### Ubly woman dies in crash

A weekend celebration turned tragic when the driver of a pickup truck crashed through a bridge guardrail and plunged into the Cass River just south of Cass City early Sunday morning, killabout 2:26 a.m. on Edmwood Boost shout a latt mile east of Cemeters Road.

### **Voters to decide \$7.7** million MCF expansion

decide the fate of a proposed \$7.7 million renovation/expansion project at the Tuscola County Medical

Care Facility next week. The special election will take place Tuesday, Oct. 26.

The county Family Independence Agency Board, which oversees operations at the facility, is requesting a special tax levy of .68 of a mill for 20 years. The millage, if approved, will raise an estimated \$644,000 the first year.

Total cost of the project, including interest, is an estimated \$13 million over the 20-year period.

For the owner of a home with a market value of \$80,000, the proposal translates into an additional \$27.20 in taxes annually.

The Tuscola County Board of Commissioners earlier this year voted to place the request before voters, although the decision was not unanimous.

Medical Care facility officials say the project would ease overcrowding at the facility, allow for the addition of units specially designed for a growing number of Alzheimer's and dementia patients, and take care of some needed repairs.

Steve Corl. director of the facility, said the improvements would not add additional beds, which now total 123. "It's an expansion with a major renovation," he said.

Corl explained the project will add another first and second floor to the 41-year-old facility; expand the lobby and dining areas; completely renovate all bathrooms, in part to meet Americans with Disabilities Act standards; and replace the boiler sys-

### MCF employees approve contract

Union workers at the Tuscola County Medical Care Facility last week overwhelmingly approved a 2-year contract. just 2 weeks before a \$7.7 million renovation/expansion proposal goes to county voters in a special election.

After a year of negotiations that left relations between workers and management strained, both sides returned to the bargaining table Oct. 11.

"At that meeting the union presented a counter proposal that was satisfactory to the facility and the Family Independence Agency Board and both the union committee and management signed it as a tentative agreement," said Steve Corl, administrator of the county medical care facility.

"The union also agreed that if the contract was ratified by the members that they would fully support the millage to better the facility for the residents, which is desperately needed," Corl said. "The union understands the importance of the millage and how it will increase drastically the quality of life that Tuscola County residents enjoy when they come to the Tuscola County Medical Care Facility."

Union members, represented by Local 2641, American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME), ratified the 2-year pact last Wednesday by a vote of 68-15, according to Local President Greg Kovacs.

The union represents about 120 workers at the 123-bed county facility in Caro, including certified evaluated nursing aides, therapists and laundry, housekeeping, maintenance and kitchen staff.

Kovacs said restoration of some benefits that were eliminated in an earlier contract imposed on the membership was enough to convince workers to vote "yes" last week.

"We knew we weren't going to get everything back," he said. "The main hang-up was the paid days off (PDOs).

"We still don't have free meals, and the half-hour lunch we lost. . .but we did get the PDOs back for the people who were hired before Jan. 6. The catch was, the commissioners said they were not willing to do that for this year," Kovacs added, noting the lost time adds up to 2 weeks for some

In exchange, the union accepted a 40-cent wage increase instead of the full 75-cent pass-through increase scheduled

Kovacs said the upcoming millage election had a lot to do with management's decision to return to the hargaining table and it was stipulated that facility workers publicly support

"As a local, we never actually campaigned against this millage," he said. However, Kovacs added, union members have felt all along that the millage would be defeated if both sides couldn't come to terms on a contract.

added. Corl acknowledged a financial crunch brought on, in part, by drastic cuts in Medicaid reimbursements - cuts that resulted in a funding shortfall of some \$250,000 in the final quarter of 1998.

However, he stated the reimbursements along with inflation, staffing needs, operational expenses and other factors were taken into consideration when the renovation/expansion project was proposed. He indicated officials are confident the medical care facility will have adequate funding to support the upgraded facility.

Commissioner Roy Petzold, who represents Millington and Vassar townships, voted against the project. Petzold said he's in favor of upgrading the air conditioning and electrical systems at the facility, however, he also feels that \$13 million is a lot of money to spend when no new beds will be added.

"It's needed," Commissioner Ed Scollon, who represents the Cass City area. commented. "(The number of beds) is controlled by the state -- you can't just add beds.

It took just a couple of days for authorities to solve the mystery surrounding the discovery of 2 badly decomposed bodies in a dense wooded area just outside of Bad Axe early last week.

The bodies were those of Jason Steven Hiller, 20, and Jodie Marie Emerick, 19, both of Bad Axe, according to Michigan State Police Detective Sgt. Mark H. Krebs, who said the pair were victims of a murder/suieide last spring.

Hiller and Emerick were in a boyfriend/girlfriend relationship when a "missing persons report" was filed on their behalf April 8.

Krebs said Hiller was last seen March 21 by his mother's boyfriend, who reported seeing Hiller leave the house with a .410 shotgun in a hard case. The boyfriend told troopers he had assumed Hiller was going hunting.

The "missing persons report" remained open until last week, when 2 hunters who were tracking a deer during the morning hours of Monday, Oct. 11, came across the skeletal remains of Hiller and Emerick near Liberty Street in western Verona Township. The hunters called Bad Axe police, who turned the investigation over to detectives from the state police post in Bad Axe.

Wake Up, I'm Fat by Camryn Manheim (nonfiction): In this memoir, Camryn Manheim tells the story of her life from her self-hating teenage years when she was overweight and wanted desperately to fit in, until today. Now she is a selfloving fat activist who is proud to be a misfit. In this book, Manheim tells the often funny, and sometimes sad, stories of being fat in a society where most people are obsessed with staying thin. She shows that overweight people need not let their size stop them from achieving their goals in life.

Uncommon Grounds by Mark Pendergast (nonfiction): This book tells the story of how coffee trees circle the globe between the tropics of Cancer and Capricorn. Poor laborers raise coffee on tropical mountainsides and send them halfway around the world to coffee bars in the United States, Europe and Japan, where city dwellers pay half a day's Third World wages for a good cup of coffee. Coffee has been blamed for revolutionary sedition, proclaimed the worst health-destroyer on earth and praised as a gift to mankind. Its history is a microcosm of the clash between colonialism and modern society, the rise of mass production, modern day media and marketing, women's issues and international commodity schemes. Pendergast enlivens his well researched history with anecdotes, unusual characters and commentary that will give readers stories to share - over cups of coffee for many years to come.

The Hungry Ocean by Linda Greenlaw: Even before Greenlaw and her 5-man crew set out on their fishing trip, the excitement starts and it continues to the very last page. On the way they have to deal with savage weather, equipment failure, not enough fish and too many sharks along with the routinely backbreaking work of operating a fishing boat while working 10 21-hour days in a row. Throughout the course of the trip, the characters of the 5 men in the crew come to life, including the arguments and jokes they play on each other. In the end the reader realizes how dangerous the commercial fishing business is and how remarkable the people are that choose to follow this profession.



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



Winter Weather Ahead

It is that time of year, as the weather conditions begin to change, we need to prepare for inclement weather. Because severe or adverse weather conditions will most likely require us to close our schools at one time or another during this school year, I wish to inform you of the following information.

Canceling school or not canceling is sometimes a no-win situation. Part of the problem is because our school district covers approximately 200 square miles. Our boundaries extend to Sebewaing Rd. to the north, Arnold Rd to the east, Colling Rd. to the west (which is directly north of Caro) and Legg Rd. to the south (which is one mile south of Hemans). Each geographic area can, and often does, have a different ice, snow, rain or fog condition on the same day. There is no way we can satisfy everyone, nevertheless, we attempt to do the best we can by making rational decisions as early as possible regarding school closings and delays.

On days in question, regarding the opening or possible early closing of schools, we suggest you listen to the listed radio or TV stations. Early morning decisions to close school will be made before busses are dispatched for the morning runs by 6:45 a.m., if possible. Please remember, on occasion, our Michigan weather changes rapidly, and things do not always go as planned. During these times we ask for your patience and understanding.

There are 2 organizations of which I am a member, dedicated to the preservation of the natural diversity and beauty of northern Michigan.

"Trout Unlimited" is one. It is, admittedly, a special interest organization dedicated to preserving wild trout fishing in our nation's streams. But to achieve its goal, preservation of the streams and the infrastructure is a necessary and laudable secondary re-


The second group, the Little Traverse Conservancy, is strictly devoted to preserving northern Michigan by saving significant land and scenic areas and fostering appreciation and understanding of the environment.

When you see every day a new condominium rising around Lake Charlevoix or the ring of large buildings around Little Traverse Bay, it appears that commercial expansion is well on its way to destroying what has been a prime reason for the influx of tourists and new home owners.

The urbanization of the north has sparked a new awareness of the need to save a tiny bit of what the north traditionally offered.

The Little Traverse Conservancy reflects the concern. In 1995 it had grown to protect land with a value of over \$10 million and has increased at record rates in the years since that report. Land under the

Nine months after blast-off somebody asks, "Hey, Harold. How much fuel did we put in that thing? Do we measure this stuff in pounds or kilograms?'




"I think they had a ball," commented Mason, whose son, Colon, was among the students invited from Linda Rose's classroom.






"Brent should be proud of himself," Coach Chappel said. "Next year we'd like to build on this year and see if we can get a little closer to the top."

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### Milk pricing change on hold

Dairy producers across the nation may have to wait at least another month to see how their milk will be priced. A court order, Sept. 28, provided for a 30-day extension on the current pricing system until the final rule on the Federal Milk Marketing Order Reform (FMMOR) is made. The court's ruling follows a rejection by the U.S. House of Representatives on reform of the Depression-era dairy program. Producers last month were forced to approve a modified Option 1B Option 1B. and the end of the Northeast Dairy Compact, or be left with no pricing system. However, Congress is hear-



The FMMOR has pitted Midwestern states against other regions in the country. The current dairy price program was created to encourage local production of milk in southern states by paying higher prices to farmers in those areas. The program, one of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's most complicated, stands in sharp contrast to most other commodities that were deregulated by Congress in the 1996 Freedom to Farm law. Dairy farmers in the Midwest have long sought reform in the program that sets prices for fresh milk, contending they


of their location.

Dairy producers are expected to lose \$200 million or more annually if the modified Option 1B Class 1 (fluid milk) price differential is enacted. "The bottom line is, Option 1A makes more sense for dairy producers across the county," said Birchmeier. "Congress has the opportunity to show support for agriculture and an interest in improving farm income during a time of financial turmoil for farmers by voting for Option 1A."



### Tax relief measures Green's top priority

State Rep. Mike Green recently announced that farm tax relief measures are one of his top priorities for the fall season.

"There are many ways we can strengthen Michigan agriculture," said Green, R. Mayville. "Simply removing laws that punish farmers is a good first step."

Green, chair of the House Agriculture and Resource Management Committee, has introduced several measures to strengthen agriculture, including a bill that amends Public Act 116 to reduce the amount of property taxes farmers pay for a 4-year period.

"The farming community has been hard-hit by rising property values and falling income," Green said. "This measure offers a respite for farmers to catch their breath and helps save a key part of Michigan's economy."


Green also is working on a revision of the state drain code. As part of that effort, he has introduced a bill to provide a property tax exemption to farmers developing vegetative filter strips 16 or more feet in width that are immediately adjacent and parallel to a drain, river or stream.

"This will keep the drains cleaner and promote soil conservation," Green said. "It also offers fair compensation for landowners who choose not to develop some of their land."

Green also is a member of the Republican Land Use Work Group, which is discussing ways to preserve open spaces.


"I am working hard, both with the drain code revision and through the Land Use Work Group, to strike a balance between healthy development and preserving the agricultural traditions and resources of Michigan.

"Without question, we live in the most beautiful state in the union," Green said. "Our task is to preserve that beauty for future generations. I don't want the glory of a sunrise on the shores of Lake Huron to be something my grand-children have to read about I want them to experience it as I have."





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As the firearm hunting season quickly approaches, Michigan hunters have more opportunities than ever before to bag a doe.

On most private lands, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has abandoned the old antlerless permit lottery system in favor of a more liberal, over-the-counter purchase of licenses. For \$3.50, hunters can purchase as many antlerless licenses for private lands as they want in most parts of the state, with the exceptions being in northwest Lower Michigan and the Upper Peninsula.

In addition, the department is continuing a late antlerless firearm season this year, from Dec. 15 through Jan. 2.

'We're pleased to see the department provide additional tools for the taking of deer," said Scott Everett, Michigan Farm Bureau legislative counsel. "Michigan's current deer herd far exceeds

rise in recent years."

In addition to antlerless licenses, hunters can also purchase up to 2 kill tags; however, at least one buck is required to have a minimum of 4 tines on one side. "This is designed to make it more challenging to fill both buck tags and to encourage the taking of does," explained John Urbain, DNR big game specialist.

During last year's harvest, Michigan hunters killed just shy of 600,000 animals - of which more than half were does. "That's an all-time high," Urbain said. "About 315,000 of those deer were taken in the southern Lower Peninsula, which is just phe-

While the DNR is still trying to estimate the size of this year's herd, officials say that it's slightly smaller than last year - but still too large. By measuring antler beams and the number of points on 18month-old bucks, DNR biologists say the large deer population is affecting the health of the herd.

"We've been seeing smaller beams and fewer points, which indicate a less healthy population," Urbain explained. "The more points and bigger beams show a better balance with their habitat. And, if the bucks are healthier, so will be the does and fawns."



The department is increasing its effort to educate hunters on the many regulation changes that have occurred in the last 3 years. "We can give hunters the tools, but because 97 percent of the land in southern Lower Peninsula is private, it's up to them to decide whether or

not to utilize them."

tested. Deer feeding for the rest of the state is now limited, as well. Lower Michigan and south of U.S. 2 between Iron Mountain and Escanaba in the U.P. is limited to 2 gallons of feed at one time for recreational viewing pur-

Another obstacle created through history is the taboo around shooting does. "Last year, for the first time, we switched from taking 40 per-cent does and 60 percent bucks, to taking 60 percent does and 40 percent bucks," Urbain said.

The two-fronted effort to reduce the herd also includes new feeding and baiting regulations.

The feeding (for the purpose of sustaining an animal) and baiting (used to hunt over) ban is now in place in the 11-county TB-infected area of northeast Lower Michigan, where an outbreak of bovine tuberculosis was confirmed in both free-ranging deer and livestock. An early antlerless firearm season is also being offered in poses. The remainder of the U.P. is restricted to 5 gallons at one time for recreational viewing, but is allowed to supplemental feed during harsh winters if a landowner contacts the DNR office.

Baiting for the entire state, except for the TB-infected area where it is prohibited, is now limited to 5 gallons at any one time.

"Michigan has an abundance of deer." Urbain said. "It provides a substantial amount of recreation. We're urging Michigan residents to take advantage of that, go hunting and enjoy themselves and the outdoors."

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





# EPA backs down on proposal to ban leaf spot compound

Reps. Jim Barcia (D-Michigan) and Dave Camp (R-Michigan) recently announced the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has backed down on its proposal to ban the compound TPTH (Supertin) by Sept. 30 this year.

TPTH is a compound used by sugar beet farmers to control the disease Cercospera Leaf Spot. Currently, there are no other compounds available to adequately control the disease.

The EPA reversed its decision shortly after Camp and Barcia wrote to EPA Administrator Carol M. Browner.

"The loss of this compound would be devastating to the U.S. sugar beet industry," the legislators wrote to Browner. The legislators were particularly concerned that sugar beet growers were not contacted about the decision to cancel this compound until one week before the scheduled decision-making date.

"The EPA's decision to cancel this compound, which is so critical to our sugar beet farmers in Michigan, is a good example of government not realizing the realworld impact of their decisions," Barcia said. "Our farmers deserve better. They deserve the chance to adequately respond to this decision that directly affects their livelihoods, and their families."

"The EPA decision was made without the benefit of the most recent and reliable data," Camp added. "Their decision-making process failed to follow guidelines created by a committee that is helping to implement the Food Quality Protection Act."

Both Congress and the administration have directed the EPA to base regulatory decisions on the best science and data available. The legislators wrote that the data used to evaluate Supertin was in some cases more than 10 years old, even though data as current as 1999 is available from the Department of Agriculture.

More than 18 House members from 11 states signed the bi-partisan letter to the EPA.
