Council appoints Haley to seat

The Cass City Village Council appointed Sandra Haley to fill a council vacancy during a special meeting last week.

Haley is a former council trustee who did not seek reelection earlier this year. She was previously appointed to the council in August 1994, then won a 4-year term of her own 2 years later.

Haley fills a vacancy left by Les Karr, who had 2 years remaining on his 4-year term as a trustee when he was elected village president last March.

Haley was appointed after receiving 3 votes during last week's special meeting. Also nominated was former council Trustee Matthew Prieskorn, who received 2 votes. Prieskorn served on the council for a dozen years before losing his bid for the village president's seat earlier this year.

"They've (Haley and Prieskorn) both been excellent council people," commented Village Manger Jane Downing. "They were both excellent candidates, and hopefully Matt will continue to stay involved in some ca-

"Enough is enough"

Vandals target Northwood course, owner calling it quits

bara Howard more than \$10,000 in stolen and damaged property 3 years ago when they broke into the couple's clubhouse at Northwood Shores Golf Course in Cass City.

Vandals struck again over the weekend, but this time the cost will be much higher.

After 5 years of pouring sweat and time into the par 3 course, the Howards say the latest attack on their business - just as they had returned from vacation with plans to prepare to open for the season — has left them frustrated to the point where they're ready to call it quits.

"It almost takes our energy away from the place. It might just be the last straw," Joe Howard commented Sunday after discovering that vandals had ripped off the wooden guard rails on bridges connecting greens on the course, and smashed benches and green markers, then tossed them into a ditch.

"You're used to the little stuff, but this is just downright stupidity, hateful and uncalled for," said Howard, who estimated the damage at

\$3,000 to \$4,000. "And a lot of time, a lot of labor, a lot of materials. It's just terrible.'

Howard said he and his wife have enjoyed improving the golf course and take pride in being part of the business community.

"We work hard and enjoy the place. It's a beautiful site and a great place for the community," he added. "We don't get the avid golfer, but we get the people who want to golf, who want to learn the game, who want to bring their families.

"I love the people. We've met a lot of friends."

Howard said his goal for the course has always been to break even financially. In fact, his rates enable a family to enjoy a golf outing for about \$35. "We're not into it for the money, but we need to earn money to keep the place going," he noted. "It's just getting to the point where it may work, but it takes a lot of effort and a lot of time."

The vandals who broke into the Northwood Shores clubhouse in July 1997 stole a trailer, then loaded it with Howard's power and hand tools, hundreds of CDs, pop and a 4-wheeler. They also damaged Howard's classic car and a custom race car stored at the clubhouse.

Howard and 2 other men tracked the suspects more than 11 miles until they came across the stolen goods at a Deford area residence. Two

"We feel sorry for the people who love the place," Howard said. At the same time, he added, "You can't go around every night and take things inside and protect your stuff.

The Thumb Oilseed Producers' Cooperative, Ubly, was honored last week in Lansing as the Best Small Business in 1999 by the Michigan Small Business Development Center (Michigan SBDC) for Region 6, which covers 5 counties in

the Thumb area.

from each of the tually 900,000 bushels of organization's regions across the state, were chosen as Best Small Businesses because of their success in terms of sales, employment, business strategy, economic impact and, of course, the involvement of the Michigan SBDC in providing assistance, said Michigan SBDC State Director Ronald R. Hall.

The cooperative received its award at an exhibit and dinner program in Lansing. Its display included a number of products they produce for domestic and international markets.

Thumb Oilseed Producers' Cooperative General Manager Gary Wruble said biodegradable engine lubricants, high-energy meal for livestock, fruit drinks and soy foods are all "future" products that are made right now. More than that, they are made from soybeans grown Twelve companies, one in the Thumb area - - eventhem from 22,000 acres.

> At the cooperative's processing plant, these beans will be converted into 800,000 gallons of crude oil and 20,000 tons of soybean meal for distributors based in the United States and Canada - - contracts in place even before the plant opened. Not all product will be shipped out, however, a small portion is kept for research and development of new marketoriented products.

> Before the cooperative was formed, farmers relied on their own contacts to make

soybean sales. The idea of creating a "value-added" service with soybeans, however, started germinating in 1997 with an assist from James LeCureux of Michigan State University Extension. Today it has about 185 members and is a model for cooperatives being formed for other commodities.

From the early planning stages, to financing arrangements, to today's operations, LeCureux said, the Michigan SBDC at the Huron County Economic Development Corporation has been a source of counsel and assis-

Warrants lead to record pot find

A drug trafficking investigation that began last month at a Decker area residence recently blossomed into what Sanilac Drug Task Force officials are calling their largest single seizure of marijuana in recent history.

The marijuana seized in the operation, which included execution of search warrants at 4 different Sanilac County homes, has an estimated street value of \$68,000.

Sgt. Robert Willis said the drug team executed 3 search warrants during the evening hours of April 9 and early morning hours of April 10.

"The first search warrant was executed in the 3800 block of Baird Street in the village of Carsonville. Following a 6-month-long investigation, drug task force officers arrested a 17-yearold Carsonville man (and) a 19-year-old Reese man, and turned over a 13-year-old juvenile female to her parents," Willis said.

"Located in the residence was a quantity of marijuana pre-packaged for sale, \$190 in cash of suspected drug proceeds, and 8 guns, one being a sawed off rifle." Willis said both male sus-

pects were booked into the Sanilac County Jail. They were later released pending issuance of warrants seeking charges of possession with intent to deliver marijuana and maintaining a drug house against the 17-yearold, and charges of possession of marijuana and frequenting a drug house against the 19-year-old.

Drug team officers executed the second search warrant in the 1400 block of Argyle Road, following a month-long investigation of marijuana sales from a residence, during the early evening hours of April 9.

"During the execution of the search warrant, approximately 3 pounds of marijuana, scales, drug paraphernalia and \$128 in suspected drug proceeds were seized from the residence," Willis

He noted the investigation began March 10, when the drug team executed a search warrant at a Decker address and, through additional investigation, found that marijuana seized in that raid was coming from the Argyle Road residence.

"A 41-year-old female and her 19-year-old daughter were arrested by the Sanilac County Drug Team," Willis continued, adding both were booked into the county jail marijuana and \$1,017 in cash and released pending issuath the residence. 


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
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
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Rabbit Tracks

I can truthfully report that I visited the MGM Grand casino in Detroit and didn't lose a cent. That's because I didn't gamble. I like to play craps when I gamble, but at the Grand the cheapest dice game was for a minimum bet of \$10. Just too rich for my blood. Not that my money was missed. They had 4 tables in operation, one for the \$10 minimum, 2 with a \$15 minimum and one with a \$25 minimum. Each of them was crowded with gamblers. This was just before noon on a Thursday and the place was fairly well jammed. No wonder they take in a million dollars a day.

The reason Esther and I visited was to try one of the restaurants. We selected the lunch buffet, which costs \$9.95 each, including all the non-alcoholic drinks you desire.

If you rated the buffet on price and selection, it has to rate a 9 on the one-10 scale. The buffet looks like one of the food courts that you see in a mall. Except that your ticket lets you choose from all the ethnic dishes, Japanese, Chinese, Italian, American and 2 others that I can't identify.

It wasn't gourmet, but if you like a wide variety, including desserts, with buffet quality, it's a place to go.

The reason we were in Detroit in the morning was to attend the Van Gogh exhibition at the Detroit Museum of Arts. It was well worth the trip and I enjoyed it as much as I did the first one that was held some 35 years ago.

We went on Thursday because weekends are sold out and it's best to make reservations before trekking to the big city. Tickets are \$16 each plus a small handling fee and Esther and I agreed that it was money well spent.

The brining is scheduled to take place after the Tuscola County Road Commission grades the roads in May, according to Newell, who said Fred Morley of Wilkinson Corp. submitted the bid.

simply caring for children. For example, the providers strive to incorporate educational activities and field trips in their centers.

"I think we operate on the preschool level. We do introduce the children to that type of activity to help prepare them (children) for the school years.'

During their monthly meetings, members of the group share ideas and support one another. "What we try to do each month is bring something to the table that's going to help each other," Price

Organizations such as the Mid Thumb Day Care Providers have proven very positive for the day care field, according to Pam Weidman of the Greater Flint and Thumb Area 4C Association, a United Way agency dedicated to helping children grow and develop in a protected, stimulating and

healthful environment. "It's a proven fact that day care providers that belong to a support group stay in business longer, which is better for the children because it (gives them) a stable environment," Weidman said.

The Greater Flint and Thumb Area 4C Association provides a myriad of services ranging from referrals to licensed child care facilities and tips on how parents can select high quality child care, to training and support for child care providers and support services for parents.

Weidman said individuals who regularly care for children not related to them are required by law to be licensed by the state.

The process involves a long list of rules covering a variety of health standards, including certification in CPR and first aid, immunizations, fire and tornado drills and posting of all exits in the day care facility; a criminal background check, and comprehensive safety inspections.

Licensing takes time, money and a lot of attention to detail, Price acknowledged. "But I think it's just good business."

At the same time, Timko pointed out, the local day care providers put plenty of work into creating caring environments for children, which provides peace of mind to the families.

"That's what a day care provider is - someone who cares," she said, adding that concern doesn't stop when a child goes home for the day. "You get attached to these kids and you get attached to the parents. To me, we're caring for the most valuable

Bird nodded in agreement, saying day care providers often provide support to parents by way of phone calls. "It's not a regular shift job. You're on call all the time; at night, on weekends."

"We feel privileged to have people trust us to watch their children," said Price, who hopes to see the Mid Thumb Day Care Providers continue to grow in the months ahead. "What we hope is to strengthen and grow and really be able to provide even better care for the children than what we're already giving," he said.



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

Ditches may aid farmers

Ditches may give farmers a simple, low-tech and inexpensive solution to improving surface water quality.

Drainage ditches are a valuable tool for reducing the amounts of chemicals entering bodies of water. Agricultural Research Service scientists calculated the percentage of runoff that a ditch may be exposed to during a small storm (.25 of an inch), looking to pinpoint its role in keeping irrigation and pesticides from entering water bodies. They found that the ditch trapped 60 to 90 percent of Atrazine and a commonly used insecticide, Karate, carried in runoff water.

The bin is enclosed with an locking lid and doesn't require any turning for the more passive homeowner who still wants to compost. The Earth Machines are pre-ordered and will be available for Huron County residents to pick up in Bad Axe about mid-May.

Both bins come with complete instruction books that explain the composting process and how to use the bin.

Order forms for both bins can be picked up at MSU Extension, 104 County Building, Bad Axe. Sample bins will be on display there as well. Orders can be placed until April 28 for the Earth Machine and anytime for the Covered Bridge bin.

Area residents are invited to learn how to creatively use Michigan's natural materials during a special workshop, "Environmental Education Day", at the Sanilac Petroglyphs east of Cass City Saturday, April 29, from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. The workshop is designed for educators, but

is open to all visitors. Participants will discover more about the environment surrounding the Petroglyphs, and learn how to craft handmade paper and fiber baskets using natural renewable resources.

A number of educational Michigan Historical Muhandouts will be provided to seum system operated by the educators for classroom instruction

Earth Day is April 22, and in the spirit of environmental renewal, visitors will have the opportunity to assist in cleaning-up the area around the Petroglyphs as a part of an ongoing environmental program. Participants are encouraged to bring gloves, rakes and garbage bags.

The Sanilac Petroglyphs are among the most important prehistoric sites in Michigan. Dating back 300 to 1,000 the Sanilac years, Petroglyphs are a series of figures carved into a sandstone outcrop. Archaeologists suggest that they may have been created by native Americans seeking to improve their hunting success or recording their visions.

To reach the park, turn east off M-53 onto Bay City-Forestville Road and drive 2 miles to Germania Road. Turn south on Germania Road and drive approximately one-half mile. The Petroglyphs' parking lot is on the west side of the road.
