele are parents who contract with the bus service to transport their children to and from school; rides to day care programs, and, of course, demand on the part of senior citizens. "That is a big one, especially disabled seniors."

Murphy said Caro Thumbbody Express provided close to 61,000 rides last year, and nearly one-quarter of the riders were senior citizens.

Provided enough residents are interested enough and willing to pass a special tax levy to help fund the service, buses could be traveling throughout Tuscola County,

offering dependable transportation at an affordable price.


But it's too early for predictions. The decision-making process is going to take time, according to Murphy, who said she knows there is a demand for the service in Cass City and other areas.

Officials hope to learn just how much interest is generated by the surveys, which will be distributed over the next few weeks. Murphy said the survey process is expected to take a year to complete.

Officials will then try to determine if there is enough interest to expand bus service, and whether it will be feasible to expand only in certain areas if there isn't enough support to go county-wide with the service.

Balloons give some indication of how fresh the sale is by their very condition.


We will make sure prices are clearly marked at our garage sale. It's a lot of work to mark every item, but most people don't like to have to ask how much it costs.

It's sure that some of you were called to answer a survey conducted recently by Detroit Edison. Some of you probably agreed, as I did, to spend about 15 minutes answering questions.

Just how meaningful the answers will be and how much light they will shed is open to doubt. Major doubt. The survey was designed to determine how major problems and issues are viewed by the community. Naturally, answers will be tinted by personal beliefs and spheres of interest. The survey asks for ratings on each topic on a 0-10 scale.

What it did do was force me to consider how we are facing the problems and how important they are to the majority.

It's hard for me to believe when accessing community concerns that employment wouldn't top the list. Give it a 10.

The survey broke down general categories. Concerning senior citizen programs, for instance, it asks how funeral assistance, food and milk and adequate health care assistance are viewed.

For space reasons, we will stick with a few of the general categories and how I felt the community viewed them. Senior citizen programs rate about a 5 in my book. Darn important to those already there and those about ready to qualify, but not of much account to those with most of a lifetime ahead.

The environment rates about a 6. We'd rate it higher except it's an area where we talk the talk but often fail to walk the walk.

The survey wants to know how much summer jobs, scholarships and related activities concern us. It was tempting to put it down the list, say about a 4, but how can you do that when a new school building and a building addition is nearing completion? Give it a 6.

Ranking far down the list is downtown development and revitalization. I give it about a 3. Remember this is the community's reaction as I see it. For me as part of a special interest group, it ranks at the very top, a 10.

The very same rating is earned by the community's reaction for assistance to small business.

The questionnaire wants to find out how important the use of drugs and alcohol are

to the residents. That rates about 8, of more interest than the problem of crime, which checks in about a 7. I rated it lower than the use of drugs because drugs affect more families and crime is viewed as a lesser problem in the Thumb.

Finally, public safety gets about a 4 because most folks feel comfortable living in the community.

It's certain that your assessment of these issues will be different.

What makes it worthwhile is not that the results will change a thing, but it made me (and you?) hesitate a moment and consider where we are and where we may be headed.



The back forty

I'm starting to get excited about this El Nino thing. Weather forecasters say this year's El Nino could compare with the 1982-83 event that caused rain, drought, wind, and calm spells in much of the world.

Government officials, weather experts, and 150 reporters met in California recently to see if they could talk El Nino back out to sea. Scientists believe hot air from the California summit could counteract warm air from the ocean, pushing the jet stream north, and sending storms to Alaska where folks are used to that kind of stuff. (Now that I have the jargon down, I believe I could forecast weather with the best of them.)

The El Nino summit gives a new slant to the old saying, "Everyone talks about the weather, but nobody does anything about it." Now we have an administration that thinks government should do something about everything.

Featured speakers at the California conference were Vice President Al Gore, who said, "We are here to get in front of this El Nino." Conference organizers were surprised to get Gore, considering the size of his phone bill, but he found the money somewhere.

The Vice President was backed up by James L. Witt, head of the Federal Emergency Management Agency. Witt is a former Arkansas county judge, who probably understands the weather as well as the next person.

These guys couldn't attend (or weren't invited to) the El Nino summit convened by California Gov. Pete Wilson a week before. The republicans have their own weather forecasters.

Witt and the Vice President both hinted that El Ninos are likely caused by global warming, which is coming up at the United Nations conference in a few short weeks. (Tickets available at the White House.)

"The ground we break here

is preparing for this El Nino will help us prepare for the face of America's changing climate," Witt said.

I have to agree with him there. I'd rather prepare for the face of anything than other parts that could be far less agreeable.

The main thrust of the California summit was that folks need to be prepared. Those who live in Southern California are advised to keep their boots on this winter.

Several experts suggested those who live in flood-prone areas should get flood insurance. Folks who have sandbags should get some sand. Those who have sand are advised to get some bags.

People who own firewood should cover it up. Everyone

is advised to clean out their gutters.

This might seem like common sense to the layman, but what do we know about climate, weather, global warming? All we know is what the news media and the popular press chooses to tell us.

From what I can tell, that isn't very enlightening.

The following editorial, which pertains to the improving trend of Michigan public schools, was taken from the October 1997 issue of Fortnighter, a publication of the Michigan Association of School Administrators.

"If the first month is any indicator, Michigan's public schools are in for another banner year. Enrollments are up, districts have opened smoothly, and standardized test results have risen again.

For the fourth time in 5 years, scores on the ACT college admissions test have increased. In fact, the national composite score has either increased or stayed constant for a record 8 consecutive years according to data released by the U.S. Department of Education. This is at a time when more people than ever are taking the test, which makes it all the more remarkable.

Michigan's composite score has always been above the national average and continues to improve. This impressive scoring is based on more than 66,000 students being tested last year, which is 68% of our graduates. Scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), which is taken by fewer students, are even more impressive. Michigan's average scores far outstrip those of the nation.

The State's standardized testing program also showed significant gains, particularly in the area of writing. In addition, the United States' fourth graders, including Michigan's, were well above average in math and science when compared with students in 19 other countries.

The results are more evidence of the continuing improvement of our public education system, both in Michigan and elsewhere. This improvement has come about because of the changes and efforts made by schools. They have developed programs to meet the needs of a constantly changing public school population that ranges from special education to socially and economically disadvantaged to gifted and talented children. The task is not complete, but significant progress has been made.

In economic terms, the public schools are producing an excellent return on investment. Viewed another way, they clearly are good and getting better."



"Being prepared," said junior Becky Oesch.

"And keeping your ears open and being able to improvise," added senior Andrew Hartwick.

The pair, along with 3 other

teammates, sophomores Kristy Ryan and Jesse Hillaker, and junior Rose Hoelzle, all agree time spent researching this year's topic — increasing renewable energy sources — has paid off big.

The debaters noted they and the rest of the Cass City team have been researching the topic since it was announced

last January. Hoelzle said the 2-week debate camp she attended earlier this year along with Oesch and Ryan also proved to be a big help.

In debate, a 2-person team presents an affirmative argument in favor of solar or wind power, for example, and another team presents an argument opposing the affirmative presentation.

Which is why it's so important to spend a lot of time exploring and learning about a given year's debate topic.

The Cass City debaters have done their homework and it shows. The team has won about 20 trophies in just 3 tournament appearances this year.

Half of the trophies came from the Dexter Tournament, held earlier this month near Ann Arbor, where the Red Hawks advanced in every division they entered, claiming 10 trophies in all. The honors included 3 of the top 5 individual speaking trophies and a first-place finish in the open team division.

With only 2 more regular season tournaments left this year, Cass City Coach Chad Daniels is beginning to look forward to watching his charges compete at the state level.

Daniels said he believes his novice debaters will advance beyond districts, which requires a team to win 5 of 8 debates. Last year's team did just that and went on to be named the best Class C team in the state tournament.

The question is, how will the novice debaters stack up to teams from all classes, Daniels said.

The varsity team, meanwhile, is already a lock-in for state based on its overall performance to-date, and the team is looking to better its fifth place finish last year.

The preliminary state competition for novice debaters gets underway in December, followed by state competition a week later. District action for varsity debaters will begin in January, followed by the state tourney.

If attitude and expectations count, the Cass City debaters should be in the thick of both tourneys.

"We have high goals," commented Hartwick when asked if he and his fellow debaters are surprised at their success so far this year. "We have high standards when we go."

Women of all ages are encouraged to attend. Do not be misled into thinking that such a violent act could never happen to you.


Emmert qualifies for state finals

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
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Hawks top Bad Axe

Key games ahead in hoop title chase

Fresh from a decisive 69-39 victory over the Bad Axe Hatchets Thursday, the Cass City Red Hawk hoop team's chances for a Greater Thumb West title will depend on its effort in the next 3 games.

Not that victories in the 3 games will assure a title, but a loss would severely damage hopes and 2 losses just about kill any chances for a championship.

The win enabled All Saints to share the Greater Thumb West title with USA and Lakers, all with 5-1 records.


All Saints just dominated both sides of the line. Coach Tom Oesch said. They proved to be the better football team.



A farm accident claimed the life of a Mayville area woman early last week.

Troopers from the Michigan State Police Post in Caro identified the victim as Fay A. Vaughn, 36, 2815 Mayville Rd.

Troopers reported they were dispatched to the Vaughn residence Monday at about 4 p.m. to investigate an apparent farming accident.

When they arrived, troopers were met by Mayville Ambulance personnel who had found the victim already deceased when they arrived.

Investigators said Vaughn had apparently gone to an area behind the barn where 4 other individuals were in the process of baling straw. When she began helping with the operation, part of her clothing became entangled in a power take-off unit that connected a tractor to the hay baler.

Troopers said the tractor was shut off immediately, but not before Vaughn suffered extensive injuries.

* Encourage children not to eat their treats while trick or treating, wait until they bring them home so the goodies can be inspected.


* Discard any unwrapped candy or anything that looks as if it may have been tampered with.

Under a new law, it is not necessary for a school to offer driver training, but it is likely that Cass City will, provided that enough students are willing to pay for the instruction.

Each student will receive a voucher worth \$60 to apply towards driver training. It will cost students about \$60 additional. Those payments will amount to about half of the cost per student taking the course.

For that reason, the board wants to find out if a 2-tier system could be established with out-of-district students paying more than resident students.

I don't want to pay 50 percent of the cost of a student that doesn't live in the district, one board member said. An investigation will be con-

ducted and a decision probably made at the next board meeting.

OTHER BUSINESS

•Betsy Dillon, physical education teacher, reviewed new ways to teach elementary physical education and said that she was pleased with the results.

Sugar beets tops among area crops

averaging a very respectable 17.6 percent.

Braem called harvest conditions "excellent" thanks to warm weather that continued into mid-October.

Thumb area MSU Cooperative Extension officials are calling the Indian summer a life-saver for many farmers who found themselves behind throughout much of the growing season due to a wet, cool spring.

"It made all the difference in the world," said Martin Nagelkirk, extension director in Sanilac County.

"We would have definitely lost financially in some soybean fields (without the heat), but it made the corn crop. If we had had a normal fall, we would have had some sizable discounts on test weights and yields."

"It was a blessing. We thought we were going to be hurting," agreed Huron County Agricultural Agent

Carrie Andrich. "Soybeans really matured during that Indian summer," Andrich said, adding yields in some fields were as high as 60 bags per acre. In other fields yields were in the 40s, and in others, a disappointing 30 bags.

Nagelkirk estimated three-quarters of the soybean crop in Sanilac County has been harvested, and yields overall have been average.

Some growers have seen excellent yields, he said, but there have also been some disappointments, largely because of root problems early in the growing season, then, later on, white mold growth.

Perhaps the biggest disappointment this year is the dry bean crop, particularly navy beans, according to Nagelkirk.

"Ninety-nine percent of the dry beans are out. We did have some late beans that we may try to pick up yet," he said. "Overall, the crop did have more culls, or the pick (of damaged beans) was higher than what we normally get."

"I guess what hurt us in terms of quality was that rain in August."

All in all, Nagelkirk added, yields were fairly average, about 14 bags. However, he pointed out the market price has been very weak, especially for navy beans.

Andrich reported Huron County farmers also struggled with damaged dry beans, but the problem was less extensive in the eastern portion of the county. She noted Tuscola County growers saw more damage.

As for the corn crop, the jury is still out. The good news, Andrich said, is a majority of the crop matured prior to the first killing frost.

"Some guys have just started on the corn. Mostly, they're taking it off for high moisture corn" to feed cattle. So far, she said, test weights on early corn have been fair to good.

Wilkinson named curator at Detroit arts institute

The city-owned Detroit Institute of Arts isn't letting a pending court case get in the way of administering its 20th-century art department. The museum has promoted

longtime employee Mary Ann Wilkinson to curator of 20th-century art. She has served as interim curator since curator Jan van der Marck was fired in 1995, following allegations he was violating a requirement that DIA employees live in the city.

A Wayne County judge ordered van der Marck reinstated last month, but the city is appealing the ruling. "Whether or not Jan returns makes no difference to Mary Ann's appointment," says Maurice Parrish, interim director of the DIA. "It's not unusual to have 2 full curators in one department."

Parrish praised Wilkinson as "a strong advocate" for contemporary art. "Mary Ann has worked hard and is truly deserving," he says. "She's well-liked and highly respected by the art community."

Wilkinson is the daughter of Mrs. Ann Wilkinson and the late Gerald Wilkinson of Kingston and a 1971 graduate of Kingston High School.

Wilkinson joined the DIA staff in 1981 as a research assistant for The Cranbrook Vision, an exhibit shared with the Metropolitan Museum in New York. She

worked her way from assistant curator to associate curator and has been acting head of the 20th-century department since the summer of 1995. Wilkinson has helped defuse criticism long directed at the museum for ignoring local artists. She has curated a number of exhibits for the DIA, particularly those with a strong Michigan angle.

For instance, exhibits she organized include Charles McGee: Seeing 70 in 1994, Decorative Arts 1900: Highlights from Private Collections in Detroit in 1994, Twenty Years of the Alternative Press in 1990 and Pi Benio in 1983.

She's also been involved in local arts projects such as "Art on the Move" with the Center for Creative Studies and the Detroit Recreation Department, as well as the Wildlife Interpretive Gallery at the Detroit Zoo and the not-for-profit Detroit Artists Market.

Wilkinson earned her bachelor's and master's degrees in art history from the University of Michigan. Her professional affiliations include the College Art Association and the American Association of Museums.
