Fires damage house, level barn

Fires damaged an apartment house in Cass City and destroyed a barn south of the village last Wednesday.

Elkland Township fire fighters were dispatched to an apartment house at 6360 Houghton St. shortly after 4 p.m.

The building is owned by Dale Peters, according to Fire Chief Ron Pawloski, who said a fire was started in an upstairs apartment occupied by James Gillespie.

"The occupant's son put a pan of grease on the stove and either became preoccupied or left, and it set the apartment on fire," Pawloski said.

The fire chief estimated the loss of the barn at \$30,000, with another \$20,000 in damage to the contents and \$5,000 in damage to the nearby residence. "He had 5 vehicles, either in the barn or right next to it that burned up," he said, adding the owners are insured.

Pawloski commanded both Cass City and Elmwood-Gagetown firemen, whose combined efforts in quickly knocking down the blaze saved the rest of the structure with minimal water damage. "They did a fantastic job," he said.

Fire fighters remained at the scene for about 3 hours. They were assisted by the Caro, Elmwood-Gagetown and Kingston fire departments.

Tuscola County Undersheriff Jim Jashinske reported deputies were following a vehicle on Deckerville Road near Colwood Road at about 3:05 a.m. when the motorist, later identified as Erin D. Lasiewski, 23, was observed driving off the edge of the roadway.

Community speaks out on terrorist attacks

Last week's terrorist attacks on America struck very close to home for some area residents, who are mourning the loss of a family member.

Marvin "Roger" Woods, 57, a 1962 graduate of Owendale-Gagetown Schools, is among the estimated 189 people killed when one of 4 hijacked commercial jets slammed into the Pentagon in Washington, D.C., Tuesday, Sept. 11.

Family members were notified early last Wednesday morning, and Woods' status as "missing and presumed dead" was confirmed Friday.

"He was very easygoing and I guess you could say he enjoyed life," said Joan Merchant, Cass City, Woods' cousin.

Merchant, who grew up with Woods and graduated from Owen-Gage in 1963, said news of his death was a shock to family members. "It's hard to believe yet. It's hard on everybody," she added. "We were all close."

Just one day before the terrorist attack, Woods moved into one of the offices that took a direct hit at the Pentagon, according to Merchant, who said she isn't certain what area of the building he worked in prior to his move.

Judy Winchester, another of Woods' cousins, said he was a career Navy man. "He was raised here in Owendale, or near Owendale, and then he went right into the Navy after he graduated," she added.

Merchant said Woods' father, the late Willard Woods, and 2 brothers also served in the Navy. His mother, Hazel Woods-Parker, resides in Bay City.

Woods served in the Navy for 23 years, retiring in 1984. According to a Washington Post story published Saturday, he then took a 6-week vacation and reported back to his office at the Patuxent River Naval Air Station and continued his job as director of communications, but as a civilian. He was relocated to the Pentagon in the 1990s.

"His job was his life," his son, James, was quoted in the story. "I remember when he retired from the Navy, he cried."

Woods, who served a tour in Vietnam, met his wife, Betty, in October 1971 while on leave. Three months later they were married.

The couple lived in Great Mills, Md., and have 3 grown children.

Betty Woods was watching television when news of the Pentagon attack was broadcast, according to the Washington Post story. She hoped and prayed that her husband had already been called away to the war room or was in the courtyard taking a smoking break.

By 1:30 a.m. Wednesday, when the Navy officers arrived at her front door, she knew that he hadn't escaped the violence.

Merchant said the family is planning services for Woods, but the details have not been worked out yet. "They did say there will be a (local) memorial service, but they didn't say when."

Community reflects on a national tragedy

Cass City area residents continue to follow the aftermath of the worst terrorist attack on United States soil in history. 7 days after hijacked jets crashed into the World Trade Center in New York and the Pentagon in Washington, D.C.

Continuous live television broadcasts depict efforts to hunt down those responsible for the brutal murders. And the grim task of recovering the bodies of victims, which officials predict will number in the thousands.

The well-planned and executed attacks left Americans and their allies stunned.

For some, the images of jets crashing into the towering buildings and the explosions that followed brought back memories of another major attack on America many years ago.



PRY BAR: Tool used to crumple the metal surrounding that clip or bracket you needed to remove in order to replace a 50-cent part.

This one's for you men, assuming most women are as ignorant about tools as I am. I had to ask my husband if this article was funny. He said it was. It's called "The Truth About Tools" and came from Crosswalk.com.

HAMMER: Originally employed as a weapon of war, the hammer nowadays is used as a kind of divining rod to locate expensive parts not far from the object we are trying to hit.

MECHANIC'S KNIFE: Used to open and slice through the contents of cardboard cartons delivered to your front door; works particularly well on boxes containing seats and motorcycle jackets.

ELECTRIC HAND DRILL: Normally used for spinning steel Pop rivets in their holes until you die of old age, but it also works great for drilling mounting holes in fenders just above the brake line that goes in the rear wheel.

PLIERS: Used to round off bolt heads.


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**Rabbit Tracks**

Connie Iwankovitsch sang "America The Beautiful" and led the singing of the national anthem. Wayne Dillon repeated a passage from a column by Mitch Albom and a moment of silence was observed in memory of the attack victims.

Rather than wait, I hitchhiked the last leg. Rides were so easy to find by servicemen that we could pick and choose, turning our backs on the older cars coming by.


Hitchhiking, I beat the train by a full 4 hours.

NATIONAL TRAGEDY

Last week was a terrible time in American history. We are all struggling with the horrible events of Sept. 11 and want to be sure we are doing the right things. Many people are interested in what the school has done and what ideas there are for parents in order to help their children with this situation.

This is a devastating event of unprecedented proportions. Every child and every staff member of our schools are concerned for the many thousands of people who have lost their lives, and whose lives are in peril at this moment. Some of the things we have done at school to date include:

- Postponed evening athletic contests the day of the attack.
- Held a 7:30 a.m. school prayer service at the high school flagpole the morning after the attack.
- All flags are flying at half staff through September 22nd.
- Teachers have been given the latitude to discuss, as appropriate, the situation with their students.
- There was a moment of silence observed in the schools and prior to the game last Friday.
- All schools are working on "Well Wishes Cards" for EMS workers, fire fighters, police officers and all other volunteers helping with the crisis. This is being done in coordination with the American Red Cross.
- Many other activities, too numerous to list.

As parents, depending on their ages and needs, children may also have particular needs and concerns. Younger children will both understand the events differently and react very differently than high schoolers and college students. The following are some ideas to help you meet your individual child's needs and concerns. They were taken from a document I recently received which focused upon helping children deal with this crisis.

Pre-school and Elementary Ages

- Young children need you close for reassurance. Give them hugs. Let them know that they and your family are safe and you are in charge and that you will keep them safe.
- In response to their questions, you might tell them simply that some bad things have happened, but you and your family are okay. If you have friends and family involved and your children ask about them, tell them simply what you know, or that you don't know, but will tell them when you find out.

-Be careful about their media exposure, as it is impossible to predict what they will see and how it might affect them.

Middle School

- Middle schoolers will see and understand more of the media coverage. Let them talk about it and express their ideas and emotions. Reassure them of the strength of our country and that our leaders are developing a plan to deal with major disasters.

-Be cautious of their media exposure too, as it may be too intense for them.

-Be on the lookout for behaviors that are uncharacteristic for your child. These may be a clue that they are struggling and may need to talk or just be with you.

High School and Older Students

- Older students may struggle with the nature of hatred and evil and why people might behave in such terrible ways. Some may feel anger and a desire for vengeance. They may be concerned about our country going to war and what that might mean for themselves, their friends and families. Remind them of the strength of our country and its people and the amazing way Americans rally in the face of tragedy. Solicit their ideas and feelings.

-These events may naturally lead to a discussion of what our democracy means and how we live it, including the risks involved. Provide lots of time and support. As time goes on, help your child connect to meaningful activities in the community to help support the victims and become a part of the effort to heal.

Circuit court proceedings

The following people appeared in Tuscola County Circuit Court last week on various criminal charges:

• David H. Hunten, 50, Vassar, was sentenced to 30 months to 10 years in prison for his plea of guilty to operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor, third offense, May 24 in Denmark Township, and to being an habitual offender (2 prior felony convictions).

• Keith E. Jewell, 43, Millington, was sentenced to 18 months probation and 90 days in the county jail, with work release, for his plea of guilty to attempted assault with a dangerous weapon March 18 in Vassar.

He was also ordered to pay court costs and fines totaling \$1,300.

• Philip K. Henry, 25, Caro, was sentenced to 90 days in jail and ordered to pay \$810 in costs and fines for his plea of guilty to failure to register as a sex offender July 4, 2000, in Caro.

• Jeremy M. Kern, 20, Fairgrove, was sentenced to 24 months probation and 180 days in jail for his plea of

guilty to uttering and publishing May 26-29 in Fairgrove, involving a \$374.75 check drawn on Key Bank, Cleveland, Ohio.

Kern was also ordered to pay \$1,580 in costs and fines.

• Richard L. Hobson II, 31, Caro, pleaded no contest to 3 counts of attempted second degree criminal sexual conduct.

A pre-sentence investigation was ordered and bond was continued at \$100,000. Sentencing is to be set.

• Donald W. Hoover, 19, Warren, pleaded guilty to carrying a concealed weapon July 19 in Akron Township.

A pre-sentence investigation was ordered and bond was set at \$5,000. Sentencing is to be scheduled.

• Gregory A. Carlisle, 33, Caro, pleaded guilty to operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor, third offense, May 14 in Vassar.

A pre-sentence investigation was ordered and the defendant was remanded to the custody of the sheriff's department. Sentencing is to be scheduled.

• Jack R. Sholes, 44, Deford, was sentenced to 60 months probation and 180 days in the county jail (90 days deferred) for his plea of guilty to operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol.

Bond was set at a combined \$90,000 and a pre-trial hearing was ordered scheduled in the case. The defendant was remanded to the custody of the sheriff's department.

He was also ordered to pay costs and fines totaling \$2,860.

• Benjamin N. Kozma, 20, Mayville, stood mute to charges of larceny in a building, 2 counts of forgery and 2 counts of uttering and publishing Aug. 13 involving \$75 and \$100 checks drawn on Independent Bank; breaking and entering a building with intent to commit larceny Aug. 14 in Mayville; and larceny in a building, forgery and uttering and publishing Aug. 17 involving a \$100 check drawn on Mayville State Bank, failure to register as sex offender, and failure to comply with reporting duties under the Sex Offenders Registration Act.

A deer camp crunch requires an empty aluminum can of about 12 ounces. The can is placed between the heel of the left hand and the palm of the right hand in such a way that the biceps, chest muscles, and abdominals are all stressed simultaneously.

When performed properly this activity results in a satisfying "crunch".

Another exercise popular with sportsmen is called "lunges". Lunges are said to



Man sentenced in ATV theft

An Eastpointe man has been sentenced in connection with the theft of a Cass City man's John Deere 6-wheel ATV last July.

Earl G. Massa, 49, pleaded no contest to a charge of larceny of property valued at more than \$1,000 in Tuscola

County Circuit Court. He was sentenced to 24 months probation and 60 days in the county jail, with work release, and ordered to pay \$1,780 in costs and fines plus attorneys fees of \$1,000.

The incident took place July 6. According to reports, Massa told Cass City police and Tuscola County Sheriff's deputies that a white male he had met at Wild John's Party Store on M-53 offered to sell him the machine. Massa said the unidentified man stated the ATV was "tore up" and that he would accept \$200 for it.

Massa said he paid cash but didn't get a receipt.

The owner of the equipment, Al Wright of Cass City, discovered Massa loading the ATV, valued at \$5,000, onto a trailer after traveling to his property near Cass City and Crawford roads to pick up a picnic table.

Reports state the ignition on the equipment had been "punched out".

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Vandemark homestead honored as a Michigan centennial farm

Family history is important to Jerry and Connie Vandemark, who have put considerable time and care into researching their roots.

That sort of dedication carries its own rewards, but Thumb Electric Cooperative (TEC) officials recently honored the Wells Township couple's efforts by presenting them with a Michigan Centennial Farm marker to display at their Gilford Road farm.

"This is one way for us to thank them for their many years of patronage," David Fritz, TEC member services and marketing manager, said during the presentation Thursday.

Jerry Vandemark said his family homestead was established in the mid-1890s - 107 years ago. "I'm a fourth generation on this farm," he added.

The area resident has traced his family history back to his great-great-grandparents, Peter and Sally Vandemark. The couple lived in Tioga County, N.Y., but never came to Michigan.

Vandemark's great-grandfather and great-grandmother, Abraham and Mary E. Vandemark, were the first in his family to settle in the northeast section of Wells Township. The couple purchased the original 79 acres Dec. 13, 1894, for the tidy sum of \$2,000, borrowing the money from Elijah H. Pinney, founder of the former Pinney State Bank in Cass City.

"When my great grandparents came here, a large part of Wells Township - this whole area - was not settled," Vandemark noted.

"Originally, my great-grandfather came here (Tuscola County) right after the Civil War. We have his discharge papers," he said. "He was mustered out, I think, in 1865, and he came to Unionville."

Abraham farmed a 40-acre spread about a mile southwest of Unionville until his move to Wells Township in 1894.

During those years, he kept a diary, a treasure that Jerry and Connie later discovered. "For the whole year of 1872, he had an entry every day. It's very interesting reading," Vandemark said.

The entries were simple, but offered some insight into his great-grandfather's daily life. "He wrote about the weather, what he did that day, who he went to visit," he added, noting one entry indicated Abraham was still clearing stumps from his farmland near Unionville, an area of

ACT scores are accepted by virtually all colleges in the nation, including all Ivy League schools. The test fee is \$24 (\$27 in Florida).

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
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CASS CITY'S TRAVIS JENSEN is stopped after a short gain Friday against visiting Bad Axe. The Hawks went behind early and lost 43-18.

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



F.B. lauds disaster request

The state's largest farm organization is supporting Gov. John Engler's federal disaster request for 73 Michigan counties that have faced devastating field, fruit and vegetable crop losses due to severe drought.

The affected areas include Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties.

Michigan Farm Bureau (MFB) along with the Michigan Department of Agriculture, the Farm Service Agency and Michigan State University's Extension Service recently coordinated a crop tour of 4 Michigan counties to develop an estimate of crop losses due to

widespread drought conditions.

"The governor and the Michigan Department of Agriculture should be commended for their prompt attention to the plight of Michigan farmers," said Wayne Wood, president of Michigan Farm Bureau.

"Historically low commodity prices and the drought have delivered a one-two punch to a majority of the state's farmers. Thanks to the governor's efforts, it's now up to farmers to measure and verify actual yield losses to complete the disaster designation process."

Engler's request, in a letter


to U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Ann Veneman, was based on 30 percent or more loss estimates in at least one commodity from each of the included counties.

From the middle of June through the middle of August, less than three-quarters of an inch of rain fell in most areas of the state, causing severe crop losses. In addition, many areas and crops were exposed to repeated temperatures exceeding 100 degrees.

In order for federal disaster status to be granted, original crop loss estimates must be verified from harvest yield data.



cent?" asked senior Cassey Hatcher.

"I think we should find out for sure who is behind all this and get them back. America is a strong nation and we can't let them think they are getting the best of us. We must be strong and move on with our everyday lives."

"On Sept. 10, everything was fine. Then, only one day later, the whole world has changed for everyone," senior Kayla Wentworth said. "I also think it's unfair that we are getting taken advantage of by our own people during this tragedy by raising gas prices."

Locally, news of the terrorism sparked rumors of a gasoline shortage, and reports of gas prices soaring up to \$5 a gallon in some parts of the state. Motorists jammed into Cass City's gas stations, lining up at least 8 cars deep at times.

Prices did increase, but they remained below \$1.90 for regular unleaded.

"It was crazy. I'd say (we sold) 4 times as much gas," said Heidi Cook, manager at the Mr. Chips Food Store. "I ran out of no lead, I'd say, at 8 p.m., and I have 6 pumps."

"Everybody thought they were going to pay \$4," she said. "People lined up, honking horns, spilling gas, they were fighting out in the parking lot. It was very stressful."

School throughout the area canceled evening sporting events and other activities.

OUT OF RESPECT

"It was basically out of respect for the thousands, likely, that were killed," explained Cass City School Supt. Ken Micklash. "Our world is getting smaller and smaller, and a lot of people in Cass City have the potential for having friends or relatives out there."

If losses of 30 percent or more are confirmed and the request is granted, eligible producers will have access to low-interest emergency loans from the USDA's Farm Service Agency for up to 80 percent of their weather-related production losses.

In addition to the low-interest loan program, Wood said MFB will continue to seek additional relief for Michigan producers affected by the drought. That relief may well involve seeking additional reform to crop insurance program options.

"The drought clearly stresses the need to develop an affordable and reliable crop insurance program for all crops so that producers can insure and protect themselves from economic ruin in the future," he said.

hour during the chase, which covered 6 to 7 miles.

Jashinske said the driver continued southbound on Murray Road, disregarded a posted stop sign at Riley Road, and continued southbound and disregarded a stop sign at Bevens Road.

Lasiewski, who was not wearing a seatbelt, lost control on the gravel road, sliding sideways off the road, then rolling onto the left side, striking a Detroit Edison Pole and coming to rest on its top. He was found in a yard about 50 yards from his vehicle.

"MMR and Mayville Ambulance treated the driver, and he was taken by FlightCare helicopter to St. Mary's Hospital," Jashinske said. "Caro Fire Department also assisted deputies."

He noted a report on the incident will be forwarded to the prosecutor's office.

visions, watching the horrific events unfold.

"Obviously, the atmosphere was subdued," Micklash said. "This was much worse than Pearl Harbor, in my opinion, because that was an attack on armed forces, and this was against innocent civilians."

The attack led to some unprecedented decisions, including the FAA's grounding

of all flights in the country. Financial markets were also shut down, and predictions for the markets, once they reopened, were grim.

"It's an impact on all of us — the loss of knowledge that we've suffered," Althaver said, referring to the financial firms housed at the World Trade Center. "These are all people who work in very sophisticated busi-

nesses, with a lot of smarts. The impact of that will be felt for a long time."

"But I think that our investors today are pretty savvy people, and I think we have to keep our heads straight and not panic."

"I think the important thing is, Pearl Harbor united this country — and we were a very divided country at that time — and I think this will,"

Althaver continued.

Still, he acknowledged, it will not be easy to deal with what has been described as the most audacious terrorist act ever, particularly as names and personal information emerge on the many victims.

"It's terrible," he said. "I think the mental health of our country is going to be tested over the next several days."
