Fires destroy home, \$20,000 motorcycle

January came in like a lamb for the Elkland Township Fire Department, which continued to enjoy plenty of peace in quiet with just 63 fire runs in all of 2000. Unfortunately, the month is going out like a lion.

Fire fighters have been dispatched to fires or accidents 5 times since last Wednesday, including 3 blazes Saturday.

Fire Chief Ron Pawloski reported a former schoolhouse located at 4992 E. Cass City Rd., about 7 miles east of the village, was destroyed early Saturday morning. He estimated the loss at \$50,000.

The brick structure, which had been converted into a home, was not occupied when the 4:28 a.m. alarm sounded. Pawloski identified the owner as Randall L. Hiatt

The cause of the fire remains under investigation by a state fire marshal, who inspected the scene Monday, and the Sanilac County

Sheriff's Department. Fire fighters remained at the scene for about 3 hours. They were assisted by the Moore and Argyle township fire departments and the Elmwood-Gagetown Fire Department.

The Elkland Township Department was then called to a car fire on Akron Road, three-quarters of a mile west of Cedar Run Road. The call came in at 9:28 a.m., according to Pawloski, who said a 1994 Buick Century Ltd.

owned by Wallace Wiles, Cass City, was destroyed. He estimated the loss at about \$3,000.

At 11:38 a.m., fire fighters were called back to the former schoolhouse, which had rekindled. "We didn't clear the hall

until quarter after 1 a.m.," Pawloski said, adding it was a long day.

Earlier in the week, Cass City firemen were dispatched to the scene of an accident in which a pickup truck rolled into a deep ditch on Deckerville Road, near Englehart Road (see related photo).

The department was also called to assist the Elmwood Gagetown Fire Department at a garage fire Thursday morning. No one was injured in the blaze, about 6 miles west of Cass City, but the property loss was enough to make any motorcycle enthusiast groan.

The blaze leveled the structure at 3402 E. Cass City Rd., destroying a 1993 Harley Davidson motorcycle valued at \$20,000, according to Elmwood-Gagetown Fire Chief Paul Lopez, who estimated the total loss at \$35,000.

The owner, Karl L. Solo, was not insured, he said.

The fire was reported at 5:38 a.m. The garage was already fully engulfed when the fire department was dispatched, Lopez said. "I saw the glow from Gagetown when we got out of the hall,"

he added. The fire chief said he suspects a wood burning stove in the structure sparked the blaze.

Elmwood-Gagetown firemen, who were assisted by the Elkland Township Fire Department, remained at the scene for about 3 hours.

Semco gas bills may increase 65%

Semco Energy Gas Company, which supplies gas to Cass City among its 257,000 customers in Michigan, is expected to go before the Michigan Public Service Commission this week and ask for relief from its current freeze on prices.

Roberta Floyd, spokeswoman, said that the company currently bills gas at \$3.24 per 1,000 cubic feet for gas that currently sells for about \$10.

The current prize freeze is in effect until April 1. If the MPSC gives Semco permission, the intent is to negotiate a new price which would be in effect from April, 2001, to April 1, 2004.

Floyd says that the intent is to negotiate a price of around \$5 per 1000 cubic feet so that the company would not be required to buy gas on the open market when prices could skyrocket more than they have now.

If the price is negotiated at \$5.00, home owners can expect prices to increase about 65 percent.

Two other major suppliers are MichCon and Consumers Energy. Customers of MichCon will seek approval of rates to \$5.17 from \$2.95 per 1000 cubic feet. Consumers seeks to increase prices from the current price of \$2.84 to \$5.69 per 1,000 cubic feet.

MichCon said that a proposal to cash out contracts for natural gas distribution would reduce the price increase to between 10 and 15 percent.

While natural gas customers face stiff increases, LP gas customers are already feeling the effects of supply and demand in the crude oil market.

There's been little stability in the price of LP, a biproduct of crude oil, said Vince Laney, operations manager at Cass City Oil and Gas. "Nobody knows what the price is going to be. The price changes, literally, everyday," he added.

"Whatever happens with natural gas, you will see with propane as well," Laney said, noting the wholesale price for LP Please turn to page 4.

spends her days serving up nutritious food as well as a smile and some friendly conversation to more than 2 dozen senior citizens in the Deford area.

Davidson, a Sebewaing resident, is a volunteer driver for the Human Development Commission's Home Delivered Meal Program.

"I have about 30 seniors on my route," said Davidson, who began volunteering last April. "My mother-in-law told me about (the program). She's been doing her route for years, and she needed a sub driver, so I subbed for her and I really liked it."

Davidson, who asked for her own route, is one of about 40 volunteers who regularly deliver some 1,400 meals each day to seniors in Huron, Sanilac and Tuscola counties, according to HDC Nutrition Manager Michelle Sarka, who says more drivers are needed.

"Another 3 or 4 volunteers per county would be a godsend," she said of the 30year-old program. "We're looking for people to give us a couple hours - even a day per month. That would be helpful."

Drivers are especially needed to help cover routes in Bad Axe, Deckerville and Caro, according to Sarka. However, she pointed out, "no one area in Huron, Sanilac or Tuscola counties enjoys an overabundance of drivers, so new volunteers would be welcomed anywhere."

Home Delivered Meal drivers are strictly volunteers, but they are reimbursed for their mileage. Each driver also receives a meal prepared by the HDC nutrition staff.

Volunteers deliver meals to homebound seniors in Huron and Tuscola counties 4 days a week, while seniors in Sanilac County receive delivery 5 days a week. Drivers also deliver frozen meals for use on the weekends and on other non-delivery days. The seniors, in turn, are asked to donate \$1.75 per meal

Un-bee-lievable Stellar speller defends regional title

Ryan Biddinger enjoys music, so much so that the Cass City Middle School student has put the time and effort into learning how to play the saxophone.

But "xylophone" and "orchestra" proved to be real music to his ears at the 2001 Knights of Columbus Saginaw Diocese Spelldown, where the sixth grader spelled both words to claim first place in the Level One division for fifth and sixth grade students.

It wasn't a fluke. Biddinger, son of Michelle and Greg Biddinger, Cass City, won the regional contest last year as well.

This year's spelldown was held Jan. 20 in Standish. Aside from Biddinger, other Cass City students turned in strong performances in Level One. Sixth grade student Allie Richards finished in third place, while Jeff Sparks and Derek Weidman, both fifth grade students, were ranked 11th and 13th, respectively, among 32 participants. In the Level 2 spelldown, Cass City's Rose Krug finished in seventh place,

while Kaylin Tack was ninth and Corey Brooks, 15th out of 23 contestants. All 3 students are in the eighth grade.

Knights of Columbus member Daryl Iwankovitsch described this year's Level One contest as a marathon, with the competitors going through 9 pages of words. "They spelled every word on the list and went to an unpublished list of words to determine the winner," he said. "In the Level 2 competition, they spelled through the sixth page to determine the winner."

Biddinger will now go on to compete in the state spelling bee Feb. 17 in Clare. Cass City's winning performance in this year's spelldown follows the middle school's best showing ever in 2000, when 4 Cass City fifth graders finished in the top 10 finalists out of about 3 dozen students.

Biddinger correctly spelled "indictment" and then "incomprehensible" to earn the title of top speller, while Courtney Rabideau finished in second place. Allie Richards finished sixth and Brad Severance was tenth.

minish. The refuge has so much wildlife (more than 200 species) that it is sometimes called the "Serengeti of North America." President Bush advocates drilling there, an area President Clinton refused to open to exploration.

Bush feels that modern technology reduces the damage to the environmental damage. Environmentalists counter that there are at least 25 contaminated waste sites on Alaska's North Slope and more than 400 spills each year.

Bolstering the environmentalists' case is that experts agree that no matter how much oil is discovered on the plain, it will not have an effect on prices now or in the future. If drilling were okayed today, experts point out that it would be 10 years before oil made its way to consumers.


