Assistance funding limited

High heating costs big concern for working poor

While all Michigan residents are or will be paying more to heat their homes due to rising fuel prices, those least able to afford higher bills are facing some very difficult times, even with the help of programs designed to assist with heating expenses.

"Of course, it is a serious situation and we are very concerned about it," said Tom Dillon, director of the Independence Agency in Tuscola and Huron counties.

"At this point, we're working with providers and working with customers to get through the heating season. There has been an effort on behalf of the FIA to try to get increased funding and to get our caps (the minimum amount of assistance allowed per household) increased.

"If we make it through April 1 and we still have funds left, we should be okay for this heating season, Dillon added.

Homeowners who heat

with fuel oil or liquid propane have been digging deeper for some time to keep up with price increases on top of an especially cold win-

But natural gas customers are also expected to feel a serious financial pinch. Officials at both Consumers Energy Co. and Michigan Consolidated Gas Co., citing increased costs, are seeking state approval to nearly double their rates. Likewise, Semco Energy Gas Company, which supplies gas locally, has announced plans to file a request with the Michigan Public Service Commission to increase rates from \$3.24 to about \$5 per 1,000 cubic feet of gas.

Dillon said FIA officials have been working to deal with price hikes for deliverable fuels such as LP and fuel oil. State Emergency Relief program funding has been increased, he noted, and emergency services dollars are also available.

However, he said, officials were not anticipating the large price increases now being sought by the state's major natural gas utilities.

"It's scary. With low income people, and many of the jobs people are getting are low income, it really could be a very difficult situation," he added. "Hopefully the Public Service Commission will take a good, hard look at that before they do anything drastic."

HEATING HELP

Human Development Commission (HDC) officials, who administrator direct home heating assistance programs that serve some 700 households in Tuscola, Huron, Sanilac and Lapeer counties, are also concerned about the area's working

While the number of households served has not risen significantly, the amount of assistance families need today has dramatically inOffenbecher, HDC community services director.

"We know a lot of folks have gone from state assistance to working, (but) we've got a lot of families that are working 2 or 3 service jobs and are still low income," she

Offenbecher explained HDC administers 2 main heating assistance programs. The first is The Heat and Warmth (THAW) Fund established many years ago by a non-profit organization based in Detroit. The program provides a set dollar amount of assistance to households that meet income guidelines.

Under the program, Offenbecher said, major utilities match that amount. However, there are no matching programs for heating oil and other deliverable fuels. "It has been a very difficult winter for those folks. That's been a big concern for us," she added.

Another concern centers on the winter protection program for low-income households and senior citizens.

Offenbecher said the program allows those households to pay a set amount each month to heat their homes, but when the program concludes in late March-early April, they must pay the difference between that amount and the actual utility cost.

HDC also administers the State Emergency Relief Fund, which provides emergency dollars for households facing utility shut-offs.

Offenbecher noted HDC also offers a tax-consulting program to encourage residents to apply for home heating credits, and a home weatherization program designed to cut heating costs.

The biggest challenge facing agencies such as HDC. she said, is securing enough funding to meet as many needs as possible. The

creased, according to Lori THAW program, for example, runs through mid-April, "but we typically expend our funds before that.

> "All of our resources are very limited. That's why the Walk for Warmth is so important," Offenbecher said, referring to an annual HDC fundraiser slated for Feb. 24 this year (see related story). This year's goal is to raise \$10,000 in each of Tuscola and Huron counties, and \$5,000 in each of Sanilac and Lapeer counties.

> In the meantime, Offenbecher said HDC officials are conducting a survey of those who request assistance to determine the impact of higher heating costs on low-income families based on their income levels and utility bills.

> "We're hoping to have at least some baseline data by Feb. 9," she said. "Our hope is that we can send that" to lawmakers and the Public Service Commission.

Familiar face

Cass City's Jack Esau still going strong

Jack Esau smiled during the interview as he recalled a lifetime of service to the community and said, be sure to get this in because it "says a lot about our commu-

From the days when I worked for 15 cents an hour to the present, I never worked for an employer that I didn't like. That covers a wide-ranging list and a lot of years in the business community. It's probably equally true that he never worked for anyone who didn't like him.

Esau celebrated his 83rd birthday Tuesday, Jan. 30. Ramrod straight he appears fully capable of easily fitting into the Marine uniform he wore for 6 years (1940-46) serving his country during all of World War II. His hitch with the Marines included 2 landings in the

Pacific. He enlisted a year before Pearl Harbor. He graduated from Cass City High School in 1935 and attended Michigan State College for a year. Lack of money ended his college career.

In 1935 the depression was grinding away and money was in short supply. My first job at a gas station earned 15 cents an hour and the work included changing oils winter and summer, Esau grimaced, in an outdoor pit. He also worked part-time at the A&P Store. Keith

McConkey ran the store and as the manager he earned \$30 a week and if store receipts went over \$800 he earned a bonus. In 1937 he became a butcher working for Young and Maier meat market before entering the Marine Corps and at Gross & Maier meat market from 1946-60. After that he spent 6 years working at Walbro Corpora-

tion before accepting a position at the Rawson Dental Clinic until he "retired" in 1983. That same year the people at Erla's Food Market came calling to see if he could help out a few days. He agreed

and spent the next 17 years working part time. He was a Godsend to us, said Char Krueger, store manager, so good with people.

Waiting on people was what he liked best, his wife Ruth observed, and his friendly assistance and concern for shoppers has made him one of the most recognized persons in Cass City.

Also helping him to become an icon in the community has been membership in various civic organizations. He is a charter member of the Cass City post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars where he served as quartermaster (finance) officer for 13 years. He served in a similar capacity for the Cass City Community Club that was the leading Cass City organization for 40 years to about 1960.


He was a member of the Cass City Gavel Club and a charter member and first president of the Cass City

As a member of the Society and for personal reasons he has been a regular visitor at Rawson Memorial Library, Barb Hutchinson, librarian, reports, "He's a walking encyclopedia of community history and ver refer anyone with a hard to answer question about our area

He always has time to talk about the days when nickels and dimes were important and there was no welfare. When Roosevelt started the work-welfare programs it lifted the community and it enabled Cass City to have a sewer-water system long before many others in the Thumb.

He and his wife, Ruth, were married in 1948 and they have 3 children, Eric, of Amherst, Mass.; Mary Beth Bealick, of Cincinnati, Ohio and Ann Ballard of Home-

Right now he is retired, but don't be surprised if all that changes on a moment's notice. Someone just might call, need a little help, and he'll be off and running for another decade or so. And enjoy every minute of it.

Growers hope to seal sugar deal by spring

Sugar beet growers who contract with Michigan Sugar Company hope to buy the Saginaw Township-based business by April or May later than what they wanted but a potential deal nonethe-

For the past year, interested growers have tried to negotiate the acquisition with Michigan Sugar's parent company, Texas-based Imperial Sugar Co. Growers had hoped to finalize the deal for an undisclosed sum by March 31, 2001, but delays on Imperial's part have pushed that timeline to later in the spring.

A significant delay was the uncertainty of whether Imperial would file for bankruptcy - a question that left growers wondering whether they should leave sugar beets in this year's rotations, buy seed, etc. Growers interested in buying a stake in the operation farm between 127,000 and 132,000 acres of sugar beets.

Imperial last month filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection in a Delaware court. The company listed assets of \$1.1 billion and liabilities of \$775.1 million, including \$456.4 million in debt.

"This bankruptcy was not surprising, it's just that we didn't know when it would happen. Now that it did, it allows the conversation to go on more openly," said Don Sutto, a Saginaw sugar beet grower who is a member of the Great Lakes Sugar Beet Growers Association and the Michigan Farm Bureau Board of Directors.

The bankruptcy filing also provided some immediate relief for growers concerned about receiving payment on their 2000 crop, said Dick Leach, executive vice president of the Great Lakes Sugar Beet Growers Association.

"There certainly was a cloud that hung over the heads of growers about payments, but we've been assured that's been taken care of," he said. "Growers were assured by the court's approval that they will get the rest of their payments from the 2000 crop in the normal pay cycle."

Payment is important because sugar beets historically have provided Michigan farmers with profits above other mainstays, including corn and soybeans. And with prices for those other commodities now slumped, keeping Michigan Sugar in business is more important than ever.

Imperial officials blamed financial hardship partly on a lingering trend of low sugar prices on the world market. Leach said growers will evaluate Michigan Sugar's assets and determine what





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

Thumb airports in line for block grant funding from FAA

The Federal Aviation Administration recently awarded a block grant totaling \$22.1 million to Michigan for various airport development projects at more than 70 smaller commercial airports across the state.

Recipients of the funding include the Tuscola Area Airport in Caro, Huron County Memorial Airport in Bad Axe, and the Sandusky City Airport in Sandusky.

"Smaller airports across Michigan will be able to extend and repair their runways, acquire land for noise abatement and meet environmental concerns thanks to this grant," said Sen. Carl Levin (D-Michigan), who along with Sen. Debbie Stabenow (D-Michigan) made the announcement. "Air travelers in Michigan will see the results of these improvements almost imme-

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diately."

receive additional federal funding to help them expand and improve air service for Michigan's passengers and visitors," Stabenow said. "This funding is critical to helping Michigan's community airports to offer more convenient service in up-todate facilities.'

The Michigan Bureau of Aeronautics will distribute the federal funds, which will be used for improvements to enhance safety and capacity as well as to preserve the physical integrity of the system of airports in the state.

Specific projects include extension of runways, land acquisition, environmental assessments, and rehabilitation of runways; aprons and taxiways.

Most of the general aviation airports will receive a grant of \$150,000, with some airports receiving more for priority projects, and other receiving somewhat smaller funding amounts.

A 61-year-old Brown City man was arrested Sunday evening in connection with a reported drive-by shooting targeting a home on Wellman Line Road in the Brown City



Over the years it had been a practice to turn off the motor and with a good head of steam see how far the car coasted before stopping. With hydraulic steering that little fun thing went by the boards. You lose control when the motor stops.

There's no doubt that an E-Steer equipped car would fail to coast as far as they did in pre-hydraulic times.

According to a Southern States spokesman, UPI of Columbus, Ohio, will also provide livestock credit services through UPI's subsidiary, Producers Credit Corp., and provide services to livestock producers from the Midwest to Southeast.

Unlike Southern States, which operates several agribusiness divisions, UPI's primary business is livestock marketing and credit services, according to Ray

Ramsey, director of livestock marketing for the farmerowned Southern States cooperative.

Teaming Southern States' Richmond, Va.-based livestock marketing division with UPI, Ramsey said, should result in a more efficient business and a "more regional focus for our farm-

Sugar beet prices, he noted, "are not where they were several years ago, but they've come back a couple cents from where they were 6 months ago. That's not great news, but people tell us it hit the low cycle and may be coming back. At least they're headed in the right direction.

Having control over the end product should put more money in farmers' pockets, Leach said. "This would put growers in charge of their own destiny in Michigan.

"By owning it, we're looking at 100 percent of the proceeds from selling sugar, pulp and molasses, instead of 53.5 percent, which is our present contract. We'll also share in the expenses, but we won't have to provide as great a return on the investment as a publicly owned company has to do.'

For now, though, Leach said growers are concentrating on what it will take to close the deal.

"There is a minimum number of acres at which the plan won't work, but the more acres we have, the easier it will be for everybody," he said. "There's also a minimum number that will provide more acres than can profitably be maintained. But the first concern will have to be that Michigan Sugar has to make its own payments."

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


Meyer named to education panel

The subcommittee is expected to begin K-12 education budget discussions for 2002 in the coming months.



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
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Bulldogs register 3 impressive cage war road victories



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

Co-op Elevator chief honored by state group

As a young man, John Kohr was lucky enough to land a job as a bookkeeper for a chain of elevators in Michigan's Thumb area. Two years later, the Pigeon Cooperative Elevator lured him away and, for the last 39 years, he's been a major contributor to the company's growth and continued suc-

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


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






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
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
