Cable purchase alive and well

General Cable Corporation last week announced the shareholders of BICC plc voted approval for the sale of BICC plc's worldwide energy cable and cable systems businesses to General Cable.

The parties continue to work diligently toward the earliest possible closing date, anticipated to be in the second quarter of 1999. The acquisition is planned

to combine BICC's operations generating \$1.8 billion of revenues in Europe, North America, the Middle East, New Zealand, Southeast Asia, China, India and Africa with General Cable's approximately \$1.2 billion worldwide operations to create the third largest wire and cable company in the world, and the second largest in North America.

The operations to be acquired by General Cable include low-, medium-, and high-voltage power distribution and power transmission cable products, and control, signaling, electronic and data communications products and accessories, to serve industrial, utility, OEM, military/government, as well as electrical and communications distributor customers worldwide.

BICC Energy Cables' businesses are currently conducted in 41 manufacturing locations in 16 countries, with representation in 20 additional countries through regional sales offices.

"With BICC shareholder approval, the path is now paved toward completion of the acquisition within 30 to 45 days," said Stephen Rabinowitz, chairman, president and chief executive officer of General Cable Corporation.

Issue tabled **O-G** debates plan to cut drivers' hours

A recommendation to revise the bus transportation schedule in the Owen-Gage School District, resulting in fewer hours for drivers, met with opposition from at least one school board member Monday night.

Board Trustee Jeff Faist asked school Supt. Manuel Thies about the proposal, saying he had spoken with drivers who are not happy about the prospect of smaller paychecks.

"I have a problem with asking someone to take a pay cut," Faist said. "To me, that's not right."

Thies explained his recommendation was to add a fifth driver to the district's 4-person driving staff. The fifth driver would take a different run on each of 4 days, leaving the other drivers with runs on 4, instead of 5 days each week

Thies noted that recruiting drivers has been extremely difficult in recent months, and he indicated his proposal would offer a fifth driver incentive to remain with the district

Over the past school year, Thies said, illness and other situations have left the district short of bus drivers, resulting in a reduction of runs from 4 to 3, sometimes 2, forcing school officials to cut school days short by a couple of hours in order to transport students home.

Faist and trustee Walter Swiastyn suggested that Thies could ask some drivers to voluntarily give up some driving time so that the district's veteran drivers would not be affected.

They are used in a variety of ways, from salary considerations to dismissal, Faist said.

Veteran educator closing the book on 31-year career

When it comes to education, Wayne Wright has just about done it all. Teacher, administrator, ath-

letic director. counselor, coach, club and class sponsor, yearbook advisor, driver's education instructor, lunchroom monitor, evening activity supervisor, custodian the list goes on and on.

And through it all, the veteran Kingston High School principal can't recall a job he didn't like.

"I've certainly enjoyed a good career. Every job I've had has been fantastic." Wright commented in his office Friday.

I can honestly say that I look forward to coming to work each day.

In June, when the last day of classes has ended and school officials close the book on another school year, Wright will close the book on a career in education spanning more than 3 decades. including the past 13 years as principal in Kingston. "It's been a great 13 years," Wright said. "We've had a lot of stability in the staff. You kind of get comfortable working with the same staff for many years, but you get to the point where you say. I can now retire and maybe look at some other challenges.

Wright, a native of San Joaquin, Calif., began his 31year career in education at the age of 21 after earning a Bachelor of Science Degree in mathematics at Evangel College in Springfield, Mo.

"When I graduated, Michigan was recruiting (teachers) heavily. There was a shortage of teachers and salaries were a little higher up here," Wright recalled, adding he accepted a job at Burton Bentley Junior High, where he taught for 2 years before being drafted into the Army. Wright said he was among the last group of men to be

drafted during the Vietnam War era. He found himself stationed near Colorado Springs, where he was levy clerk. handling all overseas reassignments, and worked his way up to the rank of sergeant E5 during his 18months in the service.

"Probably the thing I'm most proud of is the fact that I'm a veteran," he noted. "I'm very proud of the fact that I served in the Army, and I had a very good experience.

Part of what made it a good experience for Wright was meeting his future wife, Jeannette, a Flint resident.

After Wright was discharged, he and his bride, who recently celebrated 28 years of marriage, moved to Michigan to be closer to her family. He accepted a job in the Goodrich School District, where he taught math in grades 7, 8 and 9.

"Then I went back and got my master's and education specialist on my G.I. Bill," he

The Cass City Church of the Nazarene will celebrate its 75th anniversary Sunday, May 23.

Earliest records are of a meeting May 22, 1924, to discuss the purchase of the property (known as the Bullock property), where the church remains. An organizational meeting followed July 24 of that year with 11 charter members.

Downing elected secretary

Region V includes cities and villages within the counties of Huron, Lapeer, Saint Clair, Sanilac and Tuscola. The outgoing Regional Chairperson Don Colling, village president of Caro, coordinated and hosted the meeting.

This year's program included presentations on Career Prep (School-to-Work), Census 2000, Visioning - the Essential First Step, a roundtable discussion on the Future of Local Government as well as a legislative undate from the Michigan Municipal League's State and Federal Affairs Division

The Church of the Nazarene in Ellington and Gagetown had already been in existence for approximately 10 years. The Rev. and Mrs. C.E. Ling, both elders, were responsible for Gagetown and Cass City as well as a Greenleaf Church of the Nazarene, which closed about a year after the church in Cass City was organized.

The first meetings in Cass City were in homes, and then in a store building next to what is now the Quaker Maid store. This was known as Benkleman's Store. On the present property, a

house was converted into a church with Sunday school rooms on the second floor and in the basement. In the early 1940s, a basement church was erected. Work on the building had to be delayed at times due to wartime shortages. The present brick building was built in 1956. Twenty-three pastors have

served the Cass City Church. The present pastor is Rev. Andrew Jolly, along with his wife, Lisa, and their children. Elizabeth and Zachary Andrew, who was born April 23. The anniversary celebration service will begin at 11:00 a.m. May 23, with Dr. Stephen T. Anthony as guest speaker. Dr. Anthony is district superintendent of the Eastern Michigan District Church of the Nazarene. All

visitors are welcome to help commemorate this occasion. Any historical memorabilia or pictures would be greatly appreciated. Especially welcomed would be pictures of either the house which was used as the church or of the original parsonage (the Cooley house) on the corner of Seeger and Third Streets. MDOT awards several contracts

As part of the Michigan Department of Transportation's (MDOT) 1999 \$1.2 billion road and bridge program, Gov. John Engler last week announced 177 contracts totalling \$250 million have been approved for transportation improve-

ments across the state. This month's announcement includes 117 projects to improve nearly 618 miles of road, 22 design and study projects. 16 bridge projects, 4 multi-location projects for traffic signal improvements and the construction of a rest area in Clinton County.

In Tuscola County, contracts were approved for the following projects:

*Grading, drainage structures and slope restoration on Dodge Road, from Elmwood Road to M-81 (one mile); and grading, drainage structures, guard rail and slope

restoration on Birch Run Road, from Oak Road to Sheridan Road.

The project cost is estimated \$509,956 and the contract was awarded to C.R. Hunt Construction. Completion is expected in October. *Mill and resurface M-81

from Doerr Road to the Cass City Village limits (1.1 miles).

The project is estimated at \$196,256, with the contract awarded to Valley Asphalt Company. The work is expected to take 16 days to complete.

"Widen the intersection of M-46 and M-24 for left turn lanes and traffic signal installation

Valley Asphalt Company was awarded the contract for the estimated \$481,108 project, which is expected to take 26 days to complete.

Collections Policy

Effective 6/30/99:

- Quarterly water/sewer/garbage billings will be mailed to village residents on or before the last day of 1. the last month of the service guarter (March, June, September and December).
- 2. Payments are due on or before the 21st day of the first month following the close of the service quarter (April 21st, July 21st, October 21st, and January 21st).
- 3. On the 21st due date, all outstanding accounts will be mailed a Past Due notice via regular first class mail, warning customers that water will be disconnected if payment is not received within 10 days. Notices will indicate the account balance due, including 10% late payment penalty.
- On the 31st of the billing month, or the 1st of the month following billing month, all accounts not yet 4. paid will be ordered shut-off due to nonpayment.
- DPW Supervisor will shut off/disconnect water at the residence per order, or if resident wants to 5. make payment arrangements, the exact arrangements are to be described on the Disconnection Order form, and resident must sign the form. ALL "Other Arrangements" must specify initial payment of a minimum of 25% of the total account balance within 10 days from date of the Disconnection Order, weekly or biweekly payments thereafter, and the entire account balance must be paid in full by the next billing date. Payment arrangements MUST BE in writing. Arrangements made via phone are no longer accepted.
- 6. If water is shut off, a \$50.00 shut off fee will be applied to the account upon return of the Disconnection Order form to the Village Clerk, indicating the date water was disconnected.
- 7. If payment arrangements were made, but no payments are received as outlined and signed by the resident, a \$50.00 shut off fee is immediately applied to the account and a second disconnection order will be forwarded to DPW. This second disconnection order will NOT allow payment arrangements.
- 8. Once water is disconnected due to non-payment, resident must pay the \$50.00 shut-off fee, a minimum of 50% of the outstanding utility account and a \$50.00 turn on fee, in order to have water turned back on. Then, weekly or biweekly payments toward the remainder of the balance due are required, with payment in full of the entire account by the next billing date.

Appeals court upholds ruling The Michigan Court of Appeals recently upheld

Tuscola County Circuit Court Judge Patrick R. Joslyn's ruling granting summary disposition in favor of the defendant in the matter of Belinda Mester versus State Farm Mutual Insurance

March 24, 1995, 12-yearold Jessica Mester skipped school with 2 other girls: 14year-old Amanda Smith and 12-year-old Edelfina Nazario. The girls stole a pickup truck parked with the keys inside and Amanda Smith drove the truck to the Upper Peninsula, stopping occasionally to purchase gas and to take turns driving the

After running out of money, the girls headed back towards Cass City. At approximately 1 a.m., they were spotted by a police officer in Reese. A chase ensued and Amanda refused to pull over the vehicle. The truck went out of control during the chase, resulting in a roll-over collision

Jessica's mother, filed a complaint seeking to recover nofault personal protection insurance benefits from defendant State Farm Mutual Insurance Company, the in-

surer of her own vehicle. Defendant moved for summary disposition and Judge Joslyn granted the motion, finding that there was no question of fact that Jessica was actively involved in unlawfully taking the truck and driving it away.

Because the insurance coverage excludes coverage for an individual who "unlawfully takes" a vehicle, Judge Joslyn concluded that Jessica was not eligible for no-fault benefits.

The Court of Appeals agreed with Judge Joslyn, stating that there is no question of fact that Jessica participated in the unlawful taking of the truck, without permission and without any reason to believe that she was entitled to take or use the truck. The clear intent of the policy was to deny the payment of no-fault benefits un-
