# State okays villages' **Renaissance** requests

As expected, the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) announced last week that the Thumb Area and Northern Tier Renaissance Zones received approval to create subzones and expand their boundaries.

The new expansions will result in about 138 new jobs, \$57 million in private investment and the reuse of previously underutilized industrial property. "The positive impact on

these communities is an excellent example of the success of the Renaissance Zone Program." said Doug Rothwell, president and CEO of the Michigan Economic Development Corporation. "These zone expansions will help entice development in Michigan's rural communities."

The Thumb Area Renaissance Zone received approval to expand an existing subzone in the village of Caro and create an additional subzone in the village of Cass City. Approval of the new Cass

City subzone makes it possible for Millennium Industries to move into the former General Cable Company facility. Earlier this year, the community lost 200 jobs when General Cable closed its doors.

Millennium officials plan to invest some \$2.5 million in the old site, creating 100 new jobs within the next 5 years.

The company manufactures

6 acres and extending the area's status as a subzone from 2009 to 2016, enabling Michigan Ethanol, LLC to proceed with construction of a \$55 million ethanol processing facility. The new plant is expected to create 38 new, full-time jobs.

The facility will be Michigan's first value-added corn processing endeavor. Officials estimate the 40 million gallon ethanol facility will require 14.3 million bushels of corn each year, benefiting 1,000 Michigan farmers.

State officials also approved a Northern Tier Renaissance Zone application in which Rogers City will gain more than 3 acres, making it possible for the city to convert blighted, unused industrial areas into residential

housing for the community. Created in 1996, the Renaissance Zone Program sets aside geographic areas of the state. Businesses in these designated areas operate virtually tax-free for a set number of years. There are currently 124 tax-free geographic areas.

As of September 2001, Michigan's breakthrough Renaissance Zones have spurred more than 216 projects with a combined private investment of more than \$1.3 billion and created more than 5,800 jobs.

# Local Campus Life moves into new digs

Making do with new surroundings is nothing new for Jeff Bader, who has moved the local Youth for Christ headquarters 4 times in as many years.

But the latest move may be the last one for some time. At least Bader is hoping that will be the case.

"This was definitely a good move," said Bader, who has served as the Campus Life Director for the Cass City-Kingston Region since it was established 4 years ago.

"We started out in the Methodist church after they finished their gymnasium, and then we moved down to the old funeral home, and then we were back to the Meth-

odist church," he recalled, noting both locations were made available on a temporary basis. "This is a yearby-year contract. This is definitely more long term."

The new YFC headquarters is located in the former Hendrian's Floor Covering building located at 6435 Main St. The building previously housed Friendly Harvest Bulk Foods.

Bader said the building is in good shape and offered an ideal location along with plenty of space for a large group of kids to gather. "Hendrians had done a lot of renovation, so basically I vacuumed the carpet," he added. "That was a big sell-

said. "Unfortunately, I can't be here all the time. It's going to take some other people. . .who are going to be willing to have that kind of commitment themselves." It will also take money to better equip the center. The Cass City-Kingston's annual \$50,000 budget depends solely on contributions from the community. Bader has already managed to set up some games, including air hockey and ping-pong, but he would like to add some televisions and other furnishings.

Although the local Campus Life region is relatively new, Bader has seen growth in the number of kids showing an interest in Youth for Christ. "It's still a new enough program that it doesn't have the history, but there's more notability - the school kids know what we do more than before," he said. For example, he added, more than 2 dozen kids attended an annual spring break trip to Florida last year, compared to 6 kids in the first year.

Club Extreme attendance is also up, with more than 30 kids attending last week.

Word of mouth is partly responsible for the growing popularity, but Bader also makes a point of not coming on too strong.

"It's laid back. I try not to cram a Bible down a young person's throat when they walk in the door," he said. "I'm not into fear tactics. We try to make it fun and entertaining while still proving a point.

Bader said Campus Life programs are a Christianbased outreach that focus on young people - especially those kids who are not involved in church — their concerns and the decisions they make.

"It is a Christian base and we try to use that to teach solid values, some core be-

# Christmas in the Village Holiday celebration on tap

Start your engines, shoppers, because Cass City's biggest promotion of the holiday season will kick off this weekend with bargains galore and a whole lot more.

The Cass City Chamber of Commerce, Downtown Development Authority (DDA) and a host of other local organizations are gearing up for the second annual Christmas in the Village celebration.

The event begins Sunday with a town-wide open house planned for noon to 4 p.m.

Chamber Administrator Kay Warner said local businesses are planning special hours to accommodate shoppers. "It looks like a lot of people are staying open, so it should be nice. It's not just a matter of retail, it's a matter of unity," she added, noting the municipal building will be open Sunday, enabling shoppers to look over displays set up inside. Public restrooms are also available.

The chamber and DDA are once again offering businesses free greens to decorate their storefronts. Businesses are asked to pick up their greens anytime after Wednesday afternoon at Cass City Floral.

This year's Christmas in the Village Holiday Extravaganza will get underway Saturday, Dec. 1, with a host of events, starting with breakfast with the Cass City Rotary Club at McDonald's. Residents who stop by with a new, unwrapped toy to donate will receive a coupon for a free breakfast sandwich. Rotary members will be distributing the toys as part of their Christmas for Kids program.

Residents can also take advantage of Hills and Dales General Hospital's "Healthy Holidays" blood pressure screenings at the municipal building during the morning hours.

Also on tap is Christmas in the Country, a craft show that proved very popular last year. The event, which will be held at the high school from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., drew dozens of crafters and an attendance estimated at more than

700 people last year.

Another popular attraction is the Friends of the Library Christmas Town Home Tour (see related story), held from noon to 5 p.m.

For the kids, a free movie will be offered at 2 p.m. at the Cass Theatre. Kids planning to attend are encouraged to donate a toy for the Christmas for Kids program. Free movies will also be offered Dec. 8 and Dec. 15.

Children can also plan to participate in a Kids Craft and Story time at Rawson Memorial Library, Dec. 8 and 15. Call the library at 872-2856 for more information and to register.

The most anticipated event, Santa's arrival, is scheduled for sometime between 5:30 and 6 p.m., but residents are encouraged to gather at the municipal building starting at 5 p.m. to enjoy refreshments, including hot bean soup served up by Steve Wright and Matt Prieskorn. There will also be singing and free horse drawn carriage rides.

Warner said organizers plan to set up warming barrels and a tent this year to help everyone keep warm.

The evening will conclude with a holiday concert featuring the Tom Thumb Singers. The event begins at 7 p.m. at the Cass City United Methodist Church.

Other Christmas in the Village events in December include a home decorating contest, with judging to take place in mid-December. Residents can register at the municipal building. Winners will receive cash prizes and Detroit Edison certificates.

Some lucky shoppers will also have an opportunity to win one of 3 prizes - a train set, bicycle and an American Girl Doll - during drawings scheduled for Dec. 8, 15 and 22. Shoppers can register at all downtown businesses. "There is just so much going on. It's really a nice promotion," Warner said.

For as long as I can remember, Nov. 15 has been a day eagerly anticipated and widely prepared for. When it finally arrived, men of the family would rise noisily long before dawn to go out and sit for hours in the cold, damp woods hoping a 12point buck would appear in their gun sights.

Even an unsuccessful hunt, or seasons of unsuccessful hunts, won't dampen the true hunter's enthusiasm.

When he's successful, however, he is like a child on Christmas morning. The rules require that he drive around with the trophy in the back of the pickup or across the trunk of the car, stopping often for pictures and the admiration of fellow hunters and anyone else who will show an interest.

Another vital part of the whole adventure is gathering with brothers in the hunting fraternity and sharing tales of the hunt. I'm not sure how these tales compare with the traditional "fish stories." In these modern times, though, videos tend to keep the hunters somewhat honest.

Then there's the matter of taking care of the meat after the beast has hung in the garage for a few days. That process can be rather expensive and extremely messy.

The uninitiated might wonder why one wouldn't just go to the store and buy meat, all cleaned, cut up and neatly wrapped. Beats me.

There are a few who actually like venison and really do hunt for the meat. If you're one of them and you don't bag a buck, don't give up. You can make plain old beef taste just like venison by following this formula beef is ready to butcher.

Meteorologists are doing the same thing: Flying off in all directions attempting to predict the weather months in advance. I don't think these folks have a clue what the weather will be like several weeks from now, but I always enjoy reading their predictions.

Today I read that one meteorologist predicts equal chances of above and below normal temperatures, equal chances of above and below normal precipitation, and highly variable weather this winter. We finally found one, an honest meteorologist!

I can remember when the only safe forecast was for another hard winter. Anyone who predicted a mild winter was in trouble with the folks who didn't cut enough firewood or left the cat out to freeze.

Meteorologists would come on television and say, "There's another severe winter coming up. Better cut plenty of wood, and remember the treatment for stiff cat disease: Bucket of hot water, total immersion.'

Nobody listened to weather forecasters in those days. Everybody predicted their own weather. We did it without a lot of fancy instruments, too.

Someone would see a black woolly worm and say, "Looks like it's going to be a hard winter. There goes another dark woolly worm." "What's a black worm got

to do with the weather?" the town kids would ask. "Well, that worm obviously came out of the coal bin, and he's headed south," we'd tell

them.

Folks would see a squirrel scurrying around gathering nuts and say, "It's going to be a tough winter. The squirrels are real busy this fall."

Nobody ever stopped to think a squirrel has nothing else to do in the fall. Gathering nuts might be just a hobby for him. (He's not going to rake the leaves, for heavens sake.)

"It's going to be a cold one for sure, and we're all going to freeze to death if you don't work a little faster."

originally owned by James and Emma Day. Their daughter, Mary Lena Day, married William Rawson in 1914. The Rawson children raised in the home were Ralph, Marie, Delbert, Clare and Elsie Mae. The Nicols purchased the home in 1991 from Jim and Charlotte

Kritzman. Sherry Bader home, 4659 Seeger St. This 2-story brick residence was built around 1915 and is often referred to as Mr. Holmberg's house. Arthur Holmberg was the principal for Cass City Public Schools for many years. During that time, the home is where he and his family resided. Bader purchased the home in 1995 from Holmberg's estate.

•Dolly Misch home, 6154 Woodside Dr. This condominium was purchased 4 years ago and has been completely remodeled. Misch moved to this area from Macomb.

•Northwood Meadows, Drive. Beechwood Northwood Meadows is an elegant retirement community featuring studio and one-bedroom apartments. # **Meyer sponsors education** legislation to improve schools

School districts can request temporary waiver of some state and federal laws and rules to help develop innovative education programs under legislation approved Thursday by the House, said state Rep. Tom Meyer. House Bill 4760, sponsored by Meyer, and HB 4761 allow Ed Flex and empowerment contracts to improve school performances and student education.

"Every community is searching for ways to help their schools improve, but too often bureaucratic red tape gets in the way of making changes," said Meyer, R-Bad Axe. "This legislation will allow school districts to try individual approaches that will best fit the circumstances they face.

"While rules and guidelines

are necessary, they never fit each and every situation that is necessary or can be updated fast enough to keep up with how quickly our society is changing."

A contract would allow the state education superintendent to waive state statutes and rules as part of a performance-based contract with clearly defined and measurable performance goals. Under the bills, any provision of the state school code or school aid act would be subiect to the waiver except for health and safety requirements.

Michigan has been part of the Ed Flex pilot program at the national level since 1996

"Every school district is challenged in different ways to do the best they can for

their students," Meyer said. "By giving all Michigan schools the Ed Flex option they can work on their specific obstacles and the whole educational community will have a better showing of what worked and what needs further improvement.

"Fostering an atmosphere in education where experts can advance teaching techniques and management is crucial to our schools' and our students' continued success."

As part of the Ed Flex contract, a school would be required to give an annual progress report toward its performance goals. The state education superintendent and state treasurer will administer the contracts.

HBs 4760 and 4761 currently await action by the Senate.

# Officials scaling back budget for corn check-off

Just as Michigan corn producers are tightening their belts for the coming year, so is the Corn Marketing Program of Michigan, the state's corn check-off program.

Check-off programs are established under state law P.A. 232, or more commonly known as the Agricultural **Commodities Marketing** Act. This act allows for the establishment of check-off programs for commodities grown and sold in the state, like the Corn Marketing Program of Michigan (CMPM). Since state law provides for the program, it requires that all field corn grown and sold in Michigan must be checked off. Specifically, every time a producer sells one bushel of corn, one penny comes to CMPM to be used for research, education, promotion and market development activities.

"We looked at our farms and our neighbor's farms and thought we might be in for one of the worst years on the books," said Richard Godfrey, CMPM President and corn producer from Jonesville. "We were right,

Initial reports from the Michigan Agriculture Statistics Service are reporting yields 25 percent lower than last year at this time: \* As of a month ago, corn is

averaging 93 bushels an acre. \* As of Oct. 28, 70 percent

of the corn is in fair to excellent condition. \* As of Oct. 28, nearly 40

percent of Michigan's corn crop was harvested. \* The price averaged \$1.80

a bushel in October; this is up from \$1.74 a year ago. "After talking to producers at plot tours and trade shows across the state, we scaled back our budget this year with the expectation that this would be one of the worst harvests in years," said Jody E. Pollok, CMPM executive director. "We kept the programs that are absolutely necessary - - like market development, research and education - - the programs where we are gaining momentum and can't risk losing ground."
