

Sister, 16, critically injured

Traffic crash claims life of Kingston teen

Tragedy struck again in the Kingston Community Thursday morning when a 2-vehicle traffic accident fatally injured one teen and critically injured her 16-year-old

A Marlette couple was also injured in the crash, which occurred at 7:55 a.m. on M-46 near Phillips Road in Kingston Township.

Tuscola County Sheriff's deputies reported a vehicle driven by 16-year-old Candice Boyle of Kingston was eastbound when she lost control on the icy roadway, slid sideways across the centerline and was struck by a westbound vehicle driven by Steven Zabik, 32, of Marlette.

Both Candice Boyle and her sister, Kristen, 14, were pinned in their vehicle. Kingston fire fighters extricated the pair with the Jaws of Life, according to deputies, who said Kristen was transported to St. Mary's Medical Center by FlightCare Helicopter. She died early Friday morning

Candice Boyle was taken to Caro Community Hospital and later transferred by FlightCare to St. Mary's, where she remained in critical condition Monday.

Zabik and his wife, Denise, were also pinned in their vehicle. The couple was transported to Marlette Community Hospital, and Steven Zabik was transferred to Lapeer Regional Hospital, where was listed in fair condition. Information on Denise Zabik's condition was not available.

Deputies said all 4 occupants were wearing seatbelts. Kingston School officials brought in clergy and counselors Friday to offer comfort to students stunned by news of the accident.

"It's tough. We're trying to maintain our schedule as best we can, but we're also giving kids a chance to mourn," school Supt. George Bednorek said, adding Kristen was very well liked, as is her sister, Candice.

Traffic crashes in recent years have claimed the lives of at least 3 other Kingston area teens.

Laura Ann Howard, 17, was killed in a 2-vehicle accident last November in Koylton Township. Howard was a passenger in a vehicle driven by Marian Howard, 59, also of Kingston, whose westbound vehicle was struck by a southbound pickup truck at

the corner of Clothier and Randall was an eighth grade Harris roads.

Two years earlier, Joshua Kratz, 15, and Jeffery Randall II. 13, were killed when their northbound car was struck from behind by another vehicle, causing the car to spin out of control and hit a tree on Phillips Road. Kratz was a sophomore at Kingston High School and student in the district.

Investigators said the driver of the other vehicle, Richard Hampton, was chasing the teens after a family member reported seeing the pair damaging Hampton's mailbox. Hampton was later sentenced to prison after a jury convicted him on 2 counts of negligent homicide.

TOPC eyes refining process

Thumb Oilseed Producers' Cooperative (TOPC) officials expect to begin refining soybean oil into food-grade cooking oil this spring.

The 200-member soybean processing cooperative, based in Ubly, has offered 700 additional shares to Michigan soybean growers willing to invest in the business and commit at least 500 bushels per share of non-genetically modified (GMO) soybeans each year.

The co-op has a refinery on order and plans to sell foodgrade oil in bulk to a bottler.

"The original business plan called for a crush peak of 3,500 bushels a day," said JoAnn Rutkowski, assistant manager of the co-op. "But now we know that when our machines are running at full capacity, we can crush 4,500 bushels in a 24-hour period. That's where the plan to sell more stock originated. To keep our machines working at a continual, economical

rate, we need more bushels for a full year.'

The increased crush capacity also provided more soybean oil, which TOPC sold to a refinery in Columbus, Ohio, until it closed in Octo-

"Then we were ready to sell to a refinery in Illinois, but that closed too," Rutkowski said. "Three refineries were closed since October, and in the meantime, you don't just go out and sell crude soybean oil. The majority of it is refined. So we've done the preliminary work to get the refinery ordered and purchased."

"It's being made now in India, and we hope it will be shipped in mid-April. We're guessing that if all goes well, we could be refining oil by the end of May.

Rutkowski said the refinery will be able to handle all the oil derived from the cooperative's growers and

have operating capacity to spare for a toll refinery to process oil from other crushing businesses for a fee.

The co-op's expansion could boost soybean profits for co-op members this year, particularly since a potential shortage of nitrogen fertilizer and its expected high cost could increase soybean acres and reduce corn acres. Soybeans require less nitrogen to grow than corn.

Growers interested in joining the co-op will be required to purchase at least 2 shares of stock at \$1,500 each and pay a one-time membership fee of \$650 to join. The deadline for joining is March 31, or until available shares are sold. Members with 2 shares become voting mem-

"This represents an opportunity for a grower to target 25 to 30 acres of soybean production for the 1,000 bushels required, and help him be more diversified,"

said Bob Boehm. manager of the Commodity and Marketing Department at Michigan Farm Bureau.

"It's a different market potential, and it's worth a look. Growers can still capture their LDP (loan deficiency payment) but have part of their crop hold the potential for a higher return from a niche market."

Boehm said growers should keep in mind that once they commit a certain number of bushels to the co-op, it's a contractual obligation and they must deliver. Another caution, he said, is making sure the crop is non-GMO. The co-op will test for that trait as part of its identity preserved program.

"Growers sign affidavits coming in, and we test each load," Rutkowski said. "Identity preserved will be very important because we're refining food-grade

oil. Non-GMO is what the public is asking for right now, so if we sold GMO oil, the food companies wouldn't

A schedule of meetings to inform growers about the stock offering and the potential of the value-added process will be announced soon. "Right now we're not pay-

ing our growers more than the commodity markets are," Rutkowski said. "But we think that once the refinery is up and running, the premium will be there. With the nitrogen situation and more soybean acres, the timing for investment might be right."

TOPC, which opened for business in July 1999, sells soy meal and oil, and is investigating other valueadded products, including a fruit-flavored drink that uses all parts of the soybean.

Huron voters to decide special ed funding levy

Huron County voters will decide a millage request to offset increasing special education service costs next

Huron Intermediate School District (HISD) officials will ask residents to approve a tax levy of 1.5 mills in a special election slated for Tuesday, Feb. 27. If approved, the millage would be levied indefinitely, raising an estimated \$1.6 million in the first

HISD Supt. William Mayes said increasing expenses and

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need prompted the request. "Special education costs are accelerating far beyond any other cost in education," he added, noting those expenses have been rising at a rate of 9 to 12 percent annually.

And with Proposal A capping school district revenue at 5 percent, funding services at the local level is a real struggle, he said.

Janet Richards, HISD director of special services, said the majority of funding generated by the millage would be returned to local school districts, which are now being forced to help pay for special education out of their general funds.

That's especially important now, with school enrollments declining - translating into fewer state dollars coming in --- and the number of special education students on the rise, Richards noted.

Between 1991-92 and 1999-00, she said, total student enrollment in Huron County fell from 6,832 to 6,618, while the number of special education students increased from 610 to 853.

Richards said the needs of those students range from speech difficulty to multiple severe physical and/or cognitive problems.

In recent years, she pointed out, the number of children with severe disabilities has increased. In fact, she said, last fall the district was serving 18 autistic children and another 10 students who are severely impaired - both double the number of students in each category compared to a year earlier.

Richards also noted Michigan is the only state that mandates special education services for students through the age of 25, while other states guarantee services up to a student's 21st birthday.

Cass City youngster likes high tech hand

Monica Stover is a typical 8-yearold. Like many of her classmates at Campbell Elementary School, she's active, talkative and enjoys being around others.

There is one obvious difference. however. A blood clot robbed Monica of one of her arms before she was born. In the years since, she and her parents, Brenda and Mark Stover, Cass City, have experimented with various prosthetic limbs, most of them utilizing a claw or hook-type

The artificial arms were neither natural looking nor comfortable.

Thanks to technology, however, Monica is now enjoying life with 2 arms just like her classmates.

Monica was recently fitted with a myoelectric prosthesis, a life-like arm and hand equipped with specially designed microchips that enable her to open and close the hand through simple muscle movement.

'She put it on, and it was like she had it all of her life," Mark Stover recently commented.

"It automatically works, just like

our hands. She has 2 batteries and they just pop in, and she has her own battery charger," he added. "She'll be able to paint her fingernails and all of that stuff.'

More importantly, the Stovers noted, Monica has demonstrated a real desire to wear the new prosthesis, unlike the others, which were bulky and relied on uncomfortable harnesses and shoulder muscles.

"Monica has a positive attitude at all times with this hand. I think she's happier with it," Mark said. "I would say she's more willing" to

wear it, Brenda agreed. For Monica, the prosthesis has meant a bit more freedom. "I can pick up stuff. I can pick up paper

and pictures," she said. "The only thing she can't do is tie her shoes. She can zip and button," Brenda said, adding her daughter is anxious to learn how to tie her own

Monica's prosthesis was custom made, from the snug-fitting arm to the skin tone in the glove that fits over

Council moving forward on assisted living plan

The Cass City Village Council has taken the first step towards participating in the financing of a \$5.1 million assisted living-Alzheimer's complex in the village.

The council met in special session last week following a town hall meeting with Hills and Dales Healthcare Corporation officials and interested residents to discuss the village's role in construction of the facility.

During the special meeting, council members met with attorney William Danhof of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, a law firm that specializes in municipal law.

Danhof explained the village's statutory authority to borrow money and to participate in financing for the non-profit assisted living-Alzheimer's project. The council voted unani-

mously to move forward with a \$3.8 million bonding commitment through the Cass City Economic Development Corporation (EDC). Village Manager Jane

Downing explained there have been negotiations with banks interested in purchasing bonds through the local EDC. The bonds are attracive because they are tax ex-





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

There's little doubt that the senior Hawk hoopster could receive some financial help for attending Alma. The question is what kind of help would be available.

A supporter of San Diego State where Steve Fisher, former coach at the University of Michigan, now reigns, has re-

quested a tape of Emmert in action to show the coach. A tape of the USA game will be sent. There couldn't have been a better choice.

Rating the Soaring Eagle Hotel-Casino, where we were overnight guests last Thursday.

On the negative side: There are several different places to eat and we visited 2 of them. There is an all-you-can-eat buffet. The variety is good with various meats including prime rib, fish and ethnic dishes. There is the usual salad bar and a selection of cake, pie and soft ice cream for dessert. The price was \$11.95, with about the same quality that is offered for around \$10 elsewhere.

The best feature of the sit-down restaurant we visited for breakfast was the décor. Cloth tablecloths and napkins and a waitress that knew her business. However, the kitchen failed to serve eggs on top of toast as requested. Yes, it was a small matter, but premium prices should expect premium service. An egg cost \$2.50, toast \$2.50 and juice and coffee were higher priced than at an average restaurant. Give each restaurant about a 5 on the one-10 scale.

On the plus side: The rooms are spacious and the service good. The pool and the exercise room are first class. A big plus is the available valet parking offered free. The price for mid-Michigan, \$125 for a room for 2, is slightly higher than others in the area. Give it a 7 on the one-10 scale.

For senior citizens at least, the Bobby Vinton show at the Soaring Eagle was first class. He played to a full house and was on stage full time, helped only by his daughter and son in cameo roles.

I couldn't help but wonder why he subjects himself to the rigors of a tour with one-night-stands. With many mega-hit records and a theatre in Branson, it just can't be for the money.

Enrollment dips in Cass City, Ubly, Owen-Gage

Enrollment in the Cass City Schools has dipped by 2 dozen students since October, but the numbers continue to indicate stability in the district, according to

school Supt. Ken Micklash. Despite the reduced count, the local school system stands to collect more revenue in the 2001-02 school year thanks to a generous increase in per-pupil funding from the state.

School officials across Michigan conducted one of 2 annual student counts last week. In Cass City, the preliminary count revealed a total of 1,612 students - 479 at the high school, 521 at the middle school, 529 at Campbell Elementary and 83 at Deford Elementary.

The student tally conducted last fall totaled 1,636 students, an increase from February 2000, when the count showed 1,619 students in the

Micklash noted Cass City's enrollment fluctuates from year to year, but the total number of students has remained in the low- to mid-1,600s for the past several years. One exception was recorded in September 1998, when enrollment peaked at 1,683 students - the highest number since 1983-84 (1,725 students).

In other area districts:

Owen-Gage School officials reported a total enrollment of 273 students - 145 at the elementary and 128 at the junior-senior high school. The district's enrollment totaled 288 last fall and 278 a vear ago.

•Ubly Community Schools also reported fewer students. Last week's count revealed an enrollment of 906 students - 461 at the elementary, 148 at the junior high and 299 at the high school. The total represents a decrease of 5 students from last fall. The district reported 924 students in February 2000.

The student tallies play a key role in local education revenue. Schools receive the majority of their funding in the form of a state foundation allowance, which is applied to the number of students enrolled in each district. The enrollment is determined by "blending" 2 separate counts, one conducted in September and the other during the previous February.

In recent years, the counts have been blended based on a ratio of 60 percent of the September tally and 40 percent of the February count. However, the ratio was recently revised, making the February count worth 20 percent of the blended total and the fall count worth 80 per-

Cass City Schools' current state foundation allowance is \$6,000 per student, according to Micklash, who noted state officials plan to increase that figure to \$6,500 per student in 2001-02.

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

Today much of the north country is indistinguishable from what's at home in the populated areas of the state. And the rush is on to complete the transformation.

About five years or so ago Bay Harbor was established on Little Traverse Bay on miles of the lake's frontage. It's located about 5 miles from Petoskey on M-31. Its growth has been phenomenal.

leries, boutique shops and restaurants will be included. There will be 100 condominiums priced from \$250,000 to \$2 million. A 400-seat performing arts center, a state-of-the-art Cineplex with 4 to 6 screens is to be completed in 2003.

The Cineplex will offer premium services where patron members can dine in a private restaurant attached to the theaters. One observer is quoted in

the Detroit News as saying that it has been a great tourist draw, and I'm glad to hear David (Johnson) is bringing more of an urban life to the project.

That's the puzzler. If the wealthy desire to bring urban life to up north digs, why move at all?

For the residents, there will be a view of the lake, but the vast majority will be swimming in the pool and associating with most of the same folks they do at home. Changing locations but not lifestyles.

Bay Harbor has helped bring Northern Michigan to another level, a member of an architectural and land planning firm in Southfield, says.

There's no denying that. But the level is too high.

It's drowning out what has made the north so special. You can't get away from it all when every town is anchored by one or more fast food restaurants and you are surrounded by people everywhere.

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

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
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

A snafu related to billing issues has resulted in the federal government withholding Medicaid funding in Michigan, he explained. empt and offer an attractive interest rate, she said, adding the commitment represents "absolutely no liability to the village.'

During last week's town hall meeting, Hills and Dales officials also proposed that the village provide financing for infrastructure improvements and for the purchase of 18.8 acres where the facility will be built.

Infrastructure work - roads, bridges and other improvements - is estimated at \$254,000, which would be paid for over a period of time through a special assessment district established by the village. The land cost is set at \$450,000, and Hills and Dales officials proposed paying the village back that amount over a term of several years.

Hills and Dales officials approached the village in an effort to significantly reduce initial financing costs for the

To-date, the corporation has raised \$570,000, including a \$50,000 gift from one hospital board trustee and a \$500,000 pledge over the next 5 years from another trustee. Fund drives have raised another \$20,000.

The facility will be constructed on a 6-acre site about one-half mile north of Hills and Dales General Hospital. Plans call for 20 senior assisted living units and 20 Alzheimer's units, with the capability to expand in the future. When fully opera-Self-defense tional, the facility is expected to employ 20 people to employ 20 people.

Although the village has not vet committed to financing the infrastructure and land purchase costs, Downing said she's hopeful the council will address both proposals during the next regular meeting, which is scheduled for Monday at 7 p.m. at the municipal building.

the limb. The process began in November with a visit to the U-M Orthotics and Prosthetics Center, a facility the Stovers have become very familiar with over the years.

"I said, 'Monica, tell the doctors what you'd like', and she told them, 'I would like a hand that looks like a hand'," Mark recalled. A doctor produced a book with photos of lifelike limbs, he said, and the work to fit Monica for her new arm and hand

The process involved several steps, including taking measurements and creating a mold, and encouraging Monica to complete special exercises to build up muscle tissue, he added. The result was a snug-fitting arm that doesn't require a harness and can

be adjusted to accommodate growth. "It's very expensive, but anybody can see the technology here. It was well worth it," Mark continued. He said the prosthesis cost \$12,000. The tab was covered by insurance and funding from the Special Children's

Healthcare program.

The Stovers are thankful for their insurance coverage through Mark's job as a custodian for the Cass City School District, and for the support and assistance offered by Cass City physician Dr. S. Raythatha, who has been with the family since Monica was born. But the couple indicated they would have done whatever was necessary to obtain Monica's new prosthesis.

"You've got to offer your child the best. You've got to make it available for her," Mark said. "If you or I were her age, would you want to wear a

Even if a prosthetic arm were not available for Monica, the Stovers say they would feel blessed, especially after several visits to the U-M Orthotics and Prosthetics Center, where they have seen first hand the types of physical challenges other youngsters

"What really amazes me is, you can see other people and be thankful for what you've got," Mark said. "Monica is a healthy girl."





Markel said that the team wrestled very well against both teams even though the Caro score does not indicate it. The Tigers are a powerhouse team, currently rated number one in Division 3 in

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
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
7-1-1 in the Greater Thumb Conference. In the 10-team GTC Cass City finished in a tie for third.
