

# Parks board to apply for grant

The Sanilac County Parks Board hopes to cash in on a state bond proposal approved by voters last November.

The board is planning to apply for recreational grant funding to develop Evergreen Park into a modern campground facility, complete with electric and water service.

"It's a state grant. The guesstimate is about \$610,000," said parks board member Arthur Severance. who explained the parks board has agreed to commit to a matching amount of 26 or 27 percent, or about \$155,000, which is included in the \$610,000 figure.

The funds being sought were made possible when Michigan voters approved Proposal C in the November

general election. The measure authorized the state to issue general obligation bonds totalling up to \$675 million to finance programs targeting clean-up and redevelopment of contaminated sites, protect and improve water quality, prevent pollution, abate lead contamination, reclaim and revitalize community waterfronts, enhance recreational opportunities, and clean up contaminated sediments in lakes, rivers and streams.

Applications for the grant funding are due April 1. Applicants will learn in the fall whether or not their proposals will be funded.

If the Evergreen Park grant is approved, work would begin to develop up to 125 camping sites, including 75 modern sites with electricity and water, as well as bathroom/shower facilities and a building to house a park office and living quarters for a caretaker.

# Downtown

### Cass City business district focus of town hall meet

The future of Cass City's downtown business district - its strengths, weaknesses and opportunities — is the focus of a "town hall" meeting planned for next week.

The session will be held Tuesday, March 9, starting at 7 p.m. at the Cass City Municipal Building.

The meeting was scheduled by Cass City's Downtown Development Authority and Economic Development Corporation boards, which are strongly encouraging business owners, property owners and other interested residents to attend and offer

The Downtown Development Authority will present its Phase II Facade Study and Phase III Streetscape Study, prepared by the architectural firm of Toshach, Sobezak, Spence and Forsythe, Saginaw. Representatives of the firm will also be on hand to discuss the studies and completed drawings that depict improvements to business facades and the overall look of the downtown district.

The studies, along with the completed Phase I portion (an inventory, assessment and analysis of downtown businesses), represent 2 years of work and a combined investment of \$15,000, according to Village Manager Jane Downing.


The result is a variety of ideas to make the downtown more attractive, but even the best ideas won't make a difference if members of the business community don't get involved.

And next week's meeting offers a great opportunity to do just that, Downing said. "It's just so everyone understands what we would like to do, so we can get everyone's

cooperation," she added. "It's to say, folks, this is what we can accomplish if everyone works together'."

Downing noted the DDA studies emphasize revitalizing the downtown area while at the same time preserving the buildings' architectural integrity. "It's as much to preserve the business' investment as it is to improve the image of the downtown district.

The goal is not to implement a rigid zoning enforcement zone, but rather to develop ideas that business Please turn to back page.

# Scuffle ends in arrests; Cass City officer hurt

A routine traffic stop Sunday night in Cass City led to a pair of arrests and a scuffle that resulted in minor injuries to one village officer.

Arrested were Justin G. Hulburt, 21, Cass City, and Jason W. Humpert, 17, also of Cass City.

Police are seeking charges of disorderly conduct, resisting and obstructing a police office and malicious destruction of police property against Hulburt, and disorderly conduct, obstructing a police officer and possession of marijuana against Humpert.

Cass City Patrolman Michael Gebauer reported the incident began at about 11:20 when he attempted to stop a car with a broken taillight on northbound West Street near Houghton Street. Gebauer said the driver, Humpert, accelerated, then turned east on Houghton Street and pulled into a private drive before stopping.

Gebauer reported he saw one of the vehicle occupants, Jeremy D. Nichols, 18, leave the passenger side of the car and run towards the residence. The officer told him to return to the vehicle, then instructed Humpert and the other occupant, Roger H.

Rockwell, 19, to exit the car.

Gebauer, who reported he could smell marijuana on the driver and from inside Humpert's car, placed Humpert in the back of his patrol unit and asked for permission to search the vehicle. He stated Humpert became agitated and combative.

The officer stated he could see 2 roaches in an open ash tray in the car. At the same time, he saw Hulburt standing near the patrol unit, talking to Humpert. Gebauer stated he retrieved the ash tray and placed it inside the patrol vehicle, and told Hulburt to step away.

Gebauer said Humpert reached up to the front seat of the patrol car, picked up the ash tray and threw it out the open driver's side win-

Hulburt, meanwhile, refused to return to the house, instead walking towards Gebauer. The officer reported Hulburt shouted obscenities at him and pushed him. When Hulburt refused to go back inside, Gebauer told him he was under arrest.

Tuscola County Sheriff's deputies Thomas Pennington and Ryan Pierce arrived at the scene, and Hulburt pulled away from Gebauer, ripping the badge off his shirt and running eastbound.




Dr. Charles Petty, a motivational speaker from South Carolina, kicked off the 2days event. He spoke about becoming successful and the importance of involving family and friends during the

take leadership positions within the organization, and by placing a priority on the Young Farmer program, we are assisting them in building their personal and professional lives."




