Standing tall

Deford craftsman's work to honor firemen

When it comes to Joe Hillaker's craft, variety is not only the spice of life, it's a necessity.

Which is why the Deford area resident didn't flinch when Oliver Township fire fighters asked him to create a life-size statue of a fireman for a "wall of honor" the Huron County department plans to erect in the village of Elkton.

The project would involve molding clay - a first for Hillaker, who is known throughout the area and beyond for his unique, natural wood furniture, figurines and carvings.

"This is the first time for clay," Hillaker commented in his workshop. He added that clay is very forgiving compared to working with wood or stone. "It's an oil-based clay, so it doesn't harden. I mean, it gets hard, but you can still work it."

Hillaker agreed to take on the project after a member of the Oliver Township department approached him.

"I put a show on with my furniture and my wood carvings down to the Kingston Schools, and the gal down there who coordinated that, she's married to John Champagne of Elkton," Hillaker explained. "He was looking for someone to do it, and she said, 'how about that guy from Deford.'"

The request, which came about 3 years after that visit to Kingston Elementary School, came as a surprise to Hillaker. "I said I could (do it) - it's just a question of how well," he recalled.

Hillaker started by taking photos of fire fighter Dutch Seeley dressed in full garb and holding a young boy in his arms. He then erected a rod frame on a wooden platform to support the statue. Hillaker also special ordered the clay he would need from a New Jersey company.

"There's 200 pounds of clay in this and I've got about 6 weeks into it," he said of the project. The process has involved some trial and error, with Hillaker utilizing some dentest tools he picked up at a garage sale, an old fillet knife and even a deer antler to shape the figure. "Actually, it's mostly hand work," he noted.

Hillaker's next challenge will be to create up the statue and transport it to Pontiac, where the figure will be re-created into a hard mold and then bronzed.

"It's expensive. It's probably going to take 3 or 4 grand, to re-mold it, and probably another 10 or so thousand to get it bronzed," he said. "It's quite a project. It should be quite a little draw for Elkton."

And although there were some who wondered how the statue would turn out, the finished work speaks for itself. "I had some friends, they were holding their breath, (but) they're confident now," Hillaker said.

So are members of the Oliver Township Fire Department.

"I knew Joe's work. That's why I called on him," said Champagne, a member of the department since 1976. "I think he's done an excellent job. The detail is great."

"He's fun to work with. If you have an idea or need a change, he's glad to do it," Champagne added. "He's done a bang-up job for us."

Champagne said the department has been planning the wall of honor for 5 years and held a number of fundraisers since 1997. "We wanted to honor the firemen from the past and the future," he explained.

The statue will be erected in front of a black granite wall where the names of all past and current fire fighters will be engraved.

Village preparing for new arsenic standard

Cass City Village officials are continuing their efforts to prepare for tougher federal guidelines reducing the minimum levels of arsenic allowed in public drinking water supplies.

Village Manager Frank Sheridan briefly updated the council Monday, saying he has met with 3 firms - Earth Tech Inc. of Grand Rapids, Spicer Group of Saginaw and Finkbeimer, Pettis and Stout of Detroit to discuss the village's concerns.

Those concerns focus on the village's ability to implement and pay for a treatment system that will reduce arsenic levels from an average of 16 parts per billion to the new minimum level of 10 parts per billion.

The previous acceptable level of 50 parts per billion was set in 1942. To put the levels into perspective, one part per billion is the equivalent of one drop of water in a 10,000-gallon swimming pool.

The new rule was initially approved by former President Bill Clinton during the final days of his administration. The Bush administration later suspended the order, citing at least \$200 million in new costs to local communities and questioning the scientific basis for the tougher standard.

However, a subsequent National Academy of Sciences report suggested that even 3 parts of arsenic per billion could increase the risk of health problems, including bladder and lung cancer.

In response, Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) officials early this year announced the tougher arsenic standard would go into effect by 2006.

The administrative guidelines for the revised rule have not yet been published, although a draft document is available, Sheridan told the council Monday.

"The draft document may place us in a lower priority category since our system services less than 3,300 individuals and our arsenic average is lower than 30 parts per billion," he said. "This will not allow us to ignore the new standards but may mean that we will not have to meet the January 2006 deadline for treatment."

Still, Sheridan recommended that the village move forward. "The sooner we put together a project

plan, the sooner, and more likely, it is that we can obtain some funding assistance.

"My goal is to present council with a proposed Request for Qualification (RFQ) at the May meeting," he continued. "The RFQ's purpose is to retain a firm that can do a feasibility study."

The new standard will apply to all 54,000 community water systems in the United States. The EPA estimates that roughly 5 percent, or 3,000 community water systems serving some 11 million people, will have to take corrective action to lower current levels of arsenic in their drinking water.

In Michigan, Department of Environmental Quality

(DEQ) officials estimate 450 water systems - about 15 percent of the state's total - will have to look at water treatment options.

The average cost for water that meets the new arsenic standard will depend on the size of the water system and the number of people served. Early EPA estimates placed the average household cost at between \$38 and \$327 annually for small community water systems.

Arsenic occurs naturally in rocks and soil, water, air and plants and animals. Higher levels of arsenic tend to be found in groundwater sources than in surface water sources of drinking water.

Compared to the rest of the

country, the western states have more systems with arsenic levels greater than 10 parts per billion, according to EPA statistics. However, officials noted there may be geographical "hot spots" where arsenic levels are higher than those typically seen in those areas.

Michigan's Thumb area is a good example, according to DEQ officials, who believe arsenic detected in the local groundwater supplies is related to the rock formations that underlie the area. Those formations run from the tip of the Thumb down into southeastern Michigan.

Summer work outlined

The belt tightening at Cass City Schools will be felt in work projects this summer. Supt. Ken Micklash revealed plans for school maintenance at the regular meeting of the school board Monday, April 22.

Projects this summer are expected to cost in the neighborhood of \$30,000 and a similar projection for work last summer totaled \$51,000.

However, this summer's program costs will increase as the school joins the Cass City Gavel Club in repair of facilities at the football stadium.

The restrooms at the stadium have never been able to function properly and are a mess, Micklash said. A new handicap accessible facility with proper drainage will be erected with the Gavel Club furnishing the labor and the school paying for the materials.

Asked how this dovetailed with the school's belt tightening, Micklash said that even with necessary budget restraint, property must be maintained. You put off repairs and the time comes when they must be made and taxpayers ask why the problem wasn't taken care of previously.

In addition to the new restrooms a new concession building will be erected. Unlike the present building, the new building will be in compliance with health de-

partment regulations.

Projects outlined for this summer include:

At Deford-replace floor tile in kindergarten room, \$2,200.

At Campbell Elementary and Early Childhood Center-replace windows in kitchen, \$1,752; replace cafeteria floor tile, \$4,000, walkway between Campbell and childhood center, price to be determined.

At middle school-develop recreation area at flagpole location. This includes a decorated hard surface with

benches, \$14,000. Providing a left turn lane at a price to be determined.

High school-refinish hallway lockers, \$7,200.

These costs do not include general maintenance performed each summer by the school custodians.

A major capital improvement paid from the general fund is not included. It is payment for the 6,500 square foot addition to the elementary school. The payment is \$102,908 with 2 additional payments due in the next 2 years.

Gagetown special election May 20

Gagetown residents will be asked this month to approve a hefty tax increase to support village services, including restoration of a local police department.

The Tuscola County Scheduling Commission recently approved village officials' request to hold a special election Monday, May 20.

Residents will be asked to approve 2 separate proposals, including 3.5 mills to fund a police department, which was eliminated last summer when former Chief Ken Currey resigned. Gagetown officials are asking for another 3.5 mills to pay for

public works expenses. If approved, the combined 7 mills would generate about \$20,000 and cost the owner of a home valued at \$60,000 an additional \$210 in taxes annually.

The village currently levies 15 mills, although the actual tax has been 13.3808 mills due to a Headlee rollback. The council recently voted to levy the full 15 mills, an increase of 1.62 mills, which will generate an additional \$5,000.

Cass City police officers made more arrests for drunken driving last year, but there were fewer serious crimes, vandalism complaints and traffic accidents in the village.

The local law enforcement statistics are part of Cass City's 2001 Annual Report, reviewed by the Village Council Monday night.

Overall, activity for the local department was up in 2001 - 2,267 calls for service compared to 2,061 in 2000 and 2,130 the year before. Deputy Police Chief Craig Haynes noted the department's overall rate of crimes solved was above average compared to the

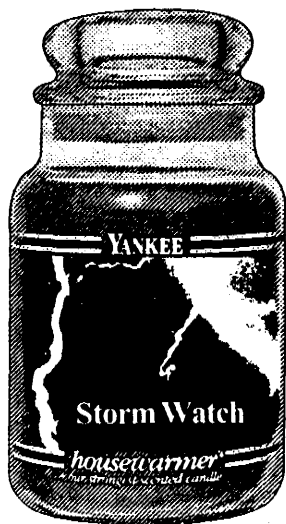

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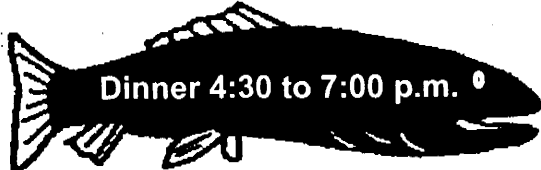
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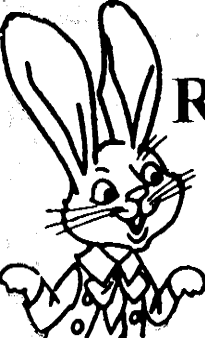

You wouldn't want to plan an evening there in a tux, but it was a satisfactory lunch. Total cost was \$26.35, plus tip. Give it a 7 on the 1-10 scale.

WHY REDUCE STAFF?

In light of the announcement that our school will be reducing one administrative position, some people have asked questions about why we are scaling back. The primary concern that needs to be addressed lies with our future. Currently, the state has informed schools that they can expect a \$200 per student revenue increase for next year. For Cass City Schools, this equates into a \$316,600 (1583 students x \$200 = \$316,600) increase in revenue. But with our current \$11.3 million budget and projecting a 4% increase in expenditures for the upcoming year, we can expect about a \$452,000 increase in spending for 2002-03. Simple math tells us by doing nothing and increasing spending by \$452,000 with anticipated revenues only rising by \$316,600 a \$135,400 deficit would result. Many school districts in our state are in financial difficulty. It is my hope that through wise planning, the Cass City Schools will not find themselves in that position in the future. Please be assured that our school is not in a financial crisis, but by scaling back now, through attrition, we can help to assure our district will not find itself in the negative financial condition that many state school districts are currently experiencing. Our community is fortunate to have excellent schools and it is our school board's intent to keep them academically and financially strong. Questions can be sent to me at 4868 N. Cell phones available for area seniors

The Tuscola County Sheriff's TRIAD and Sheriff Tom Kern recently announced the availability of free cell phones for senior citizens to use in emergencies during trips or vacations.

"The cell phones were donated by members of the Sheriff's TRIAD and Thumb Cellular and are to be used by seniors to dial 9-1-1 in an emergency while on a trip," explained Kern. "They are programmed only for calling 9-1-1."

"If you are planning a trip, you can stop by the Tuscola County Sheriff's Office during normal business hours and ask for a phone," Kern said. "We provide a charger for AC current and DC current in your car. All we ask is that you return the phone when you get back."

These phones can help seniors to call for assistance when they traveling through unfamiliar areas. Residents can request a phone by calling (989) 673-8161. When the automatic answering system begins, press 7, then 2 or 3, which will connect you to the sheriff or undersheriff.

"We look forward to providing another means for senior citizens to protect (themselves) while traveling," Kern said.

It's fitting that Dorland Kuntz' resignation letter was more than the usual sorry to be leaving and thanks for the memories that mark the ordinary notices of departure.

Dorland went into detail about his career in teaching and the reasons why he was "very proud to say that I have been part of one of the best educational systems in the state of Michigan" and then detail the reasons why.

The letter is characteristic of his career at Cass City Schools. Whatever the task before him, he gave more to it than was necessary.

My first glimpse of Kuntz on the job was in his teaching days when he was one of the chief negotiators for the teachers in lengthy bargaining sessions with the persons representing the school board.

While he probably wasn't the most skilled negotiator, (he was too blunt) no one was better prepared. He spent untold hours on the job.

As he moved up the ladder, nothing changed. He still offered his opinions regardless of the circumstances, including challenging members of the school board. In his retirement letter he was critical of other schools jumping on the bandwagon and adopting new methods of teaching. "I commend the board of education for the foresight and planning which has preserved a strong basic education for the district."

Blunt and to the point. No one spent more time in the school building than Kuntz. He was a fixture at boys' and girls' basketball games and in the press box at football games. It was no surprise to see him at the recent benefit for Ryan Storm and Alison Emmert.

If it was a general school function it was a 100-1 shot that he would be there. Spending his time, doing more than was necessary.

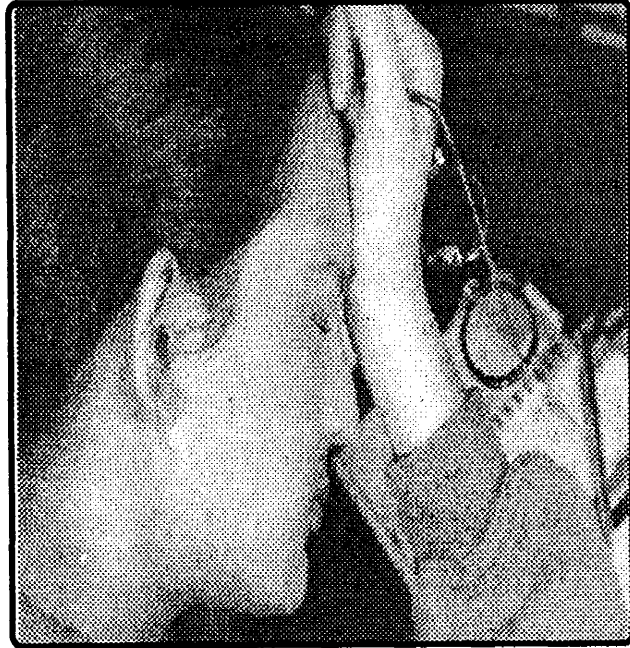

Every Cass City High School student has the opportunity to earn a \$2,500 scholarship award from the state of Michigan. This money will be sent to the college that the student chooses. The way the student can do this is by taking and passing the MEAP test with a level 1 or level 2 score. To be eligible, a student must take the MEAP High School Tests in mathematics, reading, science, and writing. Last week and the rest of this week the juniors at the High School have been taking this test and hope to earn the money when they graduate.

The MEAP mathematics test is an untimed test that evaluates the abilities to solve problems, make connections, reason, understand concepts, and carry out procedures in mathematics and communicate. This test is made up of multiple-choice and constructed response questions.

The MEAP science test evaluates the abilities of students. This untimed test is arranged in clusters. Two clusters for Life Science, Earth Science, Physical Science, along with two integrated clusters which are a text-criticism cluster and an investigation cluster. The test also has 13 independent multiple-choice items. The multiple-choice items challenge the students to apply fundamental scientific concepts, principles, and processes to select the correct response. These questions are shifted toward depth of understanding instead of trivial bits of scientific information. Constructed Response items allow the students to show all they know in any way that they can, using sentences, phrases, lists, pictures, or diagrams.

Reading is also an untimed part of the MEAP test. This part has 2 parts to it. Part 1 requires the student to read several selections linked to a common theme and answer multiple-choice questions about these selections. Some questions will deal with only one reading selection. Other questions will make connections between two or more selections. These questions cover all aspects of reading, which are: determining plot, setting, main idea, analyzing characters, making comparisons and drawing conclusions. Part 2 of the reading test presents a situation or

scenario to think about and a question related to the scenario. The student is asked to write a one to four page essay responding to this question, using information from the part 1 reading selections and the student's own ideas to support the position taken on the scenario question.

The only test that is timed is the writing part of the MEAP test. This test also has two parts to it. Part 1 is on-demand reporting and reflecting. Students report, reflect, and respond to a prompt that asks them to write about some aspect of their own writing, in general and specific to a piece(s) of their writing portfolio. This piece will be scored as a first draft. Part 2 is composing and communicating meaning. Students are asked to respond to a prompt that connects to an open-ended theme or concept, and invites them to write about it or of their own experience and observation. This piece will be scored as a polished draft.

The last part of the MEAP test is social studies. This consists of history, geography, civics, and economics. All responses in this test will require students to remember what they have learned and to analyze information presented by the prompt. There are 3 parts to this test: selected, constructed, and extended. The selected part is multiple-choice. Constructed is when the student has to generate a reply that they have created based upon their prior knowledge and information presented in a prompt at the time of testing. The last part is extended. This is where the students compose an essay that addresses a public policy issue. In order to receive full credit for their answer, the student must include what they know from history, geography, civics, economics, and their understanding of core democratic values of American democracy in their response.

If the student doesn't pass all of the test the first time there are at least 2 other chances during their senior year to retake the parts that they didn't pass so they can get the scholarship before they graduate. Many students at the high school feel that this test is very important even though it takes a long time and a lot of hard work.

Four times a year students from each of the 4 Cass City school buildings are selected to receive the Red Hawk Award of Excellence. The students are selected for outstanding contributions to the school or the community. The award can be earned for leadership, community service, outstanding behavior or academic excellence.

That means, says supt. Ken Micklash who conducts the award ceremonies, that only 16 students are selected each year.

The final award winners of the year were feted Monday, April 22, and received congratulations from the school board.

Selected from Deford Elementary School was Katherine Woodruff, daughter of Kelly and Charles Woodruff, Cass City. Her teacher, Ashlie Chappel, says that Katherine demonstrates the pillars of "Character Counts" - trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and citizenship - on a daily basis. She is a leader who can be trusted to help fellow classmates. Katherine is the second member of the family to earn the award. In October, 1998, her sister, Megan, was honored.

Zunaira "Zuni" Jilani, daughter of Mohamad Asma Jilani, Cass City, was chosen from Campbell Elementary building. Zuni is an excellent student who, her teachers say, is a role model for other children.

She is a talented artist and was one of 5 Campbell students to have art selected for display in the regional competition at Saginaw. Then her art was selected to enter state competition in Lansing.

Already, Zuni has decided on a career. She wants to be a teacher - an art teacher, naturally.

From the middle school Chelsea Israelson, daughter of Kevin and Deborah Israelson, Cass City, was honored. Her teachers say that Chelsea is a super all-around student that practices the 6 pillars of character daily.

She is ready to help anyone at any time. She does the best she can in all she attempts in and out of school.

Noah Gould, son of Todd and Tara Gould, Cass City, is a well-rounded student with a 3.750-point average. He played football, baseball, soccer and track and has been involved in weight lifting.

He has been involved in school musicals and National Honor Society and attended Rotary Leadership Camp. He is involved in his church youth group and participated in several missions.

He was successful in a long campaign to earn an appointment to the U.S. Naval Academy. It's something I always wanted to do, he said.

I was approached by some parents of school children and residents of this community to run for the school board of Cass City Public Schools. While I was collecting signatures for my nominating petitions, I listened to the concerns aired to me and promised to bring these concerns before the board before the election.

On April 22, 2002 I proposed that a committee be formed to ensure that the current way Cass City Public Schools calculates grade point average or the ranking of the students in their graduating class was both fair and in the best interest of the students.

Note that a lengthy discussion followed with views from members of the school board, teachers, administrators and concerned residents were heard. In the end Michelle Biddinger made a motion to air a public meeting on this issue. The motion was seconded by Theresa Rabideau.

Household waste collection set for residents

Tuscola County Recycling officials are looking for residents to participate in the facility's household hazardous waste (HHW) collections in May.

The program is being offered to residents in Tuscola County in an effort to reduce the waste going into landfills as well as the negative impact these products can have if mingled with the regular waste stream.

Residents will be required to pre-register and be assigned an appointment in order to participate in this program, but all information will be kept confidential. The deadline to register is Friday, May 3.

Due to budget limitations, participants will be accepted on a "first come, first served" basis. A charge of \$2 for up to 50 pounds and \$5 for 51 to 100 pounds of material will be collected at the time of collection.

"These materials need to be diverted from the regular waste stream for various health and environmental reasons," said Sharon Mika, recycling coordinator. "If a rubbish handler unknowingly spills a container with corrosive fluid they pick up at the curb, their health and physical abilities may be permanently changed. If these materials make it into our municipal landfills, they can mix with other chemicals and cause the containment systems to fail and then leak into our drinking water supply."

"Residents should feel encouraged to dispose of hazardous materials they have in their home through a HHW program," Mika

added. "Not only is it safe, but by getting rid of it now, the homeowner can prevent a future accident, when a pet or small child comes in contact with these products that are often poorly stored in a basement or garage."

Residents are urged to contact Mika to register or for additional information by calling (989) 672-1673.

Corn industry gets boost

In a show of overwhelming support for ethanol, the U.S. Senate recently voted 88-11 in favor of a renewable fuels standard in the Senate Energy Bill.

The Renewable Fuels Standard (RFS) begins this year with at least a 2 billion-gallon ethanol usage requirement, and increases annually until reaching a 5 billion-gallon minimum usage in 2012.

The ethanol industry is projected to more than meet the RFS 2002 requirement as the nation's 61 existing plants can produce more than 2.35 billion gallons a year. Production capacity continues to grow, with 14 plants currently under construction, representing more than 400 million gallons of additional annual production when completed.

The new plants include Michigan's first value-added ethanol plant. Michigan Ethanol, LLC, is building a \$55 million, 40-million-gallon ethanol processing facility in Caro that will utilize an estimated 14.3 million bushels of corn annually.

"Through our partnership with the National Corn Growers Association, the nation's corn states won a colossal victory with the passage of a renewable fuels standard," said Jody E. Pollak, Michigan Corn Growers Association (MCGA) executive director.

"This renewable fuels standard will more than double the amount of ethanol being used by the year 2012. It's about time this fuel gained serious market share, decreasing national demand for foreign oil while improving agriculture's economy."

Key issues of the RFS include: *Creation of a production floor anywhere from 25 to 40 percent higher than previous law.

*When fully phased-in, the

RFS will increase domestic corn grind for ethanol from 700 million bushels in 2002 to 2 billion bushels in 2012. *It's possible that a significant amount of the new ethanol production needed to meet the 5 billion gallon RFS will come from farmer-

owned ethanol production facilities, the fastest growing segment of the ethanol industry today.

*A 5 billion gallon RFS will add thousands of new jobs and billions of dollars to farm income over the next decade and beyond.

Academic Track was coordinated by Kathy Milligan with the help of several members of the middle school staff.

Modified soybeans focus of research

Small soil animals fed genetically modified soybeans showed no difference in health or reproductive ability from those fed conventional soybeans, according to research studies done at Michigan State University (MSU).

Roundup Ready soybeans, which are genetically modified to resist a specific herbicide, were fed to a common type of soil invertebrate, collembola (springtails), to study the effects of the soybean on its life cycle. Collembola were fed diets of a conventional soybean variety, the genetically modified Roundup Ready soybeans or a 50-50 mixture of the two genotypes.

A control group was fed brewer's yeast, the staple laboratory food for collembola. MSU soil scientists and zoologists monitored the animals for their growth and development, survival, egg-laying ability and egg hatching rates.

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires the use of collembola in tests when seed companies apply for certification of genetically modified crop varieties such as Bt (insect-resistant) corn. The EPA mandates an observation period of 28 days.

To address potential long-term, cumulative effects, the MSU studies were expanded beyond the EPA requirements to 150 days. Three successive generations of collembola were fed the various diets.

Renate Snider, MSU zoologist, and Alvin Smucker, MSU soil scientist, said results from the studies showed that a diet of Roundup Ready soybeans had no adverse effects on the growth, reproduction or survival of the soil animals. The scientists concluded that, in this study, there was no significant difference between soybean varieties developed by biotechnological methods and those developed by conventional plant breeding programs.

This study has shown that there are no short-term nor long-term effects of eating Roundup Ready soybeans on successive generations of these common soil animals.

A ground-breaking ceremony was held early last week, with owners Jim and Debra Kranz digging up the first shovelful of soil at the site, located south of M-81 between Good Shepherd Lutheran Church and the former Sherman's Restaurant.

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May 5-11 Arson Awareness Week

Every fifth fire reported in this state is an arson or suspicious blaze. During 2000, there were 3,189 intentionally-set fires. Another 6,527 suspicious fires were reported during that same year.

To focus attention on this devastating crime, Governor John Engler issued an official declaration designating May 5-11, 2002 as Arson Awareness Week in Michigan.

Arson is a serious problem in Michigan and property isn't the only thing destroyed by suspicious fires. In 2000, 42 people died and another 130 individuals were injured in such blazes.

In 2000, the dollar loss of arson and suspicious fires totaled \$197 million. These loss figures do not include indirect costs such as medical care, funeral expenses, temporary shelter, business interruption, demolition, fire investigation, prosecution, court proceedings and incarceration. Arson also has a significant impact on what Michigan residents pay for insurance.

The Michigan Arson Prevention Committee, in conjunction with the State Fire Marshal, urges all citizens to fight back against this devastating crime.

One way citizens can help fight this crime is to report it. Since 1975, the Michigan Arson Prevention Committee (MAPC) has adminis-

tered a statewide tip reward program to help put arsonists where they belong - behind bars. Arson has paid out \$525,300 in rewards since its inception. The program has led to the arrest of 1,011 individuals on arson and related charges during that same time.

Arson Control pays up to \$5,000 for information that leads to the arrest and/or conviction of arsonists. Any citizen who has information about an incendiary or suspicious blaze can call 1-800-44-ARSON.

Although not all arson fires can be prevented, there are some precautions property owners can take to deter fire setters. MAPC officials suggest:

- Always keep entry doors and garages locked
- Keep yards well lighted
- Make sure property is free of trash and debris
- Report all suspicious activity to local law enforcement officials.

The Michigan Arson Prevention Committee (MAPC) is the state's front-line task force against arson. The group is comprised of representatives from police and fire services, the insurance industry, business and government.

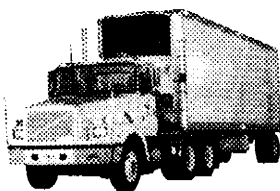

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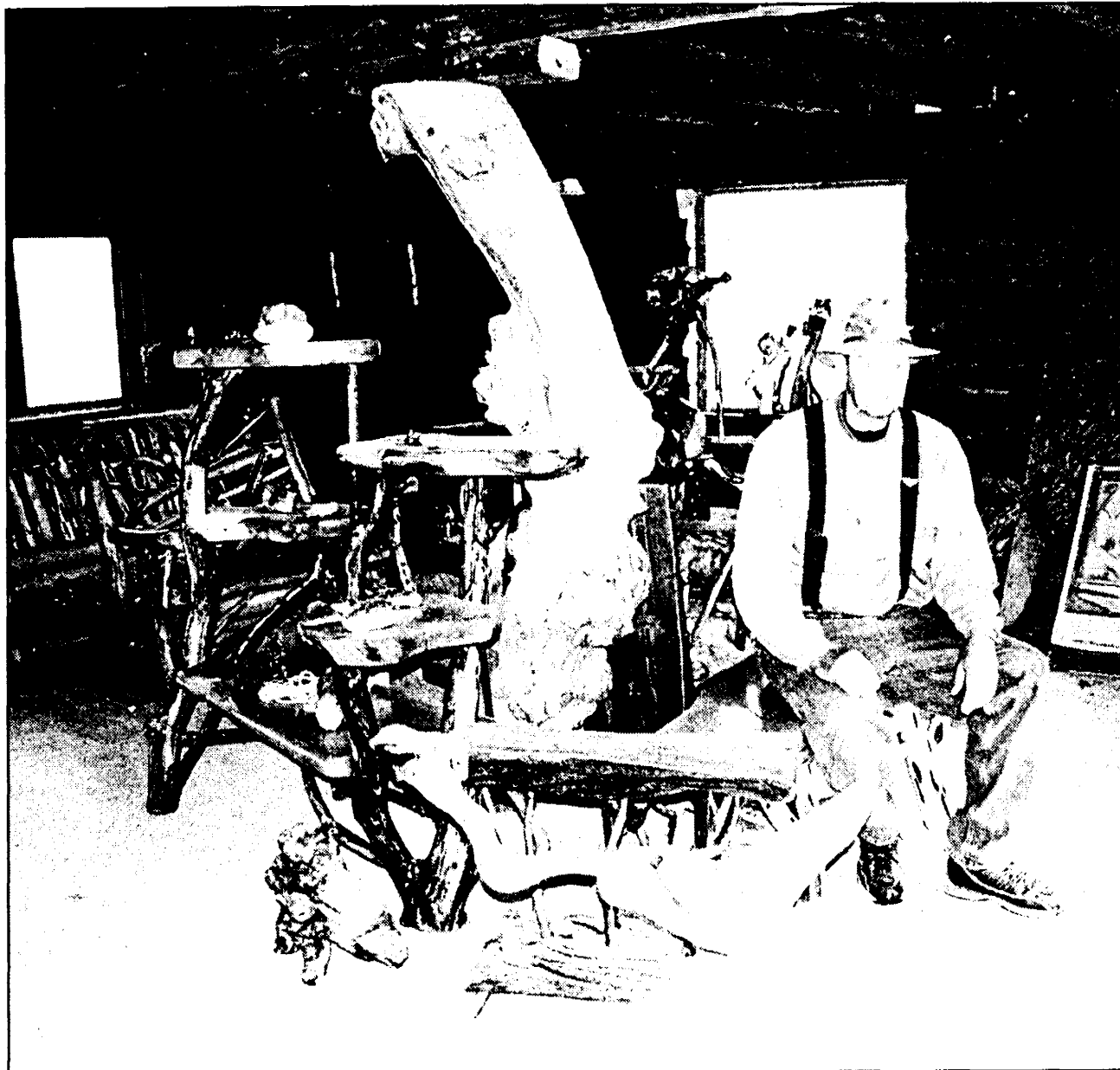

As for Hillaker, the self-taught craftsman enjoyed his first serious experience with clay. "This is a total flip-flop for me," he said. "I don't have any idea where this might take me. It's been interesting."

Working with clay has also opened up another avenue for Hillaker, who started years ago by crafting natural wood limbs into furniture. In time, he taught himself the art of carving wood and, eventually, stone.

Hillaker said he'd like to work with clay again in the future.

"I wouldn't want to do a steady dose of it, like anything else," he added. "It keeps me alive - to be able to jump over (to something else) - otherwise I'd burn out."

levy increase would enable officials to break even, something the village has not been able to accomplish in each of the past 3 years. The problem, he explained, is revenues simply have not kept up with expenses, and there is no fat in the budget, which includes the pay for the village's one full-time employee.

Wright said the village took in \$116,000 about 10 years ago, compared to anticipated revenues of \$106,210 in this year's budget. The lion's share of the revenue, about \$45,000, is generated by local taxes. State Shared Revenue accounts for another \$40,000.

Expenses, meanwhile, are set at \$119,910, including \$45,750 to run the village's public works department. That leaves an anticipated deficit of nearly \$14,000 this year.

Thumb area law enforcement community in 2000, the latest year for which statistics are available.

In 2001, Haynes reported, there was an overall decrease of 2.6 percent for Class I Crimes, including assault, burglary, larceny, malicious destruction of property and drugs. "An increase was shown in burglary for 2001, (but) the department has cleared by arrest the major-

ity of B & E complaints," he said.

Haynes noted larceny complaints were about the same, while incidents of damage to property and vandalism, as well as delinquent minor complaints decreased.

The number of traffic accidents was also down, but arrests for drunken driving were up, and the department stepped up traffic offense-parking enforcement. Haynes reported that most of the motorists stopped by officers - 70 percent - receive a verbal warning.

"The greatest increase in calls for service were in General Assistance-Non Criminal," he continued. "General assistance includes suspicious situations, escorting businesses to the bank, probation supervision and handgun registration."

The Cass City Police Department has a full-time staff of 4 officers and a part-time staff of 8 officers, all of whom are certified by the Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement Standards. The department operates 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

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Colorful dyeing projects

Projects to keep kids busy when it rains

It's the age-old rainy day dilemma: how do you keep the kids busy when it's pouring outside? For the next damp day, forego hours of television reruns and brighten things up with colorful dyeing projects. Not only are dye projects simple, inexpensive and fun, but they give kids a chance to show off their imagination and artistic flair.

Here are a few projects to keep up your sleeve for the next storm.

Play Clay - whip up some colorful home-made clay in no time

* Mix one cup cornstarch and two cups of baking

soda in a saucepan.

* Stir in 1 1/4 cups cold water and one tablespoon of corn oil.

* Stir in one tablespoon of desired dye color.

* Cook over medium heat, stirring continuously, just until mixture has the consistency of slightly dry mashed potatoes. (Mixture will come to a boil, then start to thicken, first in lumps and then in a thick mass; it should hold its shape).

If overcooked, finished crafts may crack.

* Cool on a plate covered with a damp towel.

* When cool enough to handle, knead until smooth and begin making clay creations - animals, people, jewelry - you name it.

* Air-dry crafts overnight on wire racks, turning occasionally or to oven-dry: preheat oven to 350 degrees F, place on a wire rack on a cookie sheet, turn off oven and let items dry until oven is cold.

* To preserve projects, coat with a clear acrylic finishing seal.

* Tips: Creations can be glued or tooth-picked together for durability; store unused play clay in air-tight container or heavy plastic bag in a cool place for up to two weeks.

Popsicle stick art

* Make a concentrated dye bath by mixing one box or one-half bottle of dye mix in one pint very hot water.

* Immerse wooden Popsicle sticks completely in dye bath. Longer immersion will result in deeper color.

* Remove sticks, rinse, and allow to completely dry.

* Seal with varnish or polyurethane if needed or desired.

* Dried sticks can be glued together in square forms to make items such as picture frames, boxes, or houses, or glued to tin cans to create unique pencil holders.

Tips for easy clean-up
* Cover work space with plastic drop cloth and/or newspaper.

* Wear rubber gloves to protect hands.

* Be sure to have plenty of sponges and paper towels on hand.

* Dress the kids in old clothes or have a smock or apron.

* Do not dye in a fiberglass or plastic sink that may stain.

* Clean containers and sinks immediately after dyeing by scrubbing with hot water and powdered cleanser or bleach. If dyeing in a washing machine, follow up by running a full cycle in an empty machine using hot water, detergent and bleach.



Can cause serious injury

Caution needed with garage doors

When it comes to garage door safety, the whole family should be involved. While children seem most vulnerable to garage door injuries and accidents, adults can also be injured if they do not take some basic precautions around their garage doors.

You may not think of your garage door as a potential for injury. But, as the home's largest piece of moving equipment, an improperly maintained garage door system can cause serious injury or even death. All family members should make garage door safety practices a top priority. Teaching your children and reminding adults in the home about some basic safety practices can greatly reduce the chance of anyone's being injured.

* Teach children that the garage door and operator are not toys. Teach children that playing "beat the door" (trying to

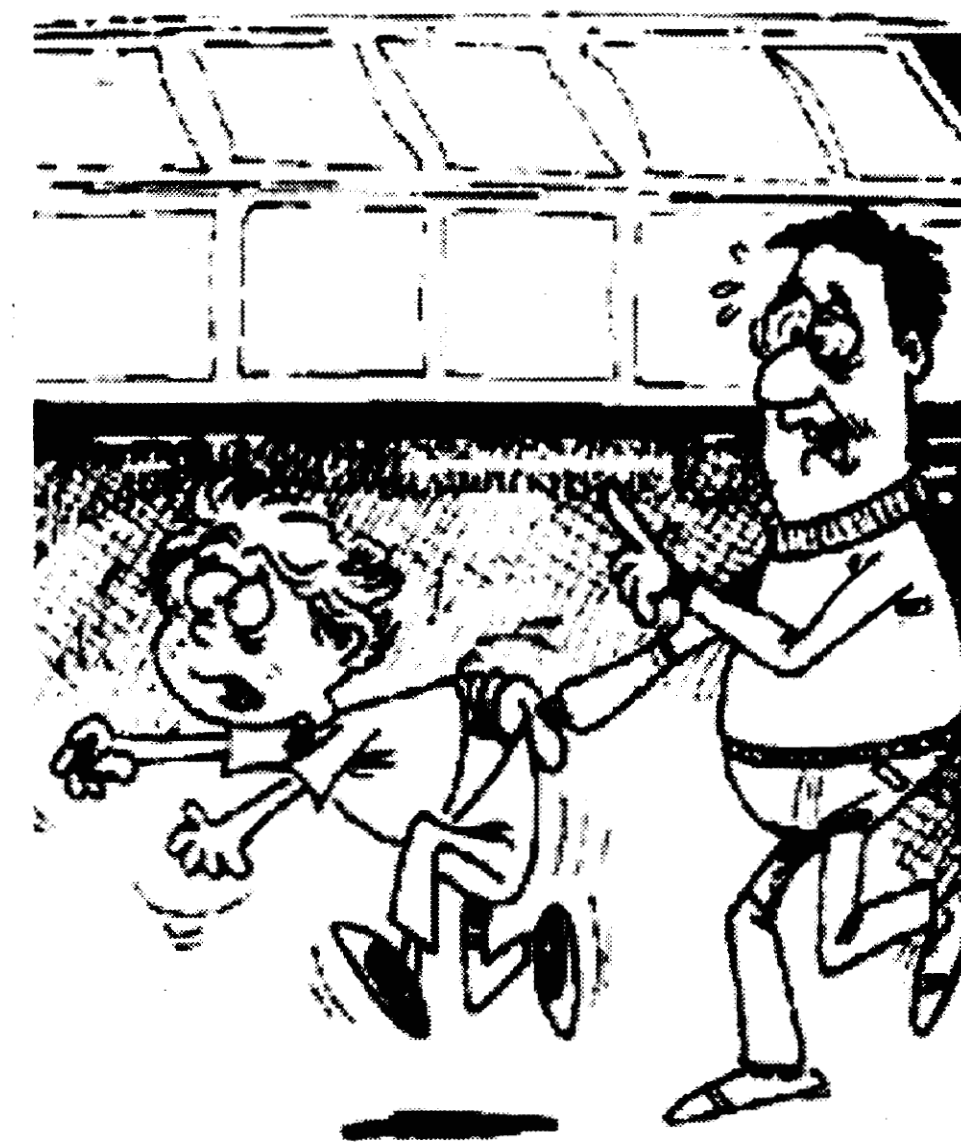
get in or out of the garage before the door closes) is not an acceptable game and could lead to a serious injury, or even death. On that same topic, don't let anyone - adults included - stand, walk, or run under a moving door. Use proper closing procedures and set an example for all family members.

* If there is an accident, family members need to be prepared to react. Every electric garage door operator is equipped with a red emergency cord. This cord allows the door to be opened manually in the case of an emergency or when the electricity fails. Make sure everyone in your house knows how to use the emergency release.

* Parents and adults should keep transmitters and remote controls out of reach of children. Be sure to mount the push-button wall control well above curious young heads - at least five feet from the floor and away from all moving door parts.

* When closing a garage door by push-button or transmitter, watch in order to see that nearby children and pets do not get in the way of the moving door, and to make sure the door stays closed.

* In addition to practicing safe measures around garage doors, it's important to maintain the mechanics of your garage door. Repair and adjustments should only be made by someone trained and qualified to do so. Springs and other door parts can cause injury if someone who is not familiar with these parts tries to make repairs. If you have questions or think your door needs to be repaired, contact a qualified door repair service company.



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"Weekend warriors" are injury prone

(TF) - While the number of "weekend warriors" who choose to perform home improvement projects on their own has grown dramatically during the years, unfortunately, so have the number of injuries.

Spending on home repair and remodeling materials is expected to reach approximately \$170 billion this year from about \$105 billion in 1990. While doing that work last year, homeowners sustained more than 300,000 injuries.

However, there's no need for homeowners to throw in the towel, says Payne. He stresses the importance of safety when undertaking any home improvement project. - * Always read the manufacturers' instructions before using any equipment and heed all safety warnings.
- * Always wear safety goggles to protect eyes from debris.
- * When working around



electrical outlets, shut off the electricity. Cleaning or working around these areas could result in an electrical shock.

- * Wear heavy gloves to protect hands when working with sharp objects.

- * Dress appropriately for the project. Long pants, long-sleeved shirts and proper footwear can help reduce injuries from flying debris. Also make sure long hair does not interfere with the work.

- * Increase ventilation in the workspace to reduce fumes and dust.

- * Wear a mask to reduce dust- and particle-inhalation.

- * Keep tools away from children and pets.

- * Store tools properly and keep them in good, working condition.
- * Use tools only for the purpose they are intended.

"Knowing the correct tools to use and how to safely use them are two things that every do-it-yourselfer should learn before beginning a home improvement project," Payne says.

"In addition to using common sense, homeowners should also

That made it ideal for us in our retirement years ahead, the Guinthers said.

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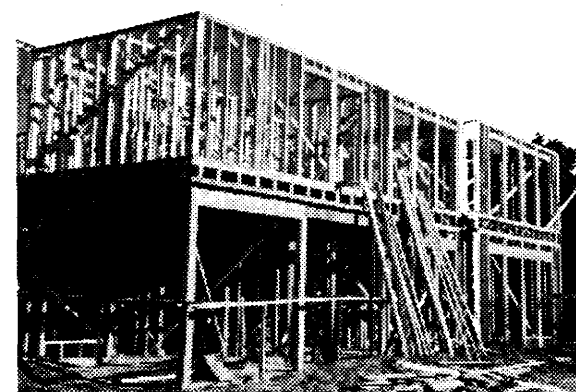
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Rug buying tips

Remember - the rug must fit the room

An 8 by 11-foot rug or larger can cover an entire room, smaller area and scatter rugs can be ideal for adorning smaller spaces - a hearth, a bedside, the area in front of a kitchen sink - with a splash of color and warmth.

• You've got to hand it to machine-made rugs. They may look strikingly similar to the handmade kind, but they're usually much less expensive. • Watch out for fringe elements. If the rug you like has fringe, make sure it's sewn on well and very carefully use the vacuum cleaner. • Don't be boxed in by the idea of getting a rectangular rug. A circular or octagonal-shaped floor covering can add flair.

• Remember to take a swatch of any fabrics you'd like to match with you when shopping for a rug. That way, you'll have a better idea of what will complement your existing decor.

• Don't underestimate the value of an underlayment. Not only will it absorb the impact of feet and noise, but it will also reduce wear and tear on the rug and make vacuuming easier.

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Edible film wrap keeps food fresher

Almost everyone loves the taste of home-grown, straight-from-the-garden fruits and vegetables, but keeping them fresh and tasty can often pose a challenge. Perhaps you've struggled with refrigerator crisp bins or are in the dark about whether to freeze certain foods. Oftentimes such questions lead would-be gardeners to turn in their shovels and opt for ready-to-eat products they can find at the local supermarket.

Recently, however, a new innovation from developers at the U.S. Department of Agriculture Agricultural Research Service (ARS) has made it possible to keep food fresh while not compromising taste. Edible film wraps made from purified fruits and vegetables can add shelf-life and tantalizing new flavors to lightly cut produce.

The wraps look like a sheet of paper and can be made in a variety of thicknesses, according to Dr. Tara McHugh, a research food technologist with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, who invented them. They are opaque and take their color from the material used. Strawberry wraps are red and broccoli ones are green - and essentially any type of fruit or vegetable can

be used.

Lab studies have shown that the new wraps work as well as synthetic ones for protecting oxygen from reaching the wrapped food. Once oxygen gets into the food, spoilage usually occurs. When applied to cut apples, the fruit/vegetable films controlled browning and prevented moisture loss better than several types of coatings.

Because the wraps are made from all-natural products, they are intended to be eaten with the food they are protecting. This can lead to an added benefit - the wraps can provide new flavor enhancements to favorite foods. Placing a strawberry film on cut bananas could yield a tasty treat, or an apple film on a glaze on pork may liven up conversation at the dinner table.

Purified fruit sheets are not a new discovery - they have long been available as snack foods. The kind that you'd likely stick in a child's school lunch. However, this is the first time the product has been explored as a storage and flavor option. ARS has recently applied for a patent on the edible films.

Though the films are in development and may reach consumers in the future, until then, gardeners should continue to explore the traditional ways of produce storage. That doesn't mean, however, that you can't ponder the flavor combinations that can be created by using edible wrapping... here are a few to get you thinking:

• Apple Carrots - A flavorful way to enhance a side dish at your next holiday gathering.

• Orange-Strawberry Bananas - Create a favorite "smoothie" flavor at home without the mess.

• Strawberry Toast - Save the jam for another day, add just a hint of flavor to your breakfast treats.

• Apple Pie - Place an apple film over a rice cake or granola cracker and have a low-fat snack.

• "Strawberries and Cream" - Prevent your vanilla pudding from developing that rubbery layer in the refrigerator by placing a strawberry film on top.

* Be particularly aware of surrounding terrain which may cause rainwater runoff into your landscape.

* Look for cracks on interior and exterior walls and along the foundation's perimeter for clues to drainage problems.

* Check rain gutters for good drainage and adequate size to handle the rainfall in the area.

* Be sure that solid surface areas like driveways, patios and walks are graded away from the house.

RETAINING WALLS

The main purpose of retaining walls is to prevent unnecessary soil erosion. Replacing a retaining wall can cost you tens of thousands of dollars, so check these items carefully:

* What type of materials are used in the retaining wall and how old are they? Concrete railroad ties last about 15 years; CCA-treated landscape timbers about 20 years. Masonry can last for centuries if properly installed, but missing mortar may mean the wall is structurally weak.

* Walls higher than 4 feet should be engineered by a professional. Are engineering drawings available and certified by an approving authority?

* Is there adequate drainage through the walls? Solid masonry requires "weep" (drainage) holes equally spaced along the base of the wall.

FENCES

Fences are the ideal tool for security and privacy. Some municipal codes require locking fences for homes with swimming pools. Here are some other questions to keep in mind:

* What is the general repair of the fence? Are posts, rails, pickets and hardware free of rot and rust? Are wood products made from rot-resistant timber?

* Is there a clear space between the bottom of the fence and the soil's surface? Wood fencing will wick moisture into the pickets if they come in contact with the soil and metal fencing may rust more quickly.

TREES, SHRUBS, GROUNDCOVERS AND LAWNS

With new homes, many landscape plantings (called softscape) may be too close to the foundation. This can cause future problems when the plants (and roots) mature.

* Full-sized, quality landscape trees should

be no closer than 15 feet to the foundation or concrete drives and walks. Fast-growing and shallow-rooted trees should be much further.

* Watch for messy fruit, nut- or seed-producing trees close to driveways, walkways, pools, ponds and patios, or plants that can outgrow their locations.

OTHER THINGS TO CONSIDER

* Water — Pools, fountains, ponds and bird baths are attractive features for your landscape, but they may also require a lot of maintenance. Check these features carefully to decide whether you want the additional effort and expense.

* Lighting — Lighting can provide security and beauty, but some systems can cost a lot of money if repairs are needed.

* Unwanted landscape visitors — Some environments are conducive to unwanted visitors from nature. Your potential home could be visited by deer, raccoons, coyotes and other wildlife.

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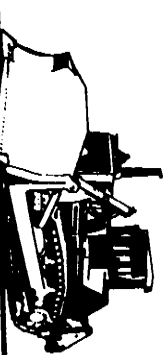
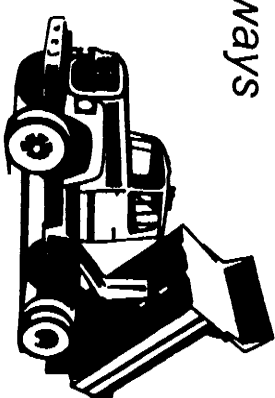


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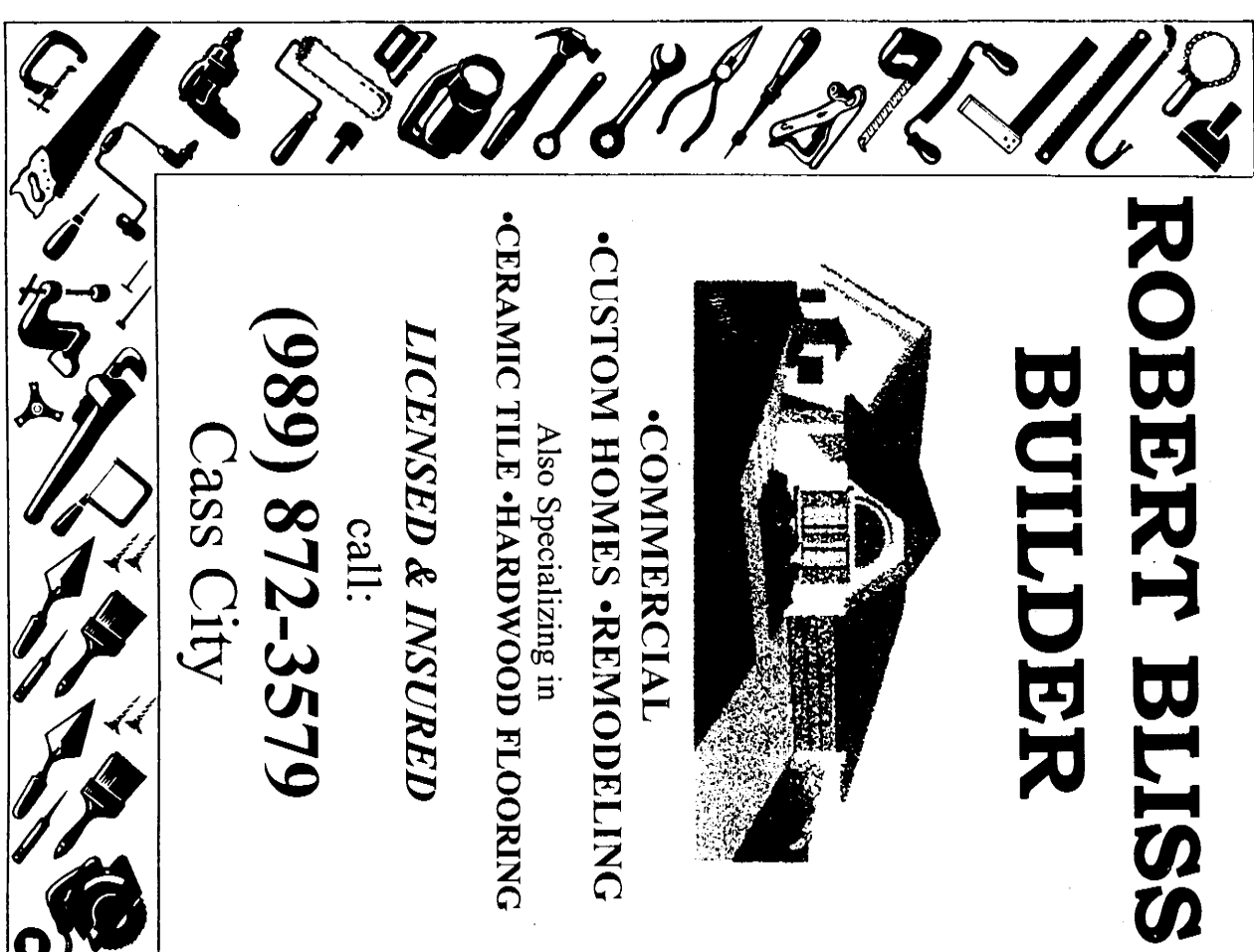
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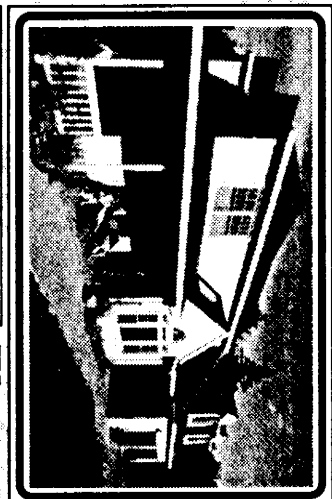
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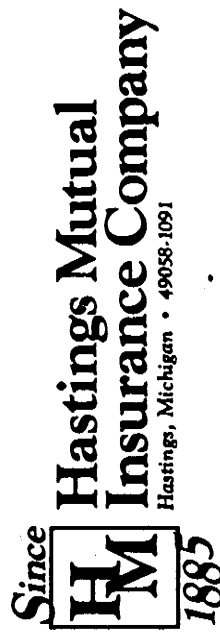

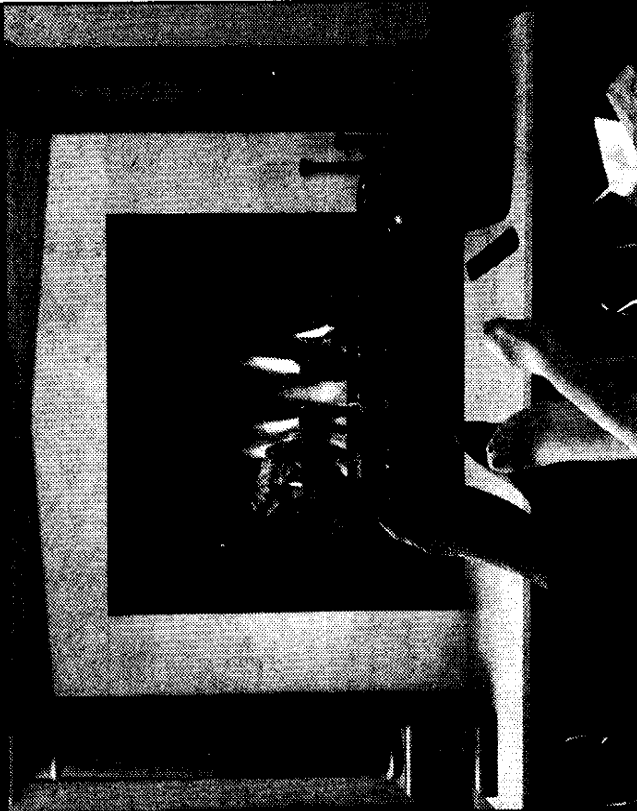
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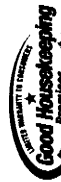
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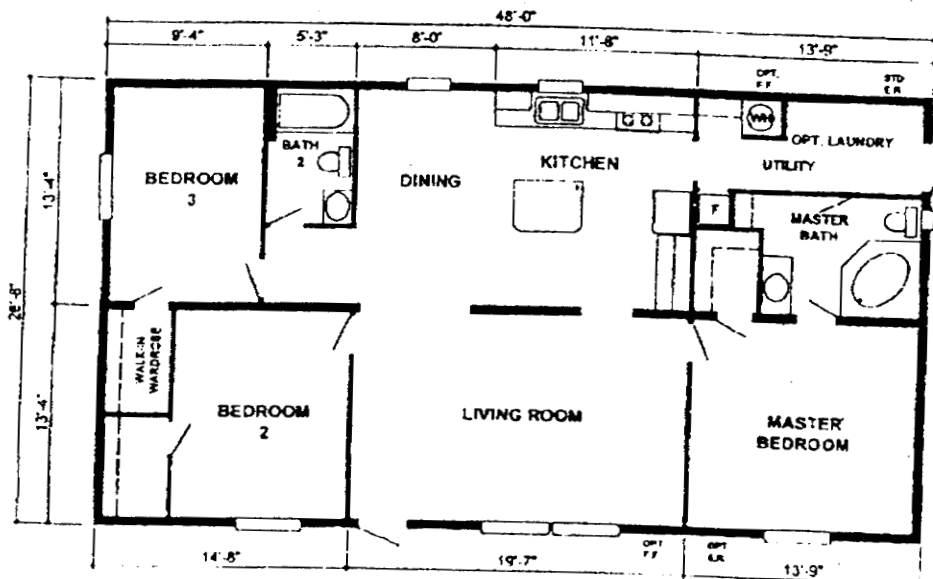
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Check landscape before buying new home

Cleaning up tips

Graffiti not just big city problem

(TF) — Some call it artwork while others call it a mess. Yet no matter what you call it, graffiti probably won't be going away too soon. Not just the invention of troublesome adolescents, graffiti has been around long since before the first spray paint can was designed and used.

In fact, the term "graffiti" has its origins in the Italian verb *graffio*, which means "to scratch or graze," and was first used by archaeologists to designate informal writings on ancient tombs and monuments. Everything from ancient hieroglyphics to a child's careless scribbles on the living room wall can be considered a form of graffiti, however nowadays the term often describes vandalism — the defacement of a storefront or public wall.

The most common form of graffiti is the spray painting of a "tag" or name on the walls of public or private property. Teens or gang members sign their names on the walls to mark their territory or so that others will know they've been there. Graffiti is not just a large city problem. Areas all over the country can experience this vandalism as well.

Lawmakers have tried to

find ways to stop graffiti, including creating age requirements for the purchase of spray paints and requiring that spray paints be kept under lock and key at neighborhood stores. However, these methods are not completely effective in preventing vandalism. In fact, many vandals have turned to "scratchiti," etching the same markings they would have made with the paint into glass or plastic windows. While graffiti continues to be a problem, there are ways to clean up the mess that has already been made and possibly prevent new ones. Here are some tips, from Salt Lake County's Division of Economic Development & Community Resources, for rallying your community to fight back against graffiti.

ORGANIZE THE NEIGHBORHOOD

Many residents may be happy to help clean up the community. Hold a neighborhood meeting to solicit volunteers.

* Before cleaning up, always get permission from the property owners in your area.

* Divide the neighborhood into small manageable areas of a few blocks.

* Assign an area coordi-

nator who is responsible for identifying groups to clean graffiti during weekends and weekday evenings when necessary.

* Inspect each area at least once a week and remove new graffiti within 24 hours of its discovery.

* Be prepared to increase your efforts as the weather gets warmer.

* Solicit area businesses and residents for donations of paint, rollers and other supplies.

CLEAN-UP SUPPLIES

Depending on the surface where the graffiti was applied, there are several ways to remove the vandalism.

* On metal, aluminum siding, fiberglass, glass or plexiglass, use carburetor cleaner.

* On stucco, use paint remover; wash off with a high-pressure water hose; or use stucco paint to cover graffiti.

* On brick, cement or concrete, use extra-strength paint remover or graffiti remover, applied with a wire brush. Allow to dry, then rinse with a forceful stream of water.

DETERRING GRAFFITI

Take these steps to prevent future vandalism:

- * Eliminate large writing surfaces by planting clinging ivy which will cover the surfaces.
- * Make walls dark.
- * Block access with thorny bushes.
- * Install motion-detecting lighting.
- * Maintain your property.
- * Increase police patrolling.
