TI Group moving lines to Mexico

A restructuring effort by TI Group will result in the relocation of about 50 jobs from the company's Walbro Engine Management plant in Cass City to Mexico, company officials have confirmed.

The Chronicle was unable to reach engine management President Andrew Masterman at the firm's corporate headquarters in Tucson, Ariz., on Friday, and Masterman was in Asia on

Crash claims Burk

Decker resident Alvin R. Burk, 75, was killed and his wife, Juanita, 73, was seriously injured in a 2-vehicle traffic crash Monday night.

Michigan State Police troopers from the Caro post said Alvin Burk's eastbound vehicle collided with a westbound tractor-trailer on M-81 near Ringle Road at about 7:19 p.m.

The driver of the tractor-trailer was identified as Kevin L. Mlujeak, 36, of Bay City.

Mrs. Burk was air-lifted by FlightCare Helicopter to Covenant Cooper Hospital in Saginaw, according to troopers, who said Mlujeak sustained a minor injury in the crash, which remains under investigation.

Tuscola County Sheriff's deputies, Vassar Ambulance personnel and the Fairgrove Fire Department assisted troopers at the scene.

However, Ann Guernsey, director of human resources, said the layoffs, which are expected by early November, are the result of the company looking to move in a new direction for production of carburetors for large, 2-stroke engines.

Guernsey said the production of Mercury carburetors and mechanical fuel pumps will be transferred to Nogales and Los Mochis, Mexico. "We're shifting...dying product lines out of the Cass City facility, so the Cass City facility can focus on the future, which is electronic fuel injection," she said.

Company officials said they expect the mechanical fuel pumps to be phased out altogether in 3 or 4 years.

Walbro Engine Management, a unit of TI Automotive, is the world's largest manufacturer of small engine carburetors for hand-held power equipment, and a ma-

Council may adjust millage rate

Cass City officials will consider adjusting local tax levies during a special meeting next month.

The good news for residents is that those adjustments are not expected to translate into higher tax bills next year.

Village Manager Frank Sheridan offered some recommendations during the Village Council's monthly meeting Monday night after sharing updated county figures on the village's taxable income base.

Including Kingston man French honor veterans

While Americans everywhere will remember U.S. servicemen and women during Memorial Day observances over the weekend, a host of former soldiers were honored earlier this month by the French government.

Kingston area resident Charles Nizzola was among those presented with "Thank You, America" certificates during a ceremony hosted May 8 by Michigan State University.

The certificates are meant to express the gratitude of the French people to the Americans who participated in the Normandy landings and liberation of France, on French territory, and in French territorial waters and airspace between June 6, 1944, and May 8, 1945.

Nizzola recalled he served 3 years with the 8th Air Force - the "mighty 8th", in 1943-45.

Nizzola, a gunner, flew 35 missions with the 73rd Squadron, which was part of the 458th Bombardment Group.

According to an historical account compiled by George A. Reynolds, the group's first combat assignments came Feb. 24 and 25, 1943, as diversions to draw enemy fighters away from Germany while other units struck deep into the Nazi homeland.

Reynolds said the unit won no citations or decorations from the USAF or 8th Air Force, although it took a

spending plan is based on several sources of revenue, Sheridan said.

"Looking only at the property tax revenue and using the rates we taxed at last year, the general fund will receive \$58,719 less than we expected and the street fund will receive \$6,096 less," he added.

Sheridan suggested that the council could recoup the loss by increasing the street fund tax levy, now set at 3.5 mills, while reducing the village's

debt service levy, currently set at 2.5 mills.

That option has been made possible by past council action to make larger than required debt service payments, which are used to pay off construction of the village's wastewater treatment plant. In fact, that debt will be paid off this year, some 16 years early and at an interest savings of nearly a half-million dollars.

Gagetown officials watched a \$13,000 anticipated budget deficit melt away Monday night as village residents said "yes" to 7-mill tax increase during a special election.

Residents approved the tax, which will be levied in the years 2002 through 2011, on a vote of 52 to 37.

"I was tickled to death," a jubilant Village President Charles Wright commented Monday night, noting residents' support will mean reinstatement of the local police department as well as a much more stable financial footing for the village as a whole.

"We're in the process of getting a new well and getting grants for that, and if you have a \$13,000 deficit, they don't look too kindly on that," he added. "At least now they can say we're trying."

Half of the new millage will be used to fund the police department, which was eliminated last summer when former Chief Ken Currey resigned, citing differences of opinion with the village council.

The other half of the tax will go to fund public works expenses.

During the village's millage campaign, a few residents initiated a campaign of their

own, collecting petition signatures in support of an effort to prevent Gagetown officials from re-hiring Currey.

However, Wright indicated that effort will not have an impact on who the village hires, largely because a number of the signatures were from individuals who don't live within the village limits. "We just put them in a file," he said. "Those petitions had names from all over. To me, it isn't even legal."

The combined 7-mill tax will generate about \$20,000 and cost the owner of a home valued at \$60,000 an additional \$210 in taxes annually.

Special meeting set June 11

School to fill vacancies

A special meeting of the Cass City School Board set for Tuesday, June 11, at 7 p.m. took on new significance following decisions reached at the regular meeting of the board Monday.

At the special meeting a new high school principal and principal-athletic director are expected to be hired. There are 12 applications for the high school principal to replace retiring Dorland Kuntz.

A committee will interview the candidates and if one is head and shoulders above the rest his or her name will be submitted to the board for approval. If there are several nearly equal candidates they will appear at the special board meeting.

Also to be decided will be a pair of proposals brought

before the board by Supt. Ken Micklash. The superintendent suggested that Kuntz be given \$10,000 for 250 hours of work to smooth the transition of duties to the new principal.

George Bushong, former computer teacher who resigned last year, was given \$10,000 helped in the transition of his work to the new teacher. His contract was for one year only and will not be renewed.

Michelle Biddinger asked that a decision be delayed until it's learned if the new principal hired will need help. David Knight asked Kuntz if he would be available up to June 20 when his career ends and Kuntz said that he didn't want to make that commitment.

If you can find someone

who can do the job that's all right with me and it will be first come, first served for any job offer, he said.

Another long debate followed the proposal to hire Lyle Severance as a computer consultant to replace the service provided by the Tuscola Intermediate School District last year.

The job is for 2 days a week and Severance offered to do the work for \$38 per hour. The ISD contract calls for a payment of \$45 per hour.

Micklash estimated that the switch could save between \$5,000 and \$7,000 a year. Kristy Hamrick who is the full time technical support teacher at the school leans toward keeping the ISD contract. They have more people

Memorial Day rites scheduled

Cass City area residents will take some time out Monday to remember all of the brave men and women who have served their country.

Memorial Day services will be held over the holiday weekend in Cass City as well as Novesta and Grant townships.

Those ceremonies will no doubt include a time of remembering the victims of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks on America and the servicemen and women who subsequently put their lives on the line to wage a war against terrorism.

"It's still pretty fresh in peoples' minds," said Jack Esau, who along with his fellow Cass City VFW members will join forces again to erect the local post's "Avenue of Flags", an impressive 215-flag display honoring deceased area veterans.

It's a display area veterans are proud to share with their community. "You know, a lot of towns don't have anything," Esau said of Memorial Day observances.

Esau, who served in the U.S. Marine Corps during World War II, has seen many comrades succumb to age and illness, but he's confident that Cass City's tradition will live on for many years to come. "I don't think we have to worry about that. It's like running the country; if your back is up against the wall, somebody always (steps up) and fills in."

Monday's observance in Cass City will begin early, with VFW members setting up the flag display, according to Esau. "Weather permitting, we will put the flags out in Cass City, Novesta and Gagetown," he said.

The annual parade featuring the Cass City Schools band and veterans will get underway at 10 a.m., starting at the Chemical Bank parking lot. "All veterans are welcome and we will provide rides," Esau noted.

A ceremony will follow at 10:30 a.m. at the Elkland Township Cemetery. The Rev. Eric Holmgren will be the guest speaker. A similar ceremony is scheduled for 1 p.m. at the Novesta Township Cemetery south of Cass City.

The 63rd annual Grant Township Memorial Day Service is scheduled for Sunday, May 26, starting at 2 p.m. at the Grant Township Cemetery, located on Bach Road, Gagetown.

The Owen-Gage Schools band will perform and march throughout the cemetery along with area veterans and scouts. Steve Bouverette of the Community of Christ Church will be the guest speaker.

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

and coupons are redeemed at authorized markets for Michigan fruits and vegetables. The coupons are distributed by the Huron County WIC program.

The program's nutrition education class is provided by Michigan State University Extension. Following the class session, each family receives \$20 worth of coupons to be redeemed at a farmers market. Huron County markets include Recker's Fresh Vegetables in Ubly, Errer Farms in Bad Axe, and Rievert Farms in Bay Port.

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
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Rabbit Tracks

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

A REALITY CHECK ABOUT COLLEGE ATHLETES

The following information was taken from an NCAA source and I found it to be quite interesting.

Points to consider for high school coaches, parents and athletes:

- 11,999 of 12,000 high school athletes will never play college sports.
- Only about 1 athlete in every 10 high schools will play sports in college.
- Less than 1% of high school athletes receive scholarship money to play sports in college.
- Four things most college programs look for when scouting high school student-athletes:
 1. A good academic background, including good GPA and ACT scores.
 2. A good all around attitude ranks immediately behind academic credentials. Is the student athlete coachable, do they possess a good work ethic, and do they have a positive influence on their teammates?
 3. Does the student athlete have good character? Those student athletes likely to be untrustworthy, who have trouble following rules, or are likely to get in trouble with the law, usually pose too many risks for the college program.
 4. Athletic ability is also vitally important, but ability alone is no guarantee one will be recruited by a college athletic program.

Airports in Tuscola and Huron to receive funding

A state bond program approved last week by the Michigan House of Representatives will aid runway expansions at Huron County Memorial Airport in Bad Axe and the Tuscola Area Airport in Caro.

House Bill 4454 makes \$1 billion available over the next 5 years to increase security and ensure the safety of passengers at more than 90 Michigan airports, according to Rep. Tom Meyer.

"Improving airports on such a wide scale signals the importance the state places on safe, reliable transportation for people and goods," Meyer said. "This program ensures Michigan remains well connected to the state, national and global network that relies on the speed of air travel to conduct business quickly and efficiently."

"The commitment to get all of the airports operating to

their highest potential will maximize opportunities for further growth and achievement in Michigan."

The measure uses \$5 million of the airport parking tax collected at Detroit Metro Airport to support \$60 million in state bonds. The bond revenue will then help the state leverage \$160 million annually in federal funds for the next 5 years. Combined with private and local funds, more than \$1 billion will be available for airport improvements.

The Huron County Memorial Airport will receive state funding totaling \$250,000 to construct a taxiway and rehabilitate a runway, part of its \$2.39 million project.

Tuscola Area Airport will receive \$110,000 toward its \$1.79 million project to extend a runway to accommodate corporate and business aircraft landings.

The bill now moves to the Senate for consideration.

Cass City set to host MML meet

Cass City will host the 2002 Region V Meeting of the Michigan Municipal League (MML), today (Wednesday)

starting at 10 a.m. at the Detroit Edison Service Center.

Mayors, village presidents, council members, managers and other officials from cities and villages in Tuscola, Huron, Sanilac, Lapeer and Saint Clair counties will be attending the annual meeting.

This year's program will address some of the complex challenges confronting local units of government today. The topics for the program are: A Legislative Update (issues include sewer liability, infrastructure funding, local rights of way, municipal finance and annexation and detachment changes); Municipal Liability in Basement Flooding (P.A. 222 and its impact on Michigan municipalities); and Downtown Improvements and Funding.

Region V officers are: chairman, Frank Sheridan, Cass City village manager; and secretary, George Fisher, mayor pro tem of Marine City.

The annual MML Regional Meeting provides a forum for discussion, an update on critical issues and an opportunity for municipal officials to exchange information about common concerns. It promotes awareness and offers ideas for improving the

The Honda Civic Hybrid, which runs on electric power and gas, went on sale at dealers last month. It promises to be one of many alternative fuel cars offered by major manufacturers in the years ahead.

It's predicted that Americans will be buying a half million gas-electric cars from all manufacturers in 4 or 5 years.

Right now, the hybrid car gets 45 to 51 miles per gallon, reduces pollution and is said to get 600 miles on a tank of gas.

The Honda hybrid costs \$2,500 more than the same car with a conventional engine.

Even if I could get the hybrid in my car at no extra cost, I'd be hesitant. My luck with vehicles that weren't tried and true hasn't been something to write home about.

Two disasters come immediately to mind. The first goes back over 60 years, when I drove the family car back when kids driving cars at 12 years old or younger was not unusual.

The family had a Terraplane, a car manufactured by the Hudson Car Company, which became Nash Motors, which became American Motors Corporation, which became Chrysler Corporation. We called it the terrible pain.

Now this car had some good features, but reliability wasn't one of them. It was as fast as anything on the road when it ran. The trouble is when there was any hint of rain it stopped. We pushed it once across Woodward Avenue in Detroit.

The new technology in the car was shifting gears with the shift mounted on the steering wheel much like the shifts on automatics today. The difference was that these units were merely transferring the shifts from the floor to the steering column. The difference also was that the new fangled shift didn't always work.

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I get a kick out of Jerry Baker's gardening tips on public television. He's just full of little tricks to help your plants.

If you haven't seen Baker's show, you might have to bear with me for a paragraph or 2. The best way to explain it is to say he doesn't do anything the county agent recommends.

Baker gardens by the seat of his pants. Everything comes right out of the kitchen - or the bathroom. His "Timely Tree Tonic", for example, consists of one cup of beer, 4 1/2 tbsp. of instant tea, one tbsp. gelatin, one tbsp. baby shampoo, one tbsp. ammonia, one tbsp. whiskey, and one tbsp. hydrogen peroxide.

He sprays plants with mouthwash, fights moles with tobacco sauce, and fertilizes roses with dog hair and banana peels. And don't forget the Epsom salts. Epsom salts are good for lots of things.

That's all fine and dandy, but I'd like to know how this man discovered these helpful remedies. Very few universities are researching dog hair and banana peels right now.

I suppose a fellow might be soaking his feet in the yard when he accidentally spills some Epsom salts in the flowerbed. Or he's sitting in the roses, eating bananas and combing his dog when he suddenly realizes how much roses like banana peels and dog hair.

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

Veteran teacher Mastie retiring after 32 years

Hip surgery and the complications that followed forced Jim Mastie from his classroom at Cass City Middle School for most of the 2000-01 school year.

It might have been a good time to retire — Mastie had already given some thought to closing out a career in education spanning more than 3 decades — but the veteran instructor wanted to leave the classroom on his own terms.

"I didn't want to leave teaching because of my health. I wanted to retire enjoying what I do and have done for many, many years," Mastie commented Friday. "This is my job. I wanted to be here for the kids."

"I wanted to end it like I have for some 30-some years."

Mastie will do just that at the end of this school year, and school officials, students, athletes and parents will honor him at an open

house scheduled for Wednesday, May 29, from 4 to 7 p.m. in the middle school media center.

Mastie spent virtually his entire 32-year career in Cass City, where he also devoted 21 years to coaching various sports.

A native of Vulcan, Mich., a town of about 700 people in the Upper Peninsula, Mastie began his teaching career in Wisconsin after earning his bachelor's degree at Northern Michigan University, where he majored in physical education and minored in biology.

"I had the job of a teacher who was on a leave of absence, and he came back. That left me out, so I started sending out resumes," he recalled, noting he spent one year in Wisconsin.

Mastie received a call for a job interview in Cass City. He had never heard of the town, but he drove down in July 1970, stopped in at what

is now Mr. Chips (across from the Chronicle building), changed his clothes and went to meet with then-intermediate school Principal Bob Stickle.

After the interview, Mastie met with both Stickle and then-Supt. Don Crouse. "I can remember Mr. Crouse — he turned the contract (on his desk) around and said, 'if you want the job, it's yours.'

For Mastie, the job and the community turned out to be a perfect fit, not only for him, but also for his family. He and wife Marilyn, an Ubly native and fifth grade teacher at the middle school, have raised 2 children, both former Cass City High valedictorians. Son Nathan is employed at Menlo Logistics in Troy, and daughter Janis is a senior at Saginaw Valley State University.

"I was impressed with Cass City. It was a nice town, and I didn't want to teach in a big city," he said. "I'm a small town guy — I still am — this was my kind of town."

Mastie also found that his first experience in the classroom, with junior high students, was also a perfect fit for him as a teacher.

"I guess I just kind of fell in love with it," he recalled. "It's a difficult age. The kids are wanting more independence. They have their good days and their bad days, but they're still not too old to say I know it all. They're still willing to try to do their best."

Mastie figures his students would consider him to be strict in the classroom, but he has also worked to be fair with each student. "I'm a very organized person. I've got everything in its place and a place for everything," he said, "and I guess that's the way I go about teaching."

Mastie, who teaches science and language arts, has also used his love of sports to contribute to the school district. Over the years he has coached JV boys basketball, assisted with the varsity girls softball team, and coached varsity girls basketball, freshman football and junior high basketball, football and track.

"I've always enjoyed that," he said. "It's been in my blood all my life."


Now, with his career winding down — 12 days or about 79 hours to go as of Friday, he joked — Mastie reflected on what he will miss the most when the school year comes to a close.

"You get into teaching because you're working with the kids. I've enjoyed all the years," said the veteran educator, who still remembers the teacher who inspired him to pursue a career in education. "I guess it would have been my eighth grade social studies teacher. I really liked social studies and I really respected the man."

Mastie noted the many friendships he's made with colleagues and others over the years have also made teaching a very satisfying way to make a living. "That's probably going to be one of the hardest things" to leave, he said.

Even after he retires, Mastie will have a close link to the middle school because his wife will still be teaching there. "This is her 30th year, but she says she's not ready (to retire) yet," he said, adding 32 years is enough for him.

"It seemed like a good number," he joked. "It was just time. I'm ready to go on and see what happens down the road."

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

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

Cass City Village Manager Frank Sheridan said the company still plans to install about \$1 million worth of new and replacement equipment at Cass City plant, a move related to the new focus on building electronic fuel injection systems.

The village council recently established an Industrial Development District for Walbro Engine Management, paving the way for company officials to request a tax abatement of 50 percent for up to 12 years on the additional equipment.



Michigan Department of Transportation officials are looking for groups or organizations that are interested in "adopting" sections of highway in the Thumb area.

MDOT's "Adopt-a-Highway" program is an effort involving volunteers who maintain roadways by picking up trash and litter. The goal is to keep roadsides clean and attractive.

Doug Wilson, manager of the Cass City Transportation Service Center, recently outlined the program with the following questions and answers:

What is adopt-a-highway?

Participants adopt a section of state highway roadside to clean up over a 2-year period. A minimum 2-mile stretch of road is recommended. All types of state highways may be adopted, including 2-lane roads, limited access highways, boulevards and business routes.

Who's eligible?

Just about any group of at least 6 people and 3 backup participants. It's a great opportunity for all types of organizations, including scout groups, church groups, teen groups, small and large businesses, clubs, service organizations and senior citizen groups. Crew members must be at least 12 years old, and children between the ages of 12 and 15 must have adult supervision at a ratio of one adult for every 3 children.

What's required to participate?

Your time and effort. Participants are asked to pick up litter a minimum of 3 times a year from the highway roadside in their designated areas. The goal of the program is to clean the roadsides before mowing cycles and tourism periods (April through October). Designated pickup dates and times will be determined by MDOT at the beginning of each year to facilitate and schedule pickup of bagged trash.

Is there a fee?

There is no fee required to participate. Requests for specific roadside areas will be handled on a first-come, first-served basis between you and a local MDOT district coordinator. All attempts will be made to match you with your first choice, or a segment that is closest to your community.

An important note about safety - all Adopt-a-Highway participants are required to conduct a safety meeting once a year before pickup. All participants are required to wear an orange vest while working along the roadside. Once your group is issued an Adopt-a-Highway permit, MDOT will provide additional safety information, including rules and a videotape.

In addition, your group will receive a certificate of participation to display in your lobby or business.

How are roads assigned?



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

NOTICE OF PROVISIONS OF THE WEED ORDINANCE

TO: All owners, occupants or possessors of land in the Village of Cass City

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that in accordance with Ordinance Numbers 51 and 142 of the Village of Cass City. All noxious, poisonous or injurious weeds, or other weeds, grass or brush exceeding a height of (12) inches upon any property, in the Village of Cass City shall be cut down, destroyed or removed, as the case may be, to prevent growth in excess of (12) inches.

In the event the owner or occupant, or any person; persons, agent, firm or corporation having control or management of any lot, place or parcel of land within the Village of Cass City shall fail, refuse or neglect to comply with the above mentioned noxious, poisonous or injurious weeds or other weeds, grass or brush exceeding twelve (12) inches to be cut down, destroyed or removed.

A charge of **\$40.00 per hour** shall be charged for cutting, destruction or removal of same and will be levied and collected against such property in the manner provided by Local and State Law: Property Owners **shall not be notified** prior to the Village taking action to maintain the property. All charges assessed shall be considered a lien on such property.

This provision for weed control shall be in effect from **May 22, 2002** through and including **October 1, 2002**. Such weeds must be cut by the property owner, tenant, or occupant of the property on or before **June 1, 2002**, and again thereafter on or before **August 15, 2002**.

In accordance with Village Ordinances, property owners must maintain their properties at all times.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, the following lands shall be exempt from the provisions of this section provided that the owner of the land petitions for exemption from the provisions of this section in writing to the Village Manager of the Village of Cass City.

- (1) Undeveloped wooded areas where tree growth is in excess of ten (10) feet in height.
- (2) Undeveloped parcels of four and one-half (4 1/2) acres or more in non subdivision areas.
- (3) Lands where occupied lots have been developed without removing the original natural cover.

ORDINANCE N. 148

ZONING ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF ORDINANCES FOR THE VILLAGE OF CASS CITY BY RESCINDING SUBSECTION 1603(2)(F) FROM SECTION 1603, ACCESSORY BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES, AND ADDING A NEW SUBSECTION 1603(4) TO SECTION 1603, ACCESSORY BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES, IN ORDER TO EXPAND THE REGULATIONS PERTAINING TO RECREATIONAL EQUIPMENT.

THE VILLAGE OF CASS CITY ORDAINS:

Section 1. Amendment.

Subsection 1603(2)(F) shall be rescinded in its entirety and a new subsection 1603(4) shall be added to Section 1603, Accessory Buildings and Structures, and shall read as follows:

4. Accessory Buildings and Structures located in any RA, RB or MH District shall include recreational equipment and shall be subject to the following regulations:
 - a. Recreational equipment shall include, but is not limited to:
 - (1) Boats, large size floats and rafts, and boat trailers or similar transport vehicles.
 - (2) Folding tent trailers, pop-up trailers, and similar types of vehicles that are convertible in nature, mounted on wheels and intended for travel and vacation use.
 - (3) Pick-up campers, travel trailers, fifth wheelers, pull-behinds and similar vehicles designed primarily to be mounted on a pick-up truck or truck chassis, and intended for use as a temporary dwelling for travel, recreational and vacation use.
 - (4) Utility trailers or similar vehicles which are used to transport motorcycles, snowmobiles, go-carts, stock cars, or similar recreational vehicles.
 - (5) Motorized homes or similar vehicles which are used as portable dwellings and are designed and constructed as an integral part of a self-propelled vehicle.
 - (6) Motorized off-road vehicles, including but not limited to, motorcycles, snowmobiles, go-carts and stock cars, which are not licensed for general operation on public roadways.
 - b. The storage of recreational equipment shall not be permitted on any public street or public right-of-way.
 - c. Recreational equipment shall only be parked or stored within the confines of the rear yard and shall further respect any requirements related to distances from principal structures, lot lines and easements.
 - d. Recreational equipment may be temporarily parked, for purposes of loading, unloading and travel preparation, in any front yard set back area for a period not to exceed fourteen (14) continuous days. A new fourteen (14) day period does not commence until the recreational equipment has been absent from the front yard set back area for a period of at least forty-eight (48) consecutive hours.
 - e. Recreational equipment may be parked or stored in that part of the side yard that is not a part of the required front yard set back, provided the recreational equipment is no closer than three (3') feet to any principal structure and provided that such recreational equipment is adequately screened from view of adjacent property or public roadways.
 - f. No person shall permanently occupy, reside or live in any recreational equipment parked or stored upon any property within the Village. However, recreational equipment may be used for temporary occupancy purposes for a period not to exceed fourteen (14) consecutive days. A new fourteen (14) day period does not commence until the recreational equipment has been unoccupied for a period of at least seven (7) consecutive days.
 - g. No owner of recreational equipment, nor any property owner where the recreational equipment is parked or stored, shall permit any recreational equipment to hook, attach or connect to sanitary facility service leads or connections, whether such connection is permanent or temporary.
 - h. Recreation equipment that is parked or stored within the Village shall be kept in good repair and carry current license plates and registration.

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
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

available in an emergency and, of course, I'm familiar working with them. A decision will probably be reached at the special meeting.

CHALLENGES EVOLUTION

J. T. Mabe, pastor of an area Missionary church, objected to teaching the theory of evolution in the 7th grade at Cass City. Although the theory has been taught in the school, one teacher said, starting in the third grade, the pastor was objecting to the 7th grade book. It is only a minor part of the course, Middle School Principal Jeanne Lohela said, and it is always presented as a theory. Mabe asked trustee Randy Severance to have his objection a part of the minutes of the meeting and it was included.

OTHER BUSINESS

Principal Wayne Dillon made a presentation favoring the current marking system in Cass City. He said that the system awards students for hard work and this exceptional class had 13 valedictorians. It means automatic academic scholarships for 13 deserving students instead of just one, he points out.

Cass City uses the traditional marking system of A-B-C-D-F and does not include plus or minus in figuring grade averages.

He said that the top students in recent years have done very well. Only one of them has not completed his college education and most of

them have good jobs, he points out.

Dillon feels that without the financial help of scholarships that go to valedictorians some of these excellent students may not have been able to go to college.

Mickalsh said that at the next regular session persons with an opposing view will be able to tell why the school should switch to a 12-point grade system that would winnow the valedictorians down to a single winner instead of over 10 percent of the class.

Mickalsh announced that the Pinney Foundation has agreed to donate \$35,000 towards the erection of a new concession building and restroom facilities at the Cass City Recreation Park. The project is under the direction of the Cass City Gavel Club that is expected to help with the funding and provide volunteer labor. The school will pay for the cost of the materials.

The board made a change in the minutes of the last meeting eliminating that part of the vote concerning the forming of a committee to study grade point averages that read "and also obtain input from other schools on how to possibly revise the system."

It is expected that the issue will be on the agenda again at another future meeting.

Cass City will remain a school of choice for the 2002-03 school year. Students from other districts will be welcome except in grades 4, 6 and 8 that are full.

pay-off is \$245,000, and the village has nearly \$230,000 in the fund, which means the levy will total less than a mill this year.

Sheridan, who noted the village can levy up to 5 mills for streets without a vote, suggested that the council could increase the street tax to 4.4620 mills, for example, and reduce the debt service to one mill.

Under that scenario, he continued, the owner of a home, with a market value of \$80,000 would pay roughly \$738 in taxes this year, including the general fund levy of 12.4625 mills, compared to \$760 under the current millage rates. In 2003, he said, the council could increase the street tax to nearly 5 mills, and with the

elimination of the debt service tax, the same homeowner would pay about \$740 in taxes that year.

Sheridan noted his estimate assumes an annual increase of about 3 percent in the value of the home.

The village manager cautioned that the council may be forced to establish another debt service levy in the future to fund construction of a water treatment system to meet federal arsenic level guidelines for drinking water.

Council members agreed to consider Sheridan's recommendations during a special meeting scheduled for Monday, June 3, at 7 p.m.

In other business Monday, the council approved the re-appointment of Greg Biddinger to a 4-year term on the Tuscola Area Airport Authority Board.

could never figure that out," he continued.

Perhaps one of Nizzola's most memorable flights involved transporting gasoline for tanks used by Gen. George Patton's troops in France. Nizzola recalled another crew member was having trouble unloading the fuel, so he (Nizzola) went over to assist. At some point he looked down and saw Patton, who acknowledged his efforts and told him to "carry on."

"When I saw those 2 pearl handled (pistols), I knew who he was," Nizzola recalled.

He recalled wearing an anti-flak helmet and body protection, and a heavy fleece jacket that was later replaced with an electrically heated suit, a welcome change during flights when temperatures dipped to frigid levels.

Most of the missions focused on central Europe, he said, adding there were "milk runs" - missions that went smoothly - and then there were much more memorable flights. "The worst target was Berlin," he noted.

"When you went over there, you could get out and walk on the flak. Everything but the kitchen sink came up there."

"We never bombed Paris, and we never bombed the Autobahn in Germany. I
