

Jon Good, 34, of Cass City has been named the new Cass City High School principal, replacing veteran Dorland Kuntz who resigned. Official confirmation was to be voted at a special board meeting Tuesday. It had been previously agreed by the board that if the 3-person committee agreed on a candidate it would be accepted by the full board.

2 more requests on ballot

County looks to voters Aug. 6

Tuscola County officials are adding to an already crowded August primary ballot in hopes of securing additional funding to offset mounting expenses and the impact of a national recession that has translated into reduced state revenues for the county.

County officials recently approved a request to restore the county's original 4.2mill allocation, plus an additional half-mill for opera-

The action came following a comprehensive analysis of county finances, according to county Controller Mike Hoagland.

Hoagland explained the county's 4.2-mill allocation has been eroded over the past several years by the Headlee Amendment, which limits annual increases in property tax revenue to 5 percent or the rate of inflation, whichever is lower, plus new construction.

When property tax revenues exceed those limits, units of government are forced to "roll back" their millage levies. And it's accumulative, so once it's rolled back, that's your starting point the next year," said Tuscola County Equalization Director Schlichting.

Hoagland noted Tuscola County's original 4.2-mill allocation is the second lowest for general operations among Michigan's 83 counties. "So, we've done well with the financial capabilities we've been given."

Tuscola County's per capita taxable SEV (state equalized valuation) is \$17,000, according to Hoagland. In contrast, he said, the state average is \$25,000 per capita. Among neighboring counties, Sanilac County has a per capita taxable SEV of \$23,000, and Huron County,

nearly \$32,000. Because of the Headlee rollbacks, Tuscola County's allocated millage has been reduced to 3.94 mills. If voters approve the request to reinstate the full 4.2 mills, the county would levy an additional .2456 mills, which would generate about \$272,000.

For the owner of a home with a market value of \$80,000, the cost would be about \$10 a year.

The proposed additional half-mill would raise \$554,000, costing the same

The other half was transferred to a county building project designed to provide more space for storage, offices, district court and the prosecutor's office, although Hoagland said commissioners are backing off from the project a bit in light of the financially lean times ahead.

OTHER REQUESTS

Commissioners previously approved placing 3 other millage requests on the Tuesday, Aug. 6 ballot, including a pair of questions that would generate funding for the Tuscola County Medical Care Facility.

The requests are one mill for 15 years for a renovationexpansion project, and renewal of .25 of a mill for 5 years for equipment-capital expenses at the 44-year-old facility, which is located in

If approved, the renewal would generate about \$263,000 annually.

The new, one-mill tax would raise about \$1,053,000 the first year, according to county officials, who said the renovation-expansion project cost is estimated at just over \$10 mil-

The project calls for the addition of 20 beds in what will be specially designed unit for Alzheimer's patients.

Facility Administrator Margot Roedel explained the expansion stems from a substantial growth in the county's aging population and a corresponding increase in the number of residents with dementia-related diseases. In fact, she said, nearly half of the medical care facility's residents - 47 out of 123 - suffer from some form of dementia.

The third millage request will determine the future of the county's recycling pro-Residents will be asked to

approve .15 of a mill for 5 years, which would generate an estimated \$157,000 in the first year. If approved, recycling ser-

vices would be expanded to include document shredding, oil recycling, regular tire collections, electronic equipment and textiles. The household hazardous waste service would also be continued.

If the measure fails, commissioners have said they will close the county facility, located south of Caro at 1123 Mertz Rd. (M-24) in August. Since the facility opened about 6 years ago, commissioners have subsidized the program's budget by an average of \$40,000 a

Severance wins in Cass City

Few upsets in school elections

Upsets were few and far between in Monday's annual school elections in the Cass City area.

In the Cass City School District, voters reelected incumbent Trustee Randy Severance to his third 4-year term on the board of education.

Severance received 187 votes, while challengers Dawn Prieskorn and Larry Bogart garnered 138 votes and 39 votes, respectively. In all, 364 votes were cast in the election, a turnout of about 6 percent of the district's registered voters.

In a 5-way race for a pair of 4-year terms in the Owen-Gage School District, the winners were current board President Randy Howard and newcomer Jeff Leinweber. Leinweber received 97 votes and Howard, 81 votes.

Among 3 other challengers, Kathy Champagne garnered 40 votes, while Jeff Faist and Joan Koch each received 36

O-G faces red ink in new budget

The final budget for Owen-Gage Schools was received Monday just prior to the regular meeting of the board at Owendale High School. Superintendent McKenzie said he was very pleased to announce that the district ended the year in the black.

The audit showed that total expenditures \$2,384,695 and total revenues were \$2,385,960.The surplus of \$1,265 brings the fund balance to a healthy

\$578,353. The story is not as bright for 2002-03. The budget indicates that the school will end the year with a deficit of \$81,897, as total expenses are estimated at \$2,057,429 and revenues at \$1,975,532. Funding for special techni-

the elementary and second-

ary schools was eliminated

and several other planned

future purchases were taken from the budget. Delayed will be a replacement of a bus and replacement of tech equipment.

Because our taxpayers approved the bond issue, McKenzie said, we are proposing to set up a new computer center with new equipment. House Bill 6096, introduced by Rep. Tom Meyer, R-Bad Axe, makes delivery or manufacture of the drug a felony in Michigan and punishable by up to 20 years imprisonment. Possession of the drug would be a 10-year felony under the legislation.

"It is sad to say, but eestasy use is becoming more and more prevalent," Meyer said. "Too many people believe this drug doesn't cause any harm, but it has a high potential for abuse that can lead to severe psychological and physical dependence.

"We need to send a message that this is a dangerous drug, and one way of doing that is making sure the penalty fits the seriousness.'

Ecstasy is an hallucinogenic stimulant popular with adolescents and young adults who engage in the club, rave and circuit party

They try to schedule a job and many other activities going on over the summer, such as summer practices for upcoming sports. My summer job is a lifeguard at the Stevens Memorial Pool in Cass City. This is my second year as a lifeguard.

In order to be a lifeguard you have to be at least 15 years old and take classes to get certified. The first class you have to take is a lifeguard training class. I was fortunate to be able to take this class up at the pool. Grant Gould and Holli Cooper have their LGI, which is a certification that lets them teach kids how to be a lifeguard. Once you take the lifeguarding class, in order to keep the certification you have to take a test every 3 years. If you are interested in becoming a lifeguard, you can sign up at the Village of Cass City. A date has not been set for this class yet. The next class you have to take is a CPR class. You can also take this class from Grant because he also has his certification to teach CPR. The CPR class has to be retaken every year for someone to keep their certification. The pool opened on May 28 in order for the teachers to bring their classes. The pool is now on its normal schedule. Monday through Friday the hours are 1:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Early bird swim for these days is from 6:00 to 8:00 a.m. The early bird swim is for adults 18 and older. On Saturday early bird swim is from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. Open swim on Saturday begins at 11:00 a.m. and goes until 7:00 p.m. Sunday doesn't have an early bird swim. Open swim is from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. The first session of swimming lessons began Monday, June 10. If you would like to sign up for the next session for swimming lessons you can contact the Village.

Meyer announces free test kits to check arsenic Michigan residents can now contact their local health

department for a free arsenic test kit, state Rep. Tom Meyer announced.

Last year, the Legislature approved a program to help residents detect arsenic in drinking water, particularly in regions of Michigan known to have high levels of naturally occurring arsenic where households with private wells could be at risk. Those regions include portions of the Thumb area.

"Clean, safe drinking water is an overriding concern to all homeowners," said Meyer, R-Bad Axe. "Making the test kit available for free helps all residents learn if they are at risk from high arsenic levels, and indicate if corrective measures are needed.

"When it comes to health, there is no room for leaving people behind.' Arsenic occurs naturally in

Residents are required to pay about \$3 in postage to send their water sample to a lab for analysis.

The Michigan Department of Environmental Quality conducts the arsenic testing and provides residents with the results. People also are given educational materials about groundwater contamination and suggestions for reducing arsenic levels.

"Detecting the arsenic level in your home is only the first step in protecting your health," Meyer said. "Depending on the test results, homeowners will have to decide if further action, such as installing a filtration system, is necessary.

"That is part of the next phase of the state's program we are working on," he added. "Installing the proper equipment can be costly, so lawmakers are looking at ways the state may be able



Energy bill would cut sales tax

House Bill 6075, introduced by Rep. Tom Meyer, is part of a 6-bill House package to promote and develop new energy technologies in Michigan over the next 10

*Exempt the companies from general property tax until 2012; and

*Exempt use taxes charged on the purchase of devices that use alternative energy technology until 2012.

"I think people are tired of seeing me at their door," Hoyt joked of her efforts. which have fallen about \$1,300 short to-date.



Million dollar class

Local grads rack up big scholarship bucks

The Cass City High School Class of 2002 not only broke a record for most valedictorians - 13 in all this year - the class also smashed the alltime mark for academic scholarships.

This year's class of 124 students is cashing in on more than \$1 million in awards, according to Counselor Wayne Dillon.

"This was an outstanding class, I'm telling you," Dillon said. "Last year we had 103 graduates. We had 58 Michigan Merit (MEAP) winners, and that was \$145,000; the tuition and Michigan Competitive combined totaled \$34,000, local scholarships were \$50,000, and university scholarships were \$250,000 (for a total of) \$480,000."

This year's award totals are: local scholarships ---\$50,000; Michigan Merit — \$190,000 (76 students at \$2,500 per student); university scholarships -\$720,000; and Michigan Competitive — \$40,000.

"In addition, many students will receive financial aid based on family need," said Dillon, who noted a majority of this year's graduates plan to attend college.

In all, 66 (53 percent) plan to attend a 4-year institution, while 37 others (30 percent) will attend a 2-year college or trade school. Of the remaining students, 9 (7 percent) plan to enter the military, and 7 (5 percent) were undecided.



The Education of Mrs. Bemis by John Sedgwick: The main characters in this novel are Madeline Bemis, dowager of one of Boston's oldest Brahmin families, and Dr. Alice Matthews, resident psychiatrist at Montrose Psychiatric Hospital. Alice finds Mrs. Bemis curled up on a bed in Filene's furniture department, suffering from an apparent breakdown. She immediately wants to help, and arranges to have Mrs. Bemis admitted to Montrose. Alice becomes Mrs. Bemis' therapist and probes deeply into her past, pushing her to reveal her shadowy psychological history. Through memories and dreams, Alice and Mrs. Bemis begin to piece together a heartbreaking story, including shameful secrets and forgotten sorrows, that reaches all the way back to the 1940s and turns out to be linked to a recent unsolved murder. The two women are drawn together and develop a closeness far more intimate than the average doctor-patient relationship. Alice discovers that Mrs. Bemis' recovery depends on her coming to terms with the secrets of her past.
