

Renovation of annex starts

with auction


Monday the Cass City School Board, in a special meeting, is expected to select an auctioneer to sell equipment and furnishings that are left in the former middle school building.

The special meeting was called because there is an urgent need to proceed quickly. The board would like to have the now vacant building removed during the summer vacation period and not delay the remodeling of the building's annex which will be turned into the Early Childhood Center.

Most of the \$250,000 project cost will be spent on the interior of the building. The lion's share of the money will go towards heating and plumbing.

The long corridor that leads from the old building will be sealed off, allowing just enough room to install the heating system for the building, perhaps 10 to 12 feet, and the remainder removed with the rest of the old building

When the renovated annex is completed, the building will have 2 large rooms for pre-school classes and 2

Village "shocks" water to meet EPA standards

On November 17 last year, the Cass City Village Water Department conducted a routine test of its water and examination of the sample by the United States Environmental Protection Agency revealed it was positive. A positive sample is one which the EPA says is a possible health concern. EPA ratings of samples are either positive or negative, village manager Jane Downing explained.

The positive sample in-dicating a possible bacteriological contamination was taken Nov. 17 at the village water tower. Also samples taken at 2 private homes were positive.

The village will be happy to come to the home to test the water of anyone in the village free of charge.

The water passed the EPA tests after the original chlorination shocking and has been free and is free today from coliform bacteria. Today water is tested on a regular monthly schedule. The EPA has requested no additional precautionary measures for consumption of water.

In addition to solving the contamination problem, the village will test the water of anyone served by the village free of charge. We will come to the home if requested or we have bottles available at the village officers that can be used by residents to provide water samples, Downing concluded.

with the MDEQ the company will have a health and safety plan to assure safety for workers coming in contact with the site.

That plan will not affect the workers at Walbro, but will be available for contractors if they are contracted to work at the site, Hittler explained. The site now meets environmental safeguards and what's remaining for the company, Hittler said, is to conduct water safety tests twice a year for 3 more years.

Federal and state funding cuts will affect Thumb area health departments.

But officials say they've spent considerable time preparing for perhaps the biggest change — leaner Medicare reimbursements for home health services.

According to published reports, some Michigan health departments are scrambling to make up for lost revenue, in part due to the state's recent request that some departments return money that

the state overpaid them last year for mandated services. The pay-back request translates into about \$20,000 for the Greater Thumb Community Health Department, formerly the Huron County, Sanilac County and Tuscola County Associated Health Department, said Dale Hippensteel, health officer. But the impact of decreased Medicare reimbursements will have a greater impact for all home health providers, according to Hippensteel.

will translate into a loss of \$320,000 to \$500,000 this fiscal year in the Huron County and Sanilac County departments' combined \$3.2 million home health care budget. "We expect to see a decrease of 10 to 15 percent." Hippensteel noted both the Huron and Sanilac departments have certified home care agencies, and they provide services in Tuscola County as well.

24 years at school George Fisher's varied work career to end

Ask George Fisher how he has been able to enjoy a long and enjoyable bus driving career, and he'll likely tell you it's no big secret.

"I pray every morning. I pray for all the drivers," commented Fisher, who has spent the past 24-plus years as a custodian and bus driver in the Cass City School District. "I believe the Lord has had

a big hand in my life. I don't believe --- I know."

In the spring, Fisher will close the book on his career, which he describes as satisfying. His official retirement date is May 29, but he'll be done in April.

"I've really enjoyed the work because you know what you have to do, and when you do it, nobody bothers you. And I've enjoyed working with the people here.

"I've been fortunate. My kids on the bus are really good to me," he said. "I'm kind of a bear, but you can walk down the hall and they'll give you a big hug, and that means everything." Fisher's resume is about as varied as they come. Aside from years as a custodian and bus driver, he's farmed. worked for Pontiac Motors and the former Steering

Gear, and was employed as a railroad worker. He also worked for a time at the former Tusco Products in Cass City, a division of Baldwin Rubber Co., and he put 4 years in at Walbro Corporation as a set-up man.

HIRED IN '69

Fisher was first hired by the school district in 1969. He remained on the job for a year and a half before taking a job at Walbro. At the time, he recalled, he and his wife, Norma, were raising a family and needed a larger income.

But the retirement of veteran Cass City Schools custodian Gil Freeman brought Fisher back to the school district in 1975.

"I had the chance to come back and, well, this was a good, steady job," he said. Fisher has been a familiar face at Deford Elementary School for the past several years, but he also spent 14 years at Campbell Elementary School and 18 months at the high school.

"I take care of cleaning the building and minor repairs." explained Fisher, who also has 3 bus runs each day and

school grounds. "I usually leave the house at 5:30 and get home at about 5:30. If I'm needed here, I stay. "There's always a challenge here. You have different situations that come up," he said.

The exception has been the addition of modern cleaning equipment and chemicals that make the job easier. For example, he said, it took Gil Freeman a week to do the gym floor with a hand scrubber. Today, with modernized equipment, it takes only 2 days.

Fisher has also seen a change in children. He doesn't go along with those who say children are simply worse today than years ago.

Winter is a gloomy time for many. Whether we call it the winter blues, the SAD index, or cabin fever, the winter months can be a dreary span.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services says 10 million Americans suffer from seasonal affective disorder (SAD), and another 25 million suffer from sub-syndromal SAD, also called "winter blues." Folks who work in their basement, as I do, may be subject to subterranean crustaceous growth syndrome (mildew), as well.

Scientists say the shortened day length and lack of light affects our hormonal balance, causing folks to go bonkers this time of year. People who live in the North and those who work in their basements are most susceptible.

A recent article by Scott Smith of Knight-Ridder/Tribune news service and appearing in the Richland (Missouri) Mirror points out how devastating SAD and the winter blues can be. Smith quotes one psychologist as saying, "It can be very dramatic — you can't think clearly at all. One person described it as feeling like his brain was encased in cold, 40-weight motor oil."

That patient must have been a mechanic. Otherwise, how would he know how a person feels with his head encased in 40-weight motor oil? (As compared with transmission fluid, for example?)

The good news about seasonal affective disorder and the winter blues is they can be treated with light therapy. The bad news is you have to buy some lights.

Folks who don't want more lights (or have a Scotch streak in them) might try some common sense things each of us can do to increase our light absorption. We can take a walk, for example, or sit next to a window at work. Those who work in a basement or some type of closet

might try sitting closer to their computer screens to absorb as much light as possible. News reporters should turn their cameras around and shoot the flash back into their faces occasionally. (You can claim you were testing the flash.)

Folks who feel like their brain is encased in cold motor oil might try standing under a hot shower for a few minutes. If that doesn't loosen things up, one of those electric dipstick heaters might help.

Experts say a person should never be afraid to do something stupid. It will cheer up your spouse if nothing else. Most importantly, someone who feels his brain is encased

in cold motor oil should check and make sure it isn't. I learned that while watching the Red Green show several months ago.

"TOTAL COLIFORM BACTERIA DETECTED IN WATER SUPPLY"

Recent analyses of water samples taken from the Village of Cass City, Michigan Water Supply and Water System indicated possible bacteriological contamination.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards A. and has determined that the presence of total coliforms is a possible health concern. Total coliforms are common in the environment and are generally not harmful themselves. The presence of these bacteria in drinking water, however, generally is a result of a problem with water treatment or the pipes which distribute the water, and indicates that the water may be contaminated with organisms that can cause disease. Disease symptoms may include diarrhea, cramps, nausea, and possibly jaundice, and any associated headaches and fatigue. These symptoms, however, are not just associated with disease-causing organisms in drinking water, but also may be caused by a number of factors other than your drinking water. EPA has set an enforceable drinking water standard for total coliforms to reduce the risk of these adverse health effects. Under this standard, no more than 5.0 percent (5%) of the samples collected during a month can contain these bacteria, except that systems collecting fewer than 40 samples/month that have one total coliformpositive sample per month are not violating the standard. Drinking water which meets this standard is usually not associated with a health risk from disease-causing bacteria and should be considered safe.

The Village of Cass City has taken appropriate action to mitigate the circumstances by initiating emergency chlorination upon the receipt of the positive samples. Precautionary measures were initiated by the Village Water System to assure that the water supply is protected now and in the future. The Village of Cass City will continue to test samples taken from our water supply and system to monitor levels for total coliform bacteria compliance.

B. Samples collected since precautionary measures were put into place, indicate the absence of coliform bacteria. No additional precautionary measures are advised at this time for consumption of water.





This notice is provided according to the requirements of Part 201 of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act (NREPA), 1994 PA 451, as amended, MCL 324.20101 et seq, or the Part 201 Rules, 1990 AACS R 299.5101 et seg, to notify interested persons that the MDEQ has reviewed the proposed remedial action plan and finds it to be in compliance with the requirements of the Act and the administrative rules for the Act. This notice is provided to allow for public comment prior to final approval of the proposed plan.

This notice is to provide a brief summary of the proposed remedial action, offer an opportunity for public review and comment and provide for a public meeting near the facility if requested.

Read Meg's Peg Written public comments will be accepted until 5:00 p.m. on February 28, 1998. The MDEQ will carefully consider and address significant public comments before a final decision is made regarding the proposed plan.

Groundwater under and west of the main building is contaminated with constituents of mineral spirits exceeding the residential drinking water criteria as established in Part 201, Environmental Remediation, of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act, 1994 PA 451, as amended. Soil under the building constructed over the former seepage beds is contaminated with mineral spirits.

The Remedial Action Plan (RAP) includes:

Long term monitoring of the groundwater.

A financial assurance mechanism to assure Walbro's ability to pay for monitoring, operation and maintenance, oversight and other costs determined by the MDEQ to assure the effectiveness and integrity of the remedial action.

A legal agreement with the state to insure Walbro's commitment to the implementation of the approved RAP


Deed restrictions to restrict the use of the groundwater and prohibit the installation of drinking water wells on site. There are no water wells presently on site. Walbro will determine yearly if any groundwater wells installed within a one mile radius of the facility will adversely impact the contaminant plume. Walbro must take any measures necessary to contain the contaminant plume on their property. The deed restrictions require continued presence of the buildings and parking lots for infiltration and exposure barriers.

A health and safety plan (HASP) will be developed for work on site that will bring workers into contact with impacted soil and groundwater under the building and for work in confined space under the building to address inhalation concerns.

A copy of the complete remedial action proposal, including site investigation data, is available for review at the Saginaw Bay District Office in Bay City and The Village of Cass City Office in Cass City, during normal business hours. This review period will not be less than 30 calendar days from the date of this publication.

"Because radon is invisible out of 8 homes in Michigan and can't be smelled, people tend to ignore it," Rich Gonnering, Environmental Health Supervisor of the Sanilac County Health Department, said. "It doesn't cause headaches, nausea, fatigue, skin rashes, or other warning symptoms that might be experienced by exposure to other toxins, yet exposure to elevated radon levels may increase the risk of lung cancer."

Testing is easy and inexpensive, Ed Kimbrue, Environmental Health Director of the Tuscola County Health Department noted. Kits are available from the health department for \$10-12, or some DON GAS (1-800-723-6642)

ters, and other retail outlets sell the do-it-yourself test kits. Professional testing services are also available, though they are usually used as part of a real estate transaction. Homeowners are cautioned to use only EPA-listed test kits or testing companies, he added.



skilled nursing or other health professional. Now, he said, the focus is on the outcome of those visits — that is, the ability of the service provider to help a client become independent again in a timely manner. The formula is very compli-

cated, Hippensteel added. The bottom line, he said, is service providers will receive only so much money per patient.

The good news is that Thumb health officials have been planning for the change for some time.

"We've known this (was coming) for 3 years," Hippensteel said. "We don't have a problem with it. It's going to be tough for a few months, but we think it's going to be a positive thing. 'It's a whole new way of doing business," Hippensteel

said. He added that Thumb health department home care professionals will be making fewer visits to clients, however, those visits will be more intense. "Actually, it will be more focused and better planned."

"I think everybody's going to have to do fewer visits. They've made the standard so strict, that we're not going to have a choice," said Dee McKrow, chief executive officer at Hills and Dales General Hospital, Cass City. Hills and Dales operates the Thumb Area Home Care Agency, which makes 450 to 500 home care visits per month. McKrow explained that a

physician's order for home care is no longer enough. If it's determined that a patient could have traveled to receive health care, Medicare will not approve reimbursement to the home health care
