Sanilac officers utilize helicopters

Task force harvests pot crop

Sanilac County Drug Task Force officers took to the skies last week in search of marijuana, and the effort paid off with the harvest of dozens of plants.

The Sanilac County Drug Task Force conducted Operation HEMP helicopter flights throughout Sanilac County Wednesday and Thursday, seizing 376 plants in 3 locations," task force director Bill Gray said Friday.

The operation utilized 2 helicopters and flight crews from the Army National Guard, all provided to the task force through federal grant funding.

"The helicopter crews, along with drug task force ground crews, checked over 40 specific locations throughout Sanilac County where suspected marijuana growing activity had been reported," Gray said. "In

addition to the 40 tip locations, the helicopters checked hundreds of other likely marijuana growing areas in every...township during the 2 days of flights."

Most of the plants (366) were found growing on the east side of the Minden State Game Area in Minden Township.

"The marijuana plants had been actively cultivated and maintained by a suspected trespasser on the state land. A suspect in this growing activity has been questioned, but the drug task force does not anticipate being able to file criminal charges unless additional information is uncovered linking the suspect to the marijuana plants,"

Gray said.

Another 4 plants were located in Argyle Township on a wooded parcel of land on Downington Road. On-

scene investigation revealed the plants had also been actively cultivated and maintained. Officers interviewed a suspect, however, Gray noted he doesn't anticipate any criminal charges.

In addition, 6 plants were discovered in Washington Township on the property of a Burr Road resident.

"On scene investigation has connected the homeowner to the marijuana growing activity," Gray said. "The drug task force anticipates charging the suspect in this matter with manufacturing marijuana and possession of marijuana."

Gray said this year's flyover operation marks the fifth consecutive year that officers have located fewer than 800 marijuana plants in the county.

"From 1991 to 1996, the drug task force seized an av-

This year's flyover marks the fifth consecutive year that officers have found fewer than 800 marijuana plants in the county.

erage of more than 1,340 marijuana plants annually," he added. "From 1997 todate, our average...plant seizures stand at 358 annually. This represents a 73-percent reduction in marijuana growing activity during the last 5

"This reduced marijuana growing activity has also been reflected in generally reduced amounts of processed marijuana being available for sale within Sanilac County."

Assisting the drug task force last week were the Sanilac Sheriff K-9 Unit, Sanilac County Sheriff's Department detectives, Michigan State Police from the Sandusky post, Peck Police Department, Sandusky Po-

Pager woes continue

Shed fire damage set at \$300,000

Damage is estimated at \$300,000 in an early morning blaze that leveled a large shed just east of Cass City Thursday.

Thick clouds of black smoke filled the horizon as Elkland Township fire fighters left the fire hall in Cass City on their way to the Chuck O'Dell residence, 4323 Krapf Rd., just after 6

But they weren't the first to arrive.

"The bad thing is, our 'fantastic' pager system did not work," said Elkland Township Fire Chief Ron Pawloski. "I was at home. I had just made a cup of coffee when I heard the fire whistle blowing. I had no idea we had a fire."

Elmwood-Gagetown fire fighters, meanwhile, were already on their way to the

"It was totally engulfed. There was no saving it," Pawloski said of the structure. "All we could do was save the other buildings nearby."

The flames were fueled by a number of propane explosions. "There were several dozen propane tanks in there, and he had a couple of acetylene torch sets," Pawloski said. "He (also) had a skidsteer, a tractor, a boat, numerous tools."

The fire chief indicated O'Dell is insured.

Pawloski said Thursday he hadn't determined the exact cause of the fire. "I've got a call in to the state fire marshal, but right now we're looking at electrical." he added.

Pawloski later confirmed

the cause as an electrical short inside the structure.

Pawloski also contacted Tuscola County Central Dispatch officials, who indicated the pager company plans to install another tower between the Gagetown and Unionville areas

That should help, a frustrated Pawloski said. "There were only 4 pagers that went off (Thursday morning) out of 21 pagers in our department. That didn't help us out

been having problems with these pagers all along. I'm getting tired of it."

In all, nearly 30 firemen

Enrollment drop prompts change for O-G pupils

A declining kindergarten enrollment prompted the Owen-Gage Board of Education Monday to approve a scheduling change recommended by new elementary Principal Diane Warack.

There are only 13 students in kindergarten this year, compared to a typical enrollment of 21 student, according to Warack.

"As in the past, the class is split, with one group of students coming for one-half day Monday morning and 2 full days Tuesday and Thursday, while the second group of students comes for one-half day Monday afternoon and 2 full days Wednesday

and Friday," she noted.
"We took a close look at
this year, and after some research and a thoughtful conversation with Mrs. Enderle,
the kindergarten teacher, we
would like to recommend

that kindergarten move to 4 full days of instruction, with the fifth day being used for assessment, teacher/parent contact time, student tutoring, and working with first grade students who need extra help with phonics and reading," Warack said.

"The change would offer our students more instructional time and eliminate the Monday bus run."

In addition, Warack noted, the change will put Owen-Gage in line with the types of kindergarten schedules in place in neighboring districts. "We need to be competitive with the districts close to us," she said.

Under the new schedule approved by the board, students will attend full days on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. Warack said she plans to implement the schedule Monday after contacting parents.

Unfortunately, the downward enrollment trend is being seen throughout the dis-

Recycling officials recommend scaled down expansion program

Tuscola County recycling officials had hoped to implement an expanded, countywide recycling program with the help of funding shared by most of the county's local governmental units.

Instead, officials will settle for a scaled-down version of the plan.

"We've got not as many participants as I had hoped for, but we don't want to let the program die," said Don Duggar, a member of the Tuscola County Solid Waste Advisory Committee, which met Thursday to consider its options. "We're recommending to the board of commissioners that we proceed with a much smaller program."

Commissioners, who were scheduled to consider the recommendation Tuesday, earlier this summer approved a resolution to present an inter-local agreement for recycling to all townships and municipalities in the county. Under the proposal, local units of government would agree to collect a fee of up to \$1.25 per month (up to a maximum of \$15 annually) from each household.

In return, the county would provide convenient recycling services, a larger recycling processing center and a household waste program for the next 10 years. The services would also include "drop-off days" for used tires, motor oil and household batteries.

The plan was sparked by a growing demand for recycling and limited space and resources at the county's recycling center in Caro.

Duggar said the volume of recyclable items collected in the county, including curbside programs such as the one in Cass City, is overwhelming. And, with a trend of waste companies doing less sorting themselves, he added, there is simply no way the existing program can survive without expanding. Unfortunately, only 12 of the county's 34 local units of government agreed to support the plan. And one of those - Dayton Township - apparently has had second thoughts, according to county Recycling Coordinator Sharon Mika. "I think we're down to maybe 11," she said.

Townships that have agreed to participate are Almer, Columbia, Dayton, Gilford, Juniata, Kingston, Tuscola and

Vassar. Four villages - Cass City, Gagetown, Kingston and Millington - have also approved participation.

"What we're recommending is to provide a program to these

"What we're recommending is to provide a program to these 11 or 12 communities that have chosen to support us," Mika said. "We'll still provide all of the services, but it will be scaled down."

Mika added that recycling officials have no obligations to those governmental units that have rejected the plan. In fact, she said, the recycling center will no longer accept recyclable materials from waste haulers serving those communities unless the haulers pay a tipping fee.

Mika said the program will be implemented early next year. "We don't have all the details," she added, "but we feel we can put together a program to serve these communities."

Duggar agreed. "We think we have a budget that we could do a decent program," he said. "Right now we think we can have a budget of \$130,000 to \$150,000."

The services will still include a household hazardous waste

The services will still include a household hazardous waste program. Officials will also try to emphasize enforcement against those who dump waste on county roadsides. "That was one of the things that the citizens wanted some improvement on - these people who dump on the county roads, tires in ditches, things like that," Duggar noted.

Unfortunately, the limited participation among municipalities has eliminated plans for expansion of the county's recycling facility.

"It's a dilemma because there's not enough participation to go to the big plan we had, and that is a bigger building and a horizontal baler," Duggar said. "You can be very efficient with that kind of machine, but you have to have the volume, and you have to have the finances."

Officials had also hoped to double the size of the facility's

full-time staff, from 2 to 4 employees, but that won't happen now. Other plans include purchasing more trailers and a Bobcat, beefing up the program's tire collection, and more educational programs in county schools.

"We really want to do that (recycling education), but we can't spare (Mika). She's got to be there to run the center," Duggar said.

Mayville driver killed

A Tuscola County man died from injuries he suffered in an early Sunday morning accident that wasn't discovered until 5 hours after it occurred.

Troopers from the Michi-

gan State Police post in Caro identified the victim as Adam Joseph Bell, 21, of Mayville. Investigators determined that Bell was driving north on Fostoria Road, about a half-mile south of Goodrich Road in Watertown Township when his pickup truck left the roadway on the east

shoulder. Troopers said Bell apparently attempted to bring the vehicle back onto the roadway and lost control. The vehicle crossed over Fostoria Road into a ditch on the west side, striking a culvert and then a tree.

Witnesses in the area reported hearing the accident

ported hearing the accident at about 2:30 a.m., but did not see anything in the fog. The accident was subsequently discovered at 7:30 a.m.

Troopers reported that Bell died while being transported to Lapeer Regional Hospital. Assisting at the scene were Mayville and Deerfield ambulance crews and the Mayville and Watertown Township fire departments.

During the last half century. the Cass City community has had an enviable record for producing when called on. Producing with money and labor to finish projects that at first blush appeared more grandiose, more costly than the community could stom-

In my 50 years on the scene I can recall just one project that fell flat and that was torpedoed not by the Cass City area alone, but voters in the 3-county area. It called for a community college located somewhere in the neighborhood of M-81 and M-53.

Other than that we are batting a thousand and, more importantly, the bread cast upon the water was returned manifold to us.

Where would we be without Hills and Dales General Hospital, the industrial development complex, Jordan (now Baker) College, Cass City Recreational Park and our school.

Each has, to a varying degree, been achieved because a great deal of help and money was contributed from public-spirited residents.

Today it would be hard to find anyone who doesn't concede that these projects have held the community to-

If you weren't around when these public services became available, you may be surprised to learn that none came without overcoming vocal opposition.

When Hills and Dales was established there was strong opposition from residents who were supportive of the 2 small facilities that were caring for health needs. Many turned their back on the fund-raising campaigns that enabled Walbro to come to the village.

Although no financial assistance was required, there was plenty of opposition when Provincial House (now Tendercare) proposed a facility here. The opposition was great enough that a group spearheaded by the late B. A.

The connection between health and diet is wellknown. A number of studies have shown that folks who eat are far healthier than those who don't. This concept can be further refined to prove that eating certain foods is a good way to assure continued good health.

For example, a study of 552 men in the Netherlands (Netherlanderthals I presume) has shown that men who ate more than two-thirds of an ounce of fish each day had a reduced risk of stroke, when compared to men who ate less fish. The news release says the usual adult serving of fish is about 3 ounces.

These experts claim eating certain polyunsaturated fatty acids in fish leads to changes in the blood and blood vessels that might protect against stroke. Authors of the study say this is the first time an inverse relationship between fish consumption and stroke has been reported.

I find this hard to believe. Everyone knows fishing is good for a man's health.

We could do a study of men who spend 3 days a week fishing and prove they have a lower incidence of stroke. regardless of what they eat. The Netherlanderthals have to be getting their fish somewhere.

Readers may argue it doesn't take 3 days to catch 3 ounces of fish, but I'm talking cleaned fish. And that's how long it takes the way I

As for fatty acids. One look around the boat launch will prove there is no shortage of fatty acids among fishermen.

That's what bothers me about health research. One element of diet or behavior is studied without regard to all of the other activities a person is likely to participate

The person who spends his time fishing is bound to have lower blood pressure and less chance of stroke than the guy who fights 3 hours of traffic everyday and listens to city traffic all night. Did the researchers ask these things? No-o-o, they just asked, "How much fish do you eat?"

The fish eating study reminds me of a story from the late humor writer, James Thurber. Thurber claimed a woman wrote him, soliciting advice about her writing. She knew fish was considered

"brain food" and wondered if eating more of these creatures would increase her creativity.

The woman asked Thurber how much fish she should eat. She was especially concerned about what type of fish was best for an aspiring

Thurber wrote back, advising his correspondent to eat as much fish as possible. "The more the better!" he counseled.

As for the best species to augment this lady's brain power, Thurber suggested, "A whale should be just about

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

Agriculture has announced that it is taking additional steps to reduce its inventory of surplus sugar by implementing a Payment-In-Kind (PIK) Diversion Program for the current crop.

The USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) has accumulated 741,148 tons of sugar under the current sugar price support program. Because of the nature of the product; there are fewer opportunities for use of this surplus than for other commodities. The CCC is incurring monthly storage costs of \$1.35 million on 446,594 tons of refined sugar and 294,554 tons of raw cane

The PIK Program will offer eligible sugar cane and sugar beet growers the choice of diverting from production a portion of their 2001 crop in exchange for sugar held by the CCC. sugar in CCC inventory by harvest.

The total diversion program will be limited to a maximum payment-in-kind of 200,000 tons of CCC-held sugar, and individual farmers will be limited to a maximum \$20,000 value in sugar. By reducing this year's harvest, the PIK Program will help reduce government inventory costs and alleviate the current sugar oversupply situation.
