Cable closing doors, transition underway

General Cable Corporation officials will begin the process this month of closing the doors to the company's Cass City plant after more than 40 years of operation in the village.

Officials announced the decision to the local plant's 180 workers last week following completion of a feasibility study.

Corporate executives rejected an economic development incentive package worth \$40 million over the next 15 years. Village and Tuscola County Economic Development officials offered the incentives in hopes of convincing the company to stay.

"We did make a decision to discontinue the operation in Cass City. (It) will be moved and operated at an existing General Cable plant in Jack-son, Tenn.," said Lisa Lawson, General Cable's vice president of corporate communications.

Lawson said the company plans to move the fiber optic portion of its Jackson operation to another plant in Dayville, Conn., making room for the Cass City operation in Jackson. "Basically we plan to start

ment capability." The study also considered the investment required to upgrade the local plant, according to Lawson, who noted the facility is one-third to one-half the size of the most efficient plants owned by General Cable and its competitors.

Lawson emphasized the decision to move the plant was based on the company's business interests alone.

"It's not the people," she said, adding the company will be meeting with employees over the next 2 weeks to assist them in the transition. "There will be more discussion with individual associates as far as their severance packages, and the company will provide out-placement assistance at company expense. There may even be opportunities for some people at other General Cable operations.



During annual meet Saturday

Ellington officials okay raises

Village Manager Jane work can be identified by

Ellington Township officials received pay increases during the township's annual meeting Saturday.

The pay hikes, suggested in a letter sent to the board by a former township trustee, were included in a 2001-02 general fund budget totaling \$315,509. Trustees will now earn \$141 more each per year (\$1,082 annually), while the supervisor will receive \$709 more (\$5,440) and the treasurer and clerk will each earn \$794 more annually

(\$6,090). The increases will cost the township a combined \$2,580 a year, according to Township Clerk Fred Bardwell.

This is the first increase in 5 years, Bardwell said, noting Ellington Township's pay scale has lagged behind other townships with similar populations and valuation. At the same time, he added, the workload has increased significantly.

Bardwell said proposed revenues and expenditures in the new general fund budget "are real close to last year." The exception, he said, is a fund balance topping \$173,000, which includes some \$90,000 for road work that was supposed to be completed last year. The project construction on 2 miles of Hurds Corner Road, from Dutcher Road south to Shabbona Road - is scheduled for this year.

Bardwell said the fund balance is expected to total \$87,731 at the end of the new fiscal year.

The township's fire fund, meanwhile, is set at \$57,000, including a fund balance of \$35,238. Property taxes from a new, one-mill levy approved by voters in August will bring in about \$19,000. Bardwell estimated expenses at \$18,000, with a year-end fund balance of \$39.078.

The road budget, supported by a 3-mill tax levy that will generate about \$50,700 this year, is set at \$126,778 Expenditures are set at \$81,000, and township officials are estimating a year-end fund balance of \$45,778.

Village population up 16%.

Cass City officials were all smiles Monday after reviewing newly released U.S. Census figures that show the village's population has grown more than 16 percent since 1990.

"We were saying our population was going to be pushing 2,700, 2,800, so we're pretty pleased we were close," Downing said, adding the increase was the largest for an incorporated area in Tuscola County. According to the preliminary figures,

Cass City's 2000 count revealed 2,643 residents compared to 2,275 in 1990.

Downing said she hasn't had an opportunity to crunch the numbers yet, but she's certain the increase in population will translate into more revenue for the village. "Definitely it's going to mean more dollars for Cass City in state shared revenues," she added.

Elkland Township also grew overall, with a 2000 population of 3,659 residents, including the 2,643 people living in the village of Cass City. The 1990 population was about 3,400 residents, an increase of

7.6 percent. Among Thumb area counties, Sanitar saw the biggest increase in residents - 44,847 compared to 39,928 in 1990 (11 opercent); while Tuscola County registered a 3-per-cent increase (\$8,266 residents compared to 55,498 in 1990), and Huron County saw a modest 3.2 percent increase (36,079 compared to 34,951 in 1990). Overall, Michigan's population grew 5.9 percent (643,000 people) over the past 10 years. The moderate growth - Michigan now has a population of 9,938,444 --- will cost the state one of its 16 U.S. House seats next year.



I was downstairs getting ready for work, which starts early on Tuesday mornings. He fell getting out of bed, not realizing that his left side wasn't working. This all resulted in a 911 call, a rush to Hills & Dales Hospital and transfer to Saginaw St. Mary's. An arteriogram and CT scans revealed that his right carotid artery was completely blocked and the middle cranial artery was also considerably blocked.

Further tests showed a blood clot in the brain with consequent hemorrhaging and swelling.

The CT scans were continued on a regular basis and the results monitored to determine whether surgery was needed.







Grants target senior facilities

Building facilities serving senior citizens in Huron and Tuscola counties will receive renovations with help from state grants, state Rep. Tom Meyer announced Friday.

The Human Development Commission in Caro will receive \$10,000 to repair its multi-purpose building parking lot, and the Caseville Retirement Club will receive \$5,000 to repair its parking lot

"These grants will help improve the services these organizations offer," said Meyer, R-Bad Axe. "Senior groups like these organizations concentrate their efforts on providing the numerous programs and activities that enrich and help people's lives, so they often don't have the resources for build-

ing repairs. "Fixing a parking lot may seem a low priority to provide assistance for, but there's a lot to be said for having a smooth, level surface underfoot so you don't have to worry about tripping or stumbling."

The state grant program awarded funds to senior and community centers, adult day care programs, congregate meal sites and nutrition service providers to purchase various equipment needs and repair or renovate building facilities.

The Michigan Office of Services to the Aging administers the grant funds appropriated by state lawmakers.

Day camp targets safety on the farm

A Progressive Farmer Farm Safety Day Camp for children ages 8 to 12 is being planned for Saturday, May 19, at the Caro fairgrounds from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The event is being conducted by Tuscola County Farm Bureau, Tuscola MSU Extension Service and Tuscola County Farm Service Agency in conjunction with Progressive Farmer magazine.

According to Steve and Diane Foley, coordinators of the event, children often see farm and livestock operations as an exciting playground — providing endless hours of fun and adventure. But these facilities and the livestock and equipment on them also can set the stage for tragedy.

Each year, many children are killed or injured on America's farms. This summer, Foley said, farm safety day camps, such as this one, are being held in 35 states across the United States to teach rural children how to prevent injuries and reduce

the risk of farm accidents. During the camps, children participate in interactive activities that reinforce the importance of taking responsibility for their own safety, respecting parents' safety rules and sharing safety tips with their family and friends. Hands-on demonstrations teach participants lifesaving first aid techniques and re-

hope participants will maintain a healthy respect for farm hazards throughout their lives, and that, ultimately, the number of deaths and injuries among rural children will decline.

The camp program allows community leaders to struc-

ture a camp that covers basic farm safety issues and first aid, as well as addressing specific local needs. Local farmers, manufacturers, and merchants donate their time and equipment to ensure that each camp is a fun and valuable learning experience.

Parents can register their children to participate in the camp by calling Tuscola County Farm Bureau at (517) 673-4155. Registrations must be received by May 1. A registration fee for the event covers lunch, snacks, a takehome packet and a farm safety day camp T-shirt.



which lay their eggs in the spring in moist depressions in the woods. In the spring, when snow melts and spring rains flood these depressions, the mosquito larvae hatch and begin development.

In addition to the aerial treatment, ground crews will larvicide small woodlots with hand equipment.

Homeowners are encouraged to help limit mosquito production on their property

* Eliminating water-holding containers

* Cleaning out bird baths, eaves troughs and pool covers

* Cleaning weeds and brush from ditches, catchbasins and pond edges
