Cops putting 'spotlight' on minor booze purchases

If you're under 21 and in the habit of attempting to purchase alcohol in Cass City, or you're over 21 and tempted to buy for a minor, count on meeting a member of the Tuscola County law enforcement community in the near

Representatives of the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department, Michigan State Police in Caro and the Cass City and Vassar police departments gathered Tuesday at the sheriff's department to kick off the Spotlight Grant Program 2001, an alcohol enforcement effort that will target the Cass City, Caro and Vassar areas in the coming weeks.

"The program is designed to deter minors from purchasing alcohol, stop adults from purchasing alcohol for minors, and promote community awareness of the laws associated with alcohol, especially for those who work for businesses that sell or serve alcohol," explained Tuscola County Undersheriff Jim Jashinske.

He said Tuscola County is one of 21 Michigan counties to receive grants from the Office of Highway Safety Planning (OHSP). The sheriff's department's share of the funding totals \$10,000.

"Of the 83 counties in Michigan, the 21 counties selected were found to have a high incidence of traffic crashes involving minors that had been drinking and driving. The ages cited were between 14 and 20 years old, according to 1998 statistics, Jashinske said. In Tuscola County, he noted, there were 3 fatal traffic crashes and 318 personal injury accidents involving minors in 1999.

Jashinske said the Spotlight program effort will involve a number of businesses and coincide with holidays and graduation and prom dates for area schools.

O-G's McKenzie: measures cutting into budget red ink

Dan McKenzie hasn't won The net loss reduction in the war against red ink in his first year as superintendent of the Owen-Gage School District, but he is winning some battles.

McKenzie presented a revised 2000-2001 budget to termediate School District the Owen-Gage Board of for special education ex-Education Monday, saying revenues simply aren't keeping up with expenditures, which will force the district to continue to dip into fund

"The good news is that we have slowed the rate of fund balance decrease. We will still have projected fund balance of \$332,849," McKenzie told the board. "This is nearly 20 percent of our total revenue. The industry standard is 15 percent. So, there is no need to panic.

still need to make some staffing reductions that will bring us back in balance with projected revenues for 2001-2002 and stop the reduction in fund balance," he added. "Recommendations will be

coming in May regarding proposed staffing reductions. The intention will be to maximize our instructional effectiveness in the core curriculum."

McKenzie's budget amendment increases expenditures from \$2.18 million to \$2.3 million. Revenues are now estimated at \$2.22 million, up from \$2.033 million.

He noted the fund balance has steadily decreased in recent years, from more than \$711,500 in 1999 to the projected \$332,849 this year.

fund balance this year was actually \$151,625. However, McKenzie said, the district will be receiving a one-time \$45,000 reimbursement from the Huron County Inpenses stemming from the recent passage of a special ISD millage.

McKenzie said his budget amendment stems from a number of factors, including a steady decline in enrollment and the district's recently completed gym floor installation, which exceeded budget projections by

The superintendent has already moved to offset the red ink by securing the board's support for recommenda-"The bad news is that we tions downsizing the district's administrative staff (from 2 principals to one) and by filling a certified counselor's position with a newly-created "counseling coordinator" post.

Auten ready to enjoy retirement

Bev Auten might have been a teacher if she hadn't followed her first love back in the early 1970s.

In the end, she devoted years to both healthcare, as a registered nurse, and to education, as a longtime member of the Cass City Board of Education.

And she's still giving, although Auten recently retired from nursing after more than 25 years.

"I'm a people person. I enjoyed it," Auten recently commented at the Greenland Road home she shares with husband Les. "There have been a lot of changes. It was hard work, but I loved it."

The Cass City native recalled the road to her nursing career had a few twists and turns.

"I wanted to be a nurse in school, but I couldn't get Latin - that was a requirement back in the 1950s," Auten said, adding she decided to pursue a career in elementary education. She began taking classes in Bad Axe and Caro through Central Michigan University, but friends and her family encouraged her to reconsider nursing.

Auten recalled her mother was a big supporter of the idea, offering to watch her children - Julie, then 6 months old, Russ, 4, Paul, 8 and Les, 10 - so she could begin attending classes at

Delta College in 1973.

It was a challenge, acknowledged Auten, who pointed to her husband, smiled and added, "I had a lot of help.

Auten graduated from Delta 2 years later with an associate's degree. That same fall she was hired as a nurse at Hills and Dales General Hospital.

Auten, who earned her bachelor's degree through Saginaw Valley State University in 1986, worked her way up to a supervisory position in-patient care coordinator - at Hills and Dales. She remained at the Cass City hospital until her position was phased out in 1995. She then took a supervisory position at the former Caro Regional Center until her retire-

The mental health nursing is like going into another culture. There's little hands-on nursing. You treat more of the behavioral aspects," she said. "I enjoyed it, too, but I liked my hospital nursing the

Auten recalled a host of changes in nursing since she started. The changes range from attire (crisp white uniforms and caps have been replaced by scrubs) to medications (many drugs administered via injections or pills years ago are now routinely

administered intravenously). The length of hospital stays is much shorter today, Auten

the appendix or gall bladder used to involve a hospital stay of 3 to 5 days, and today patients are going home the next day. Auten said new techniques, such as laproscopic surgery, have made a real difference, although she believes shorter hospital stays are largely at-

tributable to insurance com-

There have also been big improvements in patient transport, according to the grandmother of 10, who recalled accompanying a few patients when Littles owned the local ambulance service.

Auten, who was among the first Hills and Dales nurses to earn Advanced Cardiac Life Support (ACLS) certification, indicated working in a small, rural hospital has its positives and negatives.

"I think it's harder, because you treated everything, but it also kept your knowledge focus-based. It kept you on your toes," she said, adding rural hospital nurses must be prepared to deal with cases of all types, from obstetrics to cardiac cases. "Another thing is, you know the people you're treating. They get attached to you and you get attached to them.

While Auten has many good memories, she said there were times when nursing was a very difficult job. "Getting called to the emergency room and having a child in code (cardiac arrest). I think observed. Surgery to remove that was the worst," she

Deputy released from St. Mary's

Tuscola County Sheriff's Deputy Sgt. Curtis Chambers is recovering at home from a gunshot wound he suffered in a shootout with an armed robbery suspect last month in Vassar.

The Tuscola County Sheriff's Department reported Chambers was released from St. Mary's Medical Center in Saginaw Friday, 2 days after being taken out of the hospital's intensive care unit.

"I saw him Saturday and he's well aware of the incident and what happened. That in itself is a miracle," said Undersheriff Jim Jashinske. "He's in good spirits considering everything.

The Michigan State Police are continuing their investigation into the shooting, according to Jashinske, who added reports from the State Police Crime Lab in Bridgeport are expected to come back sometime this

Jashinske said it's too soon to say whether Chambers will return to duty in the future. "We really haven't gotten that far," he added.

Tuscola County Sheriff Tom Kern said the sheriff's department and Chambers' family appreciate all those who have sent cards or called to ask about the deputy following the March 21 incident.

Chambers was struck above the left eye with a .45 caliber bullet, and the suspect, Shayne Eric Cripps, 34, of Atlanta, Mich., was killed during an exchange of gunfire after Chambers and his partner, Deputy Steven Anderson, stopped a vehicle driven by Cripps near the intersection of Plumb and Water streets in the city of

Anderson, who was not injured, returned to work Friday, March 30, according to Kern.







State lifts road/weight restrictions

The Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) has lifted the weight restrictions on state roadways in some areas of Michigan's Lower and Upper peninsu-

Full overload permits are now allowed on all state trunklines from the south state line north to and including M-46, from Muskegon to Port Sanilac, in the Lower Peninsula. Full overload permits also are now allowed in the Upper Peninsula, south of and including US-2 from the Mackinac Bridge to the Wisconsin state line in Dickinson County.

Weight restrictions will remain in effect on all state highways in other areas of the state. Weight restrictions are posted to reduce the amount of damage caused by overweight trucks during the thawing conditions common during the spring.

There are no restrictions for legal loads on those trunklines designated as "all season." All extended permits will be valid for oversize loads only within the restricted area. Permits will not be issued for any loads exceeding 14 feet in width within the restricted area.

These are good tricks to be sure, but I'm not sure they would work for our kitty. Our cat is more accustomed to 'Come in!" "Get out!" "Off the screen!" and "Scram!"

My kitty would be horribly confused by commands like, "Sit," "Shake hands," and "Wave."

I'm not saying other cat owners shouldn't teach these stunts. I'm just suggesting we consider the past when planning our cat's education.

I've never been a fan of the command, "Sit," for example. Spaniel trainers long ago adopted the word, "Hup" when they want these dogs to

Anyone who misses straight-away pheasants knows there are too many words that rhyme with sit. The same goes for "sit up."

A cat hears this and thinks he's coughed-up another hairball.

Shake hands and wave are good tricks for a kitty, though. These are simple and easy to teach.

Shake hands is taught by touching the cat's paw and commanding, "Shake." The cat should instinctively raise her paw.

Then, the owner grabs the cat's paw and pretends the animal has learned something.

This trick depends upon the cat's previous training and experience, also. The command, "Shake," should only be taught with a dry cat in the beginning.

We can teach our kitty to wave by holding a treat in front of her nose, just out of reach of her front paws. Move the treat back and forth while commanding, "Wave." The cat will reach for the food and appear to be wav-

It's important that we gauge the size of our cat before teaching any of these tricks. A cougar, for example, will respond to the command, "Wave," by biting your hand off and not appear to be waving at all.

I've found the most effective program for training cats is to learn what the ani-



My long-standing belief mal wants to do and then that cats won't do tricks is command it to do so. If the cat grabs a finger with his paw, we should say, "Shake hands. If he swats at the Christmas

> "Wave." If the cat is lying in the driveway we say, "Play If he doesn't get up, we

or her to submit to a breath test. If that test reveals a blood alcohol level of .02 (one drink), the individual will be charged with being a minor in possession (MIP), which is now a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, will result in a criminal record.

The penalties are: \$100 fine and other penalties for the first offense, \$200 fine and driver's license suspension for the second offense, and a \$500 fine and driver's license suspension for the third offense. In addition, police are required to notify the parents of minors under the age of 18.

Jashinske noted that anyone over 21 who is convicted of furnishing alcohol to a minor faces a maximum penalty of 60 days in jail and a \$1,000 fine.
