Blaze damages house

Fire caused an estimated \$50,000 in damage to a Cass City area home last week.

Elkland Township fire fighters were called to the Larry Bogart residence, 6256 River Rd., last Wednesday shortly after 8 p.m.

Smoke was billowing out from under the eaves and from the roof vents when firemen arrived, according to Fire Chief Ron Pawloski, who said the blaze originated at the rear of the residence in a laundry room/bathroom.

"At this point it's still under investigation, but the dryer is being considered the cause," Pawloski said.

"We're looking at approximately \$30,000 (in damage) to the structure, and with all the smoke, \$20,000 to the contents."

No one was injured and the family is insured, according to the fire chief.

Elkland Township fire fighters remained at the scene for about 2 hours. They were assisted by the Please turn to back page.

MDOT, Tuckey ink lease

Construction is slated to begin soon on a new building just east of Cass City that will house the Michigan Department of Transportation's

Thumb Service Center. State officials last week signed an agreement with developer Roy Tuckey, Cass City, to lease the building with an option to buy.

MDOT officials had hoped construction would begin early this month, but even with that date moved ahead to early May, it's expected the local MDOT staff will be in their new building by late summer, according to Doug Wilson, Thumb Service Cen-

ter manager. "We're still shooting for Aug. I for it to be complete," he said.

A ground-breaking ceremony has been scheduled for Friday starting at 1 p.m. at the site, which is located on the north side of M-81, just north and east of the new Kranz Funeral Home. Wilson said everyone is welcome to attend.

MDOT opened its Thumb Service Center last year in the Hahn building, 6240 W. Main St., but the agency has been working on a plan to find a more suitable location, preferably on Main Street and with adequate parking for about 15 employees.

Aside from Wilson, the local office is staffed by a designer, engineers, several construction technicians, a secretary and a couple of summer co-op employees.

Wilson said the new, single story office building will be 35-year tradition constructed on a 200-foot by 300-foot lot. Cost of the 5,000-square-foot structure is estimated at \$400,000 to \$500,000.

The Cass City office is one in the Bay Region. The others are located in Bay City, Mt. Pleasant and Davison.

According to Wilson, the Thumb Service Center staff is responsible for every aspect of customer service from driveway permits to providing bus and train schedules and road and bridge construction and maintenance.

School board rejects fan appeal, Seminary request The scheduling problem

In a lengthy session Monday night, sparked by several controversial issues, the Cass City School board reached a decision in one and left 2 others for future discussion.

Rick Brinkman, flanked by his lawyer, appealed the board's decision that banned him from all home athletic contests at Cass City Schools until the end of the first semester next year.

He was suspended for his role at the Harbor Beach-Cass City basketball game this spring in which he was accused of bumping a referee. He agrees the contact was made but not that he initiated it.

He was appealing the decision and asked that it be reduced. The board refused his request.

The board also voted against allowing Saginaw Lutheran Seminary to join the Greater Thumb West League. Athletic Director Russ Biefer presented the case for allowing Seminary to enter, saying that it would greatly alleviate scheduling problems because it would make GTW an 8-team rather than 7-team league.

The board failed to act because Seminary is on the west side of Saginaw, making it a long trip for students.

Police have suspects in plant damage, break-ins

A recent traffic stop led to the discovery of what police believe is stolen property and 4 suspects in an on-going investigation into a damage spree at the Cass City Wastewater Treatment

Three of the suspects are also believed responsible for 3, perhaps 4 break-ins in the area over the past couple weeks.

The traffic stop took place April 16 in Cass City, according to village police Sgt. Craig Haynes, who reported officers discovered some tools, soda pop, oil and an estimated 200 candy bars all believed stolen in the break-ins - in the trunk of the

Mo arrests have been made yet. Haynes dealined to name the suspects, saying only they are all males who reside in the Cass City area, ranging in age from 18 to 22 years.

Haynes said police are sooking warrants charging the 4 suspects with offenses related to damage at the Cass City Wastewater Treatment Plant March 8-9. The spree resulted in an estimated \$10,000 in damage, including destruction of a villageowned 1989 pickup truck that was used to ram a gate, fencing and structures at the plant.

Haynes said 3 of the males are suspects in recent break-ins at it's Storage and an Agri Sales Inc. night both in Cass City and at a feed store at the corner of M-53 and Bay City-Forestville

"Some of these cases are being handled by other agencies," he added, noting the break-ins remain under investigation.

Several locks were cut at Wright's Storage, although the individuals apparently took no property, according to reports. Tools were stolen and fire extinguishers activated at the Agri Sales plant, Haynes said, and tools along with the candy bars, pop and oil were taken from the feed store at M-53 and Bay City-Forestville Road.

Although arrests are still pending in the case, Haynes indicated he expects the case to proceed. "I'm confident in obtaining warrants," he said.

Local DDA, banks announce low-interest loan program


Cass City Downtown Development Authority officials are implementing a Facade Improvement Loan Program through a partnership with local banking institu-

The program was announced Monday by DDA Chairman Jim Kranz.

"Chemical Bank Thumb Area, Thumb National Bank and Mutual Savings Bank will offer low interest commercial loans at 6.5 percent, to a maximum loan amount of \$20,000 for a period not to exceed 5 years, for improvements to the facades of buildings located in the downtown development district," Kranz explained.

As an added incentive, he said, the DDA will subsidize the interest rate lower for businesses seeking the improvement loans, to 5 per-

Street, pool improvements

Council approves project bids

Cass City officials Monday awarded bids for the village's 1999 Street Program and for installation of a new pool lining and off-season pool

The village council awarded this year's paving contract to Albrecht Sand & Gravel, which submitted the low bid of \$95,077. The curb and gutter construction contract, meanwhile, was awarded to Fessler & Bowman, which submitted the low bid of \$14,511.

Both contractors were recommended by the village's consulting engineering firm, Osminski & Associates Inc., Bad Axe.

Streets slated for paving this summer are: Dale Street, Hill to Hunt; Doerr Road, Garfield to Main; Garfield Avenue, Vulcan to Doerr; West Street, Church to Huron; Leach Street, Pine to Main; Woodland Avenue, Third to Garfield, and Scotty McCullough Drive.

In addition, curb and gutter will be installed on Scotty McCullough Drive, with the cost shared by 4 property owners — the village, Regional Dialysis Center and 2 residents. Towards that end, the council established a special assessment district for curb and gutter on the road-

way and scheduled a public napolis, Ind., and a low bid hearing for May 24 at 7 p.m. at the municipal building.

Also on tap this year is re-surfacing Main Street, a Michigan Department of Transportation project. The village's share of the work totals \$16,300.

A motion to approve the 1999 street program was approved on a split vote, 5-1, with Trustee Matt Prieskorn casting the lone "no" vote.

Prieskorn stated he remains opposed to paving streets in the old Hills and Dales Subdivision, including Dale and Huron streets, without also installing curb and gutter.

In the past, the village has insisted on curb and gutter when paving. However, officials agreed to pave Dale and Huron streets without curb and gutter, following protests from subdivision residents who argued they had been assured years ago that they would not have to accept curb and gutter construction.

POOL LINER

Turning to the pool liner and cover, the council approved a lone bid of \$42,042 for a PVC pool liner from RenoSys Corporation, Indiaof \$8,300 for a Loop-Loc Cover from Water Specialties, Brighton, Mich.

Village Manager Jane Downing said installation work is scheduled for completion in May. The pool will be open to the public beginning Monday, June 14, she said.

In other business, the council approved a Reciprocal Aid and Response Protocol Agreement with other county, state and local police agencies in Tuscola County.

The resolution formalizes agreements already in place in which various police agencies assist one another, according to Police Chief Gene Wilson, who assured council members that each police agency retains the right to refuse to respond if neces-

The issue has been discussed among county law enforcement, court officials and the prosecutor's officer, according to Tuscola County Prosecutor James R. Reed, who endorsed the agreement in a letter to the council.

"We need this policy for 2 important reasons; one, the county now has a central dispatch system, and 2, Tuscola County is a relatively large

geographic area with relatively small numbers of police officers," Reed wrote.

"Mutual aid agreements are used in other counties, including Lapeer County, and adoption of these agreements is recommended by the Michigan Municipal Liability & Property Pool, which is the insurance carrier for most of the police departments in our county."

Also Monday, the council:

 Acknowledged receipt of an annual contribution of \$250 from Evergreen Township for village recreation programs.

•Rescheduled the May monthly meeting from Memorial Day, Monday, May 31, to Monday, May 24, starting at 7 p.m.

•Heard from members of the Northwood Lake Condominium Association, who voiced concerns regarding drainage problems at Northwood Circle and Misty Hill Drive, tree removal and weed maintenance. The group also asked for an update regarding planned assisted living projects slated just west of the condominiums, and they thanked the council for its attention to road striping on Hospital What to



Frustration has turned into exhilaration for local Habitat for Humanity organizers, thanks to the generosity of a Cass City woman.

The Cass City Habitat for Humanity group's search for property to build on has ended following an offer from local resident Pat Gee to donate a large lot.

The property is located just outside the village, at the end of Maple Street near Elizabeth Street.

It was welcome news to Chuck Volz, who along with his wife, Linda, are spearheading the effort to build a Habitat for Humanity home in Cass City. "I was jumping up and down," Volz recalled. "It will be large enough for at least 2 houses, which is a tremendous asset for the future. Having that land available, we know we can keep going.

My wife laughs when I come home from the store with a huge package of toilet paper. But she grew up in town. She doesn't understand what it's like to be 20 miles from your next square.



their money will be interchangeable.


I see the same thing happening in the U.S. Public restrooms are being supplied with rolls that are 2-inches



Mother enters no contest plea A Vassar woman charged in the death of her 14-monthold daughter last November

faces a minimum 10 years in prison following her plea of no contest to second degree murder.

Jody L. Haynes, 20, entered the plea Thursday in Tuscola County Circuit Court.

Bond in the case was continued at \$500,000. Circuit Judge Patrick R. Joslyn remanded Haynes to the custody of the sheriff's department pending her sentencing, which is scheduled for June 11 at 8:30 a.m.

Haynes was initially charged with open murder, homicide-felony murder and

first degree child abuse in the Nov. 20 death of Sidney A. Haynes. Investigators said the crime occurred in the Millington area home of Haynes' boyfriend, Noel P. Lloyd Jr., 24.

Tuscola County Chief Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Mark E. Reene argued that Haynes had fractured her daughter's skull, causing brain damage and eventually, death.

As a part of a plea agreement, the remaining charges will be dismissed, however, Haynes will serve a minimum sentence of no less than 10 years in prison.

Tuscola County Circuit Court Judge Patrick R. Joslyn sentenced Richard K. Davidson, 17, to 3 to 10 years for his plea of no contest to fleeing a police officer, second degree, and 3 to 5 years for operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor—causing in-

In a separate case, Davidson was sentenced to a concurrent prison term of 3 to 5 years for his plea of guilty to attempted perjury.

The court ordered Davidson's driver's license revoked and his vehicle seized by authorities.

According to police reports. the traffic accident occurred Feb. 28 in Vassar, where Davidson was seen running a red light, and a chase ensued, ending with Davidson striking a vehicle driven by Jamie L. Keinitz, 20. Keinitz was seriously injured and suffered a miscarriage.

Davidson's plea to attempted perjury stems from an incident last May in Vassar Township, where the teen falsely claimed he was robbed by Justin Hulburt, 20, of Cass City.

Davidson reported he was robbed of \$500 and a jacket, and that he had been shot, with a bullet just grazing his

abdomen. However, the teen lied to police and falsely testified in court, according to investigators, who said a drug deal was at the heart of the inci-

Davidson was initially charged with perjury, a charge carrying a penalty of life in prison because it involved a life offense (armed robbery). The reduced charge of attempted perjury resulted in the jail term imposed Friday in circuit court.



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



Chad Mellendorf and Janssen all contributed doubles for the winners. "We hit the ball well and



In addition to the USS Ponce, the ARG consists of the amphibious assault ship and ARG flagship USS Kearsarge, the dock landing ship USS Gunston Hall and the 26th Marine Expeditionary Unit.





General Cable Corporation announced that first quarter net income was \$8.1 million compared to \$13.5 million in the first quarter of 1998. Fully diluted earnings per share were 22 cents in the first quarter of 1999 compared to 36 cents a year ago. When compared to the outlook the company communicated in mid-March, at which time it anticipated that earnings might be 15 to 17 cents per share worse than the prior year, the 14 cent actual decline was achieved by aggressive cost controls and improved sales mix, primarily in higher margin telecommunications cables.

Net sales on a copper-adjusted basis decreased one percent to \$262.8 million, down from \$265.5 for the first quarter last year. The decrease in copper-adjusted net sales reflects a 3 percent decrease in net sales of electrical products and a one percent increase in communications products net sales. Net sales on an as-reported basis decreased from \$278.6 million in the first quarter of 1998 to \$262.8 million in the first quarter of 1999, reflecting the 14 cent decrease in the average monthly COMEX price per pound of copper in the first quarter of

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
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
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
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
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



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50% of stores sell tobacco to minors
