Stiff sentences set for trio guilty of armed robbery

A trio of Lansing residents charged in connection with the armed robbery of a Cass City area man last September were all sentenced to prison Friday in Tuscola County Circuit Court.

Carrie L. Tetreau, 19, was sentenced to concurrent prison for her pleas of guilty to first degree home invasion and conspiracy to commit home invasion.

Her accomplices, Rushaun D. Burton, 18, and a 16-yearold juvenile, each received prison terms of 10 to 25 years

terms of 10 to 20 years in for pleas of guilty to conspiracy to commit armed robbery. The pair were also ordered to pay \$7,007.09 and \$7,127.09, respectively, in

restitution. The robbery took place Sept. 3 at an Elkland Township residence.

Troopers from the Michigan State Police post in Caro reported the victim was tied up by 2 of the suspects, one of them armed with a handgun. The suspects then began taking property from the Schwegler Road home and Please turn to back page.

According to Cass City police reports, a pair of 15-yearold girls and a 16-year-old girl, all students at Cass City High School, allegedly skipped school Thursday and took a pickup truck belonging to Russell Speirs of Cass City.

Legislative solution?

Area farmers see loss if milk pool collapses

Michigan's agricultural community is ready to support legislation forcing dairy processors to pay a premium to producers should an existing voluntary "super pool" collapse.

But some groups, including Michigan Farm Bureau, are hoping the voluntary pool can be revived.

"In my opinion, it's unfortunate that we can't resolve this voluntarily without bringing the government into it," Michigan Farm Bureau President Jack Laurie commented Thursday.

Laurie, who farms in a partnership with his father, Grover, and son, Doug, milks 500 cows at his Cass City area dairy operation and is a longtime member of the Michigan Milk Producers Association.

"Right now a great deal of our efforts are focused on getting the players to the table to resolve this. Michigan's dairy industry cannot afford to lose \$21 million a year," Laurie said, referring to the combined premiums paid out to producers each year.

The controversy was sparked by the withdrawal of 2 large dairy processors — Dean Foods and Quality Dairy - from the state's voluntary "super pool." The program pays some \$2 million per month in premiums to Michigan farmers, who share equally in the top prices paid for Class I (top grade) milk.

The program was created 5 years ago when the state's dairy processors agreed to pay a premium for Class I milk.

In recent years, however, some processors have struck their own deals with larger dairy farms, circumventing the super pool.

COLLAPSE LIKELY

Without the support of large processors, officials say, the program is likely to collapse.

"Right now we have an agreement to continue the pool only through December," said John Dilland, director of finance for the Michigan Milk Producers Association, which repre-

sents more than 2,000 farmers and markets about 60 perfrom becoming law. cent of the milk in the state.

After that, Dilland added, it's hoped the pool will continue on a month-to-month

Dilland pointed out that Sen. Joel Gougeon (R-Bay City) has introduced legislation to the Senate Agricultural Committee that would create a state milk marketing order and make it mandatory for all processors to pay the premium.

The legislation has the support of virtually the entire agricultural community in the state and, if approved, would provide farmers with continued equity in premium payments, as well as continued stability, he said.

But the legislation is far

In the meantime, should the super pool disappear, farmers will shoulder the loss, as much as 8 cents a gallon according to one estimate.

"On our farm it will make a difference of about \$10,000 a year," said Randy Severance, who farms in a partnership with his father, Arthur. The Severances milk 100 cows in a 115-cow herd in the Decker area.

Severance said the loss would equal about 3 percent of the operation's gross annual revenue.

NOT DEVASTATING

He indicated it isn't devastating, but noted any reduction in revenue hurts, especially with the cost of supplies, equipment and feed continuing to rise.

"The problem is, everything else keeps going up, but the price of milk (paid to producers) doesn't. I think you could go back almost 20 years and see milk at about the same price."

The loss of super pool premiums "won't put a lot of farms out of business, I don't think," Severance added, "but it will take care of a lot of the discretionary income.'

The loss of the super pool would also be detrimental to the strength of cooperatives, according to Bob DeLong, who milks about 20 cows in the Cass City area.

It still seems apparent that the owners would be the principal benefactors, but nevertheless my opposition has lessened with the passage That's because of the in-

crease in competition. Gamblers will spend their hardearned dollars in Windsor or in neighboring states which have flourishing gambling casinos already up and run-

If it were up to me and the first vote were today, my vote would still be no.

Now there is a group hustling around the state to get enough signatures to place the gambling issue on the ballot again. That campaign gets no support or petition signature here. It's simply not right.

Casinos have received the nod of the electorate and plenty of big bucks have been and are being spent by reputable firms to get the casinos approved up in action.

It certainly would not be fair to them or other entrepreneurs who have invested in the area on the basis of an industry legally approved.

Gambling received the green light in Detroit, partially because nothing else appeared to be working. Walking the streets in bustling downtown Chicago a year ago was like walking in downtown Detroit 20 years

The casinos, and the new stadiums for the Lions and the Tigers, will draw people. For a few hours it will seem like old times before they return home to the suburbs. But unless they live or work downtown, it's hard to see it as a huge step forward.





gers lost, 8-6, but only after 22 innings of play - - the longest timed major league game at the time. Two things about the con-

test stick out in Nichols mind. The first is Colavito's hitting for the night (7 for

The secon! is that rookie Jack Reed's game-winning 2-run homer turned out to be the only home run in Reed's career.

"What most people don't know is the night before was Detroit's first day-night doubleheader," Nichols said. adding the Tigers ended up playing 40 innings of baseball in 24 hours.

Nichols' grandfather got an autograph from Colavito the next year during spring training, but that's the closest Nichols came to meeting his

LETTER SENT

Then, 8 years ago, Nichols

sent a letter, but learned he had the wrong address.

Last February, Nichols tried again, prompted by the knowledge that time was passing by quickly. He called Tiger Stadium and obtained Colavito's address in Pennsylvania, then penned a second letter. His heart sank when it came back, marked "refused."

Nichols said he asked a coworker at Delphi Steering Systems, Saginaw, to check into whether Colavito was in good health. The co-worker happened to be Jerry Northrup, brother of Jim Northrup, who was a centerfielder for the World Series champion Tigers in

The response was "yes", which prompted Nichols to write again and, at the suggestion of another-coworker, to not print a return address on the letter.

Nichols said he later learned Colavito had stopped opening fan mail after receiving a couple of nasty letters from fans angry because items they supposedly sent were not autographed.

He also learned he has Colavito's wife, Carmen, to thank for the response he received from the former major league outfielder. Carmen encouraged her husband to read the letter, in which Nichols described his admiration for Colavito, asked if they could meet sometime, and mentioned his love of hunting.

Colavito responded, and over the next few weeks, he and Nichols corresponded. The pair learned they shared not only a love of baseball, but for hunting as well.

My husband, who grew up in cities and moved several times, does not quite understand how a place that I haven't lived at for 15 years, I still call my home. Thanks to my dad and his farm, my boys can tell you how crops are planted and harvested. They have ridden in the tractors and combine with my dad.

They can tell you about live-They can tell you about live-stock. They help their cous-not evacuated ins at the Tuscola County Fair. In a way, my city kids are farm kids. My oldest son has written reports for school where he has even taught his teacher something new about farm life she never knew before. I'm glad they are able to do these things with their Grandpa. I am sure that their favorite childhood memories will be those spent on the

My favorite thing about "home" is consistency. Being gone for 15 years, I still go home to the same neighbors. Everyone gives you a wave driving down the road. You get a hug from the people at church and talk to them as if you never left. My neighborhood has people moving in how brave she was. She and out all of the time. It is a very transient area. People stay in their own fenced-in back vards. The garage doors go up when they come home from work, but go down immediately behind them, as if to say "don't bother me." I miss being able to count on





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

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Curbing sexual promiscuity among Thumb teens is the goal of a new initiative being funded by a \$50,000

grant. The award was announced last week by State Rep. Mike Green (R-Mayville), who stated nearly \$2 million has been approved to expand the Michigan Abstinence Partnership.

The \$1.89 million federal block grant is divided among 23 existing programs across the state as well as 10 startup programs, Green explained.

In the Thumb, the Huron, Tuscola and Sanilac health departments will use their grant funds to establish the Thumb Region Abstinence Partnership. "This is good news for ev-

eryone," said Green. "The Michigan Abstinence Partnership helps kids live healthier, longer lives by promoting abstinence." The partnership is a group

of people throughout the state who represent various philosophies but agree that communities should encourage children ages 9 through 14 years to avoid drugs, alcohol and sex.

"Our plans for the money are to, over the next 10 months or so, put together a comprehensive, strategic plan to address alcohol and drugs and how they relate to sexual abstinence," said Kay Balcer, Sanilac Health Education Department coordina-

"It's going to be, I believe, a very unique effort," added Balcer, who explained project leaders hope to include parents, community members, business leaders and teens in the planning process.

Over the next several months, representatives from each county will be discussing a host of possible activities such as peer education, teen theatre, scheduling information meetings for parents, and providing informa-

tional materials to the community.

The Thumb effort hopes to accomplish 2 goals over the next year. The first is to implement a comprehensive plan for action, and the second is to explore ways to fund future programs, Balcer

According to Green, the Michigan Abstinence Partnership is coordinated, staffed and financially supported by the Michigan Department of Community Health to provide communities with technical assistance and increase visibility of abstinence issues.

"Too many teens today are not getting the support or guidance they need at home,' the lawmaker said. "Frankly, the rate of experimental drug use and sexual promiscuity among our younger teenagers is frightening.

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
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Seek ways to save milk pool

"We don't milk a lot of cows, but there's no question there's going to be a dramatic effect. There's no question it's going to cause chaos."

DeLong, a member of the Michigan Milk Producers Association, wonders whether some producers will leave their cooperatives in search of a better price by dealing directly with a processor. At the same time, he said, farmers who have struck deals with processors

have no assurances unless they are willing to continually sell their milk cheaper than the next guy.

"It doesn't matter how big you are, it's going to hurt you," he added.

"We're all going to lose in this thing. It's cutthroat right now, but it's going to get worse if we don't have unity."

REAL RISK

"I believe there's a real risk to the cooperative system,"

Laurie agreed.

"Milk cooperatives have led the way to a guaranteed price and a guaranteed market," he said, adding the strength of cooperatives has given farmers assurance that their milk will be picked up, and that they will receive a check for their product.

Laurie said cooperatives have also been responsible for balancing the milk mar-

The Michigan Milk Producers Association, for example,

has invested \$45 million in plants and equipment to process milk into butter, powder and cheese.

Laurie noted some are critical of Michigan Milk because only about half of the cooperative's milk is Class I milk — the rest is processed — while other cooperatives' Class I milk contributions to the "super pool" total 90 percent or more of their produc-

The others feel Michigan Milk should put all of its milk into the pool. However, Michigan Milk members want a return on their investment, which continues to provide stability to the market, he said.

As for the loss of the super pool, Laurie hopes the program can remain voluntary. in part because he's concerned forced premiums will prompt some processors to leave the state. But he supports a mandatory premium if all else fails.

The reason is simple economics. Although the collapse of the super pool may translate into a 3-percent reduction in gross revenues for a farm, he said, the cost will be even greater down the road.


"Without the super pool premiums, there's no incentive to pay anything above the federal order price (\$12 per hundred pounds) for any of the milk. So, the potential is there for about a 13 1/ 2-percent decrease in rev-

In turn, Laurie continued, there would be an acceleration in the number of farms going out of business, not because of the super pool collapse alone, but because of a combination of factors growing disparity be-

tween the farm price and the shelf price, skyrocketing feed and equipment costs, etc. — that continue to squeeze producers' profit margins. With 1998 being an election

year, Laurie doubts there will be significant progress on the proposed state milk marketing order next year. But he is hopeful producers and processors can work something out on their own.

"I would like to think that in the next 60 days, we could at least get the involved parties to the table to see if we're going to be able to resolve
