Teen in critical condition

5 hurt in weekend crash

Five people were injured — one critically — in a 2-vehicle accident near the intersection of M-81 and Deckerville Road early Saturday afternoon.

Peter J. Gorno, 16, of Elk Rapids, remains in critical condition at St. Mary's Medical Center, Saginaw, following the holiday weekend crash.

Troopers from the Michigan State Police post in Caro reported Gorno was driving eastbound at a high rate of speed when he attempted to pass a vehicle that had stopped in preparation for a left turn. Reports state Gorno drove off the right side of the roadway and lost control on the shoulder, coming back onto the roadway, crossing the centerline and striking a westbound vehicle driven by Kelly J. Soldan, 23, of Clinton Township.

Gorno was transported by FlightCare Helicopter to St. Mary's.

Soldan and her 3 passengers, Leanne Soldan, 20, of Cass City, and Amanda Kornelson, 2, and Brandon Kornelson, 4, both of Clinton Township, were taken to Caro Community Hospital.

Kelly Soldan, Leanne Soldan and Amanda Kornelson were all treated

for minor injuries and then released. Reports state Brandon Kornelson was transferred to St. Mary's for observation.

All 4 occupants were wearing seat belts or placed in a safety seat, according to troopers, who reported Gorno was not wearing his

seat belt.

Troopers are continuing their investigation into the 12:13 p.m. crash. They were assisted at the scene by Caro police and the Caro Fire Department, Tuscola County Sheriff's Department, and the MMR and Vassar Area Ambulance Service.

Hulburt faces sentencing

A Cass City man faces sentencing next month after a Tuscola County jury found him guilty of obstructing a Cass City police officer and damaging village police property last February.

Justin G. Hulburt, 21, was found guilty on 2 counts of resisting and obstructing a police officer and one count of malicious destruction of police property following a 2-day jury trial last week.

Court records indicate the

jury deliberated for about 50 minutes before returning the verdicts.

The obstructing charge carries a maximum penalty of 2 years in jail or a \$1,000 fine. Malicious destruction of police property is punishable by up to 4 years imprisonment and/or a \$2,000 fine.

A pre-sentence investigation was ordered by the court, which revoked Hulburt's bond and remanded him to the custody of the sheriff's

department with work release.

Sentencing is scheduled for July 15 in circuit court.

The charges stem from a confrontation between Hulburt and Cass City Police Officer Mike Gebauer Feb. 28 in Cass City.

According to reports, the incident occurred after Gebauer made a traffic stop in the village. Hulburt approached the scene from a

Larry Robinson: Time for a change

It took Larry Robinson 30 years to meet his goal — 30 years of persistence, dedication and hard work, and now, it is time for him to move on.

Robinson, teacher and coach at Cass City Middle School, set his goal a long time ago, and now that he has met it — to teach for 30 years — he will retire.

After June 8, Robinson will fulfill a few new goals.

"Part of why I'm retiring is to spend time with my wife and with the rest of my family," Robinson said.

This Thumb-area native teaches physical education and coaches junior high track and football. During his 30-year career, he has also taught geography, history, health, and for one semester, he even taught typing. Robinson laughed as he added, "Can you believe it?"

Ugly was Robinson's home until 2nd grade, when he moved to Cass City. Until then he had lived on a farm and that love for farming has never left him.

"It's the best life there is," Robinson said.

Robinson called the farm near Ugly home once again

when he moved back during 7th grade. He remained in Cass City schools, despite over a mile walk to the bus every morning and afternoon.

After high school, Robinson headed for college. Central Michigan University is Robinson's alma mater.

It was also during this time that Robinson met his wife — completely on a bet.

"It's the best bet I've ever had," Robinson commented. He was a college freshman; she was just finishing up her sophomore year of high school in Caro. Robinson's roommates were also from Caro and they wouldn't give up the idea that Robinson should meet her.

"They said she was a nice farm girl," Robinson added. Finally, on a bet, Robinson agreed to the blind date. At 22, Robinson married his farm girl, Sharon Satchell, and 2 daughters later, they will soon be celebrating their 34th wedding anniversary.

When Robinson wasn't busy taking bets at CMU, he was studying and over the years he has done quite a bit of just that. He majored in health and physical education and he earned a minor

in geography. He not only received his teaching degree from CMU, but he received his master's degree in recreation. He has also taken 18 credit hours at CMU towards a degree as a specialist in administration.

Although Robinson has spent the last 21 years teaching the children of Cass City, it was not his first teaching experience; it was actually his third.

When he graduated from college, Robinson began his career in Sandusky, Mich., in 1967. He spent 7 1/2 years there, until he transferred to Buchanan in southwest Michigan. He remained there for 2 years, but his experiences in Buchanan made him question what he was doing.

"After teaching in Buchanan, I dropped out of teaching for 2 years," Robinson said. "I went to work back on the farm. I wasn't sure if I wanted to stay in education."

Robinson said that the atmosphere was somewhat negative and he found himself in the middle of hostilities between people.

"It made me think if it was what I wanted to do. So I farmed for a couple of

years," he added.

But he couldn't stay away, and he didn't. The Robinsons settled near Cass City and a teaching job opened up.

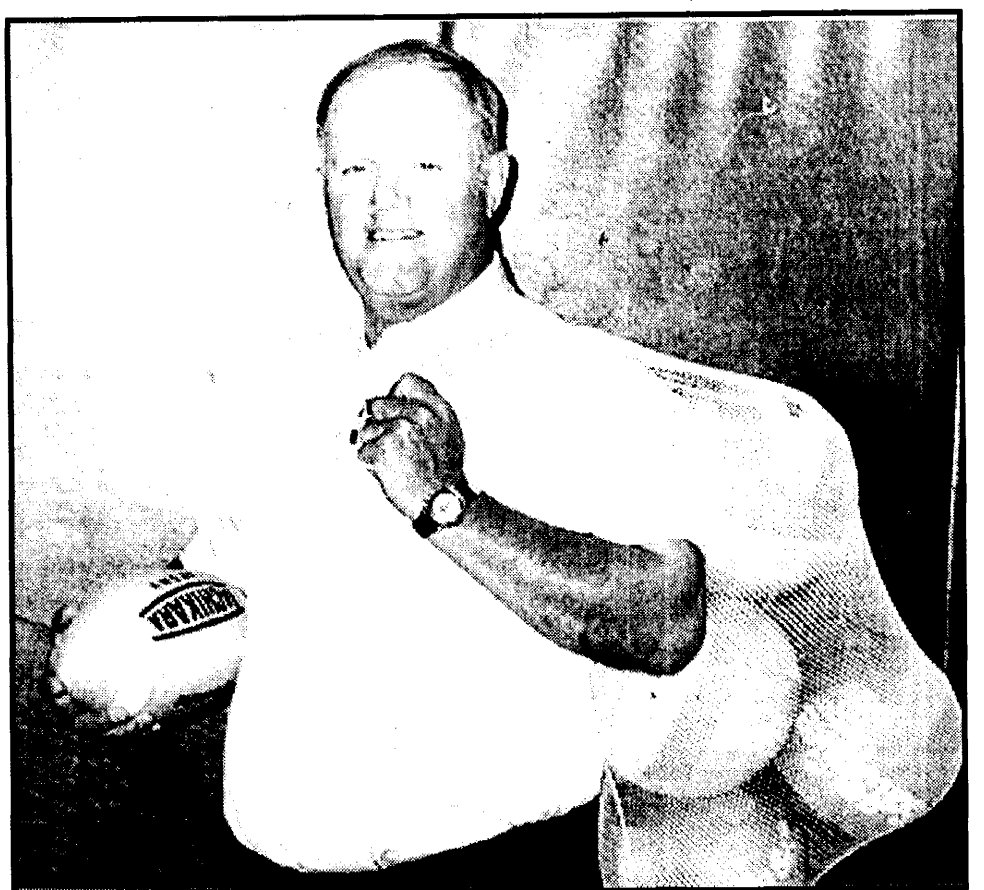
"I missed the kids," Robinson said. "I missed the sports and the variety of people."

And he's been here ever since. Robinson knew he made the right career decision. "I've enjoyed it," he said. "But I've reached a goal, and now it's time to change."

Over the 30 years, Robinson hasn't taught just middle school, although he said it is his favorite. He has taught grades K-12, and he has also coached all levels of track and football, from Junior High, to J.V. and even Varsity.

"I liked seeing the development of kids from point A to what they progress to in development," he said. "Sports contribute a lot to the characteristics one needs in life to be successful — dedication, competitiveness and trial-and-error."

Teachers have new contract

Caseville principal headed for Kingston

Kingston Community School officials last week hired a new high school principal and approved a new, 3-year labor contract for the district's teaching staff.

After interviewing several candidates, the board offered the principal's job to veteran Caseville Schools administrator George Bednorek.

A contract has not been signed yet, however, Bednorek has agreed to accept the post, according to Kingston School Supt. George Goodchild, who said Bednorek is slated to begin his new duties Aug. 1.

Bednorek was not among the finalists initially named by school officials.

"The board had heard that he (Bednorek) was interested, and since we had (Jim Green) drop out, we had an interview slot open," Goodchild explained.

Green, a high school science, physics and chemistry teacher in the Cass City School District, was named

a finalist for the Kingston post, but he withdrew his name from consideration during a school board meeting early last week.

Other finalists seeking the post were Russ Biefer, assistant principal and athletic director in the Cass City School District; Amy Bosma, a teacher in the Imlay City Schools; Ed Frankenberger, assistant principal in Three Rivers, and Tom Wade, junior/senior high school principal in the Owen-Gage School District.

Bednorek, 47, has spent his entire 23-year career in education in the Caseville School District.

He was an industrial arts and history teacher, as well as serving as varsity football and basketball coach during the first 11 years. For the past 12 years, he has been junior/senior high principal and athletic director.

Bednorek indicated he leaves Caseville district with good memories.

this time," he said. "I've been working on getting my specialist degree and I've had some aspirations to be a superintendent or high school principal in a larger school."

"I know Kingston quite well. It's a fine school system," said Bednorek, a Detroit area native who is married. He and his wife, Chris, have 4 children.

Goodchild said the pact includes salary increases of 3.0 percent the first year, 3.3 percent the second year and 3.1 percent in the final year.

"In the second year of the contract, a conference period will be added for high school teachers, and art, music and gym will be added in the elementary," he said.

An estimate on what the new contract will cost the district was not available.

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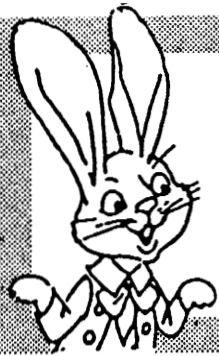
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Rabbit Tracks

Heat awareness day is June 9. The National Weather Service reports that 175 persons succumb to demands of heat annually. The Service recommends, among other things, that you drink plenty of water, even before you feel thirsty.

Oddly enough, water is also recommended for persons with heat exhaustion symptoms, but not for heat stroke, which is life threatening. For these victims, the Service says, do not give fluids of any kind. Get them to a hospital.

It was fully expected that the traffic on I-75 from Gaylord to Bay City would be heavy and stop and go during Monday's peak driving periods. After all, the weather was near perfect for vacationers in Michigan's north country.

Not so. On the highway from about 12 noon to 2:30 p.m. there was a back up for about 10 minutes just north of Sterling, but other than that it was no heavier than a normal week-end.

Caro officials pleased with response to note

Caro police and school authorities are continuing their search for the author of a threatening letter that prompted Caro School officials to close school early and evacuate students Thursday afternoon.

School Supt. Dennis Anderson said the letter was discovered by a student in a bathroom at the middle school.

"It was a threatening letter discussing a rumor that there was going to be an incident here like there was in Colorado," Anderson explained, referring to the April 20 rampage at Columbine High School in Colorado, where 2 students used guns and bombs to kill a dozen classmates and a teacher and injure 23 other students before committing suicide.

Anderson, who was notified about the letter at 2 p.m., said Caro police were contacted and a decision was made to cancel classes district-wide.

Students left the buildings at 2:30 p.m. and, 90 minutes later, a K-9 unit from the Michigan State Police post in Bridgeport arrived to search school buildings, according to the superintendent.

"We had officers in the building from Caro, state police and county. We searched the grounds, roof

and tunnels. The (state police) dog went through the buildings and found nothing."

The incident was the latest in a string of school closings in the Thumb due to rumors of bomb threats and other hints of school violence. School officials in Bad Axe, Cros-Lex, Marlette, Millington, Mayville and Vassar have all cancelled classes in recent weeks.

Anderson said law enforcement personnel were pleased with how Caro School officials handled the situation, including their ability to make a prompt decision to cancel the final hour of classes.

"We had 3 or 4 field trips going on, so our response time wasn't as fast as we wanted. (But) things went very smoothly as far as evacuation of students and faculty," he said. "We were out of the building in record time, without panic."

"Overall, I was very pleased with the procedure that took place."

Anderson acknowledged the Colorado tragedy and other similar incidents affected how school officials approached the letter found at Caro Middle School Thursday.

"I think in any other year, we would respond differently," he said. "I didn't classify this letter as a true bomb threat, but I think given the concern everybody has — and rightfully so — you take precautions when you're dealing with children."

"A lot of times, when a student finds a letter like this, panic ensues, and we didn't want that to happen," Anderson added. "You don't take any chances; you just go, and that's what we did."

As for the individual who wrote the letter, Anderson indicated officials are following up on information that may lead to the culprit.

Like dandelions in the spring, every so often subject matter offered in school is challenged. Most times it concerns what is proper literature for students.

Attempts at censorship in the past have failed and after the controversy subsided, nothing changed much and the books in question stayed on the shelves without a great deal of interest.

It doesn't appear that the current rhubarb about showing a PG-13 movie depicting a modern version of Romeo and Juliet to freshman students at Cass City High School will have any more effect than similar incidents have in the past.

Supt. Ken Micklash said that after the movie was challenged by Ray and Bonnie Ferris, he received several calls concerned about censorship of the teaching of a classic.

Balancing that is the current climate in schools and the teachers in the course have decided not to show the ending when Juliet commits suicide by shooting herself. The discussion about the ending will not be curtailed.

There is a procedure in place for parents to voice objections, but in fairness to the Ferrises, it was not generally known and hadn't been used in years.

However, every parent was given the opportunity to have a student excused from seeing the film before it was shown. The film was part of the study. If the student doesn't participate, I can see nothing wrong in having them read about it and then answer questions in writing.

Whether or not a violent film increases the hazard of violence in a school remains an unanswered question. But it's been proven time and again that censorship never really works. Banning a book in Boston always was a great sales stimulator. You have to assume that the teachers would be among the first to unite against showing

any film if they believed that it increased their chances of ending up with a bullet in the head.

As one administrator said, the teachers attempt to use the movie as a vehicle for showing what went wrong and what could have been done to eliminate the mistakes that ended in tragedy.

The only lasting benefit of the current censorship debate is that it prodded the school into reviewing its procedures to make sure parents know how they can present their views on subject matters presented to their children.

Other than that, the whole controversy is merely a Tempest in a Teapot.

This was my annual trip to the nursery with my wife. Connie goes to buy roses and bedding plants, and I tag along, reading the labels and grousing about prices. She tries to lose me as quickly as possible.

My wife visits the nursery often, but she only takes me about once a year. That's understandable, I guess.

The sweet corn was the object of my ire on this trip. I couldn't believe folks would pay good money for corn transplants. The crop is so easy to grow from seed or by starting plants in the house.

My mind raced back to the only time I can remember transplanting corn. It was 1956, and I was 12 years old. The old John Deere was fitted with duck-footed shovels in the front and smaller spring-tooth points behind the rear wheels.

I had just made the turn on the end rows and skipped over 4 rows to head back across the field. We had a 2-row planter and a 2-row cultivator in those days; so a person cultivating corn could make the turn as big as necessary — as long as he skipped an even number of rows.

A 4-row turn was OK, and a 6-row was fine, too; but skipping 3 rows or 5 meant you were on 2 separate planter laps, and the spacing wasn't always consistent.

A sixth grader should be able to count, of course, but he has other things to think

about. He recalls the last shot of the basketball game, the proper weight line for casting trout flies, or the camping trip when the biggest bear you can imagine walked out of the woods with 6 little pigs.

All of these things were bounding through my mind when I looked over and noticed 3 rows between me and the previous pass with the cultivators. A glance between the wheels showed duck-foot digging up corn, and a quick peek to the rear showed this

had been going on for some time. That's how I learned to transplant corn.

First you dig a hole, and then cover the plant roots with dirt. Stalks that are cut in half, or don't have any roots remaining are planted leaf-side-up and buried deeply. When these turn brown a few days later, Dad and the neighbors might think the corn borers got 'em.

It's a thankless job, transplanting corn — certainly not something I would recommend. Any 12-year-old kid can tell us about that.

Sister recalls fond memories

Cass City continues to benefit from Pinneys' generous legacy

You may have never met the late Fred Pinney — maybe you've never even heard his name — but if you live in the Cass City area, chances are you've benefited from Pinney's generosity and community spirit.

That legacy is alive and well throughout the community today, more than 10 years after his death.

From the newly renovated and expanded Rawson Memorial Library to Cass City Recreational Park to the planned construction of the "Let's Build Some Fun in Thumb" playscape, the Pinney family has played a key financial role in making the village a better place to work and play.

The Cass City Chamber of Commerce, during its recent annual community dinner, paid tribute to the Pinney family.

Fred Pinney, who along with his wife, Lottie, established the Pinney Foundation in November 1983, is perhaps best known as a life-long Cass City resident, respected banker and citizen, active in community affairs.

But his contributions were often made "behind the scenes".

He didn't always receive the credit due him, and his professional manner often hid the real man, described by those closest to him as a true gentleman with a quiet sense of humor and a deep devotion to his hometown.

Many of those memories remain strong for Patricia Murphy, Fred's sister.

"My father died when I was 10 years old. Frederick was 14 years older and as my sister and I grew up, he was like a father to us," Murphy said.

"When we were around 10 or 12 years old, Frederick would take us up to Sand Point on a Sunday afternoon. In the rest of the year, I remember he took us to

Saginaw on a Sunday afternoon to the Temple Theatre where we saw vaudeville."

QUIET, PRIVATE

Murphy said Fred was a quiet, private person, but not without a sense of humor.

"My mother told me that when he was in Cass City School at one time, on Halloween, (and) he and some friends took a farmer's wagon apart and reassembled it on the roof of some downtown store," she recalled. "He was temporarily suspended from school along with his friends."

"He had a keen sense of humor which I discovered as I grew older. I used to send him the most outrageous birthday cards I could find, and he loved them."

Pinney was a graduate of U-M, where his studies included law. "As far as I knew, he was always expected to go (to work in) the bank, and he complied," Murphy said. "I think he was born for the job."

His tenure at the Pinney State Bank, later bought out by Chemical Financial Corp., spanned 57 years, including many years as bank president.

During his time at U-M, Fred was a member of the U-M Opera and traveled with the group on performance tours. According to Murphy, Fred's singing ability must have improved drastically since his youth.

"Mother said when he was little, he came home from school one day with a new job. His teacher named him 'chief of the listeners' as, at that time, he couldn't carry a tune in a basket," she said.

Murphy recalled her

brother married Lottie West in September 1931.

"They eloped," she said. "The marriage was not announced until the following spring for 2 reasons. Lottie was teaching in Cass City and was not supposed to be married and remain teaching. Also, both being born in Cass City, they figured a wedding guest list would have to include the whole town. Neither of them liked a big fuss made."

LOVED CASS CITY

Murphy said her brother "always loved Cass City and showed it whenever he could."

"Frederick always accepted any responsibility and gave it his full attention. He always worked for anything that would help Cass City and his family are all glad for him that he could leave something for the town that would be remembered."

"Frederick Pinney was an absolutely honest man. He was an example of a true gentleman and a wise assistant to any who asked for help."

Pinney, who died in 1988 at the age of 83, served the community in many capacities, including a stint on the village council and as village president. He was a Cass City Rotarian, life member of Tyler Lodge No. 317 F&AM, Cass City, and member and trustee of the First Presbyterian Church.

The Pinney Foundation he and his wife established years ago continues to make generous financial gifts for a myriad of community projects. The funds are distributed by a board of directors composed of Dick

Donahue (chairman), Bev Perry, Mike Weaver, Annette Pinney, Glen Pietsenpol, Jude Patnaude, Barbara Tuckey, and B.J. Wallace.

The foundation's single largest gift totalled \$250,000 — seed money for the library renovation/expansion project.

But many other events and groups have benefited over the years, including the Bach Festival and a host of school-related programs, from Close-Up to the American Association of University Women's Reading is Fundamental project.

A variety of recreational park improvements, from ball field fencing to a \$40,000 grant for major pool renovations this year, have also received funds. Another \$30,000 was awarded this year toward the planned playground construction on the site of the old Cass City Middle School.

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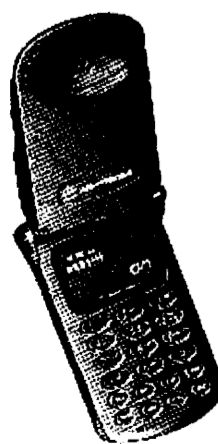
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History makers

Cass City pair to receive scholarship

David Hobbs and Marissa Sweeney of Cass City are among 40 of the state's top high school student leaders to receive a Leader Advancement Scholarship to attend Central Michigan University this fall.

The 4-year renewable award will cover the cost of 12 credit hours each year and is valued at approximately \$4,800 overall. It is among the first scholarships in Michigan to provide financial assistance specifically for student leaders.

CMU established its 3-pronged leadership program to help develop individuals to become leaders in their professions and communities.

NASS surveying

How many acres will be planted to corn in Michigan? Have spring weather conditions allowed planting to proceed normally? Are hog inventory numbers declining?

To gather reliable, objective information, the National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) of the U.S. Department of Agriculture will be surveying farmers for the annual June Agricultural Survey.

These type of questions surface with each new crop season and livestock cycle. Producers are the only source for the facts. "If farmers are going to make sound marketing decisions, they need to know the answers to these questions," says Dave Kleweno, Michigan state statistician.

The Federal/State Michigan Agricultural Statistics Service will be conducting the survey and a representative will contact local producers between May 29 and June 12. This survey is particularly vital because it will provide the first clear indications of the potential production of major commodities in 1999.

The information gathered is widely used. Producers rely on the data to reach yield production, marketing, and investment decisions. Industry analysts, extension agents, and farm organizations use the information to assist farmers in improving their economic situation.

Information from individual operations is combined with other responses to compile agricultural statistics for Michigan and the United States. Response to this survey is voluntary and all individual reports are kept strictly confidential.

To provide timely information, the survey results are released soon after the survey is completed. The Hogs and Pigs Report will be released June 25 at 3 p.m. and the Acreage and Grain Stocks Reports will be released June 30 at 8:30 a.m.

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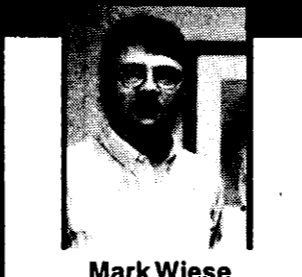

Jim Green was named the new Cass City High School varsity basketball coach Monday, replacing Jeff Hartel, who resigned this spring.

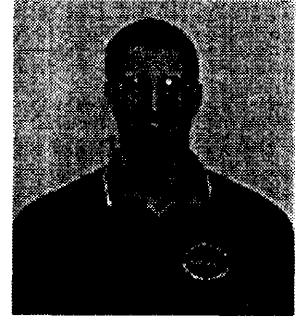

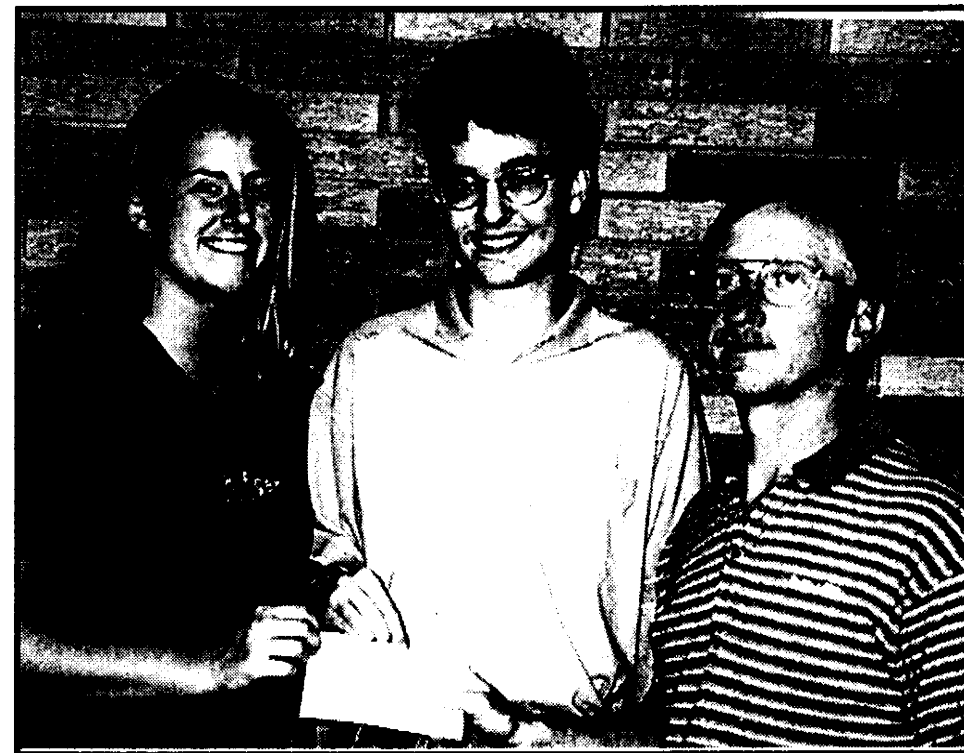
