## DNR biologist returns home

Arnie Karr's arrival at the DNR's Cass City Field Office 2 weeks ago was a homecoming of sorts.

Karr, who spent the past several years working as a wildlife habitat biologist in the Saginaw Bay region, is originally from the Gagetown area. In fact, he grew up on a dairy farm just a stone's throw from the Octagon Barn.

Now, he's settling in at his office about 5 miles west of Cass City, where he'll continue the work of long-time DNR Wildlife Biologist Bud Jarvis, who retired in November after 33 years on the

"I feel extremely fortunate to have this happen," Karr said of his new assignment, which will include planning, mapping, creating and preserving wildlife habitat for some 50,000 acres of state game areas in Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties.

While Karr grew up hunting and fishing in the Thumb, he says a lot has changed since he graduated from Owen-Gage High School in

"A bunch of us from Owen-Gage High School used to hunt near Hurds Corner Road, just 5 miles from here," recalled Karr, who also spent a fair amount of time hunting pheasant and grouse in the area, bagging wildfowl at Fish Point, and chasing deer in Deford.

"When I was in high school, there was no Gagetown State Game Area. Another thing

that wasn't there was the Verona State Game Area," Karr said, referring to the 9,000-acre state game area in Huron County that has become popular among pheas-

"There were no pheasant management areas back then. One of the key things Bud (Jarvis) and the technicians here did to improve pheasant habitat was to get some permanent winter cover and nesting cover out there," he continued, noting the DNR staff relied on farmers and share cropping agreements to create plots of switch grass along with corn to provide a food source. "They're the ultimate answer for winter survival for pheas-

Really, the entire food chain

Karr brings to his new job

Karr said the open grasslands created by the DNR attract a variety of songbirds as well as game birds. "Any ground-nesting wildlife benefits from the grasslands.

Karr pointed out that his duties will include preserving grasslands by suppressing overgrowth of brush through controlled burning and other measures. He'll also work with farmers and share croppers and timber cutters to improve habitat for

## TNU arrests 87, seizes \$3.2 million in drugs in '99

has spent more than 10 years putting drug dealers out of business in the Thumb and beyond, but there's still plenty of work to do, according to TNU Commander Detective Lt. Mitch Krugielki.

"Our goal, of course, is to begin with the mid-level drug trafficker and work our way up to the. . .source," Krugielki said recently following the drug unit's annual meeting. "The work is here; we're only restricted by personnel and funding issues."

Tuscola County Sheriff Tom Kern agreed, saying TNU continues to play a vital role in the war against

"There's no doubt at all. The drug scene keeps changing all the time and you have to keep on top of it," Kern said. "You need these teams to keep the pressure on.

"They (TNU) are out there making buys and busts, and I think we've been able to keep some control over it." When it comes to regional drug teams, Kern said, it's important to look at the whole picture. You may not have officers arresting a drug dealer in your hometown everv other week, he said, but that's not the point. "The point is, you live in this county and the drug transactions are coming in and taking place in this county, and it's going to impact your kids

and grandkids. TNU is continuing its work on the heels of a year that saw an upswing in drug-rerests, most involving marijuana trafficking.

"I would feel confident in saying there is an increase in the availability of marijuana in the Thumb area," Krugielki said. Pot sales are very lucrative, he added, with

The Thumb Narcotics Unit the street value typically ranging from \$800 a pound to \$1,000 a pound. "But we had one complaint where an individual was paying \$3,000 a pound."

> In all, TNU investigations in 1999 resulted in nearly 90 arrests and the seizure of more than \$3.2 million worth of drugs.

TNU handled a total of 143 complaints last year, including 68 arrests in Tuscola County, 62 arrests in Lapeer County and 5 arrests in Huron County.

Krugielki pointed out that the numbers reflect only where a complaint originated, not necessarily the location of all drug activity associated with a given investigation. A complaint received in Lapeer, for example, could lead officers to Marlette and then Cass City.

"Drug dealers don't know township and county borders, so the (statistics) are skewed," he said.

101 criminal charges. The

total includes 67 arrests in Lapeer County, 30 in Tuscola County and 2 in Huron County. There were 2 charges of

marijuana use, 19 charges of marijuana possession, 35 counts of delivery of marijuana, 6 counts of delivery/ manufacture of cocaine/ crack, 4 counts of delivery/ manufacture of Lysergic Acid Diethylamide (LSD), one count of the delivery/ manufacture of heroin, and one count of delivery/manufacture of Methamphet-

Officers seized 3,197.38 pounds of marijuana with a street value of \$3,197,380, 14 grams of heroin valued at \$4,200, 37.5 grams of cocaine valued at \$4,125, 3.25 grams of cocaine valued at \$358, and 80 units of LSD valued at \$240.

TNU investigations in 1999 also resulted in charges of being a fugitive (4), criminal sexual conduct (2), robbery (2), fraudulent procurement of narcotics/drugs (one), burglary of a safe/vault (2), obstruction of justice (2), weapons offenses (4), bomb threat (one), larceny (one) and driving while license is suspended (one).

TNU's share of forfeiture proceeds totaled \$11,575.81 in 1999. The forfeitures were \$3,612 in cash, negotiable instruments and securities; \$410 in other property forfeited (long guns auctioned); and \$10,000 in real property, minus costs and sharing percentages.

TNU, which relies on cooperation from local, county and state police agencies throughout the Thumb. serves the counties of Huron, Lapeer, Sanilac and Tuscola with a contingency of 7 officers and a secretary in a geographical area encompassing a combined population of 225,000 people.

The regional drug team has a board of directors consisting of 11 members, including Kern, who serves as board president, Cass City Police Chief Gene Wilson (vice president) and Huron County Sheriff Mike Gage.

John Hoppe of Cass City, son of Melvin and Alicia Hoppe, recently enlisted in the U.S. Navy for guaranteed training as an engineman.



Detroit schools seek to provide better facilities and better administrative supervision and have money ready to pour into the system.

But after reading a story recently about 9 reported rapes of students on their way to classes in Detroit this school year, it's easy to see why problems on the road to a better system remain.

The story continued with an outline of preventive measures available and the names and addresses of 3 rape counseling organizations.

The safety methods suggested include:

\*Turn on the porch lights before dawn on weekdays \*Glance out house win-

dows between 7-9 a.m. and 2-4 p.m. \*Parents should form walk-

ing groups of neighboring pupils. All of these suggestions make sense given the problems in Detroit, but it's hard

to imagine needing a similar program in Cass City or the Thumb. Given a choice, any parent would go where the living is

safer, and a safe environment makes it easier to attract good teachers. It's true that Detroit pays less than the suburbs, but the system also pays more than most Thumb schools. Filling vacancies with competent teachers is not a problem in the Thumb, while many vacancies go unfilled in Detroit.

Until there is a better handle on the problem, all the glitz and glitter uptown won't do much for the Detroit pupils. The new baseball and football stadiums, the 3 new casinos and the commercial development are big plusses for the central business district, sure to attract more visi-

when he left the service. That army field jacket was the best barn coat I ever had. It had a zipper, and buttons, and a removable liner for winter use.


Best of all, it had enough pockets for candy bars, so strong, I had to take a muskrat traps, shotgun shower every time I took it shells, dead rabbits, a few off.



Students get to enjoy the fun and excitement of seeing who their best matches are. They may even want to surprise their Data Match crush with flowers or a nice box of chocolates.



Tessa Zawilinski said, "I'm not sure what to get, a card for sure.'


I asked Katie Hacker what she plans to get her boyfriend. She said, "Last year I got him a flower, this year probably a shirt."

## 7-year-old Gagetown boy heats up ice at IMA arena

Most 7-year-olds are content to spend their winter weekends sliding down hills and building snow forts, with some time in front of their favorite video game in between outdoor activities.

Not Eric Montreuil. Montreuil, son of Don and Patti Montreuil of Gagetown, prefers to spend his free time on the ice, racing a motorcycle equipped with specially designed studded tires and fenders.

And although the boy entered his first season of ice racing competition just a few weeks ago, he's already enioving the thrill of victory.

"He's won all of them (races) so far," Don Montreuil said, noting his son most recently claimed a first-place trophy in an 8-lap race Jan. 29 at the IMA sports arena in Flint, where he competed against 7 other youngsters ages 4 to 8 years. He has also won events on quarter-mile tracks in Port Huron and Gladwin.

The area youngster got his first taste of riding his motorcycle on ice at the home of friend who has a gravel pit, according to his father. "He looked like he was doing pretty good," the elder Montreuil recalled. "And he's kind of hooked now."

Montreuil's success isn't altogether surprising. His racing career actually dates back to the spring of 1998, when he began competing on dirt tracks around the state.

His competition debut included a first-place finish on the half-track at the Tuscola County Fairgrounds in Caro, second-place in the Dirt Track State Championships in Croswell, and third place in the Michigan State Championship TT Scrambles in

In less than 6 months, the boy collected 9 trophies and one plaque.

"He gets a lot of practice. He has a lot of friends who have bikes," said Don Montreuil, who grew up around snowmobiles, motorcycles and 4-wheelers, and has shared that interest with his son. The elder Montreuil also enjoys the role of his son's "pit crew" - changing the tires and gears on Eric's

motorcycles to suit track conditions, and taking care of maintenance chores.

He and his wife also serve as chauffeurs, transporting Eric to various weekend race competitions throughout the

As a parent, Montreuil acknowledged, there are some tense moments when it comes to watching Eric race. But the youngster always wears a full complement of protective equipment, from boots to a chest protector to a helmet. And, he pointed out, "I know he's a safe driver.

"Safety's first. That's what I've tried to teach him," he said, adding Eric will ease back on the throttle in a race if winning means taking a risk. "There's always tomorrow.

Eric, who recently received a new bike - an Italian-made 50 cc Action Attack - said he enjoys racing, win or lose. "It's a lot of work," said his father, who indicated racing has proven to be a great hobby for his son. "I figure if he's out there riding his motorcycle, he's staying out of trouble."

pher Rogner, Detective Patrick Woidan, and sergeants Kevin Thane and Michael Pine - received commendations for their investigation of an assault complaint in Wells Township.

"Sergeant Thane and Deputy Rogner responded (to the complaint). After taking the information, the suspect started to talk. Sergeant Thane, suspecting the information given was very valuable, called the other patrol car to assist," Kern said.

'Sergeant Pine and Deputy Dunham staked out at the suspect's residence. Eventually, all 4 officers stopped several cars leaving the residence and were able to recover a considerable amount of stolen property.

"Detective Woidan was called in to assist with coordination efforts," he added. "As a result of good police work and extra investigative efforts, 12 burglaries were cleared up, thousands of dollars of stolen merchandise was recovered, and 3 arrests were made."

#### STOLEN VEHICLE

Finally, deputies Hull, Pennington and Dunham were commended for their work in responding to a stolen vehicle complaint in the Deford area.

Dunham was dispatched to the complaint, according to Kern, who said Pennington was having lunch nearby, overheard the call and was about to leave when a citizen gave him information on the possible location of the stolen vehicle.

"Deputies Dunham and Pennington responded to the last general location of the reported stolen vehicle and located the vehicle by a pond in a wooded area," Kern noted. "Deputy Pennington called for a tracking dog, and Deputy Hull was called for additional assistance.

While in the area, Deputy Hull observed a suspect run to a residence on Shabbona Road.

The suspect was retrieved from under the building, but only after making threats on the dog and the officer with a baseball bat and a 2-by-4. Eventually, the suspect was sprayed with pepper gas and finally subdued.'



McLaughlin, along with Cass City Coach Jim Green, were the stars of Westover's 1990 hoop team in Kingston. Under Westover's guidance, the senior pair happily advanced the Cardinals into the state's tourney quarterfinal round before bowing to Detroit East Catholic.

Friday's learning session, however, wasn't nearly as pleasant for McLaughlin.

With the win, Coach Leon Westover's Bulldogs improved to 7-3 in NCTL play heading into Friday's match up with visiting Carsonville-Port Sanilac. 
WAITING FOR A PASS is Cass City's Becky Bulla (8) from teammate Kayla Wolschlager at Saturday's USA Invitational.

Defensively, Owen-Gage had Vargo with 35 digs, Salcido with 29 digs, and Lowry and Danielle Fritz with 23 digs each.



## Survey reveals most motorists are buckling up

State safety belt use fell in a critical area in 1999, most notably among young adults, according to the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning (OHSP).

Results of the annual survey, conducted by the University of Michigan Transportation Research Institute (UMTRI), revealed that belt use rates for the 16-29-yearenforcement law will take effect, allowing officers to ticket motorists who are not buckled up. Currently, Michigan's safety belt law has secondary enforcement status, meaning motorists must be stopped for another traffic code violation before a safety belt citation can be issued.

old age group fell significantly, from 63.6 percent in 1998 to 57.4 percent in 1999.

The survey found no change in overall safety belt use, moving from 69.9 percent in 1998 to 70.1 percent in 1999. The overall number reflects safety belt use by drivers and front seat passengers of passenger cars, sportutility vehicles, vans and pickup trucks.

"We're troubled when belt use declines in any area," said Betty J. Mercer, OHSP division director. "It's even more disturbing when that decrease comes in a population where we have low use rates. We don't have an explanation and hope that heightened publicity efforts and the new law will reverse the decline."

Many states with secondary enforcement laws find safety belt use plateaus around 70 percent. In the spring of-2000, Michigan's standard

tion campaign, "Click it or ticket," has been launched to alert motorists to the impending change in the safety belt law. Materials, including radio and television public service announcements, are slated to begin airing as soon as February.

Historically, safety belt use has increased from 62.7 percent in 1994 to 70.1 percent in 1999. Based on the experience of other states that have changed from secondary to standard enforcement laws, Michigan can expect gains of up to 10 percentage points or more, according to experts with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

The safety belt use survey is conducted each fall. Trained observers carefully record safety belt use at predetermined sites to accurately measure belt use hab-

#### Ag practice compliance hearings set

State hearings on farmers not complying with Michigan Department of Agriculture guidelines began in New Lothrop Monday, according to state Rep. Mike Green, chair of the House Agriculture and Resource Manage-

In January, Green appointed a 5-member subcommittee to examine farmers' non-compliance with MDA's Generally Accepted Agriculture Management Practices.

"During the right-to-farm legislation discussion it became apparent that not all farmers are following the suggested guidelines," said Green, R-Mayville. "The goal of the hearings is to determine the impact instances of non-compliance pose to the farming industry and environment."

The subcommittee will meet with local officials and the public in the VFW Hall, 8235 N. Saginaw St., New Lothrop, to discuss farming practices.

# NFO urges milk price floor

As America's dairy farmers continue receiving pay prices at 1978 levels, a major farm group is formally requesting the secretary of agriculture to temporarily floor class III milk prices at \$13.50. Class

#### 19,000 receive exams

Since 1992 nearly 19,000 Michigan women have received low-cost or free breast and pelvic exams that could have saved their lives via the federal and state-funded breast and cervical cancer control program (BCCCP). Prior to 1992 many of these women may have chosen not to have breast and cervical cancer screening because of limited financial resources to pay for pelvic and clinical breast exams, mammograms, pap tests or treatment if something was found. Because many women only went for care after more severe symptoms developed, cancers were often detected after they had become invasive and significantly less curable.

While some funding has been made available to help pay for screening tests, the success of the program is largely due to the participating hospitals and private physicians commitment to assuring that no woman be denied needed tests or treatment because of an inability to pay.

Of the communities served by the Huron County Health Department since the beginning of the program, 59 women have been found to have breast cancer, 38 invasive and 21 in-situ (localized) disease. Fewer women have been found to have cervical cancer, 3 invasive and 14 in situ.

Locally, Huron County Health Department is the lead agency for the regional BCCCP. The program serves mainly women from Huron, Sanilac, Tuscola, Bay, Saginaw and St. Clair counties. In FY 1998-99 1,260 women were served at several screening sites. A review of the program statistics for income status shows that 65.6 percent program participants reported incomes under 100 percent, 24.4 percent 100-150 percent and 9.5 percent 150-250 percent of the federal poverty income level (currently \$20,600 a year for a single person). In looking at insurance coverage, 63.3 percent reported having no insurance. Four breast cancers were detected one (1) invasive and 3 in situ. A total of 3 non-invasive cervical cancers were found.

III base prices currently hover near \$9.50 per one hundred pounds (cwt.) of milk. Just one year ago farmers earned \$17.34/cwt.

National Farmers Organization members passed the milk floor price resolution at its national convention in mid January. NFO leaders are calling on farm organizations and other dairy industry groups to join in the effort for the temporary 6month action in all federal milk marketing orders.

"Because dairy farmers' milk production costs greatly exceed the prices they currently receive, many are sufand are leaving the business," said National Farmers Organization President Paul Olson, a dairy producer from Wisconsin. "To realize the severe hard-

ship we face, Congress and Secretary Glickman only need to remember the salary they earned 22 years ago, and then imagine trying to pay business and living expenses using that salary.' The federal government re-

ports that once total economic expenses are computed, it costs dairymen nationally an average \$17.33 per cwt. to produce milk for U.S. consumers. Their total fering severe financial loss cash expenses average

represents labor and management costs, and the overall return on investment. Versus one year ago, most

dairy producers are receiving \$7.71 cwt. less for the base price of their milk. Which means a 100-cow herd generates approximately \$14,000 less for each month's production. "Low milk prices place

dairy farmers in a cruel costprice squeeze," said Olson. Without some type of price relief, increasingly large numbers of dairy farms will face bankruptcy and financial ruin.' The Agricultural Marketing


lishes federal rules for milk production and sales, specifically calls for orderly marketing conditions and price stability, which is in the best interest of producers and consumers. Unreasonable fluctuations in prices and supplies, along with orderly milk flow are key points in federal milk market regula-

"We urge Secretary Glickman to act swiftly and set a temporary floor price of \$13.50 to protect America's hard working dairy producers that provide the quality milk that every citizen depends upon.'
