

The council just spent 2 months trimming its own proposed budget, Trustee Kathy Kropewnicki said, adding she feels it would be irresponsible to spend \$30,000 a year on a new

Other council members, including Village President Les Karr and Trustee Don Ball, expressed concerns that if the village contributed, residents would be "double dipped" because tax dollars from both the village and school would be spent on the

Still, Trustee Dale McIntosh said, the pool committee deserves a lot of credit for all of its hard work.

BUDGET

Turning to other matters, Village Manager Frank Sheridan presented a proposed 2002 spending plan with general fund expenditures of \$1.362 million and revenues totaling \$1.359 million.

The budget, which represents a planned spending increase of about \$85,000, or about 6.6 percent over actual estimated 2001 expenditures, relies on a small fund balance subsidy of just over \$3,000, leaving a fund balance of \$387,651 at the end of the fiscal year.

Combined with all funds,

village spending in 2002 is projected at nearly \$3.63 million, an increase of about

3.3 percent over 2001. Budget projects are based on a state equalized valuation (SEV) of all real and personal property in the village

of \$55,498,630. Water and sewer rates will each increase by 5 percent based on a schedule approved by the council in December 1997. Tax rates, however, will remain the same at a combined 18.5 mills - 12.5 mills for general operations, 3.5 mills for streets and 2.5 mills for debt retirement.

Sheridan noted pay-off of the sewer debt service is expected to take place in December 2002, some 16 years ahead of schedule.

Also unchanged will be current staffing levels, although the council approved a salary increase of 2.8 percent across the board for full-time village employees.

Village officials initially trimmed the budget in an effort to offset some revenue losses as well as to prepare for future expenses.

For example, officials had anticipated an increase in population, based on the most recent census figures, to translate into additional state dollars. However, Sheridan said the current state deficit will actually result in Cass City receiving

It's over

Indoor pool project drowns as school rejects loan guarantee

indoor swimming pool built at Cass City Schools.

Pool Committee Chairman Ed Fox acknowledged regretfully that the year-long campaign and outstanding fund raising effort went down the drain when the Cass City School Board voted not to guarantee a loan of some \$400,000 that was needed to bring the pool to the school and the community.

The actual motion that sounded the death knell for the project came when Dave Knight's motion to reaffirm the district's promise to pay up to \$100,000 for maintenance and to give Durant funds to help construction was passed.

Knight said that he wanted the some \$12,000 a year to go to the fund to show support for the project. Actually the \$12,000 is mere window dressing and will never be paid if Fox is correct when he said without a loan guarantee the pool will never be

a 5-2 vote. Voting no for diametrically opposite reasons were Randy Severance and Theresa Rabideau. Severance voted no because he didn't want to see Durant funds given to the pool fund. Rabideau wanted better support for the project. As a member of the pool committee, she realized that without school help it was impossible to build a pool.

In the discussion, trustee Danny Hagg said that he didn't feel the community was behind the project, a position that was seconded

by President James Turner. Trustee Michelle

Biddinger pointed out what the pool could mean to the community in the years ahead and appeared ready to support a financial aid pro-Knight's motion passed by Supt. Ken Micklash said that as a finance officer he

didn't feel it was prudent for the school to take on a financial obligation of a possible \$400,000, Principal Dorland Kuntz said that he believed building a pool could jeopardize the education of the students in the future. Fox presented figures that he believed the committee could raise to reduce the deficit to \$196,107.

With the vote, a magnificent fund raising effort by the pool committee and the outstanding support of many

supporters who contributed \$423,451.72 are lost. Together with the \$500,000 anonymous grant and another \$350,000 from the Pinney Foundation a total of over \$1.27 million was available for the project.

Everyone agreed that the school will never have another opportunity to build a pool as cheaply in the future.

OTHER BUSINESS

Hartel: ruling will cause some headaches


Cass City Athletic Director Jeff Hartel can see at least 2 major problems for the school if the United States Federal District Court decision establishing the same season for boys and girls sports is not overturned by appeal.

The decision, announced Monday by Judge Richard Enslen, marked the end of the trial phase of legal proceedings in a 3 1/2-year-old court case in which he required the Michigan High School Athletic Association to force the public, private and parochial schools in its state-wide membership to change the time of the year when they conduct sports seasons. An appeal of Judge Enslen's decision will be filed with the Sixth Court of Appeals in Cincinnati, Ohio. In essence it means that boys and girls will be required to play each sport in the same season. The case was filed because a parent thought it better for the players to receive college scholarships if the boys and girls played basketball in the same sea-

Hartel's concerns are finding a way to schedule all the events and finding gym time for practices. Each of the boys and girls teams has 3 games nightly and play twice a week, that's 12 games a week for basketball alone. In addition there is wrestling and gymnastics.

The second problem will be securing coaches. In Cass City, he pointed out; Chuck Reed coaches both boys and girls soccer teams. Coaches


We're going to be a bit more crowded when the family comes home this year. We've converted the room where the Christmas tree used to stand to a bedroom, since climbing stairs is a challenge.






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
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Business is good at the post office and Cass City's postal chief, Stacey Middleton, says that business is up about 10 percent over last year.

Old history books say the pilgrims invited their Indian friends to the first Thanksgiving dinner. This was a good thing, because these were the Indians' turkeys the pilgrims were roasting.

The pilgrims also bought cranberries to this dinner and made the Indians eat some of them. This led to considerable animosity between the white man and Native Americans in later years. After the Iroquois refused to attend any more of these dinners, someone decided it

would be a good idea to roast a turkey at Grandma's house instead. This way Grandma would have to furnish the

Soon it was learned many families had 2 Grandmas, and they would have to roast a turkey at one Grandma's for Thanksgiving and another at the other Grandma's for Christmas. This didn't solve the problem, but it led to considerable conversation.

No one suspected the effect holiday traditions were having upon the girl children. These young grandmas-intraining began to feel somehow responsible for roasting a turkey for each holiday and got real upset if they didn't. So now we have folks roasting turkeys at the drop of a

Today, with girl children comprising more than half the population, we have a real problem on our hands. This country has a stockpile of leftovers like you wouldn't believe.


What can we do to break this traditional guilt trip? I don't know about you, but I'm going to roast a quail for Christmas. It may not be traditional, but I only have to eat it once.



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

Zero-interest agricultural loans available to eligible farmers for crop losses

By a 102-1 vote, the Michigan House of Representaoverwhelmingly passed House Bill 4009 late Wednesday to make about \$200 million worth of zeroavailable to eligible farmers suffering from weather-related crop losses this past summer.

Producers across Michigan experienced various levels of yield reductions as a result of a frost and cool, wet weather in the spring, followed by drought conditions throughout the summer and an early frost during the harvest season.

The legislation now heads to the Senate for consideration in January 2002. The timing of the bill's passage will be critical, said Michigan Farm Bureau (MFB) State Governmental Affairs Manager Ron Nelson. "Producers normally seek operating loans for the upcoming crop season from their lenders in January and February," he said. "This package would help producers pay-off operating loans from the 2001 crop year, and provide lenders added confidence to extend credit for

Nelson acknowledged that the bill's approval might be challenging, considering the state's financial troubles. "The state budget is stressed, but so are our farmers," he said. "Given the overwhelming support the package received in the House, we hope the senate will take this issue up as soon as possible and give it the same level of attention and consideration.'

As passed by the House, the bill proposes a zero-interest, 10-year agricultural loan program similar to one established by the state in 1986 to help offset flood-related crop losses. A farmer could be eligible for up to a \$150,000 loan under the legislation. The state loans crop completely wiped out.

through the Farm Credit System and traditional banks.

Farmers who prove yield losses of 25 percent overall. or a 50 percent yield loss on interest agricultural loans any single commodity, would qualify for the loan program. Individual loan amounts could not exceed 100 percent of the loss amount after applicable crop insurance indemnity payments are deducted. Because this is a loan program, producers will have to provide adequate collateral to qualify for the zero-interest

financing.
The U.S. Department of Agriculture recently announced that all but one of Michigan's 83 counties were eligible for federal low-interest emergency loans from the Farm Service Agency as a result of the summer drought. USDA had also approved 27 counties for the same type of federal loan program as a result of cool weather and heavy rains in May.

The magnitude of last summer's drought has hit home and hit hard for Michigan farmers, as harvest season comes to a close and farmers take stock of their yields.

Caro-area farmer Carl Bednarski said drought conditions in the summer followed by freezing temperatures in October caused so much destruction in his dry bean crop that he did not harvest any of the 240 acres of dry beans he planted - - a first for the third-generation

In testimony before the House Appropriations Committee, Bednarski, who serves as a district director on the Michigan Farm Bureau state board, urged legislators to support a proposal to establish a zero-interest loan program. The measure passed the House Wednesday and now heads to the Senate for consideration in January 2002.

"We've never had a dry bean

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would be administered We've always harvested something. But this year the crop wasn't even worth attempting to harvest," he said. "These are circumstances no

one has ever seen before." According to the Michigan Bean Commission, the 2001 dry bean crop represents the state's lowest dry bean yield since 1936, and will likely mark the lowest total production since data was first recorded in 1909. National Agricultural Sta-

tistics Service (NASS) figures released this week put Michigan's average dry bean yield at 600 pounds, a 60percent drop from 1,500 pounds in 2000. Compared to a year ago, dry bean production is down a whopping 81 percent, NASS reported. The Michigan Bean Com-

mission pegs the state's total 2001 dry bean loss at \$81.75 million, or \$65.4 million in total grower loss and \$16.35 million in total elevator loss. Bednarski considers him-

self fortunate in that his dry beans were insured. Some growers who contract their dry beans, he said, were forced to buy beans from others to fill contracts.

The severe weather also took a toll on Bednarski's other corps. His soybeans yielded an average 17 bushels an acre, down significantly from the standard 40 bushels, while his corn yielded an average 75 bushels an acre, half of the standard 150 bushels.

"In the past years, we were able to compensate for low markets with some of the above-average yields we had," said Bednarski. "But now this year when the prices we receive for our crops are still depressed and we get half a yield or, worse yet, no yield, it really eats into our equity.

"We're actually dipping into our equity to keep farming," he said. "If this keeps up, at some point the pot's going to be empty and there's going to be nothing we're going to be able to borrow

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
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Harbor Beach hands Cass City first cage loss Friday



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


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Christmas tree a symbol of hope


trunk is pierced so that it can stand on display for all to see. Eventually, the green life fades away, the branches hang low and the dead tree is cast aside.

Meyer urges quick response

DM surveys going out

Selected landowners and hunters will begin receiving survey letters during the next 2 weeks to gauge support for the Quality Deer Management (QDM) plan proposed for Huron, Tuscola and Sanilac counties.

State Rep. Tom Meyer reminds those receiving the surveys to return them to the Department of Natural Resources as quickly as possible to ensure the Michigan Natural Resources Commission has a complete picture of local attitudes.

"The QDM proposal has been very controversial for the Thumb area," said Meyer, R-Bad Axe. "Nothing ever pleases everyone, the best that can be done is to do what the majority of the people desire.

The plan was submitted by the Thumb Area Branch of QDM, which emphasizes the need to protect yearling bucks, allowing more to reach maturity, and at the same time harvest an adequate number of adult does in order to reduce the deer buck-to-doe ratio as well as overall herd health. The group's goal is to increase the number of bucks in the 2 1/

2- to 3 1/2-year class. Opponents of the measure. however, say the proposal is trophy management and violates the rights of all hunters to decide which deer to harvest. Some residents have also questioned whether hunters will be willing to harvest does, and they say the QDM plan would adversely affect the genetics of the deer herd by moving more younger bucks into the

breeding cycle. A number of hunters have also criticized the DNR's survey method because only a select number of husters and landowners will decide the

Meyer, who describes the survey as short and simple, urges all residents who receive a survey to take the time to complete them and mail them back promptly.

The mailing will be sent to 1,000 random owners of Thumb årea property (at least density and improve the 5 acres). Another 1,000 forms have answered surveys in the

The forms include a letter from the DNR explaining the QDM proposal and the survey process, a 3-question survey with a map of the affected region and a postage-

paid return envelope. There are 2 yes/no questions - one asks if the respondent hunts deer in Huron, Sanilac or Tuscola counties. and the other if the respondent owns property in any of those counties.

The third question, which asks if the respondent supports the QDM proposal, reads as follows:

"A proposal has been sub-

mitted to the DNR to modify deer harvest regulations in Huron, Sanilac and Tuscola counties (Deer Management Units 032, 076 and 079). The proposal requires that: 1) a legal buck be defined as a deer with at least 4 antler points on one antler; 2) an adequate number of antlerless deer be harvested annually to meet population

goals and to achieve an

will go to deer hunters who adult-buck-to-adult-doe ratio of 1:2 or lower; and 3) the regulation be in place for 5 years beginning with the fall of 2002 deer hunting sea-

Respondents can answer "yes", "no", or "no opinion", which will result in a "no" vote, or "don't care", which will not count as supporting or opposing. A majority of 66 percent of the hunters and landowners must support the plan to enact the change.

If the proposal is approved, violating the 4-point rule would be subject to fines similar to taking illegal game - a \$1,000 restitution fee, loss of hunting privileges for 3 years, 5 days in jail and a \$1,000 fine.

"The commission's meeting agenda calls for a discussion of the proposal in February and a decision to be rendered at its March meeting," Meyer said. "I will present all the written comments people have sent me since October, but it is important for survey recipients to get them mailed in as soon as possible."

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
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
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
